WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Modifies definition of parole and probation officer to include certified full-time officers who are employed by the Oregon Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Barriers to accepting long term employment with the Board
- Loss of DPSST certification after certain period
- Preferred and required qualifications for employment with the Board

EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

No amendment.

BACKGROUND:

The Department of Public Safety Standards and Training (DPSST) issues certifications for public safety professions such as police officer, certified reserve officer, corrections officer, parole and probation officer, fire service professional, telecommunicator, and emergency medical dispatcher. Under current law, if a person who holds one of these certifications is not directly working in the profession for which they are certified, that person's certification will lapse after three months and expire after five years.

According to the Oregon State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision, a person certified by DPSST who is hired by the Board is subject to this lapse in certification, which may deter experienced public safety professionals from seeking employment with the Board.

Senate Bill 41 A modifies the definition of parole and probation officer to include certified full-time officers who are employed by the Oregon Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision.
