House Bill 2309

Sponsored by Representative LEWIS; Representatives CATE, LEVY B, OWENS (Presession filed.)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Requires law enforcement agencies to take DNA sample of person arrested for certain crimes. Requires destruction of sample, upon person's request, if arrest is followed by acquittal, dismissal, reversal of conviction or expiration of statute of limitations.

Removes provisions directing Department of State Police to prioritize testing of certain DNA samples when funds are limited.

Includes obtaining and analyzing DNA samples of arrested persons as purpose for which moneys may be allocated from Criminal Fine Account.

Takes effect on 91st day following adjournment sine die.

5 <u>SECTION 1.</u> (1) A law enforcement agency shall obtain a blood or buccal sample in ac-6 cordance with this section for any person who is arrested for:

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(2)(a) A blood sample may only be drawn in a medically acceptable manner by a licensed

(b) A buccal sample may be obtained by anyone authorized to do so by the arresting law

(c) A test result, or an opinion based upon a test result, of a blood or buccal sample obtained under this section is not inadmissible as evidence solely because of deviations from procedures adopted by the department that do not affect the reliability of the opinion or test result.

(d) A person authorized by this section to obtain a blood or buccal sample may not be
 held civilly liable for obtaining a sample in accordance with this section.

23 (3) A sample is not required to be obtained under this section if:

(a) The law enforcement agency has previously obtained an adequate blood or buccal
 sample of the person;

(b) The department notifies the law enforcement agency that it has previously received
an adequate blood or buccal sample of the person in accordance with ORS 137.076, 161.325 or

(c) Obtaining a sample would create a substantial and unreasonable risk to the health 1 2 of the arrested person. The department may deny inspection if it determines that there is a reasonable likelihood that such inspection would prejudice a pending criminal investigation. In any case, the department 36 37 is not required to allow the person or anyone acting on the person's behalf to test any blood or 38 buccal sample or other physical evidence. The department shall adopt procedures governing the inspection of records and samples and challenges to the accuracy of records. The procedures shall 39 40 accommodate the need to preserve the materials from contamination and destruction.

[(8)(a)] (6)(a) A person who provided a blood or buccal sample may request destruction of 41 the sample and any criminal identification record created in connection with the sample 42 43 whenever:

(A) A court reverses the conviction, judgment or order that created an obligation to provide a 44 blood or buccal sample under ORS 137.076 (2), 161.325 or 419C.473 (1)[, the person who provided the 45

1 sample may request destruction of the sample and any criminal identification record created in con-2 nection with that sample.];

3 (B) The arrest that created the obligation to provide a blood or buccal sample under 4 section 1 of this 2023 Act leads to a judgment of acquittal, an order of dismissal or a con-5 viction that is subsequently reversed; or

6 (C) A prosecution is not commenced within the statute of limitations for the crime of 7 arrest that created the obligation to provide a blood or buccal sample under section 1 of this 8 2023 Act.

9 (b) Upon receipt of a written request for destruction pursuant to this section and a certified copy of [the] a court order [reversing the conviction, judgment or order] or sworn affidavit described 10 in paragraph (d) of this subsection, the department shall destroy any sample received from the 11 12 person, any physical evidence obtained from that sample and any criminal identification records 13 pertaining to the person, unless the department determines that the person has otherwise become obligated to submit a blood or buccal sample as a result of a separate conviction, juvenile adjudi-14 15 cation or finding of guilty except for insanity for an offense listed in ORS 137.076 (1) or an arrest 16 for a crime listed in section 1 (1) of this 2023 Act. When the department destroys a sample, physical evidence or criminal identification record under this paragraph, the department shall notify 17 18 any public agency or person to whom the sample, physical evidence or criminal identification in-19 formation was transferred or disclosed under subsection [(4)] (2) of this section [of the reversal of the 20conviction, judgment or order] that the authority to retain the sample has been rescinded.

(c) The department is not required to destroy an item of physical evidence obtained from a blood
or buccal sample if evidence relating to another person subject to the provisions of ORS 137.076,
161.325, 419A.260 and 419C.473 (1) and this section and section 1 of this 2023 Act would thereby
be destroyed. Notwithstanding this subsection, no sample, physical evidence or criminal identification record is affected by an order to set aside a conviction under ORS 137.225.

(d) When a prosecution is not commenced within the statute of limitations for the crime
of arrest that created the obligation to provide a blood or buccal sample under section 1 of
this 2023 Act, the district attorney shall provide to the department a sworn affidavit within
90 days after expiration of the statute of limitations indicating that the authority to retain
the sample has been rescinded.

[(9)] (7) As used in this section, "convicted" includes a juvenile court finding of jurisdiction
 based on ORS 419C.005.

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SECTION 3. ORS 181A.160 is amended to read:

181A.160. (1) Immediately upon the arrest of a person for a crime for which criminal offender
 information must be provided under ORS 181A.165, a law enforcement agency shall:

(a) Place the arrested person's fingerprints and identifying data on forms prescribed or furnished
by the Department of State Police, photograph the arrested person and promptly transmit the form
and photograph to the department.

(b) If the arrest is disposed of by the arresting agency, cause the disposition report to be com pleted and promptly transmitted to the department.

(c) If the arrest is not disposed of by the agency, cause the disposition report to be forwarded
to the court that will dispose of the charge for further action in accordance with ORS 181A.175.

(2) A law enforcement agency, immediately upon the arrest of a person for a crime listed
in section 1 (1) of this 2023 Act, shall obtain a blood or buccal sample from the person in
accordance with section 1 of this 2023 Act.

1 [(2)] (3) A law enforcement agency may record, in addition to fingerprints, the palm prints, sole 2 prints, toe prints or other personal identifiers when, in the discretion of the agency, it is necessary 3 to effect identification of the persons or to the investigation of the crime charged.

8 137.076. (1) This section applies to any person convicted of:

9 (a) A felony;

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10 (b) Sexual abuse in the third degree or public indecency;

11 (c) Conspiracy or attempt to commit rape in the third degree, sodomy in the third degree, sexual 12 abuse in the second degree, burglary in the second degree or promoting prostitution; or

13 (d) Murder or aggravated murder.

14 (2) When a person is convicted of an offense listed in subsection (1) of this section:

(a) The person shall, whether or not ordered to do so by the court under paragraph (b) of this
subsection, provide a blood or buccal sample at the request of the appropriate agency designated in
paragraph (c) of this subsection.

(b) The court shall include in the judgment of conviction an order stating that a blood or buccal sample is required to be obtained at the request of the appropriate agency and, unless the convicted person lacks the ability to pay, that the person shall reimburse the appropriate agency for the cost of obtaining and transmitting the blood or buccal sample. If the judgment sentences the convicted person to probation, the court shall order the convicted person to submit to the obtaining of a blood or buccal sample as a condition of the probation.

(c) The appropriate agency shall cause a blood or buccal sample to be obtained and transmitted to the Department of State Police. The agency shall cause the sample to be obtained as soon as practicable after conviction. The agency shall obtain the convicted person's thumbprint at the same time the agency obtains the blood or buccal sample. The agency shall include the thumbprint with the identifying information that accompanies the sample. Whenever an agency is notified by the Department of State Police that a sample is not adequate for analysis, the agency shall obtain and transmit a blood sample. The appropriate agency shall be:

(A) The Department of Corrections, whenever the convicted person is committed to the legaland physical custody of the department.

(B) In all other cases, the law enforcement agency attending upon the court.

(3)(a) A blood sample may only be drawn in a medically acceptable manner by a licensed physician, a person acting under the direction or control of a licensed physician, a physician assistant
licensed under ORS 677.505 to 677.525, a nurse licensed under ORS chapter 678 or a qualified medical technician.

(b) A buccal sample may be obtained by anyone authorized to do so by the appropriate agency.

21 (a) Allocations for public safety standards, training and facilities.

(b) Allocations for criminal injuries compensation and assistance to victims of crime and chil dren reasonably suspected of being victims of crime.

(c) Allocations for the forensic services provided by the Oregon State Police, including, but not
 limited to, services of the Chief Medical Examiner.

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(d) Allocations for the maintenance and operation of the Law Enforcement Data System.

(e) Allocations for the collection and analysis of blood and buccal samples under section
1 of this 2023 Act.

(3) After making allocations under subsection (2) of this section, the Legislative Assembly shall
 allocate moneys from the Criminal Fine Account for the following purposes:

(a) Allocations to the Law Enforcement Medical Liability Account established under ORS
 414.815.

(b) Allocations to the State Court Facilities and Security Account established under ORS 1.178.

(c) Allocations to the Department of Corrections for the purpose of planning, operating and
 maintaining county juvenile and adult corrections programs and facilities and drug and alcohol
 programs.

(d) Allocations to the Oregon Health Authority for the purpose of grants under ORS 430.345 for
 the establishment, operation and maintenance of alcohol and drug abuse prevention, early inter vention and treatment services provided through a county.

40 (e) Allocations to the Oregon State Police for the purpose of the enforcement of the laws relat-41 ing to driving under the influence of intoxicants.

42 (f) Allocations to the Arrest and Return Account established under ORS 133.865.

43 (g) Allocations to the Intoxicated Driver Program Fund established under ORS 813.270.

44 (h) Allocations to the State Court Technology Fund established under ORS 1.012.

45 (4) Notwithstanding subsections (2) and (3) of this section, the Legislative Assembly shall allo-

cate all moneys deposited into the Criminal Fine Account as payment of fines on Class E violations
 to the Drug Treatment and Recovery Services Fund established under ORS 430.384.

(5) It is the intent of the Legislative Assembly that allocations from the Criminal Fine Account under subsection (3) of this section be consistent with historical funding of the entities, programs and accounts listed in subsection (3) of this section from monetary obligations imposed in criminal proceedings. Amounts that are allocated under subsection (3)(c) of this section shall be distributed to counties based on the amounts that were transferred to counties by circuit courts during the 2009-2011 biennium under the provisions of ORS 137.308, as in effect January 1, 2011.

9 (6) Moneys in the Criminal Fine Account may not be allocated for the payment of debt service 10 obligations.

11 (7) The Department of Revenue shall deposit in the General Fund all moneys remaining in the 12 Criminal Fine Account after the distributions listed in subsections (2), (3) and (4) of this section have

13 been made.

(8) The Department of Revenue shall establish by rule a process for distributing moneys in the
Criminal Fine Account. The department may not distribute more than one-eighth of the total
biennial allocation to an entity during a calendar quarter.

17 <u>SECTION 8.</u> Section 1 of this 2023 Act and the amendments to ORS 137.076, 137.300, 18 181A.155, 181A.160, 419A.260 and 419C.473 by sections 2 to 7 of this 2023 Act apply to arrests 19 occurring on or after the effective date of this 2023 Act.

20 <u>SECTION 9.</u> This 2023 Act takes effect on the 91st day after the date on which the 2023 21 regular session of the Eighty-second Legislative Assembly adjourns sine die.

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
