**SUMMARY**

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

**Modifies projects and amounts authorized for issuance of general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, certificates of participation and other financing agreements for biennium.**

Modifies amounts allocated for private activity bonds.

**Authorizes issuance of various lottery bonds. Modifies authorized purposes for certain lottery bond revenues.**

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

13 **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021**, the Office of Emergency Management may expend a maximum of  
14 [\$2,000,000] **\$1,000,000** for urban search and rescue preparedness equipment.

15 **(2) From the net proceeds of bonds issued under section 1 (6)(o), chapter 658, Oregon**  
16 **Laws 2021, the Oregon Department of Emergency Management may expend a maximum of**  
17 **\$1,000,000 for urban search and rescue preparedness equipment.**

18 **SECTION 6.** Section 10, chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021, is amended to read:

19 **Sec. 10.** (1) A public university that is carrying out a qualified project shall require each con-  
20 tractor in a contract with an estimated cost of \$200,000 or greater to:

21 (a) Employ apprentices to perform 15 percent of the work hours that workers in apprenticeable  
22 occupations perform under the contract, in a manner consistent with the apprentices' respective  
23 apprenticeship training programs;

24 (b) Establish and execute a plan for outreach, recruitment and retention of women, minority  
25 individuals and veterans to perform work under the contract, with the aspirational target of having  
26 at least 15 percent of total work hours performed by individuals in one or more of those groups;

27 (c) Provide health insurance and retirement benefits to workers; and

28 (d) Require any subcontractor engaged by the contractor to abide by the requirements set forth  
29 in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of this subsection, if the work to be performed under the subcontract  
30 has an estimated cost of \$200,000 or greater.

31 (2) On or before February 1 of each year, each public university that is carrying out a qualified  
32 project shall report to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means or Joint Interim Committee on  
33 Ways and Means, as part of the report required under ORS 350.379, on:

34 (a) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by apprentices;

35 (b) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by women, minority individuals and  
36 veterans; and

37 (c) The types and costs of health insurance and retirement benefits provided to workers by  
38 contractors and subcontractors.

39 (3) The requirements of this section are in addition to, and not in lieu of, the requirements im-  
40 posed under ORS 350.379.

41 (4) As used in this section:

42 (a) "Apprentice" has the meaning given that term in ORS 660.010.

43 (b) "Apprenticeable occupation" has the meaning given that term in ORS 660.010.

44 (c) "Apprenticeship training program" means the total system of apprenticeship that a particular  
45 local joint committee, as defined in ORS 660.010, operates, including the local joint committee's

1 registered standards and all other terms and conditions for qualifying, recruiting, selecting, em-  
2 ploying and training apprentices in an apprenticeable occupation.

3 (d) “Minority individual” has the meaning given that term in ORS 200.005.

4 (e) “Qualified project” means the following capital construction projects:

5 (A) The Eastern Oregon University Inlow Hall Renovation, Phase II referenced in section 1  
6 (1)(a) *[of this 2021 Act]*, **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021**;

7 (B) The Oregon State University Cascades Student Success Center referenced in section 1  
8 (1)(b)(A) *[of this 2021 Act]*, **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021**;

9 (C) The Oregon State University Cordley Hall Renovation, Phase II referenced in section 1  
10 (1)(b)(B) *[of this 2021 Act]*, **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021**;

11 (D) The Portland State University Gateway Center Reuse and Extension referenced in section  
12 1 (1)(c) *[of this 2021 Act]*, **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021**;

13 (E) The University of Oregon Heritage *[Building]* **Buildings Renovation (University and**  
14 **Villard Halls)** referenced in section 1 (1)(d) *[of this 2021 Act]*, **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021**; and

19 **SECTION 7.** Section 39, chapter 671, Oregon Laws 2019, as amended by section 18, chapter 682,  
20 Oregon Laws 2021, is amended to read:

21 **Sec. 39.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, at the request of the Oregon Department  
22 of Administrative Services, after the department consults with the Department of Veterans’ Affairs,  
23 the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in  
24 an amount that produces \$6 million in net proceeds for the purposes described in subsection (2) of  
25 this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay  
26 bond-related costs.

27 (2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the Depart-  
28 ment of Veterans’ Affairs for deposit in the Veterans’ Affordable Housing Fund, established in sec-  
29 tion 40, chapter 671, Oregon Laws 2019, for distribution to Salem Y Veterans Housing to construct  
30 veterans’ affordable housing in Salem, **which may include the acquisition of land for veterans’**  
31 **affordable housing.**

32 (3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs, further  
33 economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds  
34 and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the following findings:

35 (a) Having housing for at-risk populations is essential to Oregon’s healthy economic growth.

36 (b) A severe shortage of affordable housing exists in Oregon, and market indicators demonstrate  
37 a growing gap between the supply of and the demand for affordable housing.

38 **SECTION 8.** (1) **For the biennium ending June 30, 2023, at the request of the Oregon**  
39 **Department of Administrative Services, after the department consults with the McKenzie**  
40 **River Discovery Center, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant**  
41 **to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$3 million in net proceeds for the**  
42 **purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by**  
43 **the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.**

44 (2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the  
45 department for deposit in the ODAS Economic Development Distributions Fund established

1 under ORS 461.553 for distribution to the McKenzie River Discovery Center to construct a  
2 central exhibition structure and undertake site improvements at the site of the Historic Old  
3 Leaburg Fish Hatchery.

4 (3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs,  
5 further economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks,  
6 beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that  
7 the central exhibition structure and site improvements will enhance the economic viability  
8 of the region through increased tourism, job creation and improved quality of life for the  
9 community.

10 **SECTION 9.** (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2023, at the request of the Oregon  
11 Department of Administrative Services, after the department consults with the City of  
12 Portland Parks and Recreation, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds  
13 pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$15 million in net proceeds  
14 for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount esti-  
15 mated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

16 (2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the  
17 department for deposit in the ODAS Economic Development Distributions Fund established  
18 under ORS 461.553 for distribution to the City of Portland Parks and Recreation for the  
19 construction of a new aquatic center in North Portland.

20 (3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs,  
21 further economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks,  
22 beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that  
23 improving access to recreation services will enhance the economic viability of the region,  
24 create jobs and improve the quality of life for the community.

25 **SECTION 10.** (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2023, at the request of the Oregon  
26 Department of Administrative Services, after the department consults with the City of  
27 Milton-Freewater, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS  
28 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$3 million in net proceeds for the purposes  
29 described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State  
30 Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

31 (2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the  
32 department for deposit in the ODAS Economic Development Distributions Fund established  
33 under ORS 461.553 for distribution to City of Milton-Freewater for construction of the Police  
34 and Dispatch Station to relocate the current station from the basement of City Hall.

35 (3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs,  
36 further economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks,  
37 beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that  
38 emergency services are necessary components of a climate that facilitates and encourages  
39 economic development.

40 **SECTION 11.** This 2022 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public  
41 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2022 Act takes effect  
42 on its passage.
