House Bill 2368

Sponsored by Representative HUDSON; Representative SALINAS (Presession filed.)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced.

Establishes pilot program to improve educational outcomes by using trauma-informed approaches to education, health services and intervention strategies. Requires report on preliminary evaluation of progress of pilot program. Declares emergency, effective July 1, 2021.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to pilot program for trauma-informed approaches; and declaring an emergency.

3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. (1) As used in this section, "trauma-informed approach" means an approach 4

 $\mathbf{5}$ that recognizes the signs and symptoms of trauma in students, families and staff and re-

6 sponds by fully integrating knowledge about trauma into policies, procedures and practices

7 for the purposes of resisting the reoccurrence of trauma and promoting resiliency.

8 (2) The Department of Education, in coordination with the Oregon Health Authority, 9 shall establish a pilot program to improve educational outcomes by using trauma-informed 10 approaches. Under the pilot program, the department shall coordinate with the authority 11 to distribute moneys to school districts and education service districts for the purpose of 12improving educational outcomes by implementing trauma-informed approaches to education, health services and intervention strategies. 13

14 (3)(a) A school district or an education service district may apply to receive moneys under this section: 15

16 (A) By submitting an application that includes a proposal consistent with subsection (4) 17 of this section; and

18 (B) If the district has at least one school in the district with:

(i) A school-based health center; or 19

20 (ii) A school-based system for providing behavioral health services and care coordination 21that may include a school nurse, a school counselor, a school psychologist, a clinical psy-22chologist or a school social worker.

23 (b) A school district or an education service district may submit an application jointly 24 with one or more community partners that will participate with the district in the pilot 25program described in subsection (4) of this section.

26 (4) The department shall distribute moneys to an applicant based on the applicant's pro-27posal to design and implement a pilot program to improve educational outcomes by using 28trauma-informed approaches to education, health services and intervention strategies that 29 are based in schools and take advantage of community resources. The proposal must include 30 a plan that:

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1 (a) Coordinates the services provided by:

2 (A) The school;

(B) The school-based health center or the administrator of the school-based system de scribed in subsection (3)(a)(B)(ii) of this section; and

5 (C) Coordinated care organizations, public health entities, nonprofit youth service pro-6 viders, community-based organizations, social justice groups and similar groups that are lo-7 cated in the community;

8 (b) Requires professional development and support for school staff, including educators, 9 school district or education service district professionals, counselors, nurses, classified staff 10 and other staff of the school district or education service district, to create a culture in the 11 district and community that is informed about how to understand, recognize and respond to 12 trauma;

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(c) Provides for at least one trauma specialist who:

14 (A) Is permanently assigned at the school-based health center or at the location where 15 the school-based system described in subsection (3)(a)(B)(ii) of this section is provided; and

(B) Oversees the implementation of the plan, including coordinating the services de scribed in paragraph (a) of this subsection and coordinating the professional development and
 support described in paragraph (b) of this subsection;

(d) Indicates how services coordinated under paragraph (a) of this subsection are pro vided based on a trauma-informed approach and with an understanding, recognition and re sponsiveness to the effects of trauma on education, absenteeism and school completion;

(e) Uses evidence-based and evidence-informed approaches, culturally specific approaches
when appropriate and national models that are tailored to the community to ensure that data
are collected and the effectiveness of the pilot program is determined;

(f) Provides matching community funding, or resources that are the monetary equivalent
 of matching funding, in a ratio determined by the State Board of Education by rule; and

(g) Pursues additional funding opportunities, including funding under the federal Every
Student Succeeds Act (P.L. 114-95).

(5) The department shall prescribe the timelines by which an applicant may submit an
 application to receive moneys under this section and the form of the application.

(6) The department shall evaluate and rank applications based on the proposals submitted
 in the applications.

33 (7) The department shall distribute moneys to applicants based on:

(a) Participation in other pilot programs related to trauma-informed approaches to edu cation, health services and intervention strategies;

36 (b) The evaluations and rankings described in subsection (6) of this section;

37 (c) The moneys appropriated to the department for the purpose of this section;

38 (d) The amount of matching community funding available to the applicant; and

39 (e) Any available federal grants.

(8)(a) The department, in collaboration with the Oregon Health Authority, shall provide
 coordination among school districts and education service districts receiving moneys under
 this section.

(b) The department may coordinate with a statewide nonprofit organization that has ex perience in supporting school-based health centers and student health organizations for the
 organization to provide technical assistance to school districts and education service dis-

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1 tricts receiving moneys under this section.

2 (9) Each participating school district and education service district shall provide regular

reports on the progress of the district's pilot program to the department to enable the de partment to:

(a) Determine the effectiveness of the pilot program; and

6 (b) Submit reports and recommendations for legislation to the interim committees of the 7 Legislative Assembly related to education as required under subsection (10) of this section.

8 (10) The Department of Education and the Oregon Health Authority, in collaboration with 9 any statewide nonprofit organization described in subsection (8) of this section, shall submit 10 reports to the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to education as fol-11 lows:

(a) The first report must be submitted no later than September 15, 2021, and must pro vide a preliminary evaluation on the progress of the pilot program, including participants'
 experiences with a previous related pilot program.

(b) The second report must be submitted no later than June 30, 2024, and must provide
 individual and comprehensive evaluations on the outcomes of the pilot program and include
 any recommendations for legislation based on the results of the pilot program.

18 <u>SECTION 2.</u> Section 1 of this 2021 Act is repealed on June 30, 2024.

19 <u>SECTION 3.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropri-20 ated to the Department of Education, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, out of the 21 General Fund, the amount of \$_____, which shall be expended for the pilot program estab-22 lished by section 1 of this 2021 Act.

23 <u>SECTION 4.</u> This 2021 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public 24 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2021 Act takes effect 25 July 1, 2021.

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
