9 ceed [\\$442,862,385] **\\$467,077,050** during the 2022 calendar year or
10 [\\$442,862,385] **\\$467,077,050** during the 2023 calendar year, the increase is al-
11 located to the Private Activity Bond Committee.

12 **“SECTION 4.** Section 7, chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021, is amended to
13 read:

14 **“Sec. 7.** (1) Out of the amount specified in section 1 (6)(m)(A) [*of this 2021*
15 *Act*], **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021**, the State Treasurer may issue Article
16 XI-Q bonds in an amount not to exceed \$20,383,129 of net proceeds for the
17 purposes and in the manner specified in section 8, chapter 705, Oregon Laws
18 2013, plus an amount estimated by the State Treasurer to pay estimated
19 bond-related costs.

20 “(2) Out of the amount specified in section 1 (6)(m)(B) [*of this 2021 Act*],
21 **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021**, the State Treasurer may issue Article XI-Q
22 bonds in an amount not to exceed \$94,500,000 of net proceeds for the purposes
23 and in the manner specified in section 8, chapter 705, Oregon Laws 2013, plus
24 an amount estimated by the State Treasurer to pay estimated bond-related
25 costs.

26 “(3) Out of the amount specified in section 1 (6)(m)(C) [*of this 2021 Act*],
27 **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021**, the State Treasurer may issue Article XI-Q
28 bonds in an amount not to exceed [\\$11,700,000] **\\$16,116,705** of net proceeds
29 for the purposes and in the manner specified in section 8, chapter 705,
30 Oregon Laws 2013, plus an amount estimated by the State Treasurer to pay

1 estimated bond-related costs.

2 “(4) Out of the amount specified in section 1 (6)(m)(D) [*of this 2021 Act*],
3 **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021**, the State Treasurer may issue Article XI-Q
4 bonds in an amount not to exceed \$15,900,000 of net proceeds for the purposes
5 and in the manner specified in section 8, chapter 705, Oregon Laws 2013, plus
6 an amount estimated by the State Treasurer to pay estimated bond-related
7 costs.

8 “(5) For purposes of sections 8 and 9, chapter 705, Oregon Laws 2013, and
9 section 64, chapter 723, Oregon Laws 2013, bonds issued pursuant to this
10 section are considered to be bonds issued pursuant to section 8, chapter 705,
11 Oregon Laws 2013.

12 “(6) Bonds may not be issued pursuant to section 1 (6)(m)(A), (B), (C) or
13 (D) [*of this 2021 Act*], **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021**, except as provided
14 in this section.

15 **“SECTION 5.** Section 8, chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021, is amended to
16 read:

17 **“Sec. 8. (1)** From the net proceeds of bonds issued under section 1
18 (6)(b)(C) [*of this 2021 Act*], **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021**, the Office of
19 Emergency Management may expend a maximum of [~~\$2,000,000~~] **\$1,000,000** for
20 urban search and rescue preparedness equipment.

21 **“(2) From the net proceeds of bonds issued under section 1 (6)(o),**
22 **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021, the Oregon Department of Emergency**
23 **Management may expend a maximum of \$1,000,000 for urban search**
24 **and rescue preparedness equipment.**

25 **“SECTION 6.** Section 10, chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021, is amended to
26 read:

27 **“Sec. 10. (1)** A public university that is carrying out a qualified project
28 shall require each contractor in a contract with an estimated cost of \$200,000
29 or greater to:

30 “(a) Employ apprentices to perform 15 percent of the work hours that

1 workers in apprenticeable occupations perform under the contract, in a
2 manner consistent with the apprentices' respective apprenticeship training
3 programs;

4 “(b) Establish and execute a plan for outreach, recruitment and retention
5 of women, minority individuals and veterans to perform work under the
6 contract, with the aspirational target of having at least 15 percent of total
7 work hours performed by individuals in one or more of those groups;

8 “(c) Provide health insurance and retirement benefits to workers; and

9 “(d) Require any subcontractor engaged by the contractor to abide by the
10 requirements set forth in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of this subsection, if the
11 work to be performed under the subcontract has an estimated cost of \$200,000
12 or greater.

13 “(2) On or before February 1 of each year, each public university that is
14 carrying out a qualified project shall report to the Joint Committee on Ways
15 and Means or Joint Interim Committee on Ways and Means, as part of the
16 report required under ORS 350.379, on:

17 “(a) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by apprentices;

18 “(b) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by women, mi-
19 nority individuals and veterans; and

20 “(c) The types and costs of health insurance and retirement benefits pro-
21 vided to workers by contractors and subcontractors.

22 “(3) The requirements of this section are in addition to, and not in lieu
23 of, the requirements imposed under ORS 350.379.

24 “(4) As used in this section:

25 “(a) ‘Apprentice’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 660.010.

26 “(b) ‘Apprenticeable occupation’ has the meaning given that term in ORS
27 660.010.

28 “(c) ‘Apprenticeship training program’ means the total system of appren-
29 ticeship that a particular local joint committee, as defined in ORS 660.010,
30 operates, including the local joint committee’s registered standards and all

1 other terms and conditions for qualifying, recruiting, selecting, employing
2 and training apprentices in an apprenticeable occupation.

3 “(d) ‘Minority individual’ has the meaning given that term in ORS
4 200.005.

5 “(e) ‘Qualified project’ means the following capital construction projects:

6 “(A) The Eastern Oregon University Inlow Hall Renovation, Phase II
7 referenced in section 1 (1)(a) [*of this 2021 Act*], **chapter 658, Oregon Laws**
8 **2021**;

9 “(B) The Oregon State University Cascades Student Success Center ref-
10 erenced in section 1 (1)(b)(A) [*of this 2021 Act*], **chapter 658, Oregon Laws**
11 **2021**;

12 “(C) The Oregon State University Cordley Hall Renovation, Phase II ref-
13 erenced in section 1 (1)(b)(B) [*of this 2021 Act*], **chapter 658, Oregon Laws**
14 **2021**;

15 “(D) The Portland State University Gateway Center Reuse and Extension
16 referenced in section 1 (1)(c) [*of this 2021 Act*], **chapter 658, Oregon Laws**
17 **2021**;

18 “(E) The University of Oregon Heritage [*Building*] **Buildings** Renovation
19 (**University and Villard Halls**) referenced in section 1 (1)(d) [*of this 2021*
20 *Act*], **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021**; and

21 “(F) The Western Oregon University Student Success Center referenced
22 in section 1 (1)(e) [*of this 2021 Act*], **chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2021**.

23 “(f) ‘Veteran’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 408.225.

24 “(g) ‘Woman’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 200.005.

25 “**SECTION 7.** Section 39, chapter 671, Oregon Laws 2019, as amended by
26 section 18, chapter 682, Oregon Laws 2021, is amended to read:

27 “**Sec. 39.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, at the request of
28 the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the department
29 consults with the Department of Veterans’ Affairs, the State Treasurer is
30 authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in

1 an amount that produces \$6 million in net proceeds for the purposes de-
2 scribed in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated
3 by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

4 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be
5 transferred to the Department of Veterans’ Affairs for deposit in the
6 Veterans’ Affordable Housing Fund, established in section 40, chapter 671,
7 Oregon Laws 2019, for distribution to Salem Y Veterans Housing to con-
8 struct veterans’ affordable housing in Salem, **which may include the ac-**
9 **quisition of land for veterans’ affordable housing.**

10 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds
11 will create jobs, further economic development, finance public education or
12 restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife,
13 and is authorized based on the following findings:

14 “(a) Having housing for at-risk populations is essential to Oregon’s
15 healthy economic growth.

16 “(b) A severe shortage of affordable housing exists in Oregon, and market
17 indicators demonstrate a growing gap between the supply of and the demand
18 for affordable housing.

19 **“SECTION 8. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2023, at the re-**
20 **quest of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the**
21 **department consults with the McKenzie River Discovery Center, the**
22 **State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS**
23 **286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$3 million in net**
24 **proceeds for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section,**
25 **plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be**
26 **necessary to pay bond-related costs.**

27 **“(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must**
28 **be transferred to the department for deposit in the ODAS Economic**
29 **Development Distributions Fund established under ORS 461.553 for**
30 **distribution to the McKenzie River Discovery Center to construct a**

1 central exhibition structure and undertake site improvements at the
2 site of the Historic Old Leaburg Fish Hatchery.

3 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond
4 proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance pub-
5 lic education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and
6 native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that the
7 central exhibition structure and site improvements will enhance the
8 economic viability of the region through increased tourism, job cre-
9 ation and improved quality of life for the community.

10 “SECTION 9. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2023, at the re-
11 quest of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the
12 department consults with the City of Portland Parks and Recreation,
13 the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to
14 ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$15 million in
15 net proceeds for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this sec-
16 tion, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to
17 be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

18 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must
19 be transferred to the department for deposit in the ODAS Economic
20 Development Distributions Fund established under ORS 461.553 for
21 distribution to the City of Portland Parks and Recreation for the con-
22 struction of a new aquatic center in North Portland.

23 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond
24 proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance pub-
25 lic education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and
26 native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that
27 improving access to recreation services will enhance the economic vi-
28 ability of the region, create jobs and improve the quality of life for the
29 community.

30 “SECTION 10. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2023, at the re-

1 **quest of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the**
2 **department consults with the City of Milton-Freewater, the State**
3 **Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS**
4 **286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$3 million in net**
5 **proceeds for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section,**
6 **plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be**
7 **necessary to pay bond-related costs.**

8 **“(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must**
9 **be transferred to the department for deposit in the ODAS Economic**
10 **Development Distributions Fund established under ORS 461.553 for**
11 **distribution to City of Milton-Freewater for construction of the Police**
12 **and Dispatch Station to relocate the current station from the base-**
13 **ment of City Hall.**

14 **“(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond**
15 **proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance pub-**
16 **lic education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and**
17 **native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that**
18 **emergency services are necessary components of a climate that facili-**
19 **tates and encourages economic development.**

20 **“SECTION 11. This 2022 Act being necessary for the immediate**
21 **preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is**
22 **declared to exist, and this 2022 Act takes effect on its passage.”.**
