The Need for SB 564

- RHECs build trust and capacity within communities most impacted by health inequities by showing up consistently
- 2. This is resource intensive work that must be consistent over time to be effective
- 3. RHECs are a critical bridge during times of crises
- 4. RHEC workload, costs grow, funding at 2014 level
- 5. <u>Now is the time to invest in capacity building and</u> <u>resilience, well ahead of the next public health</u> <u>emergency or disaster</u>

## Role of RHECs in Oregon's Public Health System

- Building trust
- Building capacity
- Bridging silos to better serve community
- Innovation

### Current RHEC Regions 2023

Senate Bill 70 (2021)

- Brought RHECs back to original level of funding after cuts
- Defined the RHEC model
- Funded 4 new RHECs

## Covid-19 Response

- Established trust and communication Listening to community needs Plain language, language access resources
- Covid-19 information in English and Spanish
- Testing and vaccine resources
- Q & A events, vaccine events

#### **Responsive Relief**

- Farmworker aid during first months
- Groceries and gas gift cards
- Help with winter heating and utility bills
- School supplies and laptops
- Mental health resources
- Protective masks and air filters





## Wildfire Relief

#### Almeda and Obenchain

- Providing relief within 24 hours
- Established relationships with vulnerable communities and with key local partners
- Water, food, diapers, phone charging stations, personal toiletries, pet food, formula
- Language access
- FEMA & OHCS application assistance
- Hotel stays in the first weeks after the fire
- Food and gas gift cards
- Resource navigation and referral
- First months rent & deposit for 60 families





Why SB 564 Matters for Oregon Communities Adequately capacitate RHEC Program to:

- Meet current workload and prevent burnout
- Meet growing costs due to inflation
- Honor the time and lived experience expertise of community members serving on committees and workgroups

Proactively invest in expanding counties served by RHECs ahead of the next crisis:

• SB 564 funds 5 new RHECs in counties not currently served by the program





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
