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Self-Sufficiency Programs (SSP) Overview

- SSP serves Oregonians of all ages through a variety of interrelated programs and partnerships.
- Benefits and services work together to reduce poverty in Oregon and stop the cycle of poverty for the next generation.



Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)

SNAP offers food benefits and a bridge to employment, training, and opportunity by;

- Supplementing the monthly food budget of people who are unemployed or underemployed
- Reducing food insecurity
- Building the employment skills of recipients and supporting their pursuit of work that moves them towards self-sufficiency



SNAP Funding

- SNAP benefits are federally funded by Food and Nutrition Services (FNS) within the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA)
- Administrative costs are split evenly between federal funds and Oregon general funds
- From July 2019 to June 2020, over \$1 billion was brought into Oregon in SNAP dollars.

SNAP Overview

- An individual or household applies for benefits
- An interview is conducted, and eligibility is determined
- If eligible, an Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) card is issued. Benefits are deposited on a monthly basis.
- Employment & Training (E&T) services are offered through community partners and internal E&T Navigators
- Support services are provided to remove barriers to engagement

SNAP Use

- Fruits and vegetables
- Meat, poultry, fish and shellfish
- Dairy products
- Breads and cereals
- Other foods such as snack foods and non-alcoholic beverages
- Seeds and plants, which produce food



- Beer, wine, liquor, cigarettes, or tobacco
- Vitamins, medicines, and supplements
- Live animals
- Hot or prepared foods
- Non-food items like pet food, cleaning supplies or hygiene items

In Person

At most Oregon stores that sell food and farmers markets.

Online

For delivery through Amazon or Walmart or pickup from stores that give online options.

SNAP Outreach

Contracted SNAP Outreach partners provide:

- Information about SNAP to potentially eligible individuals
- Application assistance to individuals who want to apply
- Individualized support and referrals to SNAP participants
- We have 16 contractors which include statewide organizations such as 211 info, the Oregon Food Bank and Partners for a Hunger Free Oregon as well as local and culturally specific organizations.

SNAP Ed

- Federally funded nutrition and obesity prevention program
- SSP contracts with the Oregon State University Extension to deliver community-based nutrition education statewide

Employment & Training Program

Oregon has two types of voluntary SNAP E&T programs

- SNAP Training and Employment Program (STEP) nationally known as the SNAP 50/50 program
- Able-Bodied Adults without Dependents (ABAWD) program.

Between the SNAP E&T programs and our Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Jobs program services are provided by 140 providers and contracted partners in locations statewide (examples Oregon Employment Department, Goodwill Industries and the Community College Consortia).



COVID-19 and Wildfire Response

To help SNAP participants affected by these crises, the following temporary changes were enacted to help put food on the table:

- Maximum Emergency Supplemental Allotments- \$310 million
- Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfers for over 316,000 students totaling \$170 million
- Disaster SNAP benefits for individuals affected by the wildfires
- Adjustments to deadlines and requirements to help individuals get and keep SNAP benefits

Double Up Food Bucks

Matches up to \$10 a day of SNAP benefits used to purchase fruits and vegetables.

Benefits are matched at:

- Participating farmers markets
- Participating retail stores
- Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) farm shares
