HB 3456 Relating to sexual misconduct at institutions of higher education

1 in 10 students experience sexual violence before they graduate or leave college. Women in Oregon experience higher rates of stalking, sexual assault and rape than the national average.

Sexual violence should not be part of the "college experience."

HB 3456 INCLUDES

Free legal, medical, and counseling services

Confidential advising services

Amnesty protections for reporting parties

Transparent, public data through anonymous campus climate surveys

Annual prevention and awareness programming

To ensure survivors are able to receive resources and support through partnerships with community-based domestic and sexual violence advocacy agencies.

To aid survivors in navigating the complex process of accessing necessary resources and understanding their rights and options.

To ensure survivors are not silenced or deterred from seeking support due to fear of punishment related to alcohol or drug use at the time of an assault.

To allow schools to identify impacted demographics, tailor solutions to their campus communities, and test the effectiveness of prevention programs.

To ensure that students and employees receive robust training on prevention and response, equipping everyone to take action to stop sexual violence.

Sister bills to HB 3456 have been passed in 6 states. Oregon must take action to prevent campus sexual violence, ensure institutional transparency and increase support for student survivors.
