HB 3086: -7 Amendment

Base Bill:

 Aligns ODFW Commission with the Water Resources Commission

-7 Amendment:

- Requires that Commissioners have an understanding of the roles of federally recognized Indian tribes in Oregon and of the relationships the tribes have with lands, waters and the natural resources that the commission governs.
- Two at-large, statewide Commissioners, neither of whom can come from the same administrative water basin.
- Requires knowledge or experience relevant to implementing the wildlife policy set forth in ORS 496.012
