

## HB 2879 -2 STAFF MEASURE SUMMARY

#### WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Directs Oregon Housing and Community Services to study affordable housing for college students, and provide report, which may include recommendations for legislation, to an interim committee of the Legislative Assembly related to affordable housing no later than September 15, 2024.

*FISCAL: May have fiscal impact, but no statement yet issued*

*REVENUE: May have revenue impact, but no statement yet issued*

#### ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Allocations in measure directed at nonprofit grants, not on study
- Rate of houselessness and housing insecurity among college students
- Parallel legislation to fund a study on affordable housing needs of college students statewide
- Ensuring future data collected includes all Oregon regions and types of colleges and universities

#### EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

-2 Replaces the measure.

Removes study provisions from introduced version of measure. Directs Department of Human Services (DHS) to utilize its self-sufficiency programs to provide financial support to nonprofit organizations providing affordable housing support to low-income college students. Appropriates, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, \$5 million in General Fund moneys to DHS for grants to eligible nonprofits supporting affordable housing for low-income college students.

#### BACKGROUND:

A 2019 survey conducted by the Hope Center for College, Community, and Justice reported that, of respondents representing 14 of 17 community colleges across Oregon, 52% of Oregon students were housing insecure in the previous year, while 20 percent of respondents were homeless.

The Joint Task Force on Student Success for Underrepresented Students in Higher Education (JTUSHE) was a bicameral legislative task force established by House Bill 2590 (2021). In the Task Force's Report on Findings and Recommendations for 2023 Legislative Session, it described Oregon's ongoing affordable housing crisis as putting "intense strains on underrepresented students, including pushing students out of housing or far away from campus. While this crisis is not unique to students, institutions of higher education are unique environments where unique opportunities may exist to help students be and remain housed." The Task Force recommended establishment of a statewide work group of higher education, housing, finance, and other experts to examine and make recommendations to address student housing availability, accessibility, and affordability.
