### “RENAMING AND REORGANIZATION OF THE OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

20 “**SECTION 1.** (1) The amendments to ORS 401.052, 401.054, 401.062, 401.072, 401.076,  
21 401.082, 401.088 and 401.092 by sections 2 to 9 of this 2021 Act are intended to change the  
22 name of the ‘Office of Emergency Management’ to the ‘Oregon Department of Emergency  
23 Management’ and to establish that entity as a state agency independent from the Oregon  
24 Military Department.

25 “(2) For the purpose of harmonizing and clarifying statutory law, the Legislative Counsel  
26 may substitute for words designating the ‘Office of Emergency Management,’ wherever they  
27 occur in statutory law, other words designating the ‘Oregon Department of Emergency  
28 Management.’

29 “**SECTION 2.** ORS 401.052 is amended to read:

30 “401.052. (1) The [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management is established [*in the*  
31 *Oregon Military Department*].

32 “(2) The [office] **department** shall be responsible for:

33 “(a) Coordinating and facilitating private sector and governmental efforts to prevent, prepare  
34 for, respond to and recover from emergencies; and

35 “(b) Coordinating exercises and training, planning, preparedness, response, mitigation and re-

1   covery activities with state and local emergency services agencies and organizations.

2       “(3) The [office] **department** shall prepare a statewide emergency management plan and update  
3 the plan from time to time as necessary.

4       “**SECTION 3.** ORS 401.054 is amended to read:

5       “401.054. (1) Each of the following agencies, entities and officials shall designate an individual  
6 to act as a liaison with the [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management:

7       “(a) The Department of Consumer and Business Services;

8       “(b) The Department of Corrections;

9       “(c) The Department of Education;

10       “(d) The Department of Environmental Quality;

11       “(e) The Department of Human Services;

12       “(f) The Department of Justice;

13       “(g) The Department of Land Conservation and Development;

14       “(h) The Department of Public Safety Standards and Training;

15       “(i) The Department of State Lands;

16       “(j) The Department of State Police;

17       “(k) The Department of Transportation;

18       “(L) The Department of Veterans’ Affairs;

19       “(m) The Employment Department;

20       “(n) The Housing and Community Services Department;

21       “(o) The Judicial Department;

22       “(p) The Oregon Business Development Department;

23       “(q) The Oregon Department of Administrative Services;

24       “(r) The Oregon Department of Aviation;

25       “(s) The Oregon Health Authority;

26       “(t) The Oregon Military Department;

27       “(u) The Oregon Tourism Commission;

28       “(v) The Public Utility Commission of Oregon;

29       “(w) The Secretary of State;

30       “(x) The State Department of Agriculture;

31       “(y) The State Department of Energy;

32       “(z) The State Department of Fish and Wildlife;

33       “(aa) The State Department of Geology and Mineral Industries;

34       “(bb) The State Fire Marshal;

35       “(cc) The State Forestry Department;

36       “(dd) The State Marine Board;

37       “(ee) The State Parks and Recreation Department;

38       “(ff) The Travel Information Council; and

39       “(gg) The Water Resources Department.

40       “(2) Each agency, entity and official required to designate a liaison under this section shall  
41 designate an individual who has authority during an emergency to allocate resources and assets of  
42 the agency, entity or official.

43       “(3) Each individual designated as a liaison under subsection (1) of this section shall assist in  
44 the coordination of the functions of the agency, entity or official that designated the individual that  
45 relate to emergency preparedness and response with similar functions of the [Office] **Oregon De-**

1 **partment** of Emergency Management.

2 “**SECTION 4.** ORS 401.062 is amended to read:

3 “401.062. (1) The [*Office*] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management is under the super-  
4 vision and control of a director, who is responsible for the performance of the duties, functions and  
5 powers of the [*office*] **department**.

6 “(2) [*The Adjutant General, with the approval of*] The Governor[,] shall appoint the Director of  
7 the [*Office*] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management, who holds office at the pleasure of the  
8 [*Adjutant General.*] **Governor. The appointment of the director is subject to confirmation by**  
9 **the Senate in the manner prescribed by ORS 171.562 and 171.565.**

10 “(3) The director shall be paid a salary as provided by law or, if not so provided, as prescribed  
11 by [*the Adjutant General, with the approval of*] the Governor.

12 “(4) For purposes of administration, subject to the approval of the [*Adjutant General*]  
13 **Governor**, the director may organize and reorganize the [*office*] **department** as the director con-  
14 sidered necessary to properly conduct the work of the [*office*] **department**.

15 “(5) The director may divide the functions of the [*office*] **department** into administrative divi-  
16 sions. Subject to the approval of the [*Adjutant General*] **Governor**, the director may appoint an in-  
17 dividual to administer each division. The administrator of each division serves at the pleasure of the  
18 director and is not subject to the provisions of ORS chapter 240. Each individual appointed under  
19 this subsection must be well qualified by technical training and experience in the functions to be  
20 performed by the individual.

21 “**SECTION 5.** ORS 401.072 is amended to read:

22 “401.072. (1) The Director of the [*Office*] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management may,  
23 by written order filed with the Secretary of State, appoint a deputy director. The deputy director  
24 serves at the pleasure of the director, has authority to act for the director in the absence of the  
25 director and is subject to the control of the director at all times.

26 “(2) Subject to any applicable provisions of ORS chapter 240, the director shall appoint all sub-  
27 ordinate officers and employees of the [*Office of Emergency Management*] **department**, prescribe  
28 their duties and fix their compensation.

29 “**SECTION 6.** ORS 401.076 is amended to read:

30 “401.076. In accordance with applicable provisions of ORS chapter 183, the Director of the [*Of-*  
31 *fice*] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management may adopt rules necessary for the adminis-  
32 tration of the laws that the [*Office of Emergency Management*] **department** is charged with  
33 administering.

34 “**SECTION 7.** ORS 401.092 is amended to read:

35 “401.092. (1) The Director of the [*Office*] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management is  
36 responsible for coordinating and facilitating exercises and training, emergency planning,  
37 preparedness, response, mitigation and recovery activities with the state and local emergency ser-  
38 vices agencies and organizations, and shall[, *with the approval of the Adjutant General or as directed*  
39 *by the Governor*]:

40 “(a) Make rules that are necessary and proper for the administration and implementation of this  
41 chapter;

42 “(b) Coordinate the activities of all public and private organizations specifically related to pro-  
43 viding emergency services within this state;

44 “(c) Maintain a cooperative liaison with emergency management agencies and organizations of  
45 local governments, other states and the federal government;

1 “(d) Have such additional authority, duties and responsibilities authorized by this chapter or as  
2 may be directed by the Governor;

3 “(e) Administer grants relating to emergency program management under ORS 401.305, emer-  
4 gency services for the state and the statewide 2-1-1 system as provided in ORS 403.430;

5 “(f) Provide for and staff [a] **the State Emergency Operations Center** to aid the Governor and  
6 the [*Office of Emergency Management*] **department** in the performance of duties under this chapter;

7 “(g) Serve as the Governor’s authorized representative for coordination of certain response ac-  
8 tivities and managing the recovery process;

9 “(h) Establish training and professional standards for local emergency program management  
10 personnel;

11 “(i) Establish task forces and advisory groups to assist the [*office*] **department** in achieving  
12 mandated responsibilities;

13 “(j) Enforce compliance requirements of federal and state agencies for receiving funds and con-  
14 ducting designated emergency functions;

15 “(k) Oversee the design, implementation and support of a statewide 2-1-1 system as provided  
16 under ORS 403.415; and

17 “(L) Coordinate the activities of state and local governments to enable state and local govern-  
18 ments to work together during domestic incidents as provided in the National Incident Management  
19 System established by the Homeland Security Presidential Directive 5 of February 28, 2003.

20 “(2) Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, the State Forester shall serve as the  
21 Governor’s authorized representative for the purpose of initiating the fire management assistance  
22 declaration process with the Federal Emergency Management Agency and administering Federal  
23 Emergency Management Agency fire management assistance grants.

24 “**SECTION 8.** ORS 401.082 is amended to read:

25 “401.082. (1) To aid and advise the Director of the [*Office*] **Oregon Department** of Emergency  
26 Management in the performance of the functions of the [*Office*] **Oregon Department** of Emergency  
27 Management, the director may establish such advisory and technical committees as the director  
28 considers necessary. The committees may be continuing or temporary. The director shall determine  
29 the representation, membership, terms and organization of the committees and shall appoint their  
30 members. The director is an ex officio member of each committee.

31 “(2) Members of the committees are not entitled to compensation, but in the discretion of the  
32 director may be reimbursed from funds available to the [*office*] **department** for actual and necessary  
33 travel and other expenses incurred by them in the performance of their official duties in the manner  
34 and amount provided in ORS 292.495.

35 “**SECTION 9.** ORS 401.088 is amended to read:

36 “401.088. The Director of the [*Office*] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management may en-  
37 ter into interagency agreements with other state agencies that the director determines are neces-  
38 sary to carry out the duties of the [*Office*] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management.

40 “(Finance)

41  
42 “**SECTION 10.** (1) **The unexpended balances of amounts authorized to be expended by the**  
43 **Oregon Military Department for purposes of the Office of Emergency Management for the**  
44 **biennium beginning July 1, 2021, from revenues dedicated, continuously appropriated, appro-**  
45 **priated or otherwise made available to the department, are transferred to and are available**

1 for expenditure by the Oregon Department of Emergency Management for the biennium be-  
2 ginning July 1, 2021.

3 “(2) The expenditure classifications, if any, established by Acts authorizing or limiting  
4 expenditures by the Office of Emergency Management remain applicable to expenditures by  
5 the Oregon Department of Emergency Management under this section.

6  
7 “(Action, Proceeding, Prosecution)

8  
9 “SECTION 11. The amendments to ORS 401.052, 401.054, 401.062, 401.072, 401.076, 401.082,  
10 401.088 and 401.092 by sections 2 to 9 of this 2021 Act do not affect any action, proceeding or  
11 prosecution involving or with respect to any duties, functions and powers of the Office of  
12 Emergency Management begun before and pending as of the operative date specified in sec-  
13 tion 155 of this 2021 Act, except that the Oregon Department of Emergency Management is  
14 substituted for the Office of Emergency Management in any such action, proceeding or  
15 prosecution.

16  
17 “(Liability, Duty, Obligation)

18  
19 “SECTION 12. (1) Nothing in the amendments to ORS 401.052, 401.054, 401.062, 401.072,  
20 401.076, 401.082, 401.088 and 401.092 by sections 2 to 9 of this 2021 Act relieves a person of a  
21 liability, duty or obligation accruing under or with respect to the duties, functions and pow-  
22 ers conferred by those statutes prior to the operative date specified in section 155 of this 2021  
23 Act. The Oregon Department of Emergency Management may undertake the collection or  
24 enforcement of any such liability, duty or obligation.

25 “(2) The rights and obligations of the Office of Emergency Management legally incurred  
26 under contracts, leases and business transactions executed, entered into or begun before the  
27 operative date specified in section 155 of this 2021 Act are transferred to the Oregon De-  
28 partment of Emergency Management. For the purpose of succession to these rights and ob-  
29 ligations, the Oregon Department of Emergency Management is a continuation of the Office  
30 of Emergency Management and not a new authority.

32 “(Rules, References)

33  
34 “SECTION 13. The rules of the Office of Emergency Management in effect on the opera-  
35 tive date specified in section 155 of this 2021 Act continue in effect until superseded or re-  
36 pealed by rules of the Oregon Department of Emergency Management. References in rules  
37 of the Office of Emergency Management to the Office of Emergency Management or an of-  
38 ficer or employee of the Office of Emergency Management are considered to be references  
39 to the Oregon Department of Emergency Management or an officer or employee of the  
40 Oregon Department of Emergency Management.

41 “SECTION 14. Whenever, in any statutory law or resolution of the Legislative Assembly  
42 or in any rule, document, record or proceeding authorized by the Legislative Assembly, ref-  
43 erence is made to the Office of Emergency Management or an officer or employee of the  
44 Office of Emergency Management, the reference is considered to be a reference to the  
45 Oregon Department of Emergency Management or an officer or employee of the Oregon

1 **Department of Emergency Management.**

2  
3 **“(Initial Director)**

4  
5 **“SECTION 15. The Director of the Office of Emergency Management on the operative**  
6 **date specified in section 155 of this 2021 Act shall serve as the initial Director of the Oregon**  
7 **Department of Emergency Management at the pleasure of the Governor and without the**  
8 **need for confirmation by the Senate.**

9  
10 **“(Transfer of Emergency Powers to**  
11 **the Oregon Department of Emergency Management)**

12  
13 **“SECTION 16.** ORS 401.094 is amended to read:

14 “401.094. (1)(a) The Department of State Police shall maintain a system for the notification and  
15 interagency coordination of state resources in response to emergencies involving multijurisdictional  
16 cooperation between the various levels of government and private business entities.

17 “(b) The department shall provide the [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management  
18 with a service level agreement that describes the continued daily operations and maintenance of the  
19 system, the services and supplies needed to maintain the system 24 hours a day, every day of the  
20 year, and the policies and procedures that support the overall notification system.

21 “(2) The notification system shall be managed by the [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency  
22 Management as a continuously available communications network and a component of the state’s  
23 emergency operations center.

24 “(3) The notification system shall be the primary point of contact by which any public agency  
25 provides the state notification of an emergency or disaster, or requests access to state and federal  
26 resources.

27 “(4) Each department of state government, and those agencies of state government identified in  
28 the statewide emergency management plan prepared under ORS 401.052 as having emergency service  
29 or administrative responsibilities, shall appoint an emergency management coordinator as their  
30 representative to work with the [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management on the  
31 development and implementation of emergency plans and procedures.

32 “(5) The [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management shall adopt rules relating to  
33 the planning, administration and operation of the notification system maintained under this section.

34 **“SECTION 16a.** ORS 401.094, as amended by section 16 of this 2021 Act, is amended to read:

35 “401.094. (1)[(a)] The **Oregon** Department of [State Police] **Emergency Management** shall  
36 maintain a system for the notification and interagency coordination of state resources in response  
37 to emergencies involving multijurisdictional cooperation between the various levels of government  
38 and private business entities.

39 “[*(b) The department shall provide the Oregon Department of Emergency Management with a ser-*  
40 *vice level agreement that describes the continued daily operations and maintenance of the system, the*  
41 *services and supplies needed to maintain the system 24 hours a day, every day of the year, and the*  
42 *policies and procedures that support the overall notification system.*]

43 “(2) The notification system shall be managed by the [Oregon Department of Emergency Man-  
44 agement] **department** as a continuously available communications network and a component of the  
45 state’s emergency operations center.

1 “(3) The notification system shall be the primary point of contact by which any public agency  
2 provides the state notification of an emergency or disaster, or requests access to state and federal  
3 resources.

4 “(4) Each department of state government, and those agencies of state government identified in  
5 the statewide emergency management plan prepared under ORS 401.052 as having emergency service  
6 or administrative responsibilities, shall appoint an emergency management coordinator as their  
7 representative to work with the [*Oregon Department of Emergency Management*] **department** on the  
8 development and implementation of emergency plans and procedures.

9 “(5) The [*Oregon Department of Emergency Management*] **department** shall adopt rules relating  
10 to the planning, administration and operation of the notification system maintained under this sec-  
11 tion.

12 “**NOTE:** Sections 17 through 23 were deleted by amendment. Subsequent sections were not re-  
13 numbered.

14 “**SECTION 24.** ORS 476.590 is amended to read:

15 “476.590. The State Fire Marshal, **in consultation with the Director of the Oregon Depart-**  
16 **ment of Emergency Management**, shall prepare plans for the effective carrying out of the pro-  
17 visions of ORS 476.520 to 476.610 and provide advice and counsel to the Governor for the most  
18 practical utilization under ORS 476.520 to 476.610 of the fire-fighting resources of this state.

19 “**NOTE:** Section 25 was deleted by amendment. Subsequent sections were not renumbered.

20  
21 “(Emergency Preparedness Functions)  
22

23 “**SECTION 25a.** The Oregon Department of Emergency Management shall carry out the  
24 following functions:

25 “(1) Coordinate emergency management functions on a regional basis within this state;

26 “(2) Coordinate training related to emergency response on a regional basis within this  
27 state; and

28 “(3) Develop and carry out emergency preparedness exercises on a statewide basis.  
29

30 “(Conforming Amendments)  
31

32 “**SECTION 26.** ORS 195.260 is amended to read:

33 “195.260. (1) In order to reduce the risk of serious bodily injury or death resulting from rapidly  
34 moving landslides, a local government:

35 “(a) Shall exercise all available authority to protect the public during emergencies, consistent  
36 with ORS 401.032.

37 “(b) May require a geotechnical report and, if a report is required, shall provide for a coordi-  
38 nated review of the geotechnical report by the State Department of Geology and Mineral Industries  
39 or the State Forestry Department, as appropriate, before issuing a building permit for a site in a  
40 further review area.

41 “(c) Except those structures exempt from building codes under ORS 455.310 and 455.315, shall  
42 amend its land use regulations, or adopt new land use regulations, to regulate the siting of dwellings  
43 and other structures designed for human occupancy, including those being restored under ORS  
44 215.130 (6), in further review areas where there is evidence of substantial risk for rapidly moving  
45 landslides. All final decisions under this paragraph and paragraph (b) of this subsection are the re-

1 responsibility of the local government with jurisdiction over the site. A local government may not  
2 delegate such final decisions to any state agency.

3 “(d) May deny a request to issue a building permit if a geotechnical report discloses that the  
4 entire parcel is subject to a rapidly moving landslide or that the subject lot or parcel does not  
5 contain sufficient buildable area that is not subject to a rapidly moving landslide.

6 “(e) Shall maintain a record, available to the public, of properties for which a geotechnical re-  
7 port has been prepared within the jurisdiction of the local government.

8 “(2) A landowner allowed a building permit under subsection (1)(c) of this section shall sign a  
9 statement that shall:

10 “(a) Be recorded with the county clerk of the county in which the property is located, in which  
11 the landowner acknowledges that the landowner may not in the future bring any action against an  
12 adjacent landowner about the effects of rapidly moving landslides on or adjacent to the landowner’s  
13 property; and

14 “(b) Record in the deed records for the county where the lot or parcel is located a nonrevocable  
15 deed restriction that the landowner signs and acknowledges, that contains a legal description com-  
16 plying with ORS 93.600 and that prohibits any present or future owner of the property from bringing  
17 any action against an adjacent landowner about the effects of rapidly moving landslides on or ad-  
18 jacent to the property.

19 “(3) Restrictions on forest practices adopted under ORS 527.710 (10) do not apply to risk situ-  
20 ations arising solely from the construction of a building designed for human occupancy in a further  
21 review area on or after October 23, 1999.

22 “(4) The following state agencies shall implement the following specific responsibilities to reduce  
23 the risk of serious bodily injury or death resulting from rapidly moving landslides:

24 “(a) The State Department of Geology and Mineral Industries shall:

25 “(A) Identify and map further review areas selected in cooperation with local governments and  
26 in coordination with the State Forestry Department, and provide technical assistance to local gov-  
27 ernments to facilitate the use and application of this information pursuant to subsection (1)(b) of this  
28 section; and

29 “(B) Provide public education regarding landslide hazards.

30 “(b) The State Forestry Department shall regulate forest operations to reduce the risk of serious  
31 bodily injury or death from rapidly moving landslides directly related to forest operations, and assist  
32 local governments in the siting review of permanent dwellings on and adjacent to forestlands in  
33 further review areas pursuant to subsection (1)(b) of this section.

34 “(c) The Land Conservation and Development Commission may take steps under its existing  
35 authority to assist local governments to appropriately apply the requirements of subsection (1)(c)  
36 of this section.

37 “(d) The Department of Transportation shall provide warnings to motorists during periods de-  
38 termined to be of highest risk of rapidly moving landslides along areas on state highways with a  
39 history of being most vulnerable to rapidly moving landslides.

40 “(e) The [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management shall coordinate state re-  
41 sources for rapid and effective response to landslide-related emergencies.

42 “(5) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any state or local agency adopting rules related  
43 to the risk of serious bodily injury or death from rapidly moving landslides shall do so only in con-  
44 formance with the policies and provisions of ORS 195.250 to 195.260.

45 “(6) No state or local agency may adopt or enact any rule or ordinance for the purpose of re-

1 ducing risk of serious bodily injury or death from rapidly moving landslides that limits the use of  
2 land that is in addition to land identified as a further review area by the State Department of  
3 Geology and Mineral Industries or the State Forestry Department pursuant to subsection (4) of this  
4 section.

5 “(7) Except as provided in ORS 527.710 or in Oregon’s ocean and coastal land use planning  
6 goals, no state agency may adopt criteria regulating activities for the purpose of reducing risk of  
7 serious bodily injury or death from rapidly moving landslides on lands subject to the provisions of  
8 ORS 195.250 to 195.260 that are more restrictive than the criteria adopted by a local government  
9 pursuant to subsection (1)(c) of this section.

10 “**SECTION 27.** ORS 244.050 is amended to read:

11 “244.050. (1) On or before April 15 of each year the following persons shall file with the Oregon  
12 Government Ethics Commission a verified statement of economic interest as required under this  
13 chapter:

14 “(a) The Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Attorney General, Commissioner of the  
15 Bureau of Labor and Industries, district attorneys and members of the Legislative Assembly.

16 “(b) Any judicial officer, including justices of the peace and municipal judges, except any pro  
17 tem judicial officer who does not otherwise serve as a judicial officer.

18 “(c) Any candidate for a public office designated in paragraph (a) or (b) of this subsection.

19 “(d) The Deputy Attorney General.

20 “(e) The Deputy Secretary of State.

21 “(f) The Legislative Administrator, the Legislative Counsel, the Legislative Fiscal Officer, the  
22 Legislative Policy and Research Director, the Secretary of the Senate, the Chief Clerk of the House  
23 of Representatives and the Legislative Equity Officer.

24 “(g) The president and vice presidents, or their administrative equivalents, in each public uni-  
25 versity listed in ORS 352.002.

26 “(h) The following state officers:

27 “(A) Adjutant General.

28 “(B) Director of Agriculture.

42 “(3) By April 15 next after the filing deadline for the primary election, each candidate described

27 ministrative Services to:

28 “(a) Review and verify the security of information systems operated by or on behalf of state

30 “(b) Monitor state network traffic to identify and react to security threats; and

31 “(c) Conduct vulnerability assessments of state agency information systems for the purpose of  
32 evaluating and responding to the susceptibility of information systems to attack, disruption or any  
33 other event that threatens the availability, integrity or confidentiality of information systems or the  
34 information stored in information systems.

35 “(4) The State Chief Information Officer shall contract with qualified, independent consultants  
36 for the purpose of conducting vulnerability assessments under subsection (3) of this section.

37 “(5) In collaboration with appropriate agencies, the State Chief Information Officer shall develop  
38 and implement policies for responding to events that damage or threaten the availability, integrity  
39 or confidentiality of information systems or the information stored in information systems, whether  
40 those systems are within, interoperable with or outside the state’s shared computing and network  
41 infrastructure. In the policies, the State Chief Information Officer shall prescribe actions reasonably  
42 necessary to:

43 “(a) Promptly assemble and deploy in a coordinated manner the expertise, tools and methodol-  
44 ogies required to prevent or mitigate the damage caused or threatened by an event;

45 “(b) Promptly alert other persons of the event and of the actions reasonably necessary to pre-

1 vent or mitigate the damage caused or threatened by the event;

2 “(c) Implement forensic techniques and controls developed under subsection (6) of this section;

3 “(d) Evaluate the event for the purpose of possible improvements to the security of information  
4 systems; and

5 “(e) Communicate and share information with appropriate agencies, using preexisting incident  
6 response capabilities.

7 “(6) After consultation and collaborative development with appropriate agencies and the Oregon  
8 Department of Administrative Services, the State Chief Information Officer shall implement forensic  
9 techniques and controls for the security of information systems, whether those systems are within,  
10 interoperable with or outside the state’s shared computing and network infrastructure. The tech-  
11 niques and controls must include using specialized expertise, tools and methodologies to investigate  
12 events that damage or threaten the availability, integrity or confidentiality of information systems  
13 or the information stored in information systems. The State Chief Information Officer shall consult  
14 with the Oregon State Police, the [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management, the  
15 Governor and others as necessary in developing forensic techniques and controls under this section.

16 “(7) The State Chief Information Officer shall ensure that reasonably appropriate remedial  
17 actions are undertaken when the State Chief Information Officer finds that such actions are rea-  
18 sonably necessary by reason of vulnerability assessments of information systems under subsection  
19 (3) of this section, evaluation of events under subsection (5) of this section and other evaluations  
20 and audits.

21 “(8)(a) State agencies are responsible for securing computers, hardware, software, storage media,  
22 networks, operational procedures and processes used in collecting, processing, storing, sharing or  
23 distributing information outside the state’s shared computing and network infrastructure, following  
24 information security standards, policies and procedures established by the State Chief Information  
25 Officer and developed collaboratively with the agencies. Agencies may establish plans, standards and  
26 measures that are more stringent than the standards established by the State Chief Information Of-  
27 ficer to address specific agency needs if the plans, standards and measures do not contradict or  
28 contravene the state information systems security plan. Independent agency security plans must be  
29 developed within the framework of the state information systems security plan.

30 “(b) A state agency shall report the results of any vulnerability assessment, evaluation or audit  
31 conducted by the agency to the State Chief Information Officer for the purposes of consolidating  
32 statewide security reporting and, when appropriate, to prompt a state incident response.

34 “(a) Research and student computer systems used by or in conjunction with any public univer-

1 members must be representatives of cyber-related industries in Oregon. The voting members of the

14 “(3) The State Chief Information Officer shall provide administrative and staff support and fa-  
15 cilities as necessary for the council to carry out the purposes set forth in this section.

16 “(4) The purposes of the council are to:

17 “(a) Serve as the statewide advisory body to the State Chief Information Officer on  
18 cybersecurity.

19 “(b) Provide a statewide forum for discussing and resolving cybersecurity issues.

20 “(c) Provide information and recommend best practices concerning cybersecurity and resilience  
21 measures to public and private entities.

22 “(d) Coordinate cybersecurity information sharing and promote shared and real-time situational  
23 awareness between the public and private sectors in this state.

24 “(e) Encourage the development of the cybersecurity workforce through measures including, but  
25 not limited to, competitions aimed at building workforce skills, disseminating best practices, facili-  
26 tating cybersecurity research and encouraging industry investment and partnership with post-  
27 secondary institutions of education and other career readiness programs.

28 “(5) The council may adopt rules necessary for the operation of the council.

29 “(6)(a) A majority of the voting members of the council constitutes a quorum for the transaction  
30 of business.

31 “(b) Official action by the council requires the approval of a majority of the voting members of  
32 the council.

33 “(7) The State Chief Information Officer shall appoint one member of the council to serve as  
34 chairperson and one member of the council to serve as vice chairperson.

35 “(8)(a) The term of office of each voting member of the council is four years, but a member  
36 serves at the pleasure of the State Chief Information Officer.

37 “(b) Before the expiration of the term of a voting member, the State Chief Information Officer,

39 the appointment. A voting member is eligible for reappointment.

11 “377.833. (1) The Department of Transportation shall work together with the Travel Information  
12 Council, the [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management, the Department of State Po-  
13 lice, the Secretary of State and owners of digital billboards to develop a public notification plan for  
14 the purpose of using digital billboards to display notifications to the traveling public related to civic

27 “399.035. (1) In addition to the federally recognized Oregon National Guard subject to call or  
28 order to federal service under laws of the United States, there shall be organized within the state  
29 a National Guard Reserve force. Such force shall be known as the Oregon Civil Defense Force, and  
30 shall be composed principally of officers, warrant officers and enlisted persons not eligible for gen-  
31 eral service under federal selective service laws.

32 “(2) In time of peace the Oregon Civil Defense Force shall be maintained at cadre strength in  
33 numbers to be determined by the Governor.

44 with the Adjutant General, may assign delegate members of the Oregon State Police Civil Defense  
45 Force to command centers throughout this state.

1 “(b) The sheriff of a county in this state may form a volunteer County Civil Defense Force for  
2 the purpose of providing emergency response and communications, medical assistance, logistical  
3 support and other aid authorized by the sheriff.

4 “(6) Volunteers in the Oregon State Police Civil Defense Force or a County Civil Defense Force  
5 must possess and demonstrate experience or training in the military, law enforcement, communi-  
6 cations, rescue operations or logistical support.

7 “(7)(a) Volunteers in the Oregon State Police Civil Defense Force or a County Civil Defense  
8 Force are not, by virtue of volunteering in the force, considered:

9 “(A) Members of the Oregon Civil Defense Force;

10 “(B) Employees or volunteers of the state;

11 “(C) In ‘state service,’ as that term is defined in ORS 240.015; or

12 “(D) Agents of a public body under ORS 30.260 to 30.300 (Oregon Tort Claims Act) for the pur-  
13 pose of acts and omissions of the volunteer that are within the course and scope of the volunteer’s  
14 duties.

15 “(b) Unless entitled to compensation, reimbursement, benefits or coverage under any other pro-  
16 vision of law, volunteers in the Oregon State Police Civil Defense Force or a County Civil Defense  
17 Force are not entitled to compensation, reimbursement for expenses, workers’ compensation or other  
18 insurance coverage, public employment benefits or entitlements from the Oregon Military Depart-  
19 ment, the [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management or any other state or local  
20 agency or government.

21 “**SECTION 32.** ORS 401.096 is amended to read:

22 “401.096. (1) The [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management is designated as the  
23 sole agency of the State of Oregon for the purpose of negotiating agreements with the United States  
24 Department of Homeland Security or other appropriate federal agency, on behalf of the state, for the  
25 acquisition of federal funds for the purpose of providing emergency program management and  
26 emergency services.

27 “(2) When applying for funds described in subsection (1) of this section, the following entities  
28 shall coordinate with the [office] **department** on development of proposals and submit applications  
29 to the [office] **department** to be reviewed and processed:

30 “(a) A city or county operating an emergency management program.

31 “(b) An emergency service agency.

32 “(c) A state agency.

33 “(3) A tribal government operating an emergency management program may, when applying for  
34 funds, coordinate with the [office] **department** on development of proposals and submit applications  
35 to the [office] **department** to be reviewed, processed or both.

36 “(4) The [office] **department** is authorized to accept and receive federal funds for the purposes  
37 of emergency program management and emergency services on behalf of the state, counties, cities  
38 and participating tribal governments.

39 “**SECTION 33.** ORS 401.165 is amended to read:

40 “401.165. (1) The Governor **by proclamation** may declare a state of emergency [by  
41 proclamation] at the request of a county governing body or after determining that an emergency has  
42 occurred or is imminent.

43 “(2) All requests by a county governing body that the Governor declare an emergency shall be  
44 sent to the [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management. Cities must submit requests  
45 through the governing body of the county in which the majority of the city’s property is located.

1 Requests from counties shall be in writing and include the following:

2 “(a) A certification signed by the county governing body that all local resources have been ex-

4 “(b) A preliminary assessment of property damage or loss, injuries and deaths.

10 “(b) After notice from the [*Adjutant General*] **director** that the Governor is not available, the  
11 elected state official so notified may declare a state of emergency pursuant to the provisions of  
12 subsections (1) and (2) of this section.

13 “(c) If the [*Adjutant General*] **director** is unavailable to carry out the duties described in this  
14 subsection, such duties shall be performed by the [*Director of the Office of Emergency Management*]  
15 **Adjutant General**.

16 “(4) Any state of emergency declared by the Secretary of State or State Treasurer pursuant to  
17 this section has the same force and effect as if [*issued*] **declared** by the Governor, except that it  
18 must be affirmed by the Governor as soon as the Governor is reached. However, if the Governor  
19 does not set aside the [*proclamation*] **declaration** within 24 hours of being reached, the  
20 [*proclamation*] **declaration** shall be considered affirmed by the Governor.

21 “(5) Any [*proclamation*] **declaration** of a state of emergency must specify the geographical area

29 “(a) ‘Broadcaster’ means a person that holds a license issued by the Federal Communications

31 “(b) ‘First informer’ means an individual:

32 “(A) Who has received credentials under this section and who is employed by, or acting pursu-  
33 ant to a contract under the direction of, a broadcaster; and

35 “(i) Maintaining, including repairing or resupplying, transmitters, generators or other essential  
36 equipment at a broadcast station or facility; or

37 “(ii) Providing technical support services to a broadcaster or to another first informer.

39 during [*an*] **a state of** emergency declared under ORS 401.165, a first informer may:

40 “(a) Travel on public roads within a geographic area subject to a declaration of **a state of**  
41 emergency under ORS 401.165;

42 “(b) Access the geographic area for the purposes of maintaining transmitters, generators or  
43 other essential equipment at a broadcast station or facility used to acquire, produce or transmit  
44 news or public safety information related to the **declared state of** emergency; and

45 “(c) Access the distribution of fuel, food, water, supplies, equipment and any other materials

1 necessary for producing a broadcast or a broadcasting signal.

2 “(3) An emergency service agency may not seize a vehicle, fuel, food, water or other essential  
3 materials in the possession of a first informer.

4 “(4) The [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management shall authorize a private en-  
5 tity organized under the laws of this state that represents a majority of the broadcasters in this  
6 state to establish a program for the issuance of credentials for first informers pursuant to a plan  
7 developed by the private entity. The plan to provide credentials to first informers must provide for  
8 training first informers regarding:

9 “(a) Risks associated with entering a geographic area subject to a declaration of [an] **a state**  
10 **of** emergency under ORS 401.165;

11 “(b) Best practices for working safely in the geographic area; and

12 “(c) Best practices for working in a geographic area without hindering or interfering with the

14 “(5) The private entity selected by the [office] **department** to develop a plan for and issue cre-  
15 dentials to first informers shall annually submit to the [office] **department** a report regarding the  
16 operation of the program to issue credentials, including any changes to the plan or program.

17 “**SECTION 35.** ORS 401.305 is amended to read:

18 “401.305. (1) As used in this section, ‘tribal government’ means a federally recognized sovereign  
19 tribal government operating within the borders of this state or an intertribal organization formed  
20 by two or more federally recognized sovereign tribal governments operating within this state.

21 “(2) Each county of this state shall, and each city or tribal government may, establish an  
22 emergency management agency that is directly responsible to the executive officer or governing  
23 body of the county, city or tribe.

24 “(3) The executive officer or governing body of each county, and any city or tribe that partic-  
25 ipates, shall appoint an emergency program manager who is responsible for the organization, ad-  
26 ministration and operation of the emergency management agency, subject to the direction and

30 shall jointly establish policies that:

31 “(a) Provide direction and identify and define the purpose and roles of the individual emergency

33 “(b) Specify the responsibilities of the emergency program managers and staff; and

34 “(c) Establish lines of communication, succession and authority of elected officials for an effec-  
35 tive and efficient response to emergency conditions.

36 “(5) Each emergency management agency shall perform emergency program management func-  
37 tions within the territorial limits of the county, city or tribal government and may perform the  
38 functions outside the territorial limits as required under any mutual aid or cooperative assistance  
39 agreement or as requested and authorized by the county or city in whose territorial limits the  
40 emergency functions are performed.

41 “(6) The emergency management functions include, at a minimum:

42 “(a) Coordination of the planning activities necessary to prepare and maintain a current emer-  
43 gency operations plan, management and maintenance of emergency operating facilities from which  
44 elected and appointed officials can direct emergency and disaster response activities;

45 “(b) Establishment of an incident command structure for management of a coordinated response

4 Management System established by the Homeland Security Presidential Directive 5 of February 28,

6 “**SECTION 36.** ORS 401.358 is amended to read:

7 “401.358. As used in ORS 401.358 to 401.368:

8 “(1) ‘Emergency service activities’ means:

9 “(a) The provision of emergency services; and

10 “(b) Engaging in training under the direction of a public body, whether by reason of the training  
11 being conducted or approved by a public body, for the purpose of preparing qualified emergency  
12 service volunteers to perform emergency services.

13 “(2) ‘Qualified emergency service volunteer’ means a person who is:

14 “(a) Registered with the [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management or other pub-  
15 lic body to perform emergency service activities;

16 “(b) Acknowledged in writing as a qualified emergency service volunteer, at the time the person  
17 offers to volunteer during an emergency, by the [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Man-  
18 agement or by another public body;

19 “(c) A member of the Oregon Civil Defense Force; or

20 “(d) A building evaluator certified under the Oregon Safety Assessment Program established  
21 under ORS 401.256.

22 “**SECTION 37.** ORS 401.368 is amended to read:

23 “401.368. (1) The [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management shall provide  
24 workers’ compensation coverage for qualified emergency service volunteers who are injured in the  
25 course and scope of performing emergency service activities under the direction of a public body if  
26 the injury occurs:

27 “(a) While the volunteer is performing emergency service activities under the direction of the  
28 public body during a state of emergency declared under this chapter, or during a state of public  
29 health emergency [proclaimed] **declared** under ORS 433.441; or

30 “(b) While the volunteer is engaged in training being conducted or approved by a public body  
31 for the purpose of preparing the volunteer to perform emergency services.

32 “(2) Workers’ compensation coverage shall be provided under this section in the manner pro-  
33 vided by ORS 656.039.

34 “**SECTION 38.** ORS 401.551 is amended to read:

35 “401.551. (1) As used in this section:

36 “(a) ‘Emergency’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 401.025.

37 “(b) ‘Maintain’ means to repair, perform upkeep on and otherwise keep in good working condi-  
38 tion.

39 “(c) ‘Preparedness equipment’ means equipment, vehicles or other personal property that:

40 “(A) May be used to decrease the risk to life and property resulting from an emergency; and

41 “(B) Qualifies as a capital asset eligible for financing with tax-exempt bonds.

42 “(d) ‘Qualified applicant’ means an entity that has responsibility for or expertise in emergency  
43 preparedness and that is a local government, a special government body, a federally recognized In-

1 “(e) ‘Recipient’ means an entity that applies for and receives preparedness equipment, or funds

4 “(f) ‘Tax-exempt bond’ means a bond, as defined in ORS 286A.001, the receipt of interest on  
5 which is excluded from gross income under the Internal Revenue Code or that is eligible for a fed-  
6 eral interest subsidy payment or other tax-advantaged status.

7 “(2)(a) [*Before December 31, 2017,*] The Oregon Homeland Security Council shall develop, **and**  
8 **shall periodically revise and update**, a list of preparedness equipment that is needed throughout  
9 this state to address deficiencies in the ability of the state to respond to local and regional emer-  
10 gencies.

11 “(b) In developing, **updating and revising** the list, the council shall consult and coordinate with  
12 the [*Office*] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management and with county officials who are re-  
13 sponsible for emergency management.

14 “(c) The council shall assign a priority level to each type of preparedness equipment on the list,  
15 taking into consideration, without limitation, the types of emergency that are most likely to occur

22 scribed in subsection (2) of this section. Applicants must demonstrate a need for the specific

26 “(b) The [*office*] **department** shall identify which requests from applicants, if fulfilled, will

29 “(A) The level of priority assigned to the requested preparedness equipment type pursuant to  
30 subsection (2) of this section;

31 “(B) The level of need for the requested preparedness equipment as demonstrated by the appli-  
32 cant;

33 “(C) The ability to use and maintain the preparedness equipment as demonstrated by the appli-  
34 cant;

35 “(D) The types of emergency most likely to occur in the region where the applicant is located;  
36 and

37 “(E) Whether the applicant has an alternative means of acquiring the requested preparedness  
38 equipment.

39 “(c) The [*office*] **department** shall issue grants to applicants identified under paragraph (b) of  
40 this subsection after entering into grant agreements with the applicants as provided in paragraph  
41 (e) of this subsection. The [*office*] **department** may either purchase the requested preparedness  
42 equipment for distribution to a recipient or disburse funds to the recipient for the purchase of the  
43 requested preparedness equipment.

44 “(d) The Public Contracting Code does not apply to the acquisition of preparedness equipment  
45 by the [*office*] **department** or by a recipient pursuant to this section. When acquiring preparedness

1 equipment pursuant to this section, the [office] **department** and recipients shall use procurement  
2 methods that are impartial and transparent to the greatest extent feasible and are designed to

4 “(e) The [office] **department** may not disburse preparedness equipment or funds under this sec-

33 “(g) The [office] **department** may transfer between recipients, dispose of or otherwise manage  
34 the preparedness equipment as [it] **the department** determines is in the best interests of meeting  
35 the emergency preparedness needs of the State of Oregon. If the [office] **department** disposes of  
36 preparedness equipment for any reason, including sale to a recipient as provided in paragraph (e)(D)  
37 of this subsection, the [office] **department** shall deposit any moneys [it] **the department** receives  
38 from the disposal in the Resiliency Grant Fund established under ORS 401.552.

39 “(4) On or before December 31 of each year, the [office] **department** shall submit a report to  
40 the Legislative Assembly and to the Oregon Homeland Security Council that describes the adminis-  
41 tration and effectiveness of the grant program established under this section and the current prior-  
42 itized list of preparedness equipment types.

43 “(5) The [office] **department** shall adopt rules to administer and implement the provisions of this  
44 section.

45 “**SECTION 39.** ORS 401.534 is amended to read:

1 “401.534. (1) The Oregon Disaster Response Fund is established in the State Treasury, separate  
2 and distinct from the General Fund. Moneys received from federal grants for disaster response ef-  
3 forts shall be deposited into the Oregon Disaster Response Fund. Moneys in the fund are contin-  
4 uously appropriated to the [*Oregon Military Department*] **Oregon Department of Emergency**  
5 **Management** to be used to:

6 “(a) Help state agencies and local government units with immediate disaster response and re-  
7covery efforts related to federally declared disasters in this state; and

8 “(b) Implement long-term hazard mitigation measures after a federally declared disaster in this  
9 state during the period of immediate recovery from the disaster.

10 “(2) The Oregon Disaster Response Fund may receive gifts, grants, bequests, endowments and  
11 donations from public and private sources for purposes related to the fund.

12 “(3) The [*Office of Emergency Management of the Oregon Military Department*] **department** shall  
13 adopt rules for the disbursement of moneys from the Oregon Disaster Response Fund.

14 “(4) If there are expenditures from the Oregon Disaster Response Fund, the [*Adjutant General*  
15 *of the Oregon Military Department*] **Director of the Oregon Department of Emergency Manage-**  
16 **ment** shall report to the Emergency Board, or to the Legislative Assembly if it is in session, on:

17 “(a) The nature and severity of the disaster;

18 “(b) The actual and projected deposits into the fund;

19 “(c) The sources of actual and projected expenditures from the fund;

20 “(d) The nature of in-kind donations received; and

21 “(e) The rationale for expenditures and allocation of payments to state agencies and local gov-  
22 ernment units.

23 “(5) Following the final expenditure for a particular disaster, the [*Adjutant General of the Oregon*  
24 *Military Department*] **director** shall issue a final report to the Emergency Board, or to the Legisla-  
25 tive Assembly if it is in session. The report must include an aggregate description of the factors  
26 described in subsection (4) of this section.

27 “**SECTION 40.** ORS 401.536 is amended to read:

28 “401.536. (1) The Oregon Local Disaster Assistance Loan and Grant Account is established as  
29 an account in the Oregon Disaster Response Fund. The account consists of moneys appropriated by  
30 the Legislative Assembly and any other moneys deposited into the account pursuant to law.

31 “(2) Moneys in the account are continuously appropriated to the [*Oregon Military Department*]  
32 **Oregon Department of Emergency Management** for:

33 “(a) Providing loans to local governments, as defined in ORS 174.116, and school districts to  
34 match, either in full or in part, moneys from federal programs for federally declared disaster relief  
35 that require a match;

3 Loans made under subsection (2)(b) or (c) of this section may be interest free, or bear interest at a  
4 rate established by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services. Amounts repaid on loans

9 “**SECTION 41.** ORS 401.552 is amended to read:

10 “401.552. The Resiliency Grant Fund is established in the State Treasury, separate and distinct  
11 from the General Fund. Interest earned by the Resiliency Grant Fund must be credited to the fund.  
12 The Resiliency Grant Fund consists of moneys deposited in the fund under ORS 401.551 and may  
13 include moneys appropriated, allocated, deposited or transferred to the fund by the Legislative As-  
14 sembly or otherwise and interest earned on moneys in the fund. The moneys in the fund are con-  
15 tinuously appropriated to the [*Office*] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management for the  
16 purposes specified in ORS 401.551.

18 “540.482. (1) The Water Resources Department shall require the owner of a dam that has a high  
19 hazard rating to develop an emergency action plan for the dam.

20 “(2) An emergency action plan required under this section must include, but need not be limited  
21 to:

22 “(a) Means for emergency condition detection;

23 “(b) Means for emergency level determination;

24 “(c) Identification of, and information necessary for, notifications and communications to be  
25 made at each level of emergency condition;

26 “(d) A description of actions expected to be undertaken to prevent dam failure or reduce the  
27 effects of dam failure;

28 “(e) A map of dam failure inundation zones for varying conditions, including, but not limited to,  
29 dry weather conditions and high flood conditions; and

38 **of Emergency Management** and local emergency services agency, shall determine the appropriate  
39 frequency for conducting emergency response exercises at a dam that has a high hazard rating.

40 “**SECTION 43.** ORS 689.645 is amended to read:

41 “689.645. (1) In accordance with rules adopted by the State Board of Pharmacy under ORS  
42 689.205, a pharmacist may:

43 “(a) Administer vaccines:

44 “(A) To persons who are seven years of age or older; or

45 “(B) If authorized by the Governor **or the Director of the Oregon Department of Emergency**

1 **Management** under ORS 433.441 or the Public Health Director under ORS 433.443 or 433.444, to a  
2 person three years of age or older.

3 “(b) Pursuant to a statewide drug therapy management protocol developed by the Public Health  
4 and Pharmacy Formulary Advisory Committee convened under ORS 689.649 and adopted by rule of  
5 the board, provide approved patient care services including smoking cessation therapy and travel  
6 health services.

7 “(c) Using a form prescribed by the board, submit a concept for the development of a protocol,  
8 other than the protocols pharmacists may establish under subsection (5) of this section, to the  
9 committee for consideration by the committee and recommendation to the board for adoption by rule  
10 of the board.

11 “(d) Prescribe and dispense a drug or device included on the formulary established under sub-  
12 section (6) of this section if the prescription and dispensation is pursuant to a diagnosis by a health  
13 care practitioner who has prescriptive authority and is qualified to make the diagnosis.

14 “(2) The board may adopt rules allowing a pharmacist to prescribe vaccines, provide patient  
15 care services and submit protocol concepts under subsection (1) of this section. The rules related  
16 to the prescription of vaccines may be only as broad as necessary to enable pharmacists to enroll  
17 and participate in the Vaccines for Children Program administered by the Centers for Disease  
18 Control and Prevention.

11 “(4) The authority shall support and provide assistance to the [Office] **Oregon Department** of  
12 Emergency Management in emergencies or crises involving the public health or requiring emergency  
13 medical response.

14 “(5) The authority may enter into agreements with other states to facilitate the registry of  
15 out-of-state health care providers in the emergency health care provider registry established under  
16 this section.

17 “**SECTION 45.** ORS 401.900 is amended to read:

18 “401.900. (1) Each state or local agency shall drill agency employees working in office buildings  
19 on emergency procedures so that the employees may respond to an earthquake emergency without  
20 confusion or panic.

21 “(2) The state or local agency shall conduct the drills annually in accordance with [Office]  
22 **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management rules.

23 “(3) The drills must include familiarization with routes and methods of exiting the building and  
24 the earthquake emergency response procedure recommended by the Federal Emergency Management  
25 Agency known as ‘drop, cover and hold on.’

26 “(4) Consistent with rules of the [Office of Emergency Management] **department**, the state or  
27 local agency may drill earthquake emergency response procedures in addition to ‘drop, cover and

29 structural issues related to an office building, that ‘drop, cover and hold on’ may not be the most

42 Management of the dispute in writing. Within 30 days after this notification, the disputing agencies  
43 shall mutually select a mediator and notify the [office] **department** in writing of this selection. If  
44 a mediator is not mutually selected by the agencies within this period, the Director of the [Office]

24 operations plan and a credentialing plan that governs the use of emergency health care providers  
25 registered under ORS 401.654 and other health care providers who volunteer to perform health care

27 tialing plan must comply with rules governing those plans adopted by the Oregon Health Authority.

28 “**SECTION 82.** ORS 401.658 is amended to read:

29 “401.658. (1) The Oregon Health Authority may include in the emergency health care provider  
30 registry established under ORS 401.654 a person who was previously licensed, certified or otherwise  
31 authorized to provide health care services in Oregon by a health professional regulatory board if:

32 “(a) The person was licensed, certified or otherwise authorized to provide health care services  
33 not more than 10 years before entry in the registry; and

34 “(b) The person meets such other criteria as may be established by the authority.

35 “(2) Notwithstanding any other law prohibiting a person from providing health care services  
36 without a license, certificate or other authorization from a health professional regulatory board, a  
37 person entered in the emergency health care provider registry under subsection (1) of this section  
38 may provide health care services during a state of emergency declared under ORS 401.165 or a state  
39 of public health emergency [*proclaimed*] **declared** under ORS 433.441 without a license, certification  
40 or other authorization if:

41 “(a) The person is in compliance with all rules adopted by the authority for persons providing

20 Emergency Management Arrangement, the Oregon Health Authority may direct emergency health  
21 care providers registered under ORS 401.654 who are willing to provide health care services in an-  
22 other state to proceed to another state where emergency health care services are required by reason  
23 of an emergency in that state; and

24 “(3) Any emergency health care provider registered under ORS 401.654 or other health care  
25 provider may volunteer to perform health care services described in ORS 401.657 at any emergency  
26 health care center or health care facility in the manner provided by ORS 401.664.

27 “**SECTION 84.** ORS 401.667 is amended to read:

28 “401.667. (1) If the Governor declares a state of emergency under ORS 401.165, or [*proclaims*]  
29 **declares** a state of public health emergency under ORS 433.441, emergency health care providers  
30 registered under ORS 401.654 and other health care providers who volunteer to perform health care  
31 services under ORS 401.651 to 401.670 are agents of the state under ORS 30.260 to 30.300 for the  
32 purposes of any claims arising out of services that are provided under ORS 401.651 to 401.670 pur-  
33 suant to directions from a public body and that are within the course and scope of the health care  
34 provider’s duties, without regard to whether the health care provider is compensated for the ser-  
35 vices.

36 “(2) If the Governor declares a state of emergency under ORS 401.165, or [*proclaims*] **declares**  
37 a state of public health emergency under ORS 433.441, health care facilities designated under ORS

41 limited to, the following:

27 provisions of the National Incident Management System Incident Command System established by  
28 Homeland Security Presidential Directive 5 of February 28, 2003, and shall describe procedures for

33 “(b) **A person who is** registered with a sheriff to conduct search and rescue activities;

34 “(c) A member of a designated search and rescue organization that is registered with a sheriff

39 **“(2) For the purpose of harmonizing and clarifying statutory law, the Legislative Counsel**  
40 **may substitute for words designating the ‘office of the State Fire Marshal,’ wherever they**  
41 **occur in statutory law, other words designating the ‘Department of the State Fire**  
42 **Marshal.’**

43 **“SECTION 90. ORS 476.020 is amended to read:**

44 **“476.020. (1) The *[office of]* **Department of the** State Fire Marshal is established. *[in the De-*  
45 *partment of State Police. The State Fire Marshal shall be appointed by and be administratively re-***

1 *sponsible to the Superintendent of State Police, and shall serve at the pleasure of the superintendent.*  
2 *The State Fire Marshal shall retain all current authority of the office and shall be responsible for the*  
3 *implementation of its mission and programs.]* **The department is under the supervision and control**  
4 **of the State Fire Marshal.**

5 **“(2) The Governor shall appoint the State Fire Marshal, who holds the office at the**

4 “(a) To any claimant or legal representative, at a hearing before an administrative law judge,  
5 to the extent necessary for the proper presentation of an unemployment insurance claim.

6 “(b) Upon request to the United States Secretary of Labor. The Employment Department shall  
7 disclose the information in a form and containing the information that the United States Secretary  
8 of Labor may require. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be used for any other  
9 purpose.

10 “(c) Pursuant to section 303(a)(7) of the Social Security Act, upon request to any agency of the  
11 United States charged with the administration of public works or assistance through public em-

27 support enforcement agencies enforcing child support obligations under Title IV-D of the Social Se-

29 support obligations and collecting child support obligations from those individuals. The information  
30 disclosed is confidential and may not be used for any other purpose. The costs of disclosing infor-  
31 mation under this paragraph shall be paid by the child support enforcement agency.

32 “(g) Pursuant to sections 303(f) and 1137 of the Social Security Act, to agencies participating in  
33 the income and eligibility verification system for the purpose of verifying an individual’s eligibility  
34 for benefits, or the amount of benefits, under unemployment insurance, temporary assistance for

36 Income, child support enforcement or Social Security programs. The information disclosed is confi-  
37 dential and may not be used for any other purpose. The costs of disclosing information under this

39 “(h) Pursuant to section 303(h) of the Social Security Act and section 3304(a)(16)(B) of the Fed-  
40 eral Unemployment Tax Act, to the United States Department of Health and Human Services Na-  
41 tional Directory of New Hires. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be used for  
42 any other purpose. The costs of disclosing information under this paragraph shall be paid by the  
43 United States Department of Health and Human Services.

36 “(m) Disclose information to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission for the purpose of  
37 performing the commission’s duties under ORS chapter 348 and Title IV of the Higher Education  
38 Act of 1965. The information disclosed may include the names and addresses of employers and em-  
39 ployees and payroll data of employers and employees. The information disclosed is confidential and  
40 may not be disclosed by the commission in any manner that would identify an employing unit or  
41 employee except to the extent necessary to carry out the commission’s duties under ORS chapter  
42 348 or Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965. If the information disclosed under this para-  
43 graph is not prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the infor-  
44 mation shall be paid by the commission.

45 “(n) Disclose information to the Department of Transportation to assist the Department of

1 Transportation in carrying out the duties of the Department of Transportation relating to collection  
2 of delinquent and liquidated debts, including taxes, under ORS 184.610 to 184.665, 184.670 to 184.733  
3 and 805.263, ORS chapter 319 and the Oregon Vehicle Code. The information disclosed may include  
4 the names and addresses of employers and employees and payroll data of employers and employees.  
5 The information disclosed is confidential and may not be disclosed by the Department of Transpor-  
6 tation in any manner that would identify an employing unit or employee except to the extent nec-  
7 essary to carry out the Department of Transportation's duties relating to collection of delinquent  
8 and liquidated debts or in auditing or reviewing any report or return required or permitted to be  
9 filed under the revenue and tax laws administered by the Department of Transportation. The De-  
10 partment of Transportation may not disclose any information received to any private collection  
11 agency or for any other purpose. If the information disclosed under this paragraph is not prepared  
12 for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the information shall be paid by  
13 the Department of Transportation.

14 “(o) Disclose information to the Department of Human Services and the Oregon Health Au-  
15 thority to assist the Department of Human Services and the Oregon Health Authority in the col-  
16 lection of debts that the Department of Human Services and the Oregon Health Authority are  
17 authorized by law to collect. The information disclosed may include the names, addresses and pay-  
18 roll data of employers and employees. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be dis-  
19 closed by the Department of Human Services or the Oregon Health Authority in a manner that  
20 would identify an employing unit or employee except to the extent necessary for the collection of  
21 debts as described in this paragraph. The Department of Human Services and the Oregon Health

29 programs under ORS 430.223 or the impact of the programs on employment. The information dis-  
30 closed to the commission may include total subject wages payroll and whole hours worked. The in-  
31 formation disclosed under this paragraph is confidential and may not be used for any other purpose.  
32 The commission may not disclose the information in any manner that would identify an employing  
33 unit or employee except to the extent necessary to carry out the commission's duties under ORS  
34 430.223. If the information disclosed under this paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Em-  
35 ployment Department, the costs of disclosing the information shall be paid by the commission.

36 “(q) Disclose to any person establishment level information secured pursuant to this chapter  
37 from federal, state and local government agencies, public universities listed in ORS 352.002 or the  
38 Oregon Health and Science University established under ORS 353.020. If the information disclosed  
39 under this paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Employment Department, the costs of dis-  
40 closing the information shall be paid by the person requesting the information.

41 “(r) Disclose to any person the industrial classification code assigned to an employing unit. If  
42 the information disclosed under this paragraph is not prepared for the use of the Employment De-  
43 partment, the costs of disclosing the information shall be paid by the person requesting the infor-  
44 mation.

45 “(s) Disclose information to the State Treasurer useful for the purpose of performing the State

1 Treasurer's duties under ORS 98.302 to 98.436, 98.992 and 116.253 and the role of an estate admin-  
2 istrator under ORS 113.235. The information disclosed is confidential and may not be used by the  
3 State Treasurer for any other purpose. If the information disclosed is not prepared for the use of the  
4 Employment Department, the costs of disclosing the information shall be paid by the State Treas-  
5 urer.

6 "(5) The Employment Department may make public all decisions of the Employment Appeals  
7 Board.

8 "(6) Any officer appointed by or any employee of the Director of the Employment Department  
9 who discloses confidential information, except with the authority of the director, pursuant to rules  
10 or as otherwise required by law, may be disqualified from holding any appointment or employment  
11 with the Employment Department.

12 "(7) Any person or any officer or employee of an entity to whom information is disclosed by the  
13 Employment Department under this section who divulges or uses the information for any purpose  
14 other than that specified in the provision of law or agreement authorizing the use or disclosure may  
15 be disqualified from performing any service under contract or disqualified from holding any ap-  
16 pointment or employment with the state agency that engaged or employed that person, officer or  
17 employee. The Employment Department may immediately cancel or modify any information sharing  
18 agreement with an entity when a person or an officer or employee of that entity discloses confi-  
19 dential information, other than as specified in law or agreement.

38 "(2) If an insurer ceases to do business or collect premiums on direct domestic risks, it there-  
39 upon shall make a report to the director of its premiums subject to taxation as provided in sub-  
40 section (1) of this section and collected or due as of the date when it ceased to do business or collect  
41 premiums on direct domestic risks, and not theretofore reported, and shall forthwith pay to the di-  
42 rector the tax thereon.

43 "(3) If the director, during the period in which the director under ORS 731.836 may collect taxes  
44 owing under this section, finds the amount of such taxes paid by an insurer to have been incorrect,  
45 the director shall charge or credit the insurer with the difference between the correct amount of tax

1 and the amount actually paid.

2 “**SECTION 145.** ORS 735.470 is amended to read:

3 “735.470. (1)(a) The surplus lines licensee shall pay the Director of the Department of Consumer  
4 and Business Services a surplus lines premium tax equal to two percent of the gross amount of

6 “(b) Notwithstanding ORS 731.820, the surplus lines licensee shall also pay to the director a tax

14 policyholder directly by the surplus lines licensee or through the producing insurance producer, if  
15 any. The surplus lines licensee is prohibited from absorbing the taxes, and from rebating for any  
16 reason, any part of the taxes.

17 “(2) The surplus lines taxes are due quarterly on the 45th day following the calendar quarter  
18 in which the premium is collected. The taxes shall be paid to and reported on forms prescribed by  
19 the director or upon the director’s order paid to and reported on forms prescribed by the Surplus  
20 Line Association of Oregon.

1       “[(b) Advise state agencies with responsibility for security matters on the future direction of the  
2 office’s planning, preparedness, response and recovery activities.]

3       “(2) The council may:

4       “(a) Recommend strategies to the Governor for the effective coordination of information  
5 gathering and dissemination on subjects associated with the mission.

6       “(b) Request and receive briefings from state agencies or other entities for development  
7 of reports and recommendations for the Governor on subjects associated with the mission.

8       “(c) Facilitate interagency collaboration, cooperation and coordination on operational is-  
9 sues associated with the mission.

10       “(d) Recommend policies to the Emergency Preparedness Advisory Council on subjects  
11 associated with the mission.

12       “[(2)] (3) The membership of the council consists of:

13       “(a) Four members from the Legislative Assembly appointed as follows:

14       “(A) Two members from the Senate appointed by the President of the Senate; and

15       “(B) Two members from the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House  
16 of Representatives;

17       “(b) The Governor;

18       “(c) The Adjutant General;

19       “(d) The Superintendent of State Police;

20       “(e) The Director of the [Office] **Oregon Department** of Emergency Management; [and]

21       “(f) A representative of the Department of Justice appointed by the Attorney General[.];

22       “(g) **The State Resilience Officer;**

23       “(h) **The State Fire Marshal;**

24       “(i) **The Director of the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training;**

25       “(j) **The Director of the Oregon Health Authority;**

26       “(k) **The Director of Transportation;**

27       “(L) **The State Forester;**

28       “(m) **The Director of the Department of Corrections;**

29       “(n) **The Superintendent of State Police;**

30       “(o) **One member appointed by the Governor to act as a senior policy advisor for emer-**  
31 **gency operations;**

32       “(p) **A representative of the Oregon TITAN Fusion Center with the ability to organize**  
33 **and explain mission critical information, appointed by the Attorney General; and**

34       “(q) **Additional members appointed by the Governor as the Governor may deem neces-**  
35 **sary.**

36       “[(3)] (4) Each member appointed to the council under subsection [(2)] (3) of this section serves  
37 at the pleasure of the appointing authority. The membership of a public official ceases upon termi-  
38 nation of the office held by the official at the time of appointment to the council.

39       “[(4)] (5) The Governor is the chairperson of the council.

40       “[(5)] (6) The [Adjutant General] **Director of the Oregon Department of Emergency Man-**  
41 **agement** is the vice chairperson of the council and serves as the chairperson in the absence of the

9       “(g) One member appointed by the Director of Transportation to represent the Depart-

11       “(h) One member appointed by the Attorney General to represent the Department of

13       “(i) One member appointed by the State Forester to represent the State Forestry De-  
14 partment;

15       “(j) Seven members appointed by the Governor as follows:

18       “(C) One member with experience in emergency preparedness to represent regional or-  
19 ganizations;

21 izations;

22       “(E) One member representing the private sector;

23       “(F) One member representing the nonprofit community with a designated emergency  
24 support function responsibility; and

25       “(G) One member to represent Indian tribes in Oregon; and

26       “(k) Additional members appointed by the Governor as the Governor may deem neces-  
27 sary.

28       “(3)(a) The council may research international and national best practices and make  
29 formal recommendations to the State Resilience Officer or the Governor as needed, with  
30 special emphasis given to connecting statewide policy recommendations with state and fed-  
31 eral emergency support function capabilities.

32       “(b) The council shall advise and make policy recommendations to the Oregon Homeland  
33 Security Council regarding federal emergency support functions.

34       “(4) A majority of the members of the Emergency Preparedness Advisory Council con-  
35 stitutes a quorum for the transaction of business.

36       “(5) Official action by the council requires the approval of a majority of the members of  
37 the council.

38       “(6) The council shall elect one of its members to serve as chairperson.

39       “(7) If there is a vacancy for any cause, the appointing authority shall make an appoint-  
40 ment to become immediately effective.

41       “(8) The council shall meet at least once quarterly at the place specified by the call of  
42 the chairperson or of a majority of the members of the council.

43       “(9) The council may adopt rules necessary for the operation of the council.

44       “(10) The Oregon Department of Emergency Management shall provide staff support to

30       “(5) Official action by the council requires the approval of a majority of the members of  
31       the council.

32       “(6) The council shall elect one of its members to serve as chairperson.

33       “(7) If there is a vacancy for any cause, the Governor shall make an appointment to be-  
34       come immediately effective.

35       “(8) The council shall meet at times and places specified by the call of the chairperson  
36       or of a majority of the members of the council.

37       “(9) The council may adopt rules necessary for the operation of the council.

38       “(10) The department shall provide staff support to the council.

39       “(11) Members of the council are not entitled to compensation or reimbursement for ex-  
40       penses and serve as volunteers on the council.

41       “(12) All agencies of state government, as defined in ORS 174.111, are directed to assist  
42       the council in the performance of the duties of the council and, to the extent permitted by  
43       laws relating to confidentiality, to furnish information and advice the members of the council

42 “SECTION 157. This 2021 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the  
43 public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2021 Act takes
