Re: <u>HB 2164-3</u> and <u>HB 3352</u> – Cover All People health care reform - Support

The LWV has a long history of supporting incremental increases in health insurance coverage, especially in special needs populations. In that spirit, the LWVOR supports the goals of <u>HB 2164-3</u> and <u>HB 3352</u> Cover All People (CAP).

A sad lesson we have learned from the COVID-19 ongoing experience is that we must address disparities and inequities in society in the near-and long-term timeframes. Near term, BIPOC populations are suffering higher incidences of serious cases and deaths due to COVID; longer term we will need to restructure our public health system to ethically and practically deal with this situation. <u>HB 2164-3</u> and <u>HB 3352</u> point us in the right direction.

LWVOR supports Cover All People components of this bill:

- This is a past-due responsibility to essential workers who live with us and help us live well despite sometimes being undocumented residents of this country.
- These folks have families and children who are citizens but fear engaging with the health care system due to deportation laws.
- They live and work in rural areas of our state, which are hard to serve and will require special culturally responsive outreach techniques.
- Some of these young people age-out of Cover All Kids but still need basic and preventive health care to keep working or schooling.
- If we can cover their parents, they will be more willing to seek coverage for their children and work more productively when they are healthy.
- Science uses the Social Vulnerability Index and the Disadvantaged Index to identify and prioritize these populations for planning purposes.
- This bill used input from community-based organizations and directs OHA to utilize CCOs and cover all Oregon adults at or below 138% of the FPL regardless of immigration status.
- Our health and our economy are dependent on each other at all levels.
