HB 2575 -3 STAFF MEASURE SUMMARY

WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Directs the Department of Justice to establish a program for awarding grants to law enforcement agencies and local governments to fund training for groups and agencies that interact with persons who have experienced trauma. Directs the department to develop model training program that takes into account effects of trauma and to develop best practices, in consultation with the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training, for law enforcement agencies when interacting with persons who have experienced trauma. Requires law enforcement agencies to adopt appropriate best practice policies by date specified by Department of Public Safety Standards and Training consistent with Department of Justice model training program for law enforcement personnel in training academy. Appropriates moneys from General Fund to Department of Justice for purpose of awarding training grants. Takes effect on 91st day following adjournment sine die.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

-3 Modifies certain dates associated with grant requirements established by measure. Requires the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training shall regularly review and update training on interacting with persons who have experienced trauma, consistent with the model training program developed by the Department of Justice under section 1 of this 2021 Act. Modifies effective date of certain sections of act.

BACKGROUND:

According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), people in the juvenile and criminal justice system reveal high rates of mental and substance use disorders and personal histories of trauma. A review of many public institutions and service systems that are intended to provide services and supports to individuals has found they are often themselves trauma-inducing. Additionally, it has become evident that addressing trauma requires a multi-pronged, multi-agency public health approach inclusive of public education and awareness, prevention and early identification, and effective trauma-specific assessments and responses. In public institutions and service systems, there is increasing recognition that many of the individuals have extensive histories of trauma that, left unaddressed, can get in the way of achieving well-being. As a result, there is an increasing focus on the impact of trauma and how service systems may help to alleviate trauma-related issues by conducting their duties under a trauma-informed approach.

HB 2575 establishes a program to provide grants to local agencies for trauma-informed training and to develop model training program that takes into account effects of trauma and to develop best practices for future trainings under the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training.
