CULTURAL TRUST

VISION: We envision an Oregon that champions and invests in creative expression and cultural exchange, driving innovation and opportunity for all.

MISSION: To lead Oregon in cultivating, growing and valuing culture as an integral part of communities. We do this by inspiring Oregonians to invest in a permanent fund that provides annual grants to cultural organizations.

- Created in 2001 by the Oregon Legislature
- No other state provides a 100% tax credit for cultural donations

How the Trust Works

Oregonians donate to one or more of the registered 1,500+ cultural nonprofits.

Matching donation to the Cultural Trust, 100% state tax credit.

\$500 for individuals\$1,000 for couples filing jointly\$2,500 for C-class corporations

Annually raise over \$5.5 million

Allocations

Cultural Development Grants

- Protect and stabilize Oregon's cultural resources;
- Expand public awareness of, access to and participation in quality cultural experiences in Oregon;
- Ensure that Oregon cultural resources are strong and dynamic contributors to Oregon's communities and quality of life; and
- Build an understanding of the value and impact of culture to Oregonians.

County and Tribal Cultural Coalitions

Oregon's 45 county and tribal Cultural Coalitions are funded directly by the Trust and are unique to the state. Led by dedicated volunteers, each coalition prioritizes community cultural goals and annually distributes seed grants that address the needs of each county. Each county creates a cultural plan and makes grant awards in support of its goals.

Among these are Oregon's nine federally recognized tribes, whose cultural contributions are integral to the region's cultural vitality.



Organizational and Professional Development Program

Strengthens cultural non-profit leadership and organizational effectiveness to better serve Oregon's cultural community.

Poet Laureate

The Oregon Poet Laureate fosters the art of poetry, encourages literacy and learning, addresses central issues relating to humanities and heritage, and reflects on public life in Oregon.

Conversation with Funders

Annual funder workshops and information sessions held around the state.





Cultural Trust Relief Grants

FY 20-21 Coronavirus Relief Funding Cultural Support (CARES) \$25,954,872, allocated from the Oregon Legislature to the Oregon Cultural Trust

- 621 awards to for profit and nonprofit cultural organizations, awards ranged from \$1,446,471 to \$60.
 - Note there was also \$24,045,128 in funding to arts and culture organization in direct line items to large organizations and venues, contracts managed by DAS.

FY 22-23 American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) \$50,000,000. This program is

currently being rolled out in three categories.

- Small and Community Movie Theatres \$5 M
- Live Event Venues \$30 M
- Live Event Support Industries \$15 M
