

April 27th 1998 I was arrested for several measure II charges in Coos county.

In May of 1998 I was appointed Paul Fredrick Wloys to represent my case in trial. I did not know that my lawyer himself was being criminally investigated by the same intity that was seeking my conviction.

November of 1998 I was sentenced to serve 426 months for (not murder) measure II charges that were stacked back to back. I was 24 years old.

According to the disciplinary reports sent to me by a federal attorney in 2017, my trial lawyer was sentenced to a lengthy prison sentence and disbarred for life 2 years after my conviction. "For crimes he committed while he was supposed to be working on my case.

To date, I have filed for a commutation through the governor and I am still in Post Conviction appeal fighting my case,

Even though I am measure II, I chose to do any program available to me and I was only one of 4 people to become state certified through MHAACCB as a Recovery mentor.

Measure II's being considered for good time would give my life back. I am now 47 years old and have spent half of my life in prison "for a crime I committed at 24 years old"

I'm enclosing a couple certificates / supporting letters showing that some of us measure II guys are making immense changes by choice, even though we don't get good time.

I appreciate all you do and pray this letter finds you healthy, and safe.

I am a Security Threat Management Lieutenant with the Oregon Department of Corrections. I have acted in the capacity to view all threats to safety and security as presented by AIC's while they are in custody of the Department of Corrections. I have acted in this capacity for nearly 15 years. My tenure with the agency is 30 years.

I have been familiar with AIC Widdifield for many years. He was once an Active Member of the group known as Sureno. Over the course of many trials and tribulations he has demonstrated significant positive human behavior growth. He has been assigned to the Oregon State Correctional Facility since 2016. He has stopped any and all interest in being a gang member with the Surenos. His facility conduct has been exceptional, and he has participated in many programs. He has contributed to the safety/security of the facility by being a strong representative for peaceful solutions amongst his peers. He no longer has any ties to any criminal organization, and he is fully aware that he himself would be at-risk if he associated with gang members in the community because they identify him as an enemy because he "dropped out". His actions at OSCI have been honorable.

It is in my professional opinion that he represents little of no concern to the safety of the community should his release date be reviewed for early release. His maturity and sense of community here at OSCI has shown that he could easily bring value to the community.

Mr. Widdifield first entered the Oregon Department of Corrections on 4/14/1994. He would go on to spend most of the next 20 years growing up in prison. During this time, he was deeply involved with the gang and prison politics where he amassed a consistent track record of misconducts and negative behavior. However, in 2014 he decided to step away from the gang life. This meant coming to Oregon State Correctional Institution, where he would be branded with the title of "dropout" within the prison system, something that if you ask him, he is very proud of. Mr. Widdifield didn't stop there though, he continued to advocate for himself and take active steps to change his life.

Since 2014 Mr. Widdifield has been nothing less than a model Adult in Custody (AIC). He has completed Anger Management, earned his GED, and participated/facilitated multiple AIC Victims Panels. He has also spent the last 7 years and counting in Narcotics Anonymous/Alcoholics Anonymous while remaining misconduct free the entire time. Mr. Widdifield's accomplishments do not stop there. In 2017 he completed the Certified Recovery Mentor Program taught in the Alcohol and Drug department at Oregon State Correctional Institution. To this day he remains there working as a Certified Recovery Mentor.

As a counselor within the Oregon Department of Corrections I can say that it is very rare that I see someone with Mr. Widdifield's history truly take the steps to change his life and become a leader and role model to his peers the way he has. Mr. Widdifield is a testament to prison reform and the changes someone can make when afforded the opportunities.

Mr. Widdifield has no release date incentives and has been assessed with a low Automated Criminal Risk Score (ACRS) by the Oregon Department of Corrections. As a result, he has no real requirements or incentives to case plan, work, complete programs, etc. Therefore, his accomplishments have been by his own personal choice to improve himself.
