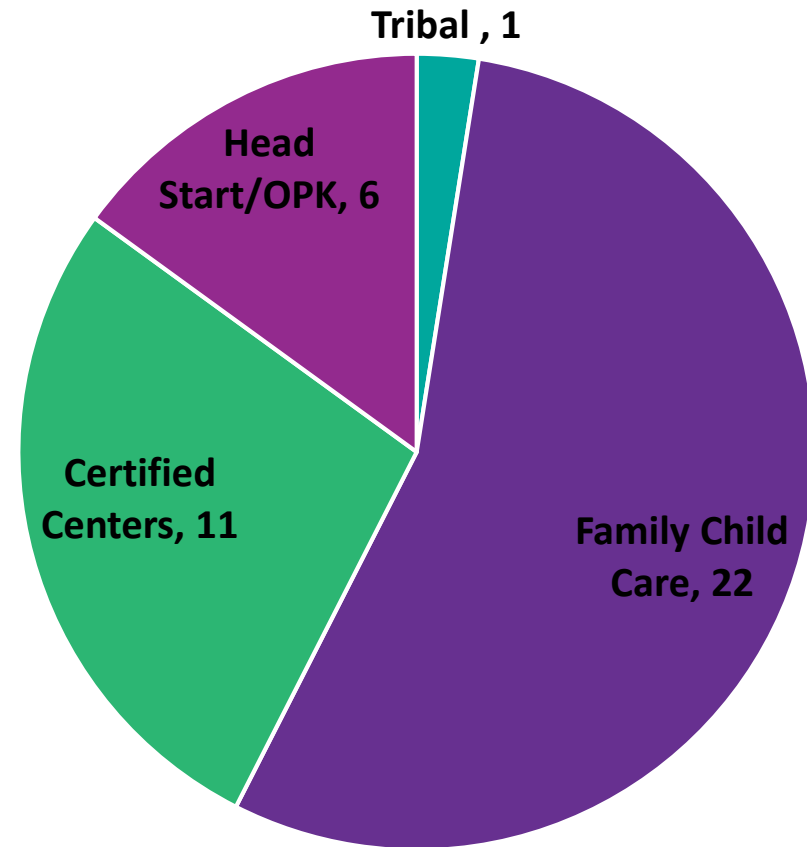

Baby Promise

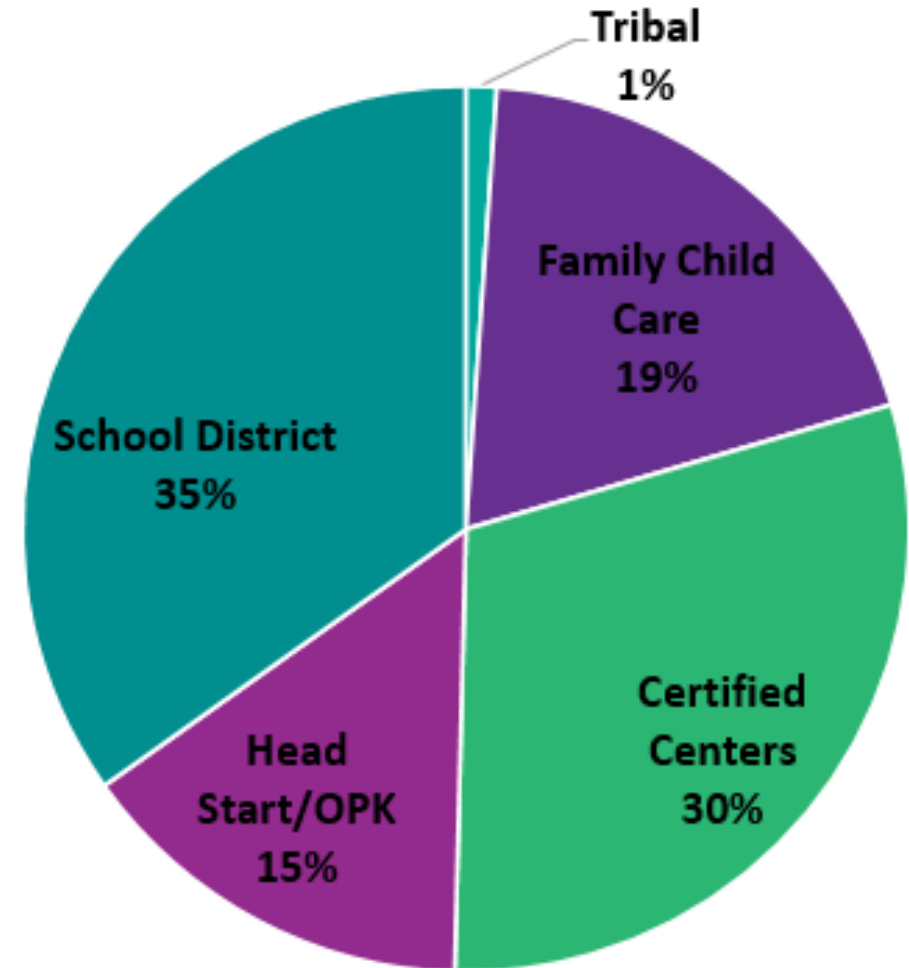
- Serves ERDC-eligible families and children
- Piloting in three regions (Central Oregon, Multnomah County, and South Coast)
- Fully subsidizes high-quality infant/toddler care for 250 families (approx. \$18-20K annually)
- Contracts with providers to “hold” slots for ERDC-eligible children over time

Preschool Promise

- 6% of eligible children served
- Fully subsidizes high-quality preschool for 3,800 families (approx. \$12K annually)
- Provides programs a portion of slots in each program
