Agency Costs	In addition to fines above, upon conviction for <u>taking wildlife</u> , if the Court finds that the seizing agency suffered economic damages, the Court <u>may</u> include a requirement the convicted person pay to the seizing agency an amount equal to the cost incurred in seizing storing, and disposing of the seized and forteited wildlife. ORS 137.101 The compensatory fine statute requires proof of "economic loss." State v. Haines, 238 Or App 431 (2010). Upon conviction of a person for <u>taking wildlife</u> while violating any provision of ORS 164.245 (Criminal trespass in the second degree) to 164.270 (Closure of premises to motor-propelled vehicles) or 498.120 (Hunting on another's cultivated or enclosed land), the <u>court shall</u> include in the serience a requirement that the convicted person pay to the seizing agency an amount equal to the cost sincurred in seizing, storing and disposing of the seized and forfeited wildlife. ORS 496.680(5)

Firearms		For any <u>criminal offense</u> in which a firearm/deadly weapon was possessed used or available for use to facilitate the crime the court <u>shall</u> declare the weapon contraband and that it be forfeited. ORS 166.279				
	forf	For any violation of <u>wildlife laws</u> any firearms/deadly weapons used in angling/hunting/trapping/taking-wildlife <u>may</u> be seized and forfeited. See ORS 496.680				
Other	hur	All wildlife taken by, or in the possession of any persons in violation of the wildlife laws, and all other implements used in angling, hunting or trapping or taking any wildlife in violation of the wildlife laws <u>may</u> also be sized and <u>may</u> be forefited. All wildlife shot by any person while violating ORS 164.245, 164.270 OR 498.120 <u>shall</u> be seized and forfeited. See ORS 496.680(1)&(2)
