Municipal Roles & Responsibilities for Protecting Water Quality:

We protect public health, safety and the environment; protecting Oregon's water quality is a partnership between State and local government.

- We are on-the-ground stewards of water quality and watershed protection: operations, community programs & partnerships, and regulations
- We are community resources: funding, technical expertise, public education and outreach
- We implement Federal and State WQ programs throughout our communities

Municipal Wastewater and Stormwater Agencies are Major Stakeholders in DEQ's Water Quality Permitting Program

- We Operate under NPDES and WPCF permits which must be implementable and affordable
- We participate in DEQ development of Total Maximum Daily Loads, Water Quality Standards, and feasible permit compliance pathways
- We fund 60% of DEQ WQ Permitting Program costs through permit fees
- Permitting and new permit requirements place significant cost burdens on Oregonians, and we seek to hold DEQ accountable for their work

Municipal Perspectives on DEQ's Water Quality Permitting Program

- > DEQ's WQ Programs have been underfunded by the State for decades, leading to:
 - -- Declining staff in TMDLs, WQ Standards & Permitting
 - --Inadequate permitting strategies/tools to address emerging WQ challenges
 - --Backlog of expired, administratively extended permits
 - --Significant fee increases without results
 - --Litigation
 - --Impacts on utility operations, community development, and the environment

DEQ WQ Programs -- Getting Back on Track...

- > 2015 Budget Note, fee increases & MWH Assessment
- Performance Improvement Program
- Increased funding and staff (2019-21 Budget)
 - --5-year Permit Issuance Plan
 - --Balanced staffing increases & coordination
 - --Significant progress, but there's more to do
- > COVID-19 economic impacts have slowed progress
- Permit issuance metrics and process are driversnegative impacts of this need to be addressed
- Continued collaboration is needed to optimize costs, benefits and environmental/social impacts

In Order to Address the Permit Backlog DEQ Should be Supported on its Current Path Without Distraction

- DEQ should stay the course, but continue to improve through listening, adaptive management, and staff training
- Increased State investment & expectations for performance, work quality, transparency, and accountability to stakeholders are needed
- Requirements for DEQ to further accelerate permit issuance, or to provide other services with limited staff, would be counterproductive
