As climate change manifests itself on Oregon OFRI helps explain how Oregon's forests can play a role in it.

<u>OFRI provides factual, truthful and science-based information</u>. There are a lot of information sources about Oregon's forests and I want to hear what they have to say. When it comes time for me to evaluate these sources, I need a standard. OFRI is my standard. Decisions can always be made using emotion, political considerations, spiritual, economic and other factors but I don't want to have buyer's remorse when I make my decision. OFRI provides a bank of information that I can draw upon.
