

SHARED RESPONSIBILITIES: COURTS AND COUNTIES

- Counties provide courthouses and security for circuit courts.
- OJD provides staffing, judges, technology, central personnel, and tools needed to provide justice services.

PROTECTING STAFF AND LITIGANTS

- Chief Justice Orders issued to keep people safe by restricting the numbers of individuals in courts and enacting measures to further public health. - Pivot to remote services with rapid expansion of Webex and other tools
- Implemented emergency authority during pandemic granted by HB 4212-A (First Special Session, 2020) through Chief Justice Order and Presiding Judge Orders





THE FOUR COMMITMENTS


- Improve services and outcomes for people who are underserved, vulnerable, or marginalized;




CHALLENGES IN FAMILY LAW CASES

HOW DO COURTS PROVIDE SAFE, EFFECTIVE, AND FAIR JUSTICE SERVICES DURING THE PANDEMIC?

 Family law includes child custody modification, parenting time orders, dissolution (divorce), and other matters impacting couples and those with children.

Economic and social stressors are now at an all-time high.



ENSURING EQUITY AND FAIRNESS IN FAMILY LAW CASES - PROCEDURAL JUSTICE

People require the court's attention more than ever.


- Self-represented litigants increases complexity and time
 - In 2020, 86.3% of Multnomah Domestic Relations cases had at least one self-represented party at time of judgment (85.7% statewide)
- Technology challenges
- Time, explanation and attention ensuring understanding is paramount
- Interpreter process takes longer in a remote setting
- Impact of stress on families: many cases will not settle
- Consistency, the need for patience and resilience
- Reducing barriers

REMOTE FILING FOR PROTECTIVE ORDERS


- During the pandemic, OJD

Webex Hearings Held in Circuit Courts





LOOKING AHEAD – 2021 PROJECTED CASELOADS


2020

- Filings decreased by 37%
- Pending caseload increased by 3%
- Pending cases taking longer to resolve and case age increases

2021

- Wave of new filings expected
- New filings will increase pending caseload
- Existing pending backlogs need to be worked
- Case age will continue to increase until courts can catch up



STRATEGIC CAMPAIGN – CRITICAL PRIORITIES



OJD BILLS - 2021 LEGISLATIVE SESSION SENATE BILLS

- Aid and Assist Reform (SB 295). Modifies processes to address persons not able to aid and assist in their defense to criminal charges. The 2021 request, supported by a broad coalition of stakeholders, includes consensus amendments to SB 1575-A.
- Chief Justice Authority During Emergencies (SB 296). Makes permanent the Chief Justice authority to extend or suspend specified statutory timelines and order remote instead of in-person appearances in civil and criminal cases during and immediately following a declared state of emergency.
- Judicial Marshal Retirement Parity (SB 297). Provides that the three Judicial Marshals are eligible for same retirement benefits as other peace officers.
- Housekeeping Measures (SB 298). Non-substantive changes that would conform language in civil stalking statutes; requires petition and declaration in sex offender reporting cases; modifies venue provisions in cases to change both name and gender identity; requires judgments identify Title IV-D child support orders; removes notarization requirement for stipulated modifications of parenting time orders.

LOOKING AHEAD – 2021 ACTION PLAN

- Develop and enhance remote hearing and services options
- Provide the full range of services and work down the backlog
- Collaborate to address the needs of Oregon's most vulnerable populations
- Focus on Strategic Campaign commitments
