### “TRANSFER COUNCIL MEMBERSHIP

7  
8

9 “**SECTION 1.** ORS 350.426 is amended to read:

10 “350.426. (1) The Transfer Council is established, consisting of 15 voting members, appointed by  
11 the Higher Education Coordinating Commission, and one nonvoting, ex officio member.

12 “(2) Before appointing the voting members, the commission shall request nominations from offi-  
13 cial student, faculty and administrator organizations at public universities listed in ORS 352.002,  
14 community colleges operated under ORS chapter 341 and high schools in this state. The 15 voting  
15 members of the council shall consist of:

16 “(a) Five academic officers, two of whom are currently employed at a public university, two of  
17 whom are currently employed at a community college and one of whom is currently employed at a  
18 public high school in this state;

19 “(b) Four faculty members, two of whom are currently employed at a public university and two  
20 of whom are currently employed at a community college;

21 “(c) One teacher who both teaches accelerated college credit programs as defined in ORS  
22 340.315 and is currently employed **either by an education service district or** at a public high  
23 school in this state;

24 “(d) Two individuals who specialize in assisting students who transfer between institutions, one  
25 of whom is currently employed at a public university and one of whom is currently employed at a  
26 community college; and

27 “(e) Three students, one of whom is currently enrolled at a public university, one of whom is  
28 currently enrolled at a community college and one of whom is currently enrolled at a high school  
29 in this state.

30 “(3) The chairperson of the commission, or a designee of the chairperson of the commission,  
31 shall serve as a nonvoting, ex officio member.

32 “(4)(a) The term of office of each voting member of the council is two years. Before the expira-  
33 tion of the term of a member, the commission shall appoint a successor. A member is eligible for  
34 reappointment.

35 “(b) In order to serve as a member of the council, an individual must at all times meet the

1 qualifications for the appointment. If at any time a member fails to meet the qualifications for the  
2 member's appointment, the position is vacant.

3 "(c) If there is a vacancy for any cause, the commission shall make an appointment to become  
4 immediately effective for the unexpired term.

5 "(5)(a) The council:

6 "(A) Shall select one or more of its members as chairperson or as cochairpersons; and

7 "(B) May establish, in the manner set forth in this subsection, one or more subcommittees for  
8 the purpose of advising the council on how to best fulfill its duties.

9 "(b) For a subcommittee established under this subsection that will make recommendations to  
10 the council on a subject that will be submitted by the council to the commission under ORS 350.429  
11 (1)(d)(A) to (D), the council may appoint any faculty member who is employed by a public university  
12 listed in ORS 352.002 or a community college operated under ORS chapter 341, provided that the  
13 subcommittee consists of equal numbers of faculty from public universities and community colleges.

14 "(c) For a subcommittee established under this subsection that will not make recommendations  
15 to the council on a subject that will be submitted by the council to the commission under ORS  
16 350.429 (1)(d)(A) to (D), the council may appoint any individual employed by a public university listed  
17 in ORS 352.002 or a community college operated under ORS chapter 341, including faculty,  
18 registrars, academic advisors and academic administrators.

19 "(d) Appointment to a subcommittee established under this subsection does not entitle an indi-  
20 vidual to vote as a member of the council.

21 "(6)(a) A majority of the voting members of the council constitutes a quorum for the transaction  
22 of business.

23 "(b)(A) Except as provided in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph, official action by the council  
24 requires the approval of a majority of the voting members of the council.

25 "(B) Official action by the council on recommendations to be made to the commission under ORS  
26 350.429 (1)(d)(A) to (D) requires the approval of three-fifths of the voting members of the council.

27 "(c) Two or more voting members of the council who disagree with recommendations that are  
28 submitted to the commission under ORS 350.429 (1)(d)(A) to (D) may jointly submit a minority report  
29 to the commission that contains alternate recommendations. A minority report created under this  
30 paragraph shall be submitted to the commission with the majority recommendations.

31 "(7)(a) A majority of the members of a subcommittee established under subsection (5) of this  
32 section constitutes a quorum for the transaction of business of the subcommittee.

33 "(b)(A) Except as provided in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph, official action by a subcom-  
34 mittee established under subsection (5) of this section requires approval of a majority of the mem-  
35 bers of the subcommittee.

36 "(B) Official action by a subcommittee on recommendations to be made to the council on a  
37 subject that will be submitted by the council to the commission under ORS 350.429 (1)(d)(A) to (D)  
38 requires the approval of three-fifths of the members of the subcommittee.

39 "(c) Two or more members of a subcommittee who disagree with recommendations that are  
40 submitted to the council on a subject that will be submitted by the council to the commission under  
41 ORS 350.429 (1)(d)(A) to (D) may jointly submit a minority report to the council that contains al-  
42 ternate recommendations. A minority report created under this paragraph shall be submitted to the  
43 council with the majority recommendations.

44 "(8)(a) The council shall meet at least every three months at a place, day and hour determined  
45 by the chairperson or cochairpersons.

1 “(b) In addition to the meetings required under paragraph (a) of this subsection, the commission  
2 may call a meeting of the council if the commission finds a meeting to be necessary and a meeting  
3 is not called by the chairperson or cochairpersons.

## 5 “IN-STATE TUITION PROVISIONS 6

7 “**SECTION 2.** ORS 350.290 is amended to read:

8 “350.290. (1) A public university listed in ORS 352.002 or a community college shall charge an  
9 enrolled student who is not a resident of this state and who is attending classes as an undergraduate  
10 or graduate student on a public university or community college campus in this state tuition and  
11 fees no greater than the resident rate if the student:

12 “(a)(A) Served in the Armed Forces of the United States;

13 “(B) Was relieved or discharged from that service with either an honorable discharge or a gen-  
14 eral discharge under honorable conditions; and

15 “(C) Provides proof that the student has established a physical presence in Oregon within 12  
16 months of being enrolled at the public university or community college;

17 “(b) Was, or is the dependent of, a resident of Oregon who left the state within the previous five  
18 years in order to serve, and who subsequently served, in the Armed Forces of the United States or  
19 in an international position with the state, the federal government or a humanitarian aid organiza-  
20 tion; or

21 “(c)(A) Was, or is the dependent of, a resident of Oregon who left the state more than five years  
22 ago in order to serve, and who subsequently served, in the Armed Forces of the United States or  
23 in an international position with the state, the federal government or a humanitarian aid organiza-  
24 tion; and

25 “(B) Since leaving the state in the manner provided in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph, has  
26 never established residence in another state.

27 “(2) A person who served in the Armed Forces of the United States or in an international po-  
28 sition with the state, the federal government or a humanitarian aid organization and who receives  
29 federal tuition benefits in excess of the tuition and fees the person is charged under subsection (1)  
30 of this section at a public university listed in ORS 352.002 or a community college where the person  
31 is enrolled shall pay tuition and fees equal to the federal tuition benefits received.

32 “(3)(a) **Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection,** distance education and self-  
33 support courses as identified by each public university listed in ORS 352.002 and community college  
34 are exempt from the tuition reduction provisions of this section.

35 “(b) **The tuition reduction provisions of this section apply to distance education courses**  
36 **as identified by each public university listed in ORS 352.002 and community college that are**  
37 **taken by a person who:**

38 “(A) **Is eligible to receive the tuition reduction provisions of this section when attending**  
39 **classes as an undergraduate or graduate student on a public university or community college**  
40 **campus in this state; and**

41 “(B) **Served in the Armed Forces of the United States.**

42 “**SECTION 3.** ORS 352.287 is amended to read:

43 “352.287. (1) The governing board of a public university listed in ORS 352.002 shall exempt a  
44 student who is not a citizen or a lawful permanent resident of the United States from paying non-  
45 resident tuition and fees for enrollment as an undergraduate student and as a graduate student in

1 a degree program at a public university listed in ORS 352.002 if the student:

2 “(a) During each of the three years immediately prior to receiving a high school diploma or a  
3 modified diploma or leaving school before receiving a high school diploma or a modified diploma,  
4 attended an elementary or a secondary school in this state;

5 “(b) During each of the five years immediately prior to receiving a high school diploma or a  
6 modified diploma or leaving school before receiving a high school diploma or a modified diploma,  
7 attended an elementary or a secondary school in any state or territory of the United States, the  
8 District of Columbia or the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico;

9 “(c) Received a high school diploma or a modified diploma from a secondary school in this state  
10 or received the equivalent of a high school diploma; and

11 “(d) Shows intention to become a citizen or a lawful permanent resident of the United States  
12 by submitting to the public university the student attends or plans to attend an official copy of the  
13 student’s application to register with a federal immigration program or federal deportation deferral  
14 program or a statement of intent that the student will seek to obtain citizenship as permitted under  
15 federal law.

16 “(2) The governing board shall exempt a student who is financially dependent upon a person  
17 who is not a citizen or a lawful permanent resident of the United States from paying nonresident  
18 tuition and fees for enrollment as an undergraduate student and as a graduate student in a degree  
19 program at a public university listed in ORS 352.002 if the student:

20 “(a) During each of the three years immediately prior to receiving a high school diploma or a  
21 modified diploma or leaving school before receiving a high school diploma or a modified diploma,  
22 attended an elementary or a secondary school in this state and resided in this state with the person  
23 upon whom the student is dependent;

24 “(b) During each of the five years immediately prior to receiving a high school diploma or a  
25 modified diploma or leaving school before receiving a high school diploma or a modified diploma,  
26 attended an elementary or a secondary school in any state or territory of the United States, the  
27 District of Columbia or the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and resided with the person upon whom  
28 the student is dependent;

29 “(c) Received a high school diploma or a modified diploma from a secondary school in this state  
30 or received the equivalent of a high school diploma; and

31 “(d) For a student who is not already a citizen or lawful permanent resident of the United  
32 States, shows intention to become a citizen or a lawful permanent resident of the United States by  
33 submitting to the public university the student attends or plans to attend an official copy of the  
34 student’s application to register with a federal immigration program or federal deportation deferral  
35 program or a statement of intent that the student will seek to obtain citizenship as permitted under  
36 federal law.

37 “(3) A student who is a citizen or a lawful permanent resident of the United States and who has  
38 resided outside of Oregon for more than three years while serving in the Armed Forces of the  
39 United States, but who otherwise meets the requirements of subsection (1) or (2) of this section, shall  
40 qualify for exemption from nonresident tuition and fees for enrollment as an undergraduate student  
41 and a graduate student in a degree program at a public university listed in ORS 352.002 without  
42 having to reestablish residency in Oregon.

43 “(4) A student who is a COFA islander and who has not previously established residence in any  
44 state or territory of the United States or the District of Columbia other than Oregon shall qualify  
45 for exemption from nonresident tuition and fees for enrollment as an undergraduate student and a

1 graduate student in a degree program at a public university listed in ORS 352.002.

2 “(5) A student who is a refugee or special immigrant visa holder and who has not previously  
3 established residence in any state or territory of the United States or the District of Columbia other  
4 than Oregon shall qualify for exemption from nonresident tuition and fees for enrollment as an  
5 undergraduate student and a graduate student in a degree program at a public university listed in  
6 ORS 352.002.

7 “(6) The governing board shall adopt standards to implement the provisions of this section.

8 “(7) Not later than July 1 of each year, the Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall  
9 report to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the President of the Senate and the interim  
10 committees of the Legislative Assembly with subject matter authority over higher education, for the  
11 preceding academic year:

12 “(a) The number of students that applied and were accepted into public universities under sub-  
13 sections (1) to (5) of this section; and

14 “(b) The financial impact of subsections (1) to (5) of this section on public universities listed in  
15 ORS 352.002.

16 “(8) A student who is not a citizen or a lawful permanent resident of the United States, or who  
17 is a refugee, special immigrant visa holder or COFA islander, is eligible to receive scholarships and  
18 other financial aid from public universities listed in ORS 352.002.

19 “(9) As used in this section:

20 “(a) ‘COFA islander’ means an individual who legally entered the United States under a Com-  
21 pact of Free Association treaty between the United States and any of the following countries:

22 “(A) The Republic of Palau;

23 “(B) The Republic of the Marshall Islands; or

24 “(C) The Federated States of Micronesia.

25 “(b) ‘Refugee’ means an individual who is granted refugee status for admission to the United  
26 States by the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services.

27 “(c) ‘Special immigrant visa holder’ means:

28 “(A) An individual from Iraq or Afghanistan who was provided with the status of special immi-  
29 grant by the United States Department of Homeland Security under:

30 “[A] (i) Section 1059(a) of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2006, P.L.  
31 109-163, 119 Stat. 3444;

32 “[B] (ii) Section 1244(b) of the Refugee Crisis in Iraq Act of 2007, P.L. 110-181, 122 Stat. 397;  
33 or

34 “[C] (iii) Section 602(b) of the Afghan Allies Protection Act of 2009, P.L. 111-8, 123 Stat.  
35 807[.]; or

36 “(B) An individual who is granted humanitarian parole, asylum, conditional permanent  
37 residency or temporary protected status by the United States Department of Homeland Se-  
38 curity or other federal agency.

39  
40 **“CONTACT-SHARING REQUIREMENT**  
41 **FOR GRADUATE STUDENT EMPLOYEES**  
42

43 **“SECTION 4. (1) Each public university listed in ORS 352.002 shall develop a form for**  
44 **graduate students enrolled at the public university who wish to be employed by the public**  
45 **university that:**

1       “(a) Requires the graduate student to provide the contact information described in ORS  
2 243.804 (4)(a)(B); and

3       “(b) Waives any privacy rights to, and authorizes the public university to disclose, the  
4 information described in paragraph (a) of this subsection.

5       “(2) As a condition of employment, any graduate student who is employed by a public  
6 university must:

7       “(a) Provide the contact information described in subsection (1)(a) of this section; and

8       “(b) Sign the consent described in subsection (1)(b) of this section to authorize the public  
9 university to release the contact information that is part of the employment record.

11                                   **“YOUTH CORRECTIONS EDUCATION PROGRAM AND**  
12                                   **JUVENILE DETENTION EDUCATION PROGRAM**

13  
14       **“SECTION 5.** ORS 329.451 is amended to read:

15       “329.451. (1)(a) At or before grade 12, a school district or public charter school shall award a  
16 high school diploma to a student who completes the requirements established by subsection (2) of  
17 this section.

18       “(b) A school district or public charter school shall award a modified diploma to a student who  
19 satisfies the requirements established by subsection (7) of this section, an extended diploma to a  
20 student who satisfies the requirements established by subsection (8) of this section or an alternative  
21 certificate to a student who satisfies the requirements established by subsection (9) of this section.

22       “(c) A school district or public charter school may not deny a student who has the documented  
23 history described in subsection (7)(b) or (8)(b) of this section the opportunity to pursue a diploma  
24 with more stringent requirements than a modified diploma or an extended diploma for the sole rea-  
25 son that the student has the documented history.

26       “(d) A school district or public charter school may award a modified diploma or extended di-  
27 ploma to a student only upon receiving consent as provided by subsection (6) of this section.

28       “(2)(a) In order to receive a high school diploma from a school district or public charter school,  
29 a student must satisfy the requirements established by the State Board of Education and the school  
30 district or public charter school and, while in grades 9 through 12, must complete at least:

31       “(A) Twenty-four total credits;

32       “(B) Three credits of mathematics; and

33       “(C) Four credits of language arts.

34       “(b) If a school district or public charter school requires a student to complete more than 24  
35 total credits, as provided by paragraph (a)(A) of this subsection, the school district or public charter  
36 school may only require the student to complete additional credits for:

37       “(A) Subjects for which the State Board of Education has established academic content stan-  
38 dards under ORS 329.045;

39       “(B) Courses provided as part of a career and technical education program; or

40       “(C) Courses that provide, or qualify to provide, credit at post-secondary institutions of educa-  
41 tion.

42       “(c)(A) A school district or public charter school that requires students to satisfy any require-  
43 ments not specified by paragraph (a) of this subsection or by rule of the State Board of Education  
44 must grant to a student a waiver of the requirements established by the school district or public  
45 charter school if the student is or, at any time from grade 9 to 12, was:

1 “(i) A foster child, as defined in ORS 30.297;

2 “(ii) Homeless, as determined under rules adopted by the State Board of Education based on  
3 standards adopted by the Department of Human Services;

4 “(iii) A runaway, as determined under rules adopted by the State Board of Education based on  
5 standards adopted by the Department of Human Services;

6 “(iv) A child in a military family covered by the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity  
7 for Military Children, as determined under rules adopted by the State Board of Education;

8 “(v) A child of a migrant worker, as determined under rules adopted by the State Board of Ed-  
9 ucation; or

10 “(vi) Enrolled in the Youth Corrections Education Program or the Juvenile Detention Education  
11 Program.

12 “(B)(i) For any student identified under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph, a school district or  
13 public charter school must accept any credits earned by the student in [*another school district or*  
14 *public charter school*] **an educational program in this state** and apply those credits toward re-  
15 quirements specified by paragraph (a) of this subsection or by rule of the State Board of Education  
16 if the credits satisfied those requirements in that [*other school district or public charter school.*] **ed-**  
17 **ucational program in this state.**

18 “(ii) **As used in this subparagraph, ‘educational program in this state’ means an educa-**  
19 **tional program that is:**

20 “(I) **Provided by a school district, a public charter school, the Youth Corrections Educa-**  
21 **tion Program or the Juvenile Detention Education Program; or**

22 “(II) **Funded as provided by ORS 343.243 for students in a long term care or treatment**  
23 **facility described in ORS 343.961 or a hospital identified in ORS 343.261.**

24 “(3) A student providing work samples to demonstrate proficiency in Essential Learning Skills  
25 as may be required under subsection (2) of this section must be allowed to use accommodations de-  
26 scribed in the student’s individualized education program or the student’s plan developed in ac-  
27 cordance with section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 29 U.S.C. 794. As used in this  
28 subsection, the term ‘accommodations’:

29 “(a) Includes, but is not limited to:

30 “(A) Additional time to demonstrate proficiency.

31 “(B) The ability to demonstrate proficiency in an alternative location that is secure and  
32 proctored.

33 “(C) The use of text-to-speech or speech-to-text technology or other assistive technology.

34 “(b) Does not include modifications that lower the proficiency standards or that are used solely  
35 to earn modified credit.

36 “(4) A student may satisfy the requirements of subsection (2) of this section in less than four  
37 years. If a student satisfies the requirements of subsection (2) of this section and a school district  
38 or public charter school has received consent as provided by subsection (6) of this section, the  
39 school district or public charter school shall award a high school diploma to the student.

40 “(5) If a school district or public charter school has received consent as provided by subsection  
41 (6) of this section, the school district or public charter school may advance the student to the next  
42 grade level if the student has satisfied the requirements for the student’s current grade level.

43 “(6)(a) For the purpose of receiving consent as provided by subsections (1)(d), (4) and (5) of this  
44 section, consent shall be provided by:

45 “(A) The parent or guardian of the student, if the student:

1       “(i) Is under 18 years of age and is not emancipated pursuant to ORS 419B.550 to 419B.558; or  
2       “(ii) Has been determined not to have the ability to give informed consent regarding the  
3 student’s education pursuant to a protective proceeding under ORS chapter 125; or  
4       “(B) The student, if the student is 18 years of age or older or is emancipated pursuant to ORS  
5 419B.550 to 419B.558.  
6       “(b) For the purpose of awarding a modified diploma or extended diploma as provided by sub-  
7 section (1)(d) of this section or of awarding a high school diploma as provided by subsection (4) of  
8 this section, consent must be received during the school year for which the diploma will be awarded.  
9       “(7) A school district or public charter school shall award a modified diploma only to students  
10 who have demonstrated the inability to meet the full set of academic content standards for a high  
11 school diploma with reasonable modifications and accommodations. To be eligible for a modified di-  
12 ploma, a student must:  
13       “(a) Satisfy the requirements for a modified diploma established by the State Board of Education;  
14 and  
15       “(b) Have a documented history of an inability to maintain grade level achievement due to sig-  
16 nificant learning and instructional barriers or have a documented history of a medical condition that  
17 creates a barrier to achievement.  
18       “(8) A school district or public charter school shall award an extended diploma only to students  
19 who have demonstrated the inability to meet the full set of academic content standards for a high  
20 school diploma with reasonable modifications and accommodations. To be eligible for an extended  
21 diploma, a student must:  
22       “(a) While in grade nine through completion of high school, complete 12 credits, which may not  
23 include more than six credits earned in a self-contained special education classroom and shall in-  
24 clude:  
25       “(A) Two credits of mathematics;  
26       “(B) Two credits of language arts;  
27       “(C) Two credits of science;  
28       “(D) Three credits of history, geography, economics or civics;  
29       “(E) One credit of health;  
30       “(F) One credit of physical education; and  
31       “(G) One credit of the arts or a world language; and  
32       “(b) Have a documented history of:  
33       “(A) An inability to maintain grade level achievement due to significant learning and instruc-  
34 tional barriers;  
35       “(B) A medical condition that creates a barrier to achievement; or  
36       “(C) A change in the student’s ability to participate in grade level activities as a result of a  
37 serious illness or injury that occurred after grade eight.  
38       “(9) A school district or public charter school shall award an alternative certificate to a student  
39 who does not satisfy the requirements for a high school diploma, a modified diploma or an extended  
40 diploma if the student meets requirements established by the board of the school district or public  
41 charter school.  
42       “(10) A student shall have the opportunity to satisfy the requirements of subsection (7), (8) or  
43 (9) of this section by the later of:  
44       “(a) Four years after starting grade nine; or  
45       “(b) The student reaching the age of 21 years, if the student is entitled to a public education



1 until the age of 21 years under state or federal law.

2 “(11)(a) A student may satisfy the requirements described in subsection (7), (8) or (9) of this  
3 section in less than four years if consent is provided in the manner described in subsection (6)(a)  
4 of this section.

5 “(b) The consent provided under this subsection must be written and must clearly state that the  
6 parent, guardian or student is waiving the time allowed under subsection (10) of this section. A  
7 consent may not be used to allow a student to satisfy the requirements of subsection (7), (8) or (9)  
8 of this section in less than three years.

9 “(c) A copy of all consents provided under this subsection for students in a school district must  
10 be forwarded to the district superintendent.

11 “(d) Each school district must provide to the Superintendent of Public Instruction information  
12 about the number of consents provided during a school year.

13 “(12)(a) A student who qualifies to receive or receives a modified diploma, an extended diploma  
14 or an alternative certificate shall:

15 “(A) Have the option of participating in a high school graduation ceremony with the class of the  
16 student; and

17 “(B) Have access to instructional hours, hours of transition services and hours of other services  
18 that are designed to:

19 “(i) Meet the unique needs of the student; and

20 “(ii) When added together, provide a total number of hours of instruction and services to the  
21 student that equals at least the total number of instructional hours that is required to be provided  
22 to students who are attending a public high school.

23 “(b)(A) The number of instructional hours, hours of transition services and hours of other ser-  
24 vices that are appropriate for a student shall be determined by the student’s individualized education  
25 program team. Based on the student’s needs and performance level, the student’s individualized ed-  
26 ucation program team may decide that the student will not access the total number of hours of in-  
27 struction and services to which the student has access under paragraph (a)(B) of this subsection.

28 “(B) A school district may not unilaterally decrease the total number of hours of instruction and  
29 services to which the student has access under paragraph (a)(B) of this subsection, regardless of the  
30 age of the student.

31 “(c) If a student’s individualized education program team decides that the student will not access  
32 the total number of hours of instruction and services to which the student has access under para-  
33 graph (a)(B) of this subsection, the school district shall annually:

34 “(A) Provide the following information in writing to the parent or guardian of the student:

35 “(i) The school district’s duty to comply with the requirements of paragraph (a)(B) of this sub-  
36 section; and

37 “(ii) The prohibition against a school district’s unilaterally decreasing the total number of hours  
38 of instruction and services to which the student has access.

38 made based on the full-time equivalent student enrollment of the community college; and  
39 “(D) For public universities, distributions from a public university support fund established by  
40 the commission by rule.

#### “PARTICIPATION IN INTERSCHOLASTIC ACTIVITIES

43

44 “**SECTION 13.** ORS 339.460 is amended to read:

45

“339.460. (1) As used in this section:

1           “(a) [*GED program*] **‘High school equivalency program’** means a program provided [*by a*  
2 *school district or an education service district*] to assist a student in earning a **certificate for pass-**  
3 **ing an approved high school equivalency test such as the** General Educational Development  
4 (GED) [*certificate*] **test.**

5           “(b) [*GED student*] **‘High school equivalency student’** means a student who is eligible to at-  
6 tend school under ORS 339.115 (1) and who is enrolled in a [*GED*] **high school equivalency pro-**  
7 **gram.**

8           “(c) ‘Homeschooled student’ means a child who is taught by a private teacher, a parent or a  
9 legal guardian, as described in ORS 339.030.

10          “(d) ‘Interscholastic activities’ includes:

11          “(A) For students in any grade from kindergarten through grade 12, athletics, music, speech and  
12 other similar or related activities.

13          “(B) For students in any grade from kindergarten through grade eight, activities that are offered  
14 only before or after regular school hours and that may, but are not required to, involve interaction  
15 among other schools.

16          “(e) ‘Public charter school’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 338.005.

17          “(2) A school district may not deny a [*GED*] **high school equivalency** student, a homeschooled  
18 student or a student who attends a public charter school that does not provide interscholastic ac-  
19 tivities the opportunity to participate in all interscholastic activities available in the school district  
20 within the attendance boundaries in which the [*GED*] **high school equivalency** student,  
21 homeschooled student or public charter school student resides if the student fulfills the following  
22 conditions, as applicable:

23          “(a)(A) For a [*GED*] **high school equivalency** student or a homeschooled student, the student  
24 must meet all school district eligibility requirements except:

25          “(i) The school district’s school or class attendance requirements; and

26          “(ii) The class requirements of the voluntary association that administers the interscholastic  
27 activity, if applicable.

28          “(B) For a student who attends a public charter school, the student must meet all school district  
29 eligibility requirements except the school district’s school or class attendance requirements.

30          “(b) For a homeschooled student or a student who attends a public charter school, the student  
31 must [*meet*] **demonstrate academic eligibility by meeting** one of these requirements:

32          “(A) Achieve a minimum score that places the student at or above the 23rd percentile, based  
33 on national norms, on an examination from the list the State Board of Education adopts under ORS  
34 339.035. The student must take the examination [*at the end of each school year*] **prior to the be-**  
35 **ginning of the school year in which the student will participate in an interscholastic activity**  
36 **and for which academic eligibility is being determined**, and the student’s parent or legal guard-  
37 ian must submit the results to the school district for use in determining **the student’s academic**  
38 **eligibility** [*for the following year*].

39          “(B) Meet alternative requirements that a school district adopts, in consultation with the  
40 student’s parent or legal guardian, to participate in interscholastic activities, including but not  
41 limited to a requirement that a student submit a portfolio of work samples to a school district  
42 committee for review to determine whether the student is eligible to participate in interscholastic  
43 activities.

44          “(c) For a [*GED*] **high school equivalency** student, the student must demonstrate **academic**  
45 **eligibility by showing** that, prior to beginning the interscholastic activity, the student has passed

1 at least one practice test administered through the [*GED*] **high school equivalency** program.

2 “(3)(a) In addition to the requirements set forth in subsection (2) of this section, a public charter  
3 school that enrolls a student who intends to participate in an interscholastic activity must pay to  
4 the school district or school that offers the interscholastic activity, as appropriate and if the school  
5 district or school requires payment as provided by this subsection:

6 “(A) An annual fee that is equivalent to not more than five percent of the amount of the school  
7 district’s General Purpose Grant per ADMw, as calculated under ORS 327.013; and

8 “(B) An additional annual fee that is equivalent to not more than five percent of the amount of  
9 the school district’s General Purpose Grant per ADMw, as calculated under ORS 327.013, if partic-  
10 ipating in the interscholastic activity requires the student to enroll in a course for credit.

11 “(b) The school district and the public charter school shall enter into an agreement to specify  
12 the amount of the fees described in paragraph (a) of this subsection.

13 “(c) A public charter school is required to pay a fee described in paragraph (a) of this subsection  
14 only once per year per student participating in an interscholastic activity at a school in the school  
15 district, regardless of the number of interscholastic activities in which the student participates.

16 “(4) [*A GED*] **A high school equivalency** student, a homeschooled student or a student who  
17 attends a public charter school may participate in interscholastic activities while awaiting exam-  
18 ination or practice test results **unless the student is awaiting the results to restore academic**  
19 **eligibility.**

20 “[*(5) A GED student, a homeschooled student or a student who attends a public charter school who*  
21 *does not maintain academic eligibility is ineligible to participate in interscholastic activities for the*  
22 *duration of the school year in which the student becomes academically ineligible and for the following*  
23 *year. The student must take the required examinations or practice tests at the end of the second year*  
24 *and meet the standards described in subsection (2)(b) or (c) of this section to become eligible for the*  
25 *third year.*]

26 “(5) **A high school equivalency student, a homeschooled student or a student who attends**  
27 **a public charter school who does not maintain academic eligibility is ineligible to participate**  
28 **in interscholastic activities for the school year in which the student is determined to be ac-**  
29 **ademically ineligible unless:**

30 “(a) **At least 18 weeks have passed from the later of the date that the student:**

31 “(A) **Was determined to have not maintained academic eligibility; or**

32 “(B) **Became a high school equivalency student or a homeschooled student; and**

33 “(b) **The student takes the required examinations or practice tests and meets the stan-**  
34 **dards described in subsection (2)(b) or (c) of this section.**

35 “(6)(a) A [*GED*] **high school equivalency** student, a homeschooled student or a student who  
36 attends a public charter school must fulfill the same responsibilities and standards of behavior and  
37 performance, including related class or practice requirements, as other students who participate in  
38 the interscholastic activity. The student must also comply with all public school requirements during  
39 the time of participation.

40 “(b) A student who attends a public charter school must be allowed to participate in an inter-  
41 scholastic activity in the same manner that a resident of the school district may participate in the  
42 interscholastic activity. A school district may not give priority to residents of the school district to  
43 participate in interscholastic activities, but may require a student who attends a public charter  
44 school to satisfy any standards for acceptance for participation.

45 “(7) A [*GED*] **high school equivalency** student, a homeschooled student or a student who at-

1 tends a public charter school who participates in interscholastic activities must reside within the  
2 attendance boundaries of the school at which the student participates unless the school district has  
3 a policy that allows any student attending a school of the school district to participate in inter-

20 **“SECTION 15.** (1) **The Department of Corrections shall develop a plan for providing the**  
21 **equipment, connectivity and infrastructure necessary to ensure that adults in custody in the**  
22 **Coffee Creek Correctional Facility and the Snake River Correctional Institution have online**

24 **“(a)** The adult basic skills development program described in ORS 421.084;

25 **“(b)** The professional and technical program described in ORS 421.081; and

26 **“(c)** Education programs that provide college credit, a college degree, a college certifica-

28 **“(2)** The department shall submit the plan developed under this section, in the manner  
29 **provided by ORS 192.245, to an interim committee of the Legislative Assembly related to ed-**

31 **“SECTION 16.** Section 15 of this 2022 Act is repealed on January 2, 2024.

32 **“SECTION 17.** (1) **No later than September 1, 2023, the Department of Corrections shall**

1       “**SECTION 18.** ORS 341.522 is amended to read:

2       “341.522. (1) The Office of Student Access and Completion shall administer the Oregon Promise  
3 program as provided by this section.

4       “(2) Subject to subsections (7) to (10) of this section, the office shall provide a grant for com-  
5 munity college courses to a person who meets the criteria described in subsections (3) to (6) of this  
6 section. The grant shall be limited as provided by subsections (7) to (10) of this section.

7       “(3) A grant shall be awarded under this section to a person who meets the following criteria:

8       “(a) Is enrolled in courses that are:

9       “(A) Offered at a community college in this state; and

10       “(B) Determined by the office, in accordance with rules adopted by the Higher Education Co-  
11 ordinating Commission, to be required for completion of:

12       “(i) A one-year curriculum for students who plan to transfer to another post-secondary institu-  
13 tion of education;

14       “(ii) An associate degree; or

15       “(iii) A program in career and technical education;

16       “(b) Except as provided in subsection (5) of this section, has been a resident of this state for at  
17 least 12 months prior to enrolling in the courses described in paragraph (a) of this subsection;

18       “(c) Attained the person’s highest level of education, except as provided in subsection (5) of this  
19 section, in this state prior to:

20       “(A) Receiving a diploma under ORS 329.451;

21       “(B) Receiving a certificate for passing an approved high school equivalency test such as the  
22 General Educational Development (GED) test as provided by ORS 350.175;

23       “(C) Completing grade 12 in compliance with the requirements of ORS 339.035; or

24       “(D) Completing grade 12 at a private or parochial school, as described in ORS 339.030 (1)(a);

25       “(d) Except as provided in subsections (4) and (5) of this section, attained the person’s highest  
26 level of education as described in paragraph (c) of this subsection within six months from the date  
27 that the person first enrolls in courses described in paragraph (a) of this subsection for the purpose  
28 of receiving a grant under this section;

29       “(e) Earned a cumulative grade point average of [2.5] **2.0** or better in high school or otherwise  
30 demonstrated an equivalent academic ability, as determined by the office according to rules adopted  
31 by the commission;

32       “(f) Completed and submitted the Free Application for Federal Student Aid for each academic  
33 year and accepted all state and federal aid grants available to the person, if eligible to file the ap-  
34 plication; and

35       “(g) Has not completed either of the following:

36       “(A) More than a total of 90 credit hours, or the equivalent, at a post-secondary institution of  
37 education; or

38       “(B) A curriculum, degree or program, as described in paragraph (a)(B) of this subsection.

39       “(4)(a) If a person otherwise meets the required criteria and has been awarded a grant under  
40 subsection (3) of this section, but the person enters into service with a career and technical student  
41 organization relating to agriculture or farming that is approved by the Department of Education  
42 under ORS 344.077 within six months after the person attained the person’s highest level of educa-  
43 tion as described in subsection (3)(c) of this section, the person will continue to be eligible to receive  
44 the grant if the person first enrolls in courses described in subsection (3)(a) of this section within  
45 six months of finishing the person’s service with the career and technical student organization.

1 “(b) In addition to the situation described in paragraph (a) of this subsection, the commission  
2 may waive the requirement set forth in subsection (3)(d) of this section for a person who shows that  
3 the person was unable to timely enroll in courses described in subsection (3)(a) of this section due  
4 to a significant hardship. The commission may adopt rules to implement this paragraph.

5 “(5)(a) A member of the Oregon National Guard who has completed initial active duty training  
6 is not required to comply with the criteria set forth in subsection (3)(d) of this section in order to  
7 receive a grant, provided that the member first enrolls in courses described in subsection (3)(a) of  
8 this section within six months after completing initial active duty training, as evidenced by an offi-  
9 cial form issued by the United States Department of Defense.

10 “(b)(A) A person who completes the highest level of education as described in subsection (3)(c)  
11 of this section while confined in a correctional facility, either serving a sentence of incarceration  
12 or as a young person, youth or adjudicated youth, is not required to comply with the criteria set  
13 forth in subsection (3)(d) of this section in order to receive a grant, provided that the person first  
14 enrolls in courses described in subsection (3)(a) of this section within six months after the date on  
15 which the person is first released from a correctional facility following completion of the highest  
16 level of education described in subsection (3)(c) of this section.

17 “(B) The eligibility requirements described in subsection (6)(a)(C) of this section may be waived  
18 by the office according to rules adopted by the commission for a person who receives a grant under  
19 this section in the manner described in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph.

20 “(C) As used in this paragraph:

21 “(i) ‘Adjudicated youth,’ ‘detention facility,’ ‘young person’ and ‘youth’ have the meanings given  
22 those terms in ORS 419A.004.

23 “(ii) ‘Correctional facility’ means any place used for the confinement of young persons, youths  
24 or adjudicated youths or persons charged with or convicted of a crime or otherwise confined under  
25 a court order, including a:

26 “(I) Youth correction facility;

27 “(II) Detention facility;

28 “(III) Department of Corrections institution;

29 “(IV) Local correctional facility; or

30 “(V) State hospital or a secure intensive community inpatient facility, with respect to persons  
31 detained therein who are youths or adjudicated youths, who are charged with or convicted of a  
32 crime or who are detained therein after having been found guilty except for insanity of a crime  
33 under ORS 161.290 to 161.373 or having been found responsible except for insanity under ORS  
34 419C.411.

35 “(iii) ‘Department of Corrections institution’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 421.005.

36 “(iv) ‘Local correctional facility’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 169.005.

37 “(v) ‘Youth correction facility’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 420.005.

38 “(c)(A) If a person was a foster child:

39 “(i) The person shall be treated as meeting the residency criteria for eligibility under subsection  
40 (3)(b) of this section if, but for the person’s placement in out-of-state foster care, the person other-  
41 wise meets the requirements of subsection (3)(b) of this section.

42 “(ii) The person shall be treated as attaining the person’s highest level of education in this state  
43 under subsection (3)(c) of this section if the person attained the person’s highest level of education  
44 while placed in out-of-state foster care and the person’s highest level of education substantially  
45 meets the requirements under subsection (3)(c) of this section.

1 “(iii) The person is not required to comply with the criteria set forth in subsection (3)(d) of this  
2 section in order to receive a grant provided that the person completes the highest level of education  
3 as described in subparagraph (A)(ii) of this paragraph while in a treatment program and the person  
4 first enrolls in courses described in subsection (3)(a) of this section within 12 months after the date  
5 on which the person is released from the treatment program.

6 “(B) Upon request from the commission, the Department of Human Services shall provide doc-  
7 umentation of the placement status of a person described in paragraph (c)(A) of this subsection.

8 “(C) As used in this paragraph:

9 “(i) ‘Foster care’ means substitute care for children placed by the Department of Human Ser-  
10 vices or a tribal child welfare agency away from the child’s parents and for whom the department  
11 or agency has placement and care responsibility, including placements in foster family homes, foster  
12 homes of relatives, group homes, emergency shelters, residential facilities, child care institutions and  
13 preadoptive homes.

14 “(ii) ‘Foster child’ means a child over whom the Department of Human Services retained juris-  
15 diction under ORS 417.200 for the duration of the child’s placement in foster care outside the State  
16 of Oregon.

17 “(6)(a) A person continues to remain eligible to receive a grant under this section if the person,  
18 in addition to satisfying the criteria specified in subsection (3) of this section, meets the following  
19 criteria:

20 “(A) Maintains at least the minimum cumulative grade point average prescribed by the com-  
21 mission based on federal aid grant requirements;

22 “(B) Makes satisfactory academic progress toward a curriculum, degree or program, as de-  
23 scribed in subsection (3)(a)(B) of this section, as prescribed by the commission based on federal aid  
24 grant requirements; **and**

25 “(C) Enrolls in courses described in subsection (3)(a) of this section for a sufficient number of  
26 credit hours to be considered at least a half-time student each term for at least three terms in each  
27 consecutive academic year.]; *and*]

28 “[*D*] *Completes a first-year experience, as identified by the community college and reported by the*  
29 *community college to the commission.*]

30 “(b) A person who fails to meet an eligibility requirement described in paragraph (a) of this  
31 subsection becomes ineligible to receive a grant under this section for the term after which the  
32 person fails to meet the eligibility requirement, unless the eligibility requirement is waived by the  
33 office according to rules adopted by the commission.

34 “(7)(a) The total amount of a grant awarded under this section shall be based on each term that  
35 a person is enrolled in courses described in subsection (3)(a) of this section. Except as provided in  
36 subsections (9) and (10) of this section, after the amount of tuition for the person for the term is  
37 reduced by any amounts received by the person in state and federal aid grants, the person shall be  
38 eligible for a grant under this section in an amount that equals:

39 “(A) Except as provided by [*paragraphs*] **paragraph** (b) [*and (c)*] of this subsection, not less than  
40 the greater of:

41 “(i) [*\$1,000*] **\$2,000, adjusted for inflation based on the increase of the average cost of tui-**  
42 **tion at a community college operated under ORS chapter 341 in a manner determined by the**  
43 **commission by rule;** and

44 “(ii) The person’s actual cost for tuition.

45 “(B) Not more than the lesser of:



1 “(i) The average cost of tuition at a community college in this state, as determined by the office;  
2 and  
3 “(ii) The person’s actual cost for tuition.  
4 “[*(b)* *The amount of a grant, as calculated under paragraph (a) of this subsection, shall be reduced*  
5 *by \$50 for each term that the person receives a grant under this section.*]  
6 “[*(c)(A)*] **(b)(A)** If the office determines both that the person’s actual cost for tuition exceeds the  
7 amount set forth in paragraph (a)(A)(i) of this subsection and that the person’s actual cost for tuition  
8 exceeds the average cost of tuition at a community college in this state, the person shall be eligible  
9 for a grant in an amount that equals the average cost of tuition at a community college in this state.  
10 “(B) If the office determines that the person’s actual cost for tuition is less than the amount set  
11 forth in paragraph (a)(A)(i) of this subsection, the person shall be eligible for a grant in an amount  
12 that equals the amount set forth in paragraph (a)(A)(i) of this subsection.  
13 “[*(d)*] **(c)** The minimum amount of a grant, as calculated under paragraphs (a) [*to (c)*] **and (b)**  
14 of this subsection, may be prorated for a person who is enrolled in courses described in subsection  
15 (3)(a) of this section for a sufficient number of credit hours to be considered at least a half-time  
16 student but not a full-time student.  
17 “[*(e)*] **(d)** The commission may prescribe by rule whether to include fees, and any limitations  
18 related to the inclusion of fees, when determining the actual cost of tuition or the average cost of  
19 tuition under this subsection.  
20 “(8) The commission may adopt by rule the priority by which grants are awarded, which may  
21 allow for preference to be given to persons enrolled in school districts or high schools that meet  
22 specified criteria.  
23 “(9) Prior to the start of the fall term of each academic year, the commission shall determine  
24 whether there are sufficient moneys to award a grant under this section to each person who meets  
25 the criteria described in subsections (3) to (6) of this section. **When making a determination un-**  
26 **der this subsection, the commission may consider both projected resources and statutory**  
27 **modifications that will take effect during the current biennium.** On the basis of this determi-

36 a grant to each person who has been awarded a grant under this section, the commission may[:]  
37 “[*(A)*] decrease the total amount of the grant awarded.[: *or*]  
38 “[*(B)*] *Increase the amount that a person must pay under subsection (7)(b) of this section for each*  
39 *term that the person receives a grant under this section.*]  
40 “(b) If at any time the commission determines that the amount of moneys available to operate  
41 the Oregon Promise program exceeds the amount determined under subsection (9) of this section, the  
42 commission may reduce or eliminate any limitation on eligibility to receive a grant under this sec-  
43 tion that was previously imposed by the commission under subsection (9)(a) of this section.  
44 “(c) The commission shall promptly notify the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly  
45 responsible for higher education each time the commission takes any action under paragraph (a) or

1 (b) of this subsection.

2 “(11) The commission shall adopt any rules necessary for the administration of this section, in-  
3 cluding any requirements related to:

4 “(a) Specifying the form and timelines for submitting an application for a grant under this sec-  
5 tion;

6 “(b) Determining whether a person is eligible for a grant under this section, including whether  
7 the person shall be given priority as allowed under subsection (8) of this section;

8 “(c) Implementing programs or policies that improve the academic success or completion rates  
9 for persons who receive a grant under this section;

10 “(d) Prescribing eligibility requirements and grant calculations for persons dually enrolled in a  
11 community college and a public university; and

12 “(e) Evaluating the impact of the program established under this section, including any re-  
13 quirements for reporting data needed for evaluations.

14 “(12) No later than December 31 of each even-numbered year, the commission shall submit to  
15 an interim legislative committee related to education a report that summarizes the commission’s  
16 findings on the impact of the program established under this section. The report shall include:

17 “(a) Student completion rates of curricula, degrees and programs described in subsection

29 **“PHYSICAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS**

30  
31 **“SECTION 20.** ORS 329.496 is amended to read:

32 **“329.496. (1)** Every public school student in kindergarten through grade eight shall participate  
33 in physical education for the entire school year.

34 **“(2)(a)** Students in kindergarten through grade five, and students in grade six at a school that  
35 teaches kindergarten through grade six, shall participate in physical education for at least 150  
36 minutes during each school week.

37 **“(b)** Except as provided by paragraph (a) of this subsection, students in grades six through eight  
38 shall participate in physical education for at least 225 minutes during each school week.

39 **“(c)** Notwithstanding the time requirements established by paragraphs (a) and (b) of this sub-  
40 section, the State Board of Education shall adopt rules that prorate the time requirements for:

41 **“(A)** School weeks with scheduled school closures, including closures for holidays, inservice days  
42 and days scheduled for parent-teacher conferences;

43 **“(B)** School weeks with unscheduled school closures, including closures for inclement weather  
44 and emergencies;

45 **“(C)** School weeks with out-of-school activities that occur during usual school hours, including

1 field trips and outdoor school programs;

2 “(D) Part-time school programs, including half-day kindergarten; and

3 “(E) Irregular class schedules, including class schedules based on a four-day week.

4 “(d) School districts and public charter schools are not required to comply with the time re-  
5 quirements established by paragraphs (a) and (b) of this subsection for school years during the  
6 biennium in which the total amounts appropriated or allocated to the State School Fund and avail-  
7 able for distribution to school districts are less than the amounts determined to be needed for school  
8 districts through the State School Fund under the tentative budget prepared as provided by ORS  
9 291.210. After the beginning of a biennium, a school district or a public charter school may cease  
10 to comply with the time requirements established by paragraphs (a) and (b) of this subsection if the  
11 amounts appropriated or allocated to the State School Fund and available for distribution to school  
12 districts are less than the amounts determined to be needed for distribution through the State  
13 School Fund, as calculated under ORS 291.210.

14 “(3) School districts and public charter schools shall offer instruction in physical education that  
15 meets the academic content standards for physical education adopted by the State Board of Educa-  
16 tion under ORS 329.045. The instruction shall be a sequential, developmentally appropriate curric-  
17 ulum that is designed, implemented and evaluated to help students develop the knowledge, motor  
18 skills, self-management skills, attitudes and confidence needed to adopt and maintain physical ac-  
19 tivity throughout their lives.

20 “(4)(a) School districts and public charter schools shall devote at least 50 percent of physical  
21 education class time to actual physical activity in each school week, with as much class time as  
22 possible spent in moderate physical activity.

23 “(b)(A) For the purpose of satisfying the time requirements established by subsection (2) of this  
24 section, school districts and public charter schools may provide up to 45 minutes of activities during  
25 each school week that:

26 “(i) Meet the academic content standards for physical education adopted by the State Board of  
27 Education under ORS 329.045;

28 “(ii) Are provided for students by a teacher whose license allows the teacher to provide in-  
29 struction in physical education to those students, even if the teacher does not have a physical edu-  
30 cation endorsement; and

31 “(iii) Have been reviewed by a licensed teacher with a physical education endorsement.

32 “(B) The Department of Education shall:

33 “(i) Review and, as appropriate, approve activities that are developed by nonprofit professional  
34 organizations representing health and physical education educators if the activities meet the re-  
35 quirements of subparagraph (A) of this paragraph; and

36 “(ii) Make available to school districts and public charter schools a list of activities approved  
37 as provided by this subparagraph.

38 “(C) School districts and public charter schools may provide activities that meet the require-  
39 ments of subparagraph (A) of this paragraph even if the activities are not approved as provided by  
40 subparagraph (B) of this paragraph.

41 “(5)(a) Notwithstanding subsections (1), (2) and (4) of this section, a student with disabilities  
42 shall have suitably adapted physical education incorporated as part of the individualized education  
43 program developed for the student under ORS 343.151.

44 “(b) Notwithstanding subsections (1), (2) and (4) of this section, a student who does not have an  
45 individualized education program but has chronic health problems, other disabling conditions or

1 other special needs that preclude the student from participating in regular physical education in-  
2 struction shall have suitably adapted physical education incorporated as part of an individualized  
3 health plan developed for the student by the school district or public charter school.

4 “(6) School districts and public charter schools shall assess school curricula at regular intervals  
5 to measure the attainment of the minimum number of minutes that students are required to partic-  
6 ipate in physical education under this section.

7 “(7)(a) All teachers of physical education for public school students in kindergarten through  
8 grade eight shall be adequately prepared and shall regularly participate in professional development  
9 activities to effectively deliver the physical education program.

10 “(b)(A) Notwithstanding any licensing or endorsement requirements established by the Teacher  
11 Standards and Practices Commission, a teacher with an elementary multiple subject endorsement  
12 may instruct students in activities described in subsection (4)(b) of this section if the activities are  
13 reviewed by a licensed teacher with a physical education endorsement.

14 “(B) A teacher described in this paragraph may provide instruction in activities described in  
15 subsection (4)(b) of this section to students who are not regularly taught by the teacher as long as  
16 the instruction in the activities to students who are not regularly taught by the teacher does not  
17 exceed 45 minutes during each school week. Nothing in this subparagraph allows a school district  
18 to employ a teacher for the sole purpose of providing instruction in activities described in sub-  
19 section (4)(b) of this section.

20 “(8) A school district that does not comply with the requirements of this section is considered  
21 to be nonstandard under ORS 327.103.

22 “(9)(a) **Notwithstanding subsection (8) of this section and pursuant to rules adopted by**  
23 **the State Board of Education, the Superintendent of Public Instruction may grant a waiver**  
24 **of the requirements of this section to a school district or a public charter school if the su-**  
25 **perintendent finds that the school district or public charter school is unable to meet the**  
26 **requirements because of a human-created disaster or a natural disaster.**

27 “(b) A waiver granted under this subsection may be:

28 “(A) In whole or in part of the requirements prescribed by this section; and

29 “(B) Granted for only one school year, but may be renewed for subsequent school years  
30 based on rules adopted by the board if the school district or public charter school continues  
31 to be impacted by the disaster.

32 “**SECTION 21.** (1) The amendments to ORS 329.496 by section 20 of this 2022 Act first  
33 apply to the 2020-2021 school year.

34 “(2) **Notwithstanding ORS 329.496 or section 2, chapter 301, Oregon Laws 2017, a school**

45 at which marijuana items are sold. To hold a retail license under this section, a marijuana retailer:

1 “(a) Must apply for a license in the manner described in ORS 475C.033;  
2 “(b) Must provide proof that the applicant is 21 years of age or older;  
3 “(c) May not be located in an area that is zoned exclusively for residential use;  
4 “(d) Except as provided in ORS 475C.101, may not be located within 1,000 feet of:  
5 “**(A) A building where a public prekindergarten or kindergarten program is provided by**  
6 **a school district or an education service district;**  
7 “[*(A)*] **(B)** A public elementary or secondary school for which attendance is compulsory under  
8 ORS 339.020; or  
9 “[*(B)*] **(C)** A private or parochial elementary or secondary school, teaching children as described  
10 in ORS 339.030 (1)(a); and  
11 “(e) Must meet the requirements of any rule adopted by the commission under subsection (3) of  
12 this section.  
13 “(3) The commission shall adopt rules that:  
14 “(a) Require a marijuana retailer to annually renew a license issued under this section;  
15 “(b) Establish application, licensure and renewal of licensure fees for marijuana retailers;  
16 “(c) Require marijuana items sold by a marijuana retailer to be tested in accordance with ORS  
17 475C.544;  
18 “(d) Notwithstanding ORS 475C.205, allow a marijuana retailer to deliver marijuana items to  
19 another marijuana retailer that has on the marijuana retailer’s license application a person that has  
20 an interest in or authority over the management of the other marijuana retailer;  
21 “(e) Subject to the limitations and privileges described in ORS 475C.149 (3), allow a marijuana  
22 retailer registered under ORS 475C.149 to sell medical grade cannabinoid products, cannabinoid  
23 concentrates and cannabinoid extracts at retail in the same manner that rules adopted under ORS  
24 475C.005 to 475C.525 allow a marijuana retailer to sell general use cannabinoid products,  
25 cannabinoid concentrates and cannabinoid extracts at retail, excepting those circumstances where  
26 differentiating between the sale of medical grade cannabinoid products, cannabinoid concentrates  
27 and cannabinoid extracts and the sale of general use cannabinoid products, cannabinoid concen-  
28 trates and cannabinoid extracts is necessary to protect the public health and safety; and  
29 “(f) Require a marijuana retailer to meet any public health and safety standards and industry  
30 best practices established by the commission by rule.  
31 “(4) Fees adopted under subsection (3)(b) of this section:  
32 “(a) May not exceed, together with other fees collected under ORS 475C.005 to 475C.525, the  
33 cost of administering ORS 475C.005 to 475C.525; and  
34 “(b) Shall be deposited in the Marijuana Control and Regulation Fund established under ORS  
35 475C.297.  
36 “**SECTION 23.** ORS 475C.101 is amended to read:  
37 “475C.101. Notwithstanding ORS 475C.097 (2)(d), a marijuana retailer may be located within  
38 1,000 feet of a [*school*] **building described in ORS 475C.097 (2)(d)** if:  
39 “(1)(a) The marijuana retailer is not located within 500 feet of:  
40 “**(A) A building where a public prekindergarten or kindergarten program is provided by**  
41 **a school district or an education service district;**  
42 “[*(A)*] **(B)** A public elementary or secondary school for which attendance is compulsory under  
43 ORS 339.020; or  
44 “[*(B)*] **(C)** A private or parochial elementary or secondary school, teaching children as described  
45 in ORS 339.030 (1)(a); and

1 “(b) The Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission determines that there is a physical or ge-  
2 ographic barrier capable of preventing children from traversing to the premises of the marijuana  
3 retailer; or

4 “(2) The marijuana retailer was established before August 1, 2017, in accordance with a city or  
5 county ordinance adopted under section 29b, chapter 83, Oregon Laws 2016.

6 “**SECTION 24.** ORS 475C.105 is amended to read:

7 “475C.105. If a [*school*] **building** described in ORS 475C.097 (2)(d) that has not previously been  
8 attended by children is established within 1,000 feet of a premises for which a license has been is-  
9 sued under ORS 475C.097, the marijuana retailer located at that premises may remain at that lo-  
10 cation unless the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission revokes the license of the marijuana  
11 retailer under ORS 475C.265.

12 “**SECTION 25.** ORS 475C.833 is amended to read:

13 “475C.833. (1)(a) The Oregon Health Authority shall establish by rule a medical marijuana  
14 dispensary registration system for the purpose of tracking and regulating the transfer of:

15 “(A) Usable marijuana, immature marijuana plants and seeds from registry identification  
16 cardholders, designated primary caregivers and persons responsible for marijuana grow sites to  
17 medical marijuana dispensaries;

18 “(B) Medical cannabinoid products, cannabinoid concentrates and cannabinoid extracts from  
19 persons responsible for marijuana processing sites to medical marijuana dispensaries; and

20 “(C) Usable marijuana, immature marijuana plants, seeds, medical cannabinoid products,

29 terest in the medical marijuana dispensary;

30 “(b) The name of the individual or individuals responsible for the medical marijuana dispensary,  
31 if different from the name of the individual who owns the medical marijuana dispensary;

32 “(c) The address of the medical marijuana dispensary;

33 “(d) Proof that each individual responsible for the medical marijuana dispensary is 21 years of  
34 age or older;

35 “(e) Documentation, as required by the authority by rule, that demonstrates the medical  
36 marijuana dispensary meets the requirements of subsection (3) of this section; and

37 “(f) Any other information that the authority considers necessary.

38 “(3) To qualify for registration under this section, a medical marijuana dispensary:

39 “(a) May not be located in an area that is zoned for residential use;

40 “(b) May not be located at the same address as a marijuana grow site;

41 “(c) Must be registered as a business, or have filed an application to register as a business, with  
42 the office of the Secretary of State;

43 “(d) Except as provided under ORS 475C.840, may not be located within 1,000 feet of:

44 “(A) **A building where a public prekindergarten or kindergarten program is provided by**  
45 **a school district or an education service district;**

1        “[A)] (B) A public elementary or secondary school for which attendance is compulsory under  
2        ORS 339.020; or

3        “[B)] (C) A private or parochial elementary or secondary school, teaching children as described  
4        in ORS 339.030 (1)(a);

5        “(e) Must not be located within 1,000 feet of another medical marijuana dispensary; and

6        “(f) Must meet the requirements of any rule adopted by the authority under subsection (10) of  
7        this section.

8        “(4)(a) The authority shall conduct a criminal records check under ORS 181A.195 for each indi-  
9        vidual named in an application submitted under subsection (2) of this section.

10       “(b) An individual convicted for the manufacture or delivery of a controlled substance in  
11       Schedule I or Schedule II may not own or be responsible for a medical marijuana dispensary for two  
12       years from the date the individual is convicted.

13       “(c) An individual convicted more than once for the manufacture or delivery of a controlled  
14       substance in Schedule I or Schedule II may not own or be responsible for a medical marijuana  
15       dispensary.

16       “(5) If a person submits the application required under subsection (2) of this section, if the  
17       medical marijuana dispensary identified in the application meets the requirements of this section and  
18       any rules adopted under this section and if each individual named in the application passes the  
19       criminal records check required under subsection (4) of this section, the authority shall register the  
20       medical marijuana dispensary and issue proof of registration. Proof of registration must be displayed  
21       on the premises of the medical marijuana dispensary at all times.

22       “(6) A medical marijuana dispensary that is registered under this section is not required to  
23       register with the State Board of Pharmacy under ORS 475.125.

24       “(7) The individual or individuals responsible for a medical marijuana dispensary shall maintain  
25       documentation of each transfer of usable marijuana, medical cannabinoid products, cannabinoid  
26       concentrates, cannabinoid extracts, immature marijuana plants and seeds.

27       “(8) The authority may inspect:

28       “(a) The premises of a proposed medical marijuana dispensary or a registered medical marijuana  
29       dispensary to ensure compliance with this section and ORS 475C.843 and any rules adopted under  
30       this section or ORS 475C.843; and

31       “(b) The records of a registered medical marijuana dispensary to ensure compliance with sub-  
32       section (7) of this section.

33       “(9) Subject to the provisions of ORS chapter 183, the authority may refuse to register an ap-  
34       plicant under this section or may suspend or revoke the registration of a medical marijuana  
35       dispensary if the authority determines that the applicant, the owner of the medical marijuana  
36       dispensary, a person responsible for the medical marijuana dispensary, or an employee of the med-  
37       ical marijuana dispensary, violated a provision of ORS 475C.770 to 475C.919, a rule adopted under  
38       ORS 475C.770 to 475C.919 or an ordinance adopted pursuant to ORS 475C.897.

39       “(10) The authority shall adopt rules to implement this section, including rules that:

40       “(a) Require a registered medical marijuana dispensary to annually renew the registration for  
41       that dispensary;

42       “(b) Establish fees for registering, and renewing the registration of, a medical marijuana  
43       dispensary;

44       “(c) Require that each medical marijuana dispensary install and maintain a minimum security  
45       system that includes video surveillance, an alarm system and a safe;

1 “(d) Require that usable marijuana, medical cannabinoid products, cannabinoid concentrates,  
2 cannabinoid extracts and immature marijuana plants transferred by a medical marijuana dispensary  
3 be tested to ensure the public health and safety; and

4 “(e) Impose any other standard on the operation of a medical marijuana dispensary to ensure  
5 the public health and safety.

6 “**SECTION 26.** ORS 475C.840 is amended to read:

7 “475C.840. Notwithstanding ORS 475C.833 (3)(d), a medical marijuana dispensary may be located  
8 within 1,000 feet of a [*school*] **building described in ORS 475C.833 (3)(d)** if:

9 “(1)(a) The medical marijuana dispensary is not located within 500 feet of:

10 “**(A) A building where a public prekindergarten or kindergarten program is provided by**  
11 **a school district or an education service district;**

12 “[*(A)*] **(B)** A public elementary or secondary school for which attendance is compulsory under  
13 ORS 339.020; or

14 “[*(B)*] **(C)** A private or parochial elementary or secondary school, teaching children as described  
15 in ORS 339.030 (1)(a); and

16 “(b) The Oregon Health Authority determines that there is a physical or geographic barrier  
17 capable of preventing children from traversing to the premises of the medical marijuana dispensary;  
18 or

19 “(2) The medical marijuana dispensary was established before August 1, 2017, in accordance  
20 with a city or county ordinance adopted under section 29, chapter 83, Oregon Laws 2016.

21 “**SECTION 27.** ORS 475C.847 is amended to read:

22 “475C.847. If a [*school*] **building** described in ORS 475C.833 (3)(d) that has not previously been  
23 attended by children is established within 1,000 feet of a medical marijuana dispensary, the medical  
24 marijuana dispensary may remain at its current location unless the Oregon Health Authority re-  
25 vokes the registration of the medical marijuana dispensary.

26 “**SECTION 28. The amendments to ORS 475C.097, 475C.101, 475C.105, 475C.833, 475C.840**  
27 **and 475C.847 by sections 22 to 27 of this 2022 Act become operative on January 1, 2023.**

29 **“PERS FOR PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOL MEMBERS**

30  
31 “**SECTION 29.** ORS 338.135 is amended to read:

32 “338.135. (1) Employee assignment to a public charter school shall be voluntary.

33 “(2)(a) A public charter school or the sponsor of the public charter school is considered the  
34 employer of any employees of the public charter school. If a school district board is not the sponsor  
35 of the public charter school, the school district board may not be the employer of the employees of  
36 the public charter school and the school district board may not collectively bargain with the em-  
37 ployees of the public charter school. The public charter school governing body shall control the  
38 selection of employees at the public charter school.

39 “(b) If a virtual public charter school or the sponsor of a virtual public charter school contracts  
40 with a for-profit entity to provide educational services through the virtual public charter school, the  
41 for-profit entity may not be the employer of any employees of the virtual public charter school un-  
42 less:

43 “(A) The employee is an administrator who does not have any teaching responsibilities; and

44 “(B) Both the executive officer of the sponsor and the public charter school governing body  
45 approve employment by the for-profit entity. The executive officer or governing body may choose to



1 grant approval under this subparagraph:

2 “(i) For all employees of the for-profit entity who meet the description in subparagraph (A) of  
3 this paragraph;

4 “(ii) Based on the job categories of the employees who meet the description in subparagraph (A)  
5 of this paragraph; or

6 “(iii) On a case-by-case basis for each employee who meets the description in subparagraph (A)  
7 of this paragraph.

8 “(3) The school district board of the school district within which the public charter school is  
9 located shall grant a leave of absence to any employee who chooses to work in the public charter  
10 school. The length and terms of the leave of absence shall be set by negotiated agreement or by  
11 board policy. However, the length of the leave of absence may not be less than two years unless:

12 “(a) The charter of the public charter school is terminated or the public charter school is dis-  
13 solved or closed during the leave of absence; or

14 “(b) The employee and the school district board have mutually agreed to a different length of  
15 time.

16 “(4) An employee of a public charter school operating within a school district who is granted  
17 a leave of absence from the school district and returns to employment with the school district shall  
18 retain seniority and benefits as an employee pursuant to the terms of the leave of absence.  
19 Notwithstanding ORS 243.650 to 243.809, a school district that was the employer of an employee of  
20 a public charter school not operating within the school district may make provisions for the return  
21 of the employee to employment with the school district.

22 “(5)(a) For purposes of ORS chapters 238 and 238A, a public charter school shall be considered  
23 a public employer and as such shall participate in the Public Employees Retirement System.

24 “(b) For purposes of determining the salary paid [*between August 29, 2003, and January 1, 2020,*  
25 *to a*] **to an active** member of the Public Employees Retirement System under ORS 238A.005 (17)  
26 **during the period between August 29, 2003, and January 1, 2020**, remuneration paid to a member  
27 in return for services to a public charter school is deemed includable in the member’s taxable in-  
28 come under Oregon law during a period of continuous employment with any public charter school  
29 if:

30 “(A) The member was hired in a qualifying position by any public charter school on or after  
31 August 29, 2003;

32 “**(B) The member was informed in writing by the public charter school during the period**  
33 **of continuous employment that the member was eligible to participate in the Public Em-**  
34 **ployees Retirement System and the public charter school made contributions to the system**  
35 **on the member’s behalf;**

36 “[*B*] (C) The remuneration was, or would have been if the member were an Oregon resident,  
37 includable in the member’s taxable income under Oregon law during the period of continuous em-  
38 ployment; and

39 “[*C*] (D) The member resided and performed services in the United States during the period  
40 of continuous employment.

41 “(c) As used in this subsection, ‘continuous employment’ means employment with a public char-  
42 ter school that is not interrupted by a period of more than 30 consecutive calendar days.

43 “(6) For teacher licensing, employment experience in public charter schools shall be considered  
44 equivalent to experience in public schools.

45 “(7)(a) Any person employed as an administrator in a public charter school shall be licensed or

1 registered to administer by the Teacher Standards and Practices Commission.

2 “(b) Any person employed as a teacher in a public charter school shall be licensed or registered  
3 to teach by the commission.

4 “(c) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) or (b) of this subsection, at least one-half of the total full-  
5 time equivalent (FTE) teaching and administrative staff at the public charter school shall be licensed  
6 by the commission pursuant to ORS 342.125.

7 “(8) Notwithstanding ORS 243.650, a public charter school shall be considered a school district  
8 for purposes of ORS 243.650 to 243.809. An employee of a public charter school may be a member  
9 of a labor organization or organize with other employees to bargain collectively. Bargaining units  
10 at the public charter school may be separate from other bargaining units of the sponsor or of the  
11 school district in which the public charter school is located. Employees of a public charter school  
12 may be part of the bargaining units of the sponsor or of the school district in which the public  
13 charter school is located.

14 “(9) An entity described in ORS 338.005 (4) may not waive the right to sponsor a public charter  
15 school in a collective bargaining agreement.

16  
17 **“HEALTH CARE BENEFITS FOR PART-TIME FACULTY**

18  
19 **“SECTION 30.** ORS 350.355 is amended to read:

20 “350.355. (1)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, a part-time faculty mem-  
21 ber at a public institution of higher education is eligible for the same employee-only health care  
22 benefits as full-time faculty members if the part-time faculty member is working at a level equal to  
23 at least half of a full-time equivalent employee **determined as an average** either at a single public  
24 institution of higher education or in aggregate at multiple public institutions of higher education  
25 during at least three of the four previous academic terms.

26 “(b) The total cost of providing any health benefit plan offered by a public institution of higher  
27 education to a part-time faculty member under this section may not increase annually by more than  
28 the annual increase in premium amounts paid for contracted health benefit plans that is permitted  
29 under ORS 243.135 (8)(b) or 243.866 (9)(b).

30 “(2)(a) In order to receive employee-only health care benefits under this section, a part-time  
31 faculty member must select a home public institution of higher education for the duration of the  
32 benefit year under a process established by each institution. A home public institution of higher  
33 education selected under this subsection:

34 “(A) Must be one at which the part-time faculty member is working during the academic term  
35 at the time of the application; and

36 “(B) Is responsible for:

37 “(i) Determining whether the part-time faculty member is eligible to receive health care benefits  
38 under this section;

39 “(ii) Determining, on [*a semiannual*] **an annual** basis, whether a part-time faculty member who  
40 was found to be eligible to receive health care benefits under sub-subparagraph (i) of this subpara-  
41 graph continues to be eligible to receive health care benefits under this section;

42 “(iii) Collecting the premiums for health benefit plans that must be paid by the part-time faculty  
43 member under subsection (3) of this section;

44 “(iv) Paying the full cost of the insurance premiums for providing health benefit plans to the  
45 part-time faculty member, subject to reimbursement as described in subsection (4) of this section;

1 and

2 “(v) Administering and providing health benefit plans to the part-time faculty member in the  
3 manner described in this section.

4 “(b) In order to receive health care benefits under this section, a part-time faculty member must  
5 provide the home public institution of higher education with all information necessary for the in-  
6 stitution to determine the eligibility of the part-time faculty member to receive health care benefits  
7 under this section.

8 “(3)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, a part-time faculty member at a  
9 public institution of higher education shall pay 10 percent of all insurance premiums for health  
10 benefit plans.

11 “(b) A public institution of higher education may provide by collective bargaining at the insti-  
12 tution to pay for some or all of the insurance premiums that must otherwise be paid by a part-time  
13 faculty member under paragraph (a) of this subsection. The public institution of higher education  
14 may not be reimbursed under subsection (4) of this section for the costs the institution incurs to  
15 provide health benefit plans under this paragraph.

16 “(4)(a) Every three months a public institution of higher education may request reimbursement  
17 from the Higher Education Coordinating Commission for the cost of paying insurance premiums for  
18 providing health benefit plans to each part-time faculty member who has selected the institution as  
19 the faculty member’s home public institution of higher education under subsection (2) of this section.

20 “(b) The commission shall use moneys from the Part-Time Faculty Insurance Fund established  
21 under ORS 350.357 to fully reimburse each public institution of higher education for all documented  
22 costs requested by the institution under this subsection, except for any costs described in subsection  
23 (3) of this section.

24 “(5) Unless otherwise provided for by collective bargaining, a part-time faculty member at a  
25 public institution of higher education who is eligible for health care benefits under subsection (1)  
26 of this section may receive health care benefits only in the manner provided by this section.

27 “(6) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission may adopt rules necessary to implement  
28 subsection (4) of this section.

29 “**SECTION 31. The amendments to ORS 350.355 by section 30 of this 2022 Act apply to**  
30 **determinations of eligibility for health benefits that are made for an open enrollment period**  
31 **that occurs on or after the effective date of this 2022 Act.**

41 “**SECTION 33. This 2022 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**  
42 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2022 Act takes effect**  
43 **on its passage.”.**
