Testimony in favor of SB 852

By voting in favor of SB 852, we are asking you to change an outdated mortgage interest deduction tax law. This law was originally intended to benefit housing for <u>all Oregonians</u>. But sadly today this tax code is no longer doing its job. And in fact, has contributed to increased costs, by causing a widening of economic disparity in our state.
