SUBJECT: Description of how recent changes to agency budget and /or management flexibility affected agency operations.

#### CHANGES TO THE AGENCY BUDGET

- 1. The Office of Emergency Management (OEM), a division of the Oregon Military Department has recently undergone a shift in structure resulting from 2020 being the most active disaster year in the history of the state. With three major disaster declarations associated with the Eastern Oregon Floods, COVID Pandemic, and the devastating Labor Day Wildfires, OEM has bifurcated its organizational structure to have an Operations Section and a Recovery Section each overseen by a Deputy Director.
- 2. This change in structure is reflected in the 2021-23 Governor's Budget which includes 25 new positions within the Office of Emergency Management and 5 positions in the Central Human Resources and Financial Administration Divisions. These positions are meant to focus on the areas of Public Assistance, Individual Assistance and Hazard Mitigation programs across the state.
- 3. There are also numerous bills being considered by the 2021 legislature that would have an impact on the agency budget as it relates to Emergency Management. Functional areas covered by these bills include, but are not limited to:
  - a. Creating a new Department of Emergency Management
  - b. Transferring the Oregon Emergency Response System from State Police to OEM
  - c. Financing enhanced capabilities to support future wildfire response & recovery efforts
  - d. Enhanced training requirements for state and local agencies
- 4. In addition to the changes related to the Office of Emergency Management the Military Department has seen dramatic increases in federal funding related to our Camp Umatilla located in Umatilla County. This investment is primarily 100% federally supported and is focused on increasing the functional use of the Camp Umatilla site to train Oregon National Guard units as well as other National Guard units from across the country.

## MANAGEMENT FLEXIBILITY AFFECTED AGENCY OPERATIONS

1. The Adjutant General has a dual mission force. The federal mission provides trained units available for active duty in time of war or national emergency, and at such other times as the national security may require. The state mission is to provide military support to civil authorities and respond to state emergencies and to provide support to law enforcement in counter-narcotics. Under the control of The Adjutant General are two air bases, two aviation facilities, training and logistic sites and 37 armories, spanning the length and width of the state. The Adjutant General as a <u>state employee</u> is responsible for 8,444 personnel. Over 7,888 are Oregon National Guard Soldiers and Airmen of whom 2,032

occupy year-round full time positions. There are 556 state positions in the 2021-23 Governor's Budget

2. Supervisory duties of the Military Department's state managers also extend to federal employees, multiple part time employees sharing positions, contracted temporary and limited duration employees, inmate crews, medical personnel and students. For example:

Our Military Lease Agents are part time employees occupying over 40 funded positions with up to four and sometimes eight personnel to a position. The Military Lease Agents in turn manage contracts for use of Readiness Centers (Armories) and supervise the public's use of such. We have one supervisor over the entire program with one subordinate manager to assist.

Our Youth Challenge Program is a residential alternative high school. In addition to budgeted positions, the Youth Challenge Program also employs through contracts, six teachers and two medical staff. Each 5 month program (with 4 weeks between) brings up to 240 cadets/students (480 for the year) all requiring supervision from management personnel.

Our STARBASE program, which partners with school districts to teach math and science to fifth grade students, employs teachers and aids that are supervised by the management staff. Additionally, the hundreds of students attending the program each year also require direct supervision.

- 3. The size of the workforce under The Adjutant General's command can increase quickly depending up activation into federal or state active duty. Each time troops are called into State Active Duty, the <a href="state-employee roster">state employee roster</a> for the Oregon Military Department increases by the number of individuals called. State Active Duty can include fighting fires, controlling flood damage, earthquake response or any other disaster occurring in Oregon that necessitates the call of troops into action. From 2001-2020, the number of Service Members called into State Active Duty was approximately 8,746.
- 4. Since 2002 the number of Service Members the President has called into Federal Active Duty is approximately 19,097. Readiness Centers and Training Sites such as Camp Rilea and Camp Umatilla are responsible to provide training to these troops to prepare them for active duty. Preparing troops for active duty can take up to six months and requires an increase in the number of temporary and limited duration employees to handle the number of troops going through the training programs. This causes an increase of oversight duties of our state managers.

#### **PROJECT DESCRIPTION**

To construct a 26,191 square foot enlisted barracks that supports unaccompanied enlisted personnel and authorized civilians who are conducting training at Camp Umatilla.

#### **PROJECT SCOPE**

A specially designed 26,191 square foot open bay enlisted barracks of permanent construction that will house up to 160 soldiers. Construction will include all utility services, information systems, fire detection and alarm systems, fixtures, furnishings and equipment, hazardous waste remediation and disposal, roads, walks, curbs, gutters, storm drainage, parking areas, and site improvements. This facility will be designed to meet Industry Standards as well as all local, State, and Federal building codes and as per 42 U.S.C. 4154. Facilities will be designed to a minimum life of 50 years in accordance with DoD's Unified Facilities Code (UFC 1-200-02) including energy efficiencies, building envelope, and integrated building systems performance as per ASA(IE&E) Sustainable Design and Development Policy Update Dec 2017. Access for individuals with disabilities will be provided. Antiterrorism measures in accordance with the DoD Minimum Antiterrorism for building standards will be provided.

#### New requests for Limitation for inclusion in the Capital Construction Bill (2021-23):

- 2. \$6 million 100% Federal Funds for a Barracks Project at Camp Umatilla
  - a. Funding has been awarded by National Guard Bureau
  - b. Contract would be obligated in Federal Fiscal Year 22
  - c. Would require Capital Construction Limitation

### **PROJECT DESCRIPTION**

To construct up to 14,677 square foot transient barracks for advanced skills trainees participating in courses at the 249th Regional Training Institute (RTI) in accordance with the training requirements of the Oregon Army National Guard and the US Army Accreditation Standards. This facility will include up to 120 individual rooms to fulfil the need for RTI's programmed student load.

#### **PROJECT SCOPE**

A specially designed 14,677 square foot National Guard transient training barracks for advanced skills trainees conducting training at Camp Umatilla's Regional Training Institute. The project will consist of a new, permanent construction of a barracks. Construction will include all utility services, information systems, fire detection and alarm systems, fixtures, furnishings and equipment, hazardous waste remediation and disposal, roads, walks, curbs, gutters, storm drainage, parking areas, and site improvements. This facility will be designed to meet Industry Standards as well as all local, State, and Federal building codes and as per Public Law 90-480. Construct a new controlled entry point, gate, and guardhouse at Camp Umatilla Oregon to improve operational readiness and comply with Antiterrorism Force Protection requirements. The project will be of permanent construction and include an improved entry point for commercial activities, a new gate, identification check station building (guard house), roadway improvements, truck inspection lane and barricade system. Construct an 82,118 square foot (\$22.7 million federally funded and \$5.3 million State funded) National Guard Readiness Center that supports training, administrative, and logistical requirements for the Oregon Army National Guard as a replacement for the Hillsboro Armory. This multi-story facility will provide a modern, state of the art facility to promote unit readiness, training and unit Administration and will be a specially designed National Guard Readiness Center of permanent construction. Access for individuals with disabilities will be provided. This facility will be designed to meet Industry Standards as well as all local, State, and Federal building codes and as per Public Law 90-480. Antiterrorism measures in accordance with the DOD Minimum Antiterrorism for building standards will be provided.

# **Property Sales:**

1. Seeking authority to sell the Armory and Field Maintenance Shop in Lebanon due to encroachment issues and unit needs

Lebanon Armory was constructed in 1950 and consists of 15,600 square feet situated on 0.45-acres.

Lebanon Organizational Maintenance Shop was constructed in 1960 and consists of 2,223 square feet situated on 1.10-acres.

## **Extension/modification of existing limitation:**

- 1. Extending existing Other Funds Capital Construction Limitation associated with the Regional Training Institute at Camp Umatilla to December 2022
  - a. Allows for the ability to leverage federal dollars to expand on work consistent with the original scope of the project approved by the legislature in 2017.

- 2. Modify existing Other Funds Capital Construction Limitation associated with the Oregon Military Museum to allow for the transfer of donated funds from a 501C3.
  - a. The Oregon Military Museum Project is gathering donations to support the development of a Korean War Exhibit and they've raised approximately \$100,000.
  - b. The OMMP expects to continue raising funds for the project with total donations possibly topping \$200,000.
  - c. Based on a review of the project scope we believe this should actually be Other Funds Capital Improvement Limitation that can be added to our Agency Budget Bill SB 5535.

#### **PROJECT DESCRIPTION**

The purpose of this request is to be able to utilize donated funds to improve specific exhibits such as the Korean War exhibit. The ability to leverage donated funds allows OMD to utilize bond funds for improvements to other exhibit spaces.
