We're writing in **support of HB 3335**, funding ADU community pilot programs.

Accessory dwelling units and other scattered-site homes are excellent options for some Oregonians in need of regulated-affordable housing. Their potentially low public cost per home---due, essentially, to the fact that creating homes in empty yard space saves precious money on land---has promise.

Making Oregon's precious affordable-housing dollars go further will be possible only through innovation, and innovation will be possible only through experimentation and dissemination. **HB 3335 would dedicate a small amount of money to funding this necessary experimentation and dissemination.** 

Oregon's housing policy, though better than that of some states, is not achieving its goals. An appropriate response should include a **three-part strategy**:

- 1. Finding more money to help the Oregonians in most need.
- 2. Lowering our many regulatory barriers to lower-cost market-rate housing.
- 3. Finding ways to make our existing expenditures go further and house more people.

HB 3335 is a promising example of the third aspect of that strategy. We urge its passage.
