

# Senate Bill 1555

Sponsored by Senator STEINER HAYWARD, Representative STARK (Presession filed.)

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Specifies reimbursement that must be paid by insurers covering universal newborn nurse home visiting services.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

1  
2 Relating to reimbursement of newborn nurse home visiting services; amending ORS 433.301 and  
3 743A.078.

4 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

5 **SECTION 1.** ORS 743A.078 is amended to read:

6 743A.078. (1) As used in this section, "carrier," "enrollee" and "health benefit plan" have the  
7 meanings given those terms in ORS 743B.005.

8 (2) A health benefit plan offered in this state must reimburse **in full** the cost [of] **to a provider**  
9 **of delivering** universal newborn nurse home visiting services, as prescribed by the Oregon Health  
10 Authority by rule under ORS 433.301 (7) **and (8)**.

11 (3) The coverage must be provided without any cost-sharing, coinsurance or deductible applica-  
12 ble to the services.

13 (4) Carriers must offer the services in their health benefit plans but enrollees are not required  
14 to receive the services as a condition of coverage and may not be penalized or in any way discour-  
15 aged from declining the services.

16 (5) A carrier must notify an enrollee about the services whenever an enrollee adds a newborn  
17 to coverage.

18 (6) A carrier may use in-network providers or may contract with local public health authorities  
19 to provide the services.

20 [(7) *This section does not require a carrier to reimburse the cost of the services in any specific*  
21 *manner. The services may be reimbursed using:]*

22 [(a) *A value-based payment methodology;*]

23 [(b) *A claim invoicing process;*]

24 [(c) *Capitated payments;*]

25 [(d) *A payment methodology that takes into account the need for a community-based entity provid-*  
26 *ing the services to expand its capacity to provide the services and address health disparities; or]*

27 [(e) *Any other methodology agreed to by the carrier and the provider of the services.*]

28 [(8)] (7) Carriers shall report to the authority, in the form and manner prescribed by the au-  
29 thority, data regarding claims submitted for services covered under this section to monitor the  
30 provision of the services.

31 **(8) This section is exempt from ORS 743A.001.**

1       **SECTION 2.** ORS 433.301, as amended by section 59, chapter 631, Oregon Laws 2021, is  
2 amended to read:

3       433.301. (1) As used in this section, “community” means a geographic region, county, tribe or  
4 other group of individuals living in proximity as defined by the Oregon Health Authority by rule.

5       (2) The authority shall design, implement and maintain a voluntary statewide program to provide  
6 universal newborn nurse home visiting services to all families with newborns residing in this state  
7 to support healthy child development and strengthen families. The authority shall design the uni-  
8 versal newborn nurse home visiting program to be flexible so as to meet the needs of the commu-  
9 nities where the program operates.

10       (3) In designing the program described in subsection (2) of this section, the authority shall con-  
11 sult, coordinate and collaborate, as necessary, with insurers that offer health benefit plans in this  
12 state, hospitals, local public health authorities, the Department of Early Learning and Care, existing  
13 early childhood home visiting programs, community-based organizations and social service providers.

14       (4) The program must provide nurse home visiting services that are:

15       (a) Based on criteria established by the United States Department of Health and Human Ser-  
16 vices for an evidence-based early childhood home visiting service delivery model;

17       (b) Provided by registered nurses licensed in this state to families caring for newborns up to the  
18 age of six months, including foster and adoptive newborns;

19       (c) Provided in the family’s home; and

20       (d) Aimed at improving outcomes in one or more of the following domains:

21       (A) Child health;

22       (B) Child development and school readiness;

23       (C) Family economic self-sufficiency;

24       (D) Maternal health;

25       (E) Positive parenting;

26       (F) Reducing child mistreatment;

27       (G) Reducing juvenile delinquency;

28       (H) Reducing family violence; or

29       (I) Reducing crime.

30       (5) The services provided in the program must:

31       (a) Be voluntary and carry no negative consequences for a family that declines to participate;

32       (b) Be offered in every community in this state;

33       (c) Include an evidence-based assessment of the physical, social and emotional factors affecting  
34 the family;

35       (d) Be offered to all families with newborns residing in the community where the program op-  
36 erates;

37       (e) Include at least one visit during a newborn’s first three months of life with the opportunity  
38 for the family to choose up to three additional visits;

39       (f) Include a follow-up visit no later than three months after the last visit; and

40       (g) Provide information and referrals to address each family’s identified needs.

41       (6) The authority shall collect and analyze data generated by the program to assess the effec-  
42 tiveness of the program in meeting the aims described in subsection (4)(d) of this section and shall  
43 work with other state agencies to develop protocols for sharing data, including the timely sharing  
44 of data with primary care providers of care to the families with newborns receiving the services.

45       (7) In collaboration with the Department of Consumer and Business Services, the authority shall

1 adopt by rule, consistent with the provisions of this section[,]:

2 (a) Criteria for universal newborn nurse home visiting services that must be covered by health  
3 benefit plans in accordance with ORS 743A.078; **and**

4 (b) **The amount of reimbursement to be paid to a provider of universal newborn nurse**  
5 **home visiting services or a methodology to reimburse the cost of providing universal new-**  
6 **born nurse home visiting services, in accordance with ORS 743A.078.**

7 (8) **The authority may prescribe by rule any reasonable reimbursement methodology in-**  
8 **cluding, but not limited to, any of the following:**

9 (a) **Value-based payments;**

10 (b) **A claim invoicing process;**

11 (c) **Capitated payments;**

12 (d) **A reimbursement methodology that takes into account the need for a community-**  
13 **based entity providing universal newborn nurse home visiting services to expand the entity's**  
14 **capacity to provide the services and address health disparities; or**

15 (e) **Any other methodology agreed to by a carrier and the provider of the universal**  
16 **newborn nurse home visiting services.**

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
