

HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 3291

By COMMITTEE ON RULES

1 In line 2 of the printed bill, after “elections” insert “; creating new provisions; amending ORS
2 171.185, 203.085, 221.230, 253.065, 253.070, 253.080, 253.585, 253.690, 254.095, 254.103, 254.408, 254.431,
3 254.458, 254.470, 254.478, 254.485, 254.529, 254.545, 254.546, 254.548, 254.555, 255.085, 255.295, 255.345,
4 258.075, 260.695 and 294.474; and repealing ORS 251.358”.

5 Delete lines 4 through 11 and insert:

6 “**SECTION 1.** ORS 254.470 is amended to read:

7 “254.470. (1) The Secretary of State by rule shall establish requirements and criteria for the
8 designation of places of deposit for the ballots cast in an election. The rules shall also specify the
9 dates and times the places of deposit must be open and the security requirements for the places of
10 deposit. At a minimum, the places designated under this section shall be open on the date of the
11 election for a period of eight or more hours, but must be open until at least 8 p.m. At each place
12 of deposit designated under this section, the county clerk shall prominently display a sign stating
13 that the location is an official ballot drop site.

14 “(2)(a) Except as provided in paragraphs (b) and (c) of this subsection, the county clerk shall
15 mail by nonforwardable mail an official ballot with a return identification envelope and a secrecy
16 envelope not sooner than the 20th day before the date of an election and not later than the 14th
17 day before the date of the election, to each active elector of the electoral district as of the 21st day
18 before the date of the election.

19 “(b) If the county clerk determines that an active elector of the electoral district as of the 21st
20 day before the date of the election does not receive daily mail service from the United States Postal
21 Service, the county clerk shall mail by nonforwardable mail an official ballot with a return iden-
22 tification envelope and a secrecy envelope to the elector not sooner than the 20th day before the
23 date of an election and not later than the 18th day before the date of the election.

24 “(c) In the case of ballots to be mailed to addresses outside this state to electors who are not
25 military or overseas electors, the county clerk may mail the ballots not sooner than the 29th day
26 before the date of the election.

27 “(3) For an election held on the date of a primary election:

28 “(a) The county clerk shall mail the official ballot of a major political party to each elector who
29 is registered as being affiliated with the major political party as of the 21st day before the date of
30 the election.

31 “(b) The county clerk shall mail the official ballot of a major political party to an elector not
32 affiliated with any political party if the elector has applied for the ballot as provided in this sub-
33 section and that party has provided under ORS 254.365 for a primary election that admits electors
34 not affiliated with any political party.

35 “(c) An elector not affiliated with any political party who wishes to vote in the primary election

1 of a major political party shall apply to the county clerk in writing. The application must be com-
2 pleted, signed and submitted by the elector electronically, in person or by mail, in a manner deter-
3 mined by the secretary by rule and must indicate which major political party ballot the elector
4 wishes to receive. Except for electors described in subsection (4) of this section, and subject to ORS
5 247.203, the application must be received by the county clerk not later than 5 p.m. of the 21st day
6 before the date of the election.

7 “(d) If the primary election ballot includes city, county or nonpartisan offices or measures, the
8 county clerk shall mail to each elector who is not eligible to vote for party candidates a ballot
9 limited to those offices and measures for which the elector is eligible to vote.

10 “(4) For each elector who updates a voter registration after the deadline in ORS 247.025, the
11 county clerk shall make the official ballot, the return identification envelope and the secrecy en-
12 velope available either by mail or at the county clerk’s office or at another place designated by the
13 county clerk. An elector to whom this subsection applies must request a ballot from the county
14 clerk.

15 “(5) The ballot shall contain the following warning:

16 “

17
18 Any person who, by use of force or other means, unduly influences an elector to vote in any
19 particular manner or to refrain from voting is subject to a fine.

20 “

21
22 “(6)(a) Upon receipt of any ballot described in this section, the elector shall mark the ballot,
23 sign the return identification envelope supplied with the ballot and comply with the instructions
24 provided with the ballot.

25 “(b) The elector may return the marked ballot to the county clerk by United States mail or by
26 depositing the ballot at the office of the county clerk, at any place of deposit designated by the
27 county clerk or at any location described in ORS 254.472 or 254.474.

28 “(c) The ballot must be returned in the return identification envelope.

29 “(d) Subject to paragraph (e) of this subsection, if a person returns a ballot for an elector, the
30 person shall deposit the ballot in a manner described in paragraph (b) of this subsection not later
31 than two days after receiving the ballot.

32 “(e) [A] **If the elector deposits the ballot at the office of the county clerk, at any place**
33 **of deposit designated by the county clerk or at any location described in ORS 254.472 or**
34 **254.474, the** ballot must be received at the office of the county clerk, at the designated place of
35 deposit or at any location described in ORS 254.472 or 254.474 not later than the end of the period
36 determined under subsection (1) of this section on the date of the election. **If the elector returns**
37 **the ballot by mail:**

38 “(A) **The ballot must be received at the office of the county clerk not later than the end**
39 **of the period determined under subsection (1) of this section on the date of the election; or**

40 “(B) **The ballot must:**

41 “(i) **Have a postal indicator showing that the ballot was mailed not later than the date**
42 **of the election; and**

43 “(ii) **Be received at the office of the county clerk not later than seven calendar days after**
44 **the date of the election.**

45 “(f) **If a county clerk receives a marked ballot for an elector who does not reside in the**

1 clerk's county, the ballot shall be forwarded to the county clerk of the county in which the
2 elector resides not later than the eighth day after the election.

3 **“(7) The following shall appear on the return identification envelope:**

4 **“(a) Space for the elector to sign the envelope.**

5 **“(b) A notice designed by rule by the Secretary of State, in consultation with the county
6 clerks, explaining that by signing the ballot the elector is attesting under penalty of perjury
7 that the ballot was mailed no later than the date of the election.**

8 **“(c) A summary of the applicable penalties for knowingly making a false statement, oath
9 or affidavit under the election laws.**

10 **“(8) If the elector returns the ballot by mail, and a postal indicator is not present or
11 legible, the ballot shall be considered to be mailed on the date of the election and may be
12 counted if the ballot is received no later than seven calendar days after the election.**

13 **“[(7)] (9) An elector may obtain a replacement ballot if the ballot is destroyed, spoiled, lost or
14 not received by the elector. Replacement ballots shall be issued and processed as described in this
15 section and ORS 254.480. The county clerk shall keep a record of each replacement ballot provided
16 under this subsection. Notwithstanding any deadline for mailing ballots in subsection (2) of this
17 section, a replacement ballot may be mailed, made available in the office of the county clerk or made
18 available at one central location in the electoral district in which the election is conducted. The
19 county clerk shall designate the central location. A replacement ballot need not be mailed after the
20 fifth day before the date of the election.**

21 **“[(8)] (10) A ballot shall be counted only if:**

22 **“(a) It is returned in the return identification envelope;**

23 **“(b) The envelope is signed by the elector to whom the ballot is issued, unless a certified
24 statement is submitted under ORS 254.431; and**

25 **“(c) The signature is verified as provided in subsection [(9)] (11) of this section.**

26 **“[(9)] (11) The county clerk shall verify the signature of each elector on the return identification
27 envelope with the signature on the elector's registration record, according to the procedure provided
28 by rules adopted by the Secretary of State. If the county clerk determines that an elector to whom
29 a replacement ballot has been issued has voted more than once, the county clerk shall count only
30 one ballot cast by that elector.**

31 **“[(10)] (12) At 8 p.m. on election day, electors who are at the county clerk's office, a place of
32 deposit designated under subsection (1) of this section or any location described in ORS 254.472 or
33 254.474 and who are in line waiting to vote or deposit a voted ballot shall be considered to have
34 begun the act of voting.**

35 **“[(11)(a)(A)] (13)(a)(A) Except as provided in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph, the name of
36 the Secretary of State may not appear in the secretary's official capacity on the return identification
37 envelope, secrecy envelope or on any instructions or materials included with the ballot if the sec-
38 retary is a candidate in the election for which the ballot is printed.**

39 **“(B) This paragraph does not prohibit the name of the Secretary of State from appearing in the
40 secretary's official capacity in the voters' pamphlet.**

41 **“(b) The name of the county clerk or other filing officer may not appear in the official capacity
42 of the county clerk or filing officer on the return identification envelope, secrecy envelope or on any
43 instructions or materials included with the ballot if the county clerk or filing officer is a candidate
44 in the election for which the ballot is printed.**

45 **“(c) As used in this subsection, 'filing officer' has the meaning given that term in ORS 254.165.**

1 “(14) As used in this section, ‘postal indicator’ means a postmark or other indicator on
2 a mailed ballot, identified by the Secretary of State by rule, that demonstrates the date or
3 time at which a ballot was mailed.

4 “**SECTION 2.** ORS 253.065 is amended to read:

5 “253.065. (1) For electors with mailing addresses outside this state, the county clerk shall deliver
6 a ballot:

7 “(a) Not later than the 45th day before the election to each military or overseas elector; and

8 “(b) Not sooner than the 29th day before the election to each absent elector with a mailing ad-
9 dress outside this state who is not a military or overseas elector.

10 “(2) The clerk shall deliver with the ballot instructions for marking and returning the ballot, a
11 return identification envelope and a secrecy envelope. [*The back of the envelope shall include a*
12 *statement to be signed by the absent elector, stating that the elector:*] **Except as provided in sub-**
13 **section (3) of this section, the return identification envelope must contain:**

14 “[(a) *Is qualified to vote;*]

15 “[(b) *Unless prevented by physical disability, has personally marked the ballot; and*]

16 “[(c) *Has not unnecessarily exhibited the marked ballot to any other person.*]

17 “(a) **Space for the elector to sign the envelope.**

18 “(b) **A notice designed by rule by the Secretary of State, in consultation with the county**
19 **clerks, explaining that by signing the ballot the elector is attesting under penalty of perjury**
20 **that the ballot was mailed no later than the date of the election.**

21 “(c) **A summary of the applicable penalties for knowingly making a false statement, oath**
22 **or affidavit under the election laws.**

23 “(3) **For a military or overseas elector as defined in ORS 253.501, the return identification**
24 **envelope provided under subsection (2) of this section must contain:**

25 “(a) **Any information that a military or overseas elector is required to sign under the**
26 **federal Help America Vote Act of 2002 (P.L. 107-252) or other federal law;**

27 “(b) **Space for the elector to sign; and**

28 “(c) **To the extent not required under paragraph (a) of this subsection, a notice designed**
29 **by rule by the Secretary of State that ensures that any military or overseas elector who**
30 **returns a ballot by mail makes a legally binding assertion that the ballot was mailed no later**
31 **than the date of the election.**

32 “[(3)] (4) An absent elector may obtain a replacement ballot if the ballot delivered under this
33 section is destroyed, spoiled, lost or not received by the elector. The county clerk shall keep a re-
34 cord of each replacement ballot provided under this subsection.

35 “[(4)] (5) A replacement ballot provided under subsection [(3)] (4) of this section may be mailed
36 or shall be made available in the office of the county clerk.

37 “[(5)] (6) If the county clerk determines that an absent elector to whom a replacement ballot
38 has been issued at the request of the elector has voted more than once, the county clerk shall count
39 only the first ballot received by the clerk and provide the elector’s name to the Secretary of State
40 for further review. If the county clerk is required to reissue ballots due to a change on the ballot
41 for any reason, that ballot shall be counted in lieu of any previous ballot issued unless:

42 “(a) Only the original ballot was voted and returned; or

43 “(b) The county clerk issued a supplemental ballot that is not a complete replacement of the
44 original ballot.

45 “**SECTION 3.** ORS 253.070 is amended to read:

1 “253.070. [A ballot from an absent elector must be received by a county clerk not later than 8 p.m.
2 of the day of the election.]

3 “(1) Upon receipt of a ballot the absent elector shall mark it and comply with the in-
4 structions provided with the ballot. The absent elector may return the marked ballot to the
5 office of the clerk, by any appropriate means.

6 “(2) If the absent elector returns the marked ballot by any means other than by mail,
7 the ballot must be received by a county clerk not later than 8 p.m. of the day of the election.

8 “(3) If the absent elector returns the marked ballot by mail:

9 “(a) The ballot must be received by a county clerk not later than 8 p.m. on the day of
10 the election; or

11 “(b) The ballot must:

12 “(A) Have a postal indicator showing that the ballot was mailed not later than the date
13 of the election; and

14 “(B) Be received at the office of the county clerk not later than seven calendar days after
15 the date of the election.

16 “(4) If the elector returns the ballot by mail, and a postal indicator is not present or
17 legible, the ballot shall be considered to be mailed on the date of the election and may be
18 counted if the ballot is received no later than seven calendar days after the election.

19 “(5) If a county clerk receives a marked ballot for an elector who does not reside in the
20 clerk’s county, the ballot shall be forwarded to the county clerk of the county in which the
21 elector resides not later than the eighth day after the election.

22 “(6) As used in this section, ‘postal indicator’ has the meaning given that term in ORS
23 254.470.

24 “**SECTION 4.** ORS 254.485 is amended to read:

25 “254.485. (1) Ballots may be tallied by a vote tally system or by a counting board. A counting
26 board may tally ballots at the precinct or in the office of the county clerk. In any event, the ballots
27 shall be tallied and returned by precinct.

28 “(2) If a vote tally system is used, the county clerk shall repeat the public certification test
29 described under ORS 254.235 (1). The test shall be conducted immediately prior to scanning any
30 ballots. The test may be observed by persons described in ORS 254.235 (2). The county clerk shall
31 certify the results of the test.

32 “(3) If a counting board has been appointed, the tally of ballots may begin on the date of the
33 election.

34 “(4)(a) If ballots are tallied by a counting board, after the tally has begun it shall continue until
35 completed. Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, a counting board shall tally
36 without adjournment and in the presence of the clerks and persons authorized to attend.

37 “(b) A counting board may be relieved by another board if the tally is not completed after 12
38 hours.

39 “(5) A counting board shall audibly announce the tally as it proceeds. The board shall use only
40 pen and ink to tally.

41 “(6) For ballots cast using a voting machine, the county clerk shall:

42 “(a) Enter the ballots cast using the machine into the vote tally system; and

43 “(b) In the event of a recount, provide the paper record copy recorded by the machine to the
44 counting board.

45 “(7) A person other than the county clerk, a member of a counting board or any other elections

1 official designated by the county clerk may not tally ballots under this chapter.

2 “(8) **The Secretary of State shall by rule establish a procedure for announcing the status**
3 **of the tally of the ballots received after the date of the election. Rules adopted under this**
4 **subsection must:**

5 “(a) **Consider the number of ballots being released in relation to the size of the district;**

6 “(b) **Prioritize voter anonymity; and**

7 “(c) **After prioritizing voter anonymity under paragraph (b) of this subsection, prioritize**
8 **the importance of timely reporting election results.**

9 “**SECTION 5.** ORS 254.545 is amended to read:

10 “254.545. Subject to ORS 254.548, the county clerk:

11 “(1) As soon as possible after any election, shall prepare abstracts of votes. The abstract for
12 election of Governor shall be on a sheet separate from the abstracts for other offices and measures.

13 “(2) On completion of the abstracts, shall record a complete summary of votes cast in the county
14 for each office, candidate for office and measure. The county clerk shall sign and certify this record.

15 “(3) Not later than the [20th] **27th** day after the election, shall deliver a copy of the abstracts
16 for other than county offices to the appropriate elections officials. The abstract for election of
17 Governor shall be delivered separately to the Secretary of State as provided in [section 4,] Article
18 V, **section 4, of the** Oregon Constitution.

19 “(4) Not later than the [30th] **35th** day after the election, shall proclaim which county measure
20 is paramount, if two or more approved county measures contain conflicting provisions.

21 “(5) Shall prepare and deliver a certificate of nomination or election to each candidate having
22 the most votes for nomination for or election to county or precinct offices.

23 “(6) Shall prepare, and file with the county governing body, a certificate stating the compen-
24 sation to which the board clerks are entitled. The county governing body shall order the compen-
25 sation paid by county funds.

26 “(7) As soon as possible after any election, shall send electronically the results of the election
27 in each precinct to the Secretary of State.

28 “**SECTION 6.** ORS 254.546 is amended to read:

29 “254.546. (1) In the case of a recall election held on a date other than the date of the primary
30 election or general election, the county clerk shall prepare an abstract of the votes and deliver it
31 to the elections official authorized to order the recall election not later than the [20th] **27th** day
32 after the election.

33 “(2) Except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, for purposes of [section 18,] Article II,
34 **section 18, of the** Oregon Constitution, the result of the recall election referred to in subsection
35 (1) of this section shall be considered officially declared on the date the abstract of the votes is
36 delivered.

37 “(3) If the elections official authorized to order the recall election is the Secretary of State, the
38 Secretary of State shall officially declare the result of the election not later than the [30th] **35th**
39 day after the election.

40 “**SECTION 7.** ORS 254.555 is amended to read:

41 “254.555. (1) Except as provided in ORS 254.548, not later than the [30th] **37th** day after any
42 election, the Secretary of State, regarding offices for which the secretary receives filings for nomi-
43 nation, shall:

44 “(a) Canvass the votes for the offices, except the office of Governor after the general election.

45 “(b) Enter in a register of nominations after the primary election the name and, if applicable,

1 major political party of each candidate nominated, the office for which the candidate is nominated
2 and the date of entry.

3 “(c) Prepare and deliver a certificate of nomination or election to each candidate having the
4 most votes for nomination for or election to the office. The Secretary of State shall sign the certifi-
5 cate under the seal of the state.

6 “(d) Issue a proclamation declaring the election of candidates to the offices.

7 “(2) Not later than the [30th] **37th** day after the election:

8 “(a) The Secretary of State, regarding measures for which the secretary is the filing officer,
9 shall canvass the votes for each measure.

10 “(b) The Governor shall issue a proclamation giving the number of votes cast for or against each
11 such measure, and declaring the approved measures as the law on the effective date of the measure.
12 If two or more approved measures contain conflicting provisions, the Governor shall proclaim which
13 is paramount.

14 “**SECTION 8.** ORS 254.529 is amended to read:

15 “254.529. (1) At each primary election, general election and special election, the county clerk
16 shall make a determination on whether to conduct:

17 “(a) A hand count of ballots as described in this section and compare the tally of votes for those
18 ballots produced by a vote tally system with the tally of votes for those ballots produced by the hand
19 count; or

20 “(b) A risk-limiting audit in the manner described in ORS 254.532.

21 “(2) If the county clerk determines that a hand count will be conducted:

22 “(a) In the event that the unofficial tally of ballots produced by a vote tally system reveals that
23 the margin of victory between the two candidates receiving the largest number of votes in the
24 county is less than one percent of the total votes cast in that election in the county, the county
25 clerk shall conduct a hand count of ballots in at least 10 percent of all precincts or of ballots in
26 at least 10 percent of all batches of ballots collected by the county clerk.

27 “(b) In the event that the unofficial tally of ballots reveals that the margin of victory between
28 the two candidates receiving the largest number of votes in the county is greater than or equal to
29 one percent but less than two percent of the total votes cast in the county, the county clerk shall
30 conduct a hand count of ballots in at least five percent of all precincts or of ballots in at least five
31 percent of all batches of ballots collected by the county clerk.

32 “(c) In the event that the unofficial tally of ballots reveals that the margin of victory between
33 the two candidates receiving the largest number of votes in the county is greater than or equal to
34 two percent of the total votes cast in the county, the county clerk shall conduct a hand count of
35 ballots in at least three percent of all precincts or of ballots in at least three percent of all batches
36 of ballots collected by the county clerk.

37 “(3) If the county clerk determines that a hand count will be conducted, the county clerk shall
38 conduct a hand count of ballots cast in the election contest between the two candidates receiving
39 the largest number of votes in the county, an election contest for an office to be voted on in the
40 state at large and, if possible, an election contest for a state measure. The Secretary of State shall
41 select the precincts or batches at random. At the election:

42 “(a) If selecting precincts, no fewer than 150 ballots must have been cast in at least one of the
43 precincts selected.

44 “(b) If selecting batches, the number of ballots contained in the batches selected must in the
45 aggregate be equal to or greater than:

1 “(A) Ten percent of the total number of ballots cast in the election for a hand count required
2 under subsection (2)(a) of this section.

3 “(B) Five percent of the total number of ballots cast in the election for a hand count required
4 under subsection (2)(b) of this section.

5 “(C) Three percent of the total number of ballots cast in the election for a hand count required
6 under subsection (2)(c) of this section.

7 “(4) Not later than 5 p.m. of the 15th business day after the date of the election, the Secretary
8 of State shall in writing advise the county clerks who made a determination that a hand count will
9 be conducted of:

10 “(a) The election contests for which ballots are to be hand counted; and

11 “(b) The precincts or batches in which ballots are to be hand counted.

12 “(5) A county clerk shall begin the hand counts under this section not later than the [23rd] **27th**
13 day after the election and complete the hand counts not later than the [30th] **35th** day after the
14 election. The results of the hand counts shall be provided to the Secretary of State, who shall make
15 the results publicly available on the Secretary of State’s website.

16 “(6) A comparison of the tally of votes produced by a vote tally system with the tally of votes
17 produced by the hand count under this section must show that the tally of votes produced by the
18 vote tally system differs by no more than one-half of one percent from the tally of votes produced
19 by the hand count.

20 “(7)(a) If a hand count conducted under this section results in a tally of votes for a candidate
21 or measure that is different from the tally of votes produced by the vote tally system for that can-
22 didate or measure, and the difference for each race is equal to or less than one-half of one percent,
23 the tally of votes produced by the vote tally system is the official tally of votes for that vote tally
24 system.

25 “(b) If a hand count conducted under this section results in a tally of votes for a candidate or
26 measure that is different from the tally of votes produced by the vote tally system for that candidate
27 or measure, and the difference in any race is greater than one-half of one percent, the county clerk
28 shall conduct a second hand count of the same ballots.

29 “(c) If the second hand count conducted under this subsection results in a tally of votes for a
30 candidate or measure that is different from the tally of votes produced by the vote tally system for
31 that candidate or measure, and the difference for each race is equal to or less than one-half of one
32 percent, the tally of votes produced by the vote tally system is the official tally of votes for that
33 vote tally system.

34 “(d) If the second hand count conducted under this subsection results in a tally of votes for a
35 candidate or measure that is different from the tally of votes produced by the vote tally system for
36 that candidate or measure, and the difference in any race is greater than one-half of one percent,
37 the county clerk shall conduct a hand count of all ballots counted by that vote tally system. The
38 hand count is the official tally of votes for that vote tally system. If the hand count is the official
39 tally of votes, not later than the [30th] **37th** day after the election, the county clerk shall certify
40 amended abstracts of votes to appropriate elections officials.

41 “(8) For purposes of conducting the hand counts under this section, the county clerk shall:

42 “(a) Retain custody of the ballots; and

43 “(b) Provide for security for the ballots and the information required to be collected under this
44 subsection.

45 “(9) This section does not apply:

1 “(a) To precincts that are subject to a recount under ORS 258.161, 258.280 or 258.290.

2 “(b) If federal law requires a post-election hand count of ballots at the primary election, general
3 election or special election to verify election results and the Secretary of State determines that the
4 requirements of federal law are at least as stringent as the requirements of subsections (1) to (8)
5 of this section.

6 “**SECTION 9.** ORS 254.548 is amended to read:

7 “254.548. (1) An individual nominated or elected to a public office by write-in votes shall sign
8 and file a form indicating that the individual accepts the nomination or office before the filing offi-
9 cer may issue a certificate of nomination or election. The Secretary of State by rule shall prescribe
10 the form to be used under this section.

11 “(2) In the case of an individual nominated or elected by write-in votes to a public office:

12 “(a) Not later than the [31st] **39th** day after the election, the filing officer shall:

13 “(A) Prepare and deliver by regular mail the form described in subsection (1) of this section to
14 the individual; and

15 “(B) If the filing officer has the electronic mail address of the individual, prepare and deliver
16 by electronic mail the form described in subsection (1) of this section to the individual;

17 “(b) Not later than the 41st day after the election, if the individual accepts the nomination or
18 office, the individual shall sign and file the form with the filing officer; and

19 “(c) Not later than the 45th day after the election, if the individual files the form by the deadline
20 specified in paragraph (b) of this subsection, the filing officer shall prepare and deliver a certificate
21 of nomination or election to the individual and, if applicable, issue a proclamation declaring the
22 election of the candidate to the office.

23 “**SECTION 10.** ORS 255.295 is amended to read:

24 “255.295. (1) Not later than the [20th] **27th** day after the date of an election, the elections officer
25 shall prepare an abstract of the votes and deliver it to the district elections authority. Not later
26 than the 45th day after the date of an election, the district elections authority shall determine from
27 it the result of the election.

11 “(3)(a) If a ballot is cast under this section using a facsimile machine, the return identification
12 envelope and waiver shall also be submitted using a facsimile machine.

13 “(b) If a ballot is cast under this section by electronic mail, the return identification envelope
14 and waiver shall also be submitted by electronic mail.

15 “(4) The county clerk shall verify the signature of each elector on the return identification en-
16 velope transmitted by facsimile machine or electronic mail under this section with the signature on
17 the elector’s registration record, according to the procedure provided by rules adopted by the Sec-
18 retary of State.

45 “(2) If general obligation bonds, which are to be paid by particular areas in the authority, are

1 to be issued, a statement that the bonds will be the general obligation of the entire authority but
2 will be the primary obligation of the areas in the authority which will be directly benefited by the
3 sewage treatment plants or trunk or lateral sewers or drains constructed with the proceeds of the
4 bonds and paid through assessment, annual levy, or sewer service charges, or combinations thereof,
5 as determined by the board under ORS 450.855 and designating specifically the boundaries of such
6 area or areas.

7 “(3) If revenue bonds are to be issued, a statement that the bonds will be payable solely out of
8 designated revenues of the authority and will not be a general obligation of the authority or a
9 charge upon the tax revenues of the authority.
