

HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 3308

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, after “ORS” insert “471.175, 471.178, 471.186, 471.190,
2 471.200, 471.221, 471.223, 471.227, 471.282,”.

3 Delete lines 5 through 22 and delete pages 2 through 9 and insert:

4 **“SECTION 1. Sections 2 to 7 of this 2023 Act are added to and made a part of ORS
5 chapter 471.**

6 **“SECTION 2. As used in sections 2 to 7 of this 2023 Act:**

7 **“(1) ‘Deliver’ means to transfer alcoholic beverages from a delivery person to a final
8 consumer at a delivery address.**

9 **“(2) ‘Delivery address’ means a location with a permanent street address in Oregon that
10 is not licensed by the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission under this chapter or ORS
11 475C.005 to 475C.525 or 475C.548.**

12 **“(3) ‘Delivery person’ means an employee, agent or contractor of a third-party delivery
13 facilitator who delivers alcoholic beverages to the physical possession of a final consumer.**

14 **“(4) ‘Eligible business’ means the holder of:**

15 **“(a) A full on-premises sales license issued under ORS 471.175;**

16 **“(b) A limited on-premises sales license issued under ORS 471.178;**

17 **“(c) An off-premises sales license issued under ORS 471.186;**

18 **“(d) A temporary sales license issued under ORS 471.190;**

19 **“(e) A brewery-public house license issued under ORS 471.200;**

20 **“(f) A brewery license issued under ORS 471.221;**

21 **“(g) A winery license issued under ORS 471.223;**

22 **“(h) A grower sales privilege license issued under ORS 471.227;**

23 **“(i) A direct shipper permit issued under ORS 471.282; or**

24 **“(j) Any other authorization, as determined by the commission by rule.**

25 **“(5) ‘Final consumer’ means an individual who takes possession of alcoholic beverages
26 at a delivery address for personal or social use, and not for resale.**

27 **“(6)(a) ‘Third-party delivery facilitator’ means an individual, person or company that:**

28 **“(A) Delivers, or holds itself out as willing to deliver, alcoholic beverages from an eligible
29 business to a final consumer; or**

30 **“(B) Facilitates, or holds itself out as willing to facilitate, the sale and delivery of alco-
31 holic beverages by an eligible business to a final consumer.**

32 **“(b) ‘Third-party delivery facilitator’ does not include a motor carrier as defined in 49
33 U.S.C. 13102, a freight forwarder as defined in 49 U.S.C. 13102 or an air carrier as defined in
34 49 U.S.C. 40102.**

35 **“SECTION 3. (1) An eligible business or third-party delivery facilitator may employ or**

1 contract with a delivery person to deliver alcoholic beverages to the physical possession of
2 a final consumer at a delivery address only if the individual:

3 “(a) Is at least 18 years of age; and

4 “(b) Has a valid driver license or other state-issued identification.

5 “(2) Prior to making any deliveries of alcoholic beverages, a delivery person shall first
6 complete the training program and be issued a certificate of completion, as described in
7 section 4 of this 2023 Act.

8 “(3) A delivery person may also be a third-party delivery facilitator that holds a permit
9 issued under section 6 of this 2023 Act.

10 “(4) A delivery person may charge an eligible business a fee for delivering alcoholic
11 beverages on behalf of the eligible business.

12 “(5) A violation of subsection (1) of this section:

13 “(a) Upon a first conviction, is a Class A violation.

14 “(b) Upon a second or subsequent conviction, is a Class A misdemeanor.

15 “SECTION 4. (1) A third-party delivery facilitator shall develop an alcohol delivery
16 training program that includes training on at least:

17 “(a) Forms of identification required by ORS 471.130 and methods for identifying, in-
18 specting, accepting or rejecting identification;

19 “(b) Signs of visible intoxication and methods for recognizing these signs and for refusing
20 to deliver alcoholic beverages to a final consumer; and

21 “(c) Rules adopted by the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission relating to the deliv-
22 ery of alcoholic beverages to a final consumer.

23 “(2) The commission may adopt rules regarding the approval of training programs de-
24 scribed in subsection (1) of this section.

25 “(3) In conjunction with an application for a permit under section 6 of this 2023 Act, a
26 third-party delivery facilitator shall submit to the commission a copy of the third-party de-
27 livery facilitator’s training program for approval by the commission.

28 “(4)(a) A third-party delivery facilitator shall provide the training program described in
29 subsection (1) of this section to delivery persons employed by or contracted with the third-
30 party delivery facilitator, and shall issue to delivery persons who successfully complete the
31 training program a certificate of completion.

32 “(b) In order to provide the training program described in subsection (1) of this section,
33 a third-party delivery facilitator may offer a training program internally or may contract
34 with another party that offers a training program that is approved by the commission.

35 “(c) A third-party delivery facilitator may offer a training program described in sub-
36 section (1) of this section only if the training program is approved by the commission.

37 “(5) A delivery person may not engage in the delivery of alcoholic beverages unless the
38 delivery person first completes the training program described in subsection (1) of this sec-
39 tion and holds a certificate of completion described in subsection (4) of this section. A de-
40 livery person who delivers alcoholic beverages on behalf of more than one third-party
41 delivery facilitator must complete the training program, and hold a certificate of completion,
42 from each third-party delivery facilitator on whose behalf the delivery person delivers alco-
43 holic beverages.

44 “(6) The commission may adopt rules to carry out this section, including rules to estab-
45 lish a fee for review and approval of a training program described in subsection (1) of this

1 section.

2 “SECTION 5. The Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission may adopt rules to regulate
3 the delivery of alcoholic beverages by parties including, but not limited to, eligible businesses,
4 delivery persons and third-party delivery facilitators.

5 “SECTION 6. (1) In order to engage in the delivery of alcoholic beverages, a third-party
6 delivery facilitator must hold a permit issued by the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commis-
7 sion and must comply with applicable requirements under this chapter.

8 “(2)(a) The commission may refuse to issue a permit, and may suspend or revoke a per-
9 mit, if the commission finds or has reasonable grounds to believe that:

10 “(A) A third-party delivery facilitator is, or has a financial interest in, a manufacturer;

11 “(B) A third-party delivery facilitator provided material false or misleading information
12 to the commission or omitted information that should have been provided to the commission;
13 or

14 “(C) Subject to paragraph (b) of this subsection, a third-party delivery facilitator, or any
15 person used by or acting on behalf or at the direction of the third-party delivery facilitator,
16 does not have a good record of compliance under this chapter, as assessed upon initial ap-
17 plication for a permit under this section and annually upon application for renewal of a per-
18 mit issued under this section.

19 “(b) The commission shall establish by rule a process through which the commission
20 shall notify a third-party delivery facilitator of a compliance issue as described under para-
21 graph (a)(A) of this subsection and allow the third-party delivery facilitator an opportunity
22 to cure the issue prior to the commission’s refusal to issue or renew the third-party delivery
23 facilitator’s permit under this section.

24 “(3) A retail licensee, as defined in ORS 471.392, is eligible to qualify as a third-party de-
25 livery facilitator. A retail licensee that is also a third-party delivery facilitator may exercise
26 any privilege granted by the retail license.

27 “(4)(a) A third-party delivery facilitator acting on behalf of an eligible business may:

28 “(A) Deliver, or cause to be delivered, alcoholic beverages to the physical possession of
29 a final consumer on behalf of an eligible business;

30 “(B) Advertise alcoholic beverages available for retail sale;

31 “(C) Solicit, receive and accept orders for alcoholic beverages from final consumers; and

32 “(D) Receive payment for alcoholic beverages ordered by final consumers.

33 “(b) A third-party delivery facilitator may engage in an activity described in this section
34 only when the third-party delivery facilitator is acting on behalf of an eligible business.

35 “(c) A third-party delivery facilitator may use only a delivery person who meets the re-
36 quirements of section 3 of this 2023 Act to deliver alcoholic beverages to a final consumer.

37 “(d) A third-party delivery facilitator that is an individual who is a delivery person must
38 meet the requirements of section 3 of this 2023 Act, including the requirement to hold a valid
39 driver license.

40 “(5) A third-party delivery facilitator may charge an eligible business a fee for delivering
41 alcoholic beverages on behalf of the eligible business.

42 “(6) A third-party delivery facilitator shall maintain and make available records to the
43 commission as required by the commission by rule.

44 “(7) The commission may adopt rules as necessary to regulate third-party delivery
45 facilitators.

1 “(8)(a) An eligible business may use a third-party delivery facilitator to carry out, on
2 behalf of the eligible business, deliveries of alcoholic beverages to final consumers that the
3 eligible business is authorized to make. In carrying out a delivery described in this sub-
4 section, a third-party delivery facilitator shall ensure that the delivery is made in compliance
5 with any requirements applicable to the delivery.

6 “(b) The commission shall adopt rules to carry out this subsection.

7 “(9) An eligible business that uses a third-party delivery facilitator to deliver alcoholic
8 beverages on behalf of the eligible business is not responsible for any failure of the third-
9 party delivery facilitator, or a delivery person employed by or contracted with the third-party
10 delivery facilitator, to comply with the requirements of sections 2 to 7 of this 2023 Act or
11 rules adopted under sections 2 to 7 of this 2023 Act.

12 “SECTION 7. (1) It is a Class A misdemeanor for a person that is not a third-party de-
13 livery facilitator that holds a permit issued under section 6 of this 2023 Act to engage in any
14 activity for which a permit is required unless the person is a licensee, permittee or agent
15 appointed by the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission, or is an employee or agent of a
16 licensee, permittee or agent acting on behalf of the licensee, permittee or agent, and the
17 activity is allowed by the privileges of the license, permit or appointment.

18 “(2)(a) The commission may assess a civil penalty against a third-party delivery
19 facilitator for a violation of this chapter or rules adopted by the commission under this
20 chapter if the violation is committed by the third-party delivery facilitator or a delivery
21 person acting on behalf of the third-party delivery facilitator.

22 “(b) The civil penalty assessed under paragraph (a) of this subsection must be at least
23 \$500 per violation and may not be more than \$4,000 per violation.

24 “(c) ORS 471.990 does not apply to a violation for which a civil penalty may be issued
25 under this subsection.

26 “SECTION 8. ORS 471.175 is amended to read:

27 “471.175. (1) The holder of a full on-premises sales license may sell by the drink at retail wine,
28 malt beverages, cider and distilled liquor. Except as provided in this section and ORS 471.176, all
29 alcoholic beverages sold under a full on-premises sales license must be consumed on the licensed
30 premises.

31 “(2) A full on-premises sales license may be issued only to:

32 “(a) A nonprofit private club, as described in subsection (9) of this section.

33 “(b) A public passenger carrier as provided in ORS 471.182.

34 “(c) A commercial establishment, as defined in ORS 471.001 (2).

35 “(d) A public location that does not qualify for licensing under paragraphs (a) to (c) of this
36 subsection if:

37 “(A) Food is cooked and served at the location;

38 “(B) The predominant business activity at the location is other than the preparation or serving
39 of food or the serving of alcohol; and

40 “(C) The location meets any minimum food service requirements established by Oregon Liquor
41 and Cannabis Commission rule.

42 “(e) A caterer, subject to the requirements of ORS 471.184.

43 “(3) The holder of a full on-premises sales license shall allow a patron to remove a partially
44 consumed bottle of wine from the licensed premises if the wine is served in conjunction with the
45 patron’s meal, the patron is not a minor and the patron is not visibly intoxicated.

1 “(4) The holder of a full on-premises sales license may purchase any distilled liquor from an
2 agent of the commission appointed pursuant to ORS 471.750 at a discount of not more than five
3 percent off the regular listed price fixed by the commission, together with all taxes, in a manner
4 prescribed by commission rule. For purposes of compensation by the commission, the appointed
5 agent shall be credited with such sales at full retail cost. The commission may not require the
6 licensee to purchase more than one container of distilled liquor at a time if the distilled liquor:

7 “(a) Except as provided in subsection (10) of this section, has a retail sales price of \$30 or more
8 per container;

9 “(b) Is available through a distributor in the United States that does not require the commission
10 to acquire more than one case of the distilled liquor in a single transaction;

11 “(c) Is not regularly stocked by the commission; and

12 “(d) Is ordered in a 750 milliliter container size if available in that size.

13 “(5) The holder of a full on-premises sales license may purchase distilled liquor only from a re-
14 tail sales agent of the commission or from another person licensed under this section who has pur-
15 chased the distilled liquor from a retail sales agent of the commission.

16 “(6) The holder of a full on-premises sales license may sell for consumption off the licensed
17 premises malt beverages, wine and cider in securely covered containers provided by the consumer
18 that have capacities of not more than two gallons each.

19 “(7) The holder of a full on-premises sales license may sell for consumption off the licensed
20 premises malt beverages, wine and cider in factory-sealed containers.

21 “(8)(a) The holder of a full on-premises sales license may deliver malt beverages, wine and cider
22 that are sold for off-premises consumption under the privileges of the license to retail customers in
23 this state without a direct shipper permit issued under ORS 471.282. Any deliveries by the licensee
24 are subject to any rules adopted by the commission relating to deliveries made under this sub-
25 section.

26 “(b) **The holder of a full on-premises sales license that uses a third-party delivery**
27 **facilitator to make deliveries under this subsection is not responsible for ensuring that the**
28 **deliveries made by the third-party delivery facilitator meet any requirements applicable to**
29 **the deliveries.**

30 “(9) A nonprofit private club, including but not limited to a fraternal or veterans organization,
31 may qualify for a full on-premises sales license under this section only if the club meets any mini-
32 mum membership, nonprofit status and food service requirements established by commission rule.

33 “(10) Beginning January 1, 2017, the commission may annually adjust the price threshold estab-
34 lished in subsection (4)(a) of this section by a percentage equal to the percentage change in the
35 Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, West Region (All Items), as published by the Bu-
36 reau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor. However, the commission may
37 not adjust the price threshold to be less than \$30.

38 “**SECTION 9.** ORS 471.178 is amended to read:

39 “471.178. (1) The holder of a limited on-premises sales license may sell by the drink at retail
40 wine, malt beverages and cider. Except as provided in this section, all alcoholic beverages sold un-
41 der a limited on-premises sales license must be consumed on the licensed premises.

42 “(2) The holder of a limited on-premises sales license may sell malt beverages, wine and cider
43 in factory-sealed containers for consumption off the licensed premises.

44 “(3) The holder of a limited on-premises sales license may sell for consumption off the licensed
45 premises malt beverages, wine and cider in securely covered containers provided by the consumer

1 and that have capacities of not more than two gallons each.

2 “(4)(a) The holder of a limited on-premises sales license may deliver malt beverages, wine and
3 cider that are sold for off-premises consumption under the privileges of the license to retail cus-
4 tomers in this state without a direct shipper permit issued under ORS 471.282. Any deliveries by the
5 holder of a limited on-premises sales license are subject to any rules adopted by the commission
6 relating to deliveries made under this subsection.

7 “(b) **The holder of a limited on-premises sales license that uses a third-party delivery**
8 **facilitator to make deliveries under this subsection is not responsible for ensuring that the**
9 **deliveries made by the third-party delivery facilitator meet any requirements applicable to**
10 **the deliveries.**

11 “(5) The holder of a limited on-premises sales license shall allow a patron to remove a partially
12 consumed bottle of wine from the licensed premises if the wine is served in conjunction with the
13 patron’s meal, the patron is not a minor and the patron is not visibly intoxicated.

14 “**SECTION 10.** ORS 471.186 is amended to read:

15 “471.186. (1) The holder of an off-premises sales license may sell factory-sealed containers of
16 malt beverages, wine and cider for consumption off the licensed premises.

17 “(2) The holder of an off-premises sales license may sell for consumption off the licensed prem-
18 ises malt beverages, wine and cider in securely covered containers supplied by the consumer and
19 that have capacities of not more than two gallons each.

20 “(3) The holder of an off-premises sales license may provide sample tasting of alcoholic
21 beverages on the licensed premises if the licensee applies in writing to the Oregon Liquor and
22 Cannabis Commission and receives written approval from the commission to conduct tastings on the
23 premises. Tastings must be limited to the alcoholic beverages that may be sold under the privileges
24 of the license.

25 “(4) An off-premises sales license may not be issued for use at a premises that is mobile.

26 “(5) Except as provided in ORS 471.402, a manufacturer or wholesaler may not provide or pay
27 for sample tastings of alcoholic beverages for the public on premises licensed under an off-premises
28 sales license.

29 “(6)(a) The holder of an off-premises sales license may deliver malt beverages, wine or cider that
30 is sold under the privileges of the license to retail customers in this state without a direct shipper
31 permit issued under ORS 471.282. **The holder of an off-premises sales license may use a con-**
32 **tractor, an agent or employee of the holder, or may use a delivery person or a third-party**
33 **delivery facilitator, to make the deliveries described in this subsection.** Any deliveries by the
34 holder of an off-premises sales license are subject to any rules adopted by the commission relating
35 to deliveries made under this subsection.

36 “(b) **The holder of an off-premises sales license shall ensure that deliveries under this**
37 **subsection made by a contractor or an agent or employee of the holder:**

38 “[a] (A) *[May be]* **Are** made only to a person who is at least 21 years of age;

39 “[b] (B) *[May be]* **Are** made only for personal use and not for the purpose of resale; *[and]*

40 “[c] (C) *[Must be]* **Are** made in containers that are conspicuously labeled with the words:
41 ‘CONTAINS ALCOHOL: SIGNATURE OF PERSON AGE 21 YEARS OR OLDER REQUIRED FOR
42 DELIVERY[.]’; **and**

43 “[7] *The holder of an off-premises sales license that makes deliveries of malt beverages, wine or*
44 *cider under subsection (6) of this section shall take all actions necessary to ensure that a carrier used*
45 *by the licensee does not deliver any malt beverages, wine or cider unless the carrier:]*

1 “(D) Are not completed unless the contractor, agent or employee making the delivery:
2 “[(a)] (i) Obtains the signature of the recipient of the malt beverages, wine or cider upon deliv-
3 ery;
4 “[(b)] (ii) Verifies by inspecting government-issued photo identification that the recipient is at
5 least 21 years of age; and
6 “[(c)] (iii) Determines that the recipient is not visibly intoxicated at the time of delivery.
7 “(c) **The holder of an off-premises sales license that uses a third-party delivery facilitator**
8 **to make deliveries under this subsection is not responsible for ensuring that deliveries made**
9 **by the third-party delivery facilitator meet the requirements of this subsection.**
10 “[(8)] (7) Any person who knowingly or negligently delivers malt beverages, wine or cider under
11 the provisions of this section to a person under 21 years of age, or who knowingly or negligently
12 delivers malt beverages, wine or cider under the provisions of this section to a visibly intoxicated
13 person, violates ORS 471.410.
14 “[(9)] (8) If a court determines that deliveries of malt beverages, wine or cider under subsection
15 (6) of this section cannot be restricted to holders of off-premises sales licenses, and the decision is
16 a final judgment that is no longer subject to appeal, the holder of an off-premises sales license may
17 not make deliveries of malt beverages, wine or cider under the provisions of subsection (6) of this
18 section after entry of the final judgment.
19 “[(10)] (9) The [*Oregon Liquor and Cannabis*] commission may adopt rules to carry out this
20 section.
21 “**SECTION 11.** ORS 471.190 is amended to read:
22 “471.190. (1) The holder of a temporary sales license may:
23 “(a) Sell at retail by the drink wine, malt beverages, cider and distilled liquor.
24 “(b) Sell for consumption off the licensed premises wine, malt beverages and cider in factory-
25 sealed containers.
26 “(c) Sell for consumption off the licensed premises wine, malt beverages and cider in securely
27 covered containers supplied by the consumer and having capacities of not more than two gallons
28 each.
29 “(2) Distilled liquor served by the holder of a temporary sales license must be purchased from
30 a retail sales agent of the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission. The holder of a temporary sales
31 license must provide food service as required by commission rule.
32 “(3) A temporary sales license may be issued only to:
33 “(a) Nonprofit or charitable organizations that are registered with the state.
34 “(b) A political committee that has filed a statement of organization under ORS 260.039 or
35 260.042.
36 “(c) State agencies.
37 “(d) Local governments, and agencies and departments of local governments.
38 “(e) Persons not otherwise described in this subsection, as long as the applicant submits a plan
39 that is approved by the commission detailing how minors will be prevented from gaining access to
40 alcoholic beverages and how minors will be prevented from gaining access to any portion of the li-
41 censed premises prohibited to minors under ORS 471.430 (3) or any rule adopted by the commission.
42 “(4) The commission may by rule establish additional eligibility requirements for temporary sales
43 licenses.
44 “(5) Subject to such qualifications as the commission may establish by rule, persons who hold
45 a full or limited on-premises sales license are eligible for temporary sales licenses.

1 “(6) A temporary sales license issued to a person described in subsection (3)(a), (c) or (d) of this
2 section authorizes the holder of the temporary sales license to:

3 “(a)(A)(i) Have on a single licensed premises more than one location at which wine, malt
4 beverages or cider is sold at retail by the drink or for consumption off the licensed premises; and

5 “(ii) Have on a single licensed premises more than one location at which wine, malt beverages,
6 cider or distilled liquor is sold at retail by the drink; or

7 “(B) Have up to three separate premises in this state licensed under the temporary sales license
8 at which wine, malt beverages or cider is sold for consumption off the licensed premises; and

9 “(b) Operate for up to 30 days, whether or not the days are consecutive.

10 “(7) The commission may adopt rules to carry out subsection (6) of this section.

11 “(8) A person holding a temporary sales license is not required to obtain an intermittent tem-
12 porary restaurant, seasonal temporary restaurant, single-event temporary restaurant license or mo-
13 bile unit license under ORS chapter 624 if only wine, malt beverages and cider in single-service
14 containers are served and only nonperishable food items that are exempted from licensure by the
15 Oregon Health Authority are served.

16 “(9) Employees and volunteers serving alcoholic beverages for a nonprofit or charitable organ-
17 ization licensed under this section are not required to have service permits or to complete an alco-
18 hol server education program and examination under ORS 471.542. The commission by rule may
19 establish education requirements for servers described in this subsection.

20 “(10) Notwithstanding ORS 471.392 to 471.400, a temporary sales license may be issued to a
21 nonprofit trade association that has a membership primarily composed of persons that hold winery
22 licenses issued under ORS 471.223 or grower sales privilege licenses issued under ORS 471.227.

23 “(11) **The holder of a temporary sales license that uses a third-party delivery facilitator**
24 **to make deliveries on behalf of the holder is not responsible for ensuring that deliveries made**
25 **by the third-party delivery facilitator meet any requirements applicable to the deliveries.**

26 “**SECTION 12.** ORS 471.200 is amended to read:

27 “471.200. (1) A brewery-public house license allows the licensee to:

28 “(a) [To] Manufacture on the licensed premises, store, transport, sell to wholesale malt beverage
29 and wine licensees of the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission and export malt beverages;

30 “(b) [To] Sell malt beverages manufactured on or off the licensed premises at retail for con-
31 sumption on or off the premises;

32 “(c) [To] Sell malt beverages in brewery-sealed packages at retail directly to the consumer for
33 consumption off the premises;

34 “(d) [To] Sell on the licensed premises at retail malt beverages manufactured on or off the li-
35 censed premises in unpasteurized or pasteurized form directly to the consumer for consumption off
36 the premises, delivery of which may be made in a securely covered container supplied by the con-
37 sumer;

38 “(e) [To] Sell wine and cider at retail for consumption on or off the premises;

39 “(f) [To] Sell for consumption off the premises wines and cider in securely covered containers
40 supplied by the consumer and having capacities of not more than two gallons each;

41 “(g) [To] Conduct the activities, except manufacturing, described in paragraphs (a) to (f) of this
42 subsection at two locations other than the premises where the manufacturing occurs;

43 “(h) [To] Obtain a special events brewery-public house license entitling the holder to conduct
44 the activities allowed under paragraphs (b) to (f) of this subsection at a designated location other
45 than the location set forth in the brewery-public house license for a period not exceeding five days;

1 “(i) [To] Distribute malt beverages manufactured at the licensed premises to any other premises
2 licensed to the same licensee, whether a manufacturer, wholesaler or retail premises; and

3 “(j) [To] Distribute for export, in any amount, malt beverages manufactured at the licensed
4 premises.

5 “(2) In addition to the privileges specified in subsection (1) of this section, in any calendar year
6 a brewery-public house licensee may sell at wholesale and distribute to licensees of the commission
7 no more than 7,500 barrels of malt beverages produced by the brewery-public house licensee.

8 “(3) A brewery-public house licensee, or any person having an interest in the licensee, is a retail
9 licensee for the purposes of ORS 471.394 and, except as otherwise provided by this section and ORS
10 471.396, may not acquire or hold any right, title, lien, claim or other interest, financial or otherwise,
11 in, upon or to the premises, equipment, business or merchandise of any manufacturer or wholesaler,
12 as defined in ORS 471.392. A brewery-public house licensee, or any person having an interest in the
13 licensee, is also a manufacturer for the purposes of ORS 471.394 and, except as otherwise provided
14 by this section and ORS 471.396, may not acquire or hold any right, title, lien, claim or other in-
15 terest, financial or otherwise, in, upon or to the premises, equipment, business or merchandise of
16 any other retail licensee, as defined in ORS 471.392.

17 “(4)(a) Except as provided in this subsection, a brewery-public house licensee, or any person
18 having an interest in the licensee, is a retail licensee for the purposes of ORS 471.398 and, except
19 as otherwise provided by this section and ORS 471.400, may not accept directly or indirectly any
20 financial assistance described in ORS 471.398 from any manufacturer or wholesaler, as defined in
21 ORS 471.392. A brewery-public house licensee, or any person having an interest in the licensee, is
22 also a manufacturer for the purposes of ORS 471.398 and, except as otherwise provided by this sec-
23 tion and ORS 471.400, may not provide directly or indirectly any financial assistance described in
24 ORS 471.398 to any retail licensee, as defined in ORS 471.392. The prohibitions on financial assist-
25 ance in ORS 471.398 do not apply to financial assistance between manufacturing and retail busi-
26 nesses licensed to the same person under the provisions of this section.

27 “(b) The commission may issue more than one brewery-public house license at a single premises
28 if each licensee:

29 “(A) Has a valid Brewer’s Notice issued by the federal Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade
30 Bureau at the premises address; and

31 “(B) Otherwise complies with ORS 471.398.

32 “(c) A brewery-public house licensee may produce malt beverages for another brewery-public
33 house licensee under a custom order agreement. The commission may adopt rules regarding the
34 contents of custom order agreements.

35 “(5) Notwithstanding subsection (3) of this section, a brewery-public house licensee, or any per-
36 son having an interest in the licensee, may also hold a winery license authorized by ORS 471.223.
37 A brewery-public house licensee, or any person having an interest in the licensee, may also hold a
38 warehouse license authorized by ORS 471.242.

39 “(6) Notwithstanding subsection (3) of this section, a brewery-public house licensee is eligible for
40 limited on-premises sales licenses and temporary sales licenses.

41 “(7) Notwithstanding subsection (3) of this section, a brewery-public house licensee, or any per-
42 son having an interest in the licensee, may also hold a full on-premises sales license. If a person
43 holds both a brewery-public house license and a full on-premises sales license, nothing in this

4 pointed by the commission as the distillery’s retail outlet agent for the purpose of selling distilled
5 liquors under ORS 471.230.

6 “(9) Notwithstanding subsection (3) of this section, the commission by rule may authorize a
7 brewery-public house licensee to coproduce special events with other manufacturers.

8 “(10)(a) Notwithstanding subsection (3) of this section, a brewery-public house licensee may hold,
9 directly or indirectly, an interest in a manufacturer or wholesaler, provided that the interest does
10 not result in exercise of control over, or participation in the management of, the manufacturer’s or
11 wholesaler’s business or business decisions and does not result in exclusion of any competitor’s
12 brand of alcoholic liquor.

13 “(b) Notwithstanding subsection (3) of this section, a manufacturer or wholesaler, and any offi-
14 cer, director or substantial stockholder of any corporate manufacturer or wholesaler, may hold, di-
15 rectly or indirectly, an interest in a brewery-public house licensee, provided that the interest does
16 not result in exercise of control over, or participation in the management of, the licensee’s business
17 or business decisions and does not result in exclusion of any competitor’s brand of alcoholic liquor.

18 “(11) For purposes of ORS chapter 473, a brewery-public house licensee shall be considered to
19 be a manufacturer.

20 “(12) **The holder of a brewery-public house license that uses a third-party delivery**
21 **facilitator to make deliveries on behalf of the holder is not responsible for ensuring that**
22 **deliveries made by the third-party delivery facilitator meet any requirements applicable to**
23 **the deliveries.**

24 “**SECTION 13.** ORS 471.221 is amended to read:

25 “471.221. (1) As used in this section, ‘common control’ means:

26 “(a) That a manufacturer, or any officer, director, substantial stockholder or other substantial
27 equity holder in the manufacturer:

28 “(A) Directly or indirectly holds 50 percent or more interest in the brewery licensee; or

29 “(B) Has authority to direct the management of the brewery licensee; or

30 “(b) That a brewery licensee, or any officer, director, substantial stockholder or other substan-
31 tial equity holder in the brewery licensee:

32 “(A) Directly or indirectly holds 50 percent or more interest in another manufacturer; or

33 “(B) Has authority to direct the management of another manufacturer.

34 “(2) A brewery license authorizes the licensee to:

35 “(a) Manufacture malt beverages on the licensed premises.

36 “(b) Sell to wholesale malt beverage and wine licensees, import, store, transport or export:

37 “(A) Malt beverages produced on the licensed premises; or

38 “(B) Malt beverages of a brand produced by a manufacturer that is under common control with
39 the brewery licensee.

40 “(c) Sell wine, malt beverages or cider on the licensed premises at retail for consumption on or
41 off the licensed premises.

42 “(d) Sell, in securely covered containers supplied by the consumer and having a capacity of not
43 more than two gallons each, wine, malt beverages or cider for off-premises consumption.

44 “(e) Obtain a special events brewery license that entitles the holder to conduct the activities
45 allowed under paragraphs (c) and (d) of this subsection at a designated location other than the one

1 set forth in the brewery license for a period not exceeding five days.

2 “(f) Notwithstanding ORS 471.392 to 471.400, subject to ORS 471.175, hold a full on-premises
3 sales license.

4 “(g) Conduct any activities authorized under paragraph (c), (d) or (f) of this subsection at up to
5 two additional locations approved by the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission.

6 “(3) Subject to ORS 471.235, a brewery licensee may hold a wholesale malt beverage and wine
7 license. A brewery licensee must hold a wholesale malt beverage and wine license if the brewery
8 licensee:

9 “(a) Imports, stores, transports or exports malt beverages of brands that are not produced by the
10 licensee or a manufacturer under common control with the licensee; or

11 “(b) Except as provided in this paragraph, sells or distributes malt beverages. This paragraph
12 does not apply to malt beverages described in subsection (2)(a) or (b) of this section sold at a li-
13 censed premises described in subsection (2)(a) of this section.

14 “(4) A brewery licensee and a winery licensee may not be under common control unless the
15 winery licensee:

16 “(a) Uses its premises to produce wine or cider; and

17 “(b) Holds a valid producer and blender basic permit issued by the federal Alcohol and Tobacco
18 Tax and Trade Bureau.

19 “(5) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, a brewery licensee, a manufacturer
20 that is under common control with the brewery licensee or any officer, director, substantial stock-
21 holder or other substantial equity holder in the brewery licensee or in a manufacturer that is under
22 common control with the brewery licensee may not sell malt beverages at retail at more than three
23 locations in this state regardless of the number or type of licenses held by the licensee, manufac-
24 turer, officer, director, stockholder or equity holder.

25 “(6) A brewery licensee may produce malt beverages for a brewery-public house licensee under
26 a custom order agreement. The commission may adopt rules regarding the contents of custom order
27 agreements.

28 **“(7) A brewery licensee that uses a third-party delivery facilitator to make deliveries on**
29 **behalf of the licensee is not responsible for ensuring that deliveries made by the third-party**
30 **delivery facilitator meet any requirements applicable to the deliveries.**

31 **“SECTION 14.** ORS 471.223 is amended to read:

32 “471.223. (1) As used in this section, ‘control’ means that the licensee:

33 “(a) Owns the brand under which the wine or cider is labeled; or

34 “(b) Performs or has the legal right to perform all of the acts common to a brand owner under
35 the terms of a trademark license or similar agreement that for the brand under which the wine or
36 cider is labeled has a term of at least three years.

37 “(2) The holder of a winery license may:

38 “(a) Import wine or cider in containers that have a capacity of more than four liters.

39 “(b) Import wine or cider in containers that have a capacity of four liters or less if the brand
40 of wine or cider is under the control of the licensee.

41 “(c) Bottle, produce, blend, store, transport or export wines or cider.

42 “(d) Sell wines or cider at wholesale to the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission or to
43 licensees of the commission.

44 “(e) Sell wines or cider at retail directly to the consumer for consumption on or off the licensed
45 premises.

1 “(f) Sell malt beverages at retail for consumption on or off the licensed premises.

2 “(g) Sell for consumption off the premises malt beverages, wines and cider in securely covered
3 containers that are supplied by the consumer and have capacities of not more than two gallons each.

4 “(h) Conduct under the winery license any activities described in paragraphs (a) to (g) of this
5 subsection at five or fewer premises designated by the commission.

6 “(i) Purchase from or through the commission brandy or other distilled liquors for fortifying
7 wines or cider.

8 “(j) Obtain a special events winery license that entitles the holder to conduct the activities al-
9 lowed under paragraphs (e) to (g) of this subsection at a designated location other than the one set
10 forth in the winery license for a period not to exceed five days.

11 “(3) A winery licensee shall allow a patron to remove a partially consumed bottle of wine from
12 the licensed premises if the patron is not a minor and the patron is not visibly intoxicated.

13 “(4) Except as provided in subsection (5) of this section, in order to hold a winery license the
14 licensee shall:

15 “(a) Possess at a bonded premises within Oregon a valid producer and blender basic permit is-
16 sued by the federal Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau; or

17 “(b) Possess a valid wine blender or valid wholesaler basic permit issued by the federal Alcohol
18 and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau and have a written contract with a winery licensed under par-
19 agraph (a) of this subsection that authorizes the winery to produce for the licensee a brand of wine
20 or cider that is under the control of the licensee.

21 “(5) Subsection (4) of this section does not apply if a licensee produces only cider under the
22 winery license.

23 “(6) A winery licensee may sell and ship malt beverages, wine or cider directly to a resident of
24 this state only if the licensee has a direct shipper permit issued under ORS 471.282.

25 “(7) A winery licensee, or any person having an interest in the licensee, may also hold a full
26 on-premises sales license. If a winery licensee, or a person having an interest in the licensee, also
27 holds a full on-premises sales license, the provisions of this chapter do not prevent the licensee or
28 person from both selling wine or cider bottled and produced under the winery license and selling
29 alcoholic liquor as authorized under the full on-premises sales license.

30 “(8) More than one winery licensee may exercise the privileges of a winery license at a single
31 location. The commission may not refuse to issue a winery license to a person for the production
32 of wine or cider on specified premises based on the fact that other winery licensees also produce
33 wine or cider on those premises.

34 “(9) If a winery licensee does not possess at a bonded premises within Oregon a valid producer
35 and blender basic permit issued by the federal Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau, the
36 licensee may exercise the privileges described in this section only for wine and cider brands that
37 are under the control of the licensee.

38 “(10) **The holder of a winery license that uses a third-party delivery facilitator to make**
39 **deliveries on behalf of the winery licensee is not responsible for ensuring that deliveries**
40 **made by the third-party delivery facilitator meet any requirements applicable to the deliv-**
41 **eries.**

42 “**SECTION 15.** ORS 471.227 is amended to read:

43 “471.227. (1) A grower sales privilege license shall allow the licensee to perform the following
44 activities only for fruit or grape wine or cider where all of the fruit or grapes used to make the
45 wine or cider are grown in Oregon under the control of the licensee **to:**

1 “(a) [To] Import, store, transport or export such wines or cider.

2 “(b) [To] Sell such wines or cider at wholesale to the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission
3 or licensees of the commission.

4 “(c) [To] Sell such wines or cider at retail directly to the consumer for consumption on or off
5 the licensed premises.

6 “(d) [To] Sell at retail for consumption off the licensed premises malt beverages and such wines
7 and cider in securely covered containers provided by the consumer and having capacities of not
8 more than two gallons each.

9 “(e) [To] Conduct some or all of the activities allowed under paragraphs (a) to (d) of this sub-
10 section at a second or third premises as may be designated by the commission.

11 “(f) [To] Obtain a special events grower sales privilege license which shall entitle the holder to
12 conduct the activities allowed under paragraphs (c) and (d) of this subsection at a designated lo-
13 cation other than the one set forth in the grower sales privilege license for a period not to exceed
14 five days.

15 “(2) A grower sales privilege licensee shall allow a patron to remove a partially consumed bottle
16 of wine from the licensed premises if the patron is not a minor and the patron is not visibly
17 intoxicated.

18 “(3) For purposes of ORS 471.392 to 471.400, a grower sales privilege licensee shall be consid-
19 ered a manufacturer.

20 “(4) A person holding a winery license in another state is not eligible for a license under this

31 “(8) **A grower sales privilege licensee that uses a third-party delivery facilitator to make**
32 **deliveries on behalf of the licensee is not responsible for ensuring that deliveries made by the**

35 “471.282. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter and except as provided by ORS
36 471.175, 471.178 and 471.186, a person may sell and ship malt beverages, wine or cider directly to a
37 resident of Oregon only if the person holds a direct shipper permit. The Oregon Liquor and Cannabis
38 Commission shall issue a direct shipper permit only to:

39 “(a) A person that holds a license issued by this state or another state that authorizes the
40 manufacture of malt beverages, wine or cider;

41 “(b) A person that holds a license issued by this state or another state that authorizes the sale
42 of wine or cider produced only from grapes or other fruit grown under the control of the person;

43 “(c) A person that holds a license authorizing the sale of malt beverages, wine or cider at retail;
44 or

45 “(d) A person that holds a temporary sales license under ORS 471.190, if the shipments of malt

1 beverages, wine or cider made by the person are delivered only during the term of validity of the
2 temporary sales license.

3 “(2) The holder of a direct shipper permit that is a licensee of another state may deliver malt
4 beverages under the permit only if that other state makes direct shipper permits, or the equivalent,
5 available for the delivery of malt beverages by persons holding a license issued by the commission
6 authorizing the manufacture or retail sale of malt beverages.

7 “(3)(a) A person may apply for a direct shipper permit by filing an application with the com-
8 mission in a form and manner prescribed by the commission.

9 “(b) If the application is based on a license issued by this state, the person shall include in the
10 application the number of the license issued to the person.

11 “(c) If the application is based on a license issued by another state, the person shall include in
12 the application a true copy of the license issued to the person by the other state or include sufficient
13 information to allow verification of the license by electronic means or other means acceptable to the

16 person described in subsection (1)(d) of this section, the person shall pay a \$100 registration fee and

29 “(6) A person holding a direct shipper permit shall take all actions necessary to ensure that a
30 carrier used by the permit holder does not deliver any malt beverages, wine or cider unless the

32 “(a) Obtains the signature of the recipient of the malt beverages, wine or cider upon delivery;

33 “(b) Verifies by inspecting government-issued photo identification that the recipient is at least
34 21 years of age; and

37 **make deliveries on behalf of the permit holder is not responsible for ensuring that deliveries**

40 “[7)(a)] (8)(a) A person holding a direct shipper permit shall report to the commission on a
41 quarterly basis all shipments of malt beverages, wine or cider made to Oregon residents under the
42 permit. The report must be made in a form prescribed by the commission.

43 “(b) A person holding a direct shipper permit shall allow the commission to audit the permit
44 holder’s records upon request and shall make those records available to the commission in this state.

45 “(c) A person holding a direct shipper permit consents to the jurisdiction of the commission and

1 the courts of this state for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this section and any related
2 laws or rules.

3 “[8)(a)] (9)(a) A person holding a direct shipper permit shall timely pay to the commission all
4 taxes imposed under ORS chapter 473 on malt beverages, wine and cider sold and shipped under the
5 permit. For the purpose of the privilege tax imposed under ORS chapter 473, all malt beverages,
6 wine or cider sold and shipped pursuant to a direct shipper permit is sold in this state.

12 “(b) If the person holds the permit based on an annual license issued by another state, the per-
13 son may renew the permit by paying a \$100 renewal fee and providing the commission with a true

15 allow verification of the license by electronic means or other means acceptable to the commission.

16 “(c) If the person holds the permit based on an annual license issued by this state, the person
17 may renew the permit at the same time that the person renews the license.

18 “[10)] (11) The commission may refuse to issue or may suspend or revoke a direct shipper per-
19 mit if the permit holder fails to comply with the provisions of this section. A person may sell and
20 ship malt beverages, wine or cider under a direct shipper permit only for as long as the person has
21 the license issued by this state or another state that authorizes the person to hold a direct shipper
22 permit. A direct shipper permit does not authorize the shipment of malt beverages by a permit
23 holder described in subsection (1)(b) of this section or lacking authority as provided under sub-

25 “[11)] (12) Any person who knowingly or negligently delivers malt beverages, wine or cider
26 under the provisions of this section to a person under 21 years of age, or who knowingly or
27 negligently delivers malt beverages, wine or cider under the provisions of this section to a visibly

29 “[12)] (13) A person may not make sales and shipments of malt beverages, wine or cider directly
30 to Oregon residents unless the person holds a direct shipper permit issued under this section. Any
31 person who knowingly makes, participates in, transports, imports or receives a shipment of malt
32 beverages, wine or cider that is in violation of this section commits a misdemeanor as provided in
33 ORS 471.990 (1).

34 “**SECTION 17.** ORS 471.346 is amended to read:

35 “471.346. (1)(a) The Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission shall by rule develop uniform
36 standards for minor decoy operations used to investigate licensees, **permittees**, [*and agents operat-*
37 *ing stores on behalf of the commission under ORS 471.750]* **agents appointed by the commission,**
38 **third-party delivery facilitators and any person delivering alcoholic beverages to final con-**
39 **sumers in this state** for violations of the laws of this state prohibiting sales **and deliveries** of al-
40 coholic beverages to minors.

41 “(b) Uniform standards established by the commission under this section apply to all investi-
42 gations conducted by the commission that use minor decoys. The commission shall encourage all law
43 enforcement agencies of this state to use the uniform standards established under this section for
44 minor decoy operations conducted by the law enforcement agencies.

45 “(2) To the greatest extent possible, the uniform standards established by the commission under

1 this section **must**:

2 “(a) [Shall] Be the same for minor decoy operations conducted by the commission and for minor
3 decoy operations conducted by law enforcement agencies of this state; and

4 “(b) [Shall] Provide for coordination between the commission and law enforcement agencies of
5 this state in conducting minor decoy operations.

32 **agent appointed by the commission, third-party delivery facilitator or a person delivering**
33 **alcoholic beverages to final consumers** for selling **or delivering** alcoholic beverages to a
34 minor[, *citation issued to a licensee for selling alcoholic beverages to a minor or conviction of a licensee*
35 *for selling alcoholic beverages to a minor*] if the complaint, citation or conviction arose out of a mi-

39 sale **or delivery** of alcoholic beverages to a minor that results from a minor decoy operation that

42 “(a) Imposing any civil penalty against a licensee, **permittee, agent appointed by the com-**
43 **mission, third-party delivery facilitator or a person delivering alcoholic beverages to final**
44 **consumers;**

45 “(b) Making a decision on the renewal, suspension or cancellation of a license, **permit, ap-**

1 **pointment or third-party delivery facilitator permit** issued under this chapter or **rules adopted**
2 **under this chapter; or**

3 “(c) Otherwise sanctioning a licensee, **permittee, agent appointed by the commission,**
4 **third-party delivery facilitator or a person delivering alcoholic beverages to final consumers**
5 for the sale **or delivery** of alcoholic beverages to a minor.

6 “(7) The commission shall give notice of the uniform standards established under this section to
7 all law enforcement agencies of this state that conduct minor decoy operations.

8 “**SECTION 18.** ORS 471.410 is amended to read:

9 “471.410. (1) A person may not sell, give or otherwise make available any alcoholic liquor to any
10 person who is visibly intoxicated.

11 “(2) [*No one*] **A person** other than the person’s parent or guardian may **not** sell, give or other-
12 wise make available any alcoholic liquor to a person under the age of 21 years. A parent or guard-
13 ian may give or otherwise make alcoholic liquor available to a person under the age of 21 years only
14 if the person is in a private residence and is accompanied by the parent or guardian. A person vio-
15 lates this subsection [*who*] **if the person** sells, gives or otherwise makes available alcoholic liquor
16 to a person with the knowledge that the person to whom the liquor is made available will violate
17 this subsection.

18 “(3)(a) A person who exercises control over private real property may not knowingly allow any
19 other person under the age of 21 years who is not a child or minor ward of the person to consume
20 alcoholic liquor on the property, or allow any other person under the age of 21 years who is not a
21 child or minor ward of the person to remain on the property if the person under the age of 21 years
22 consumes alcoholic liquor on the property.

23 “(b) This subsection:

24 “(A) Applies only to a person who is present and in control of the location at the time the
25 consumption occurs;

26 “(B) Does not apply to the owner of rental property, or the agent of an owner of rental property,
27 unless the consumption occurs in the individual unit in which the owner or agent resides; and

28 “(C) Does not apply to a person who exercises control over a private residence if the liquor
29 consumed by the person under the age of 21 years is supplied only by an accompanying parent or
30 guardian.

31 “(4) This section does not apply to sacramental wine given or provided as part of a religious rite
32 or service.

33 “(5) Except as provided in [*subsections (6) and (7)*] **subsection (6)** of this section, a person who
34 violates subsection (1) or (2) of this section commits a Class A misdemeanor. Upon violation of
35 subsection (2) of this section, the court shall impose at least a mandatory minimum sentence as
36 follows:

37 “(a) Upon a first conviction, a fine of at least \$500.

38 “(b) Upon a second conviction, a fine of at least \$1,000.

39 “(c) Upon a third or subsequent conviction, a fine of at least \$1,500 and not less than 30 days
40 of imprisonment.

41 “(6)(a) A person who violates subsection (2) of this section is subject to the provisions of this
42 subsection if the person does not act knowingly or intentionally and:

43 “(A) Is licensed or appointed under this chapter; [*or*]

44 “(B) Is an employee **or agent** of a person licensed or appointed under this chapter and [*holds*
45 *a valid service permit or has attended a program approved by the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Com-*

1 *mission that provides training to avoid violations of this section.] the employee or agent violates*
2 **subsection (2) of this section while acting on behalf or at the direction of the licensee or**
3 **person appointed under this chapter; or**

4 **“(C) Is a delivery person as defined in section 2 of this 2023 Act and was delivering alco-**
5 **holic beverages to a final consumer.**

6 “(b) For a person described in paragraph (a) of this subsection:

7 “(A) A first conviction is a Class A violation.

8 “(B) A second conviction is a specific fine violation, and the presumptive fine for the violation
9 is \$860.

10 “(C) A third conviction is a Class A misdemeanor. The court shall impose a mandatory fine of
11 not less than \$1,000.

12 “(D) A fourth or subsequent conviction is a Class A misdemeanor. The court shall impose a
13 mandatory fine of not less than \$1,000 and a mandatory sentence of not less than 30 days of
14 imprisonment.

15 “[7] *For an employee of an off-premises sales licensee who violates subsection (2) of this section*
16 *while operating a checkout device and does not act knowingly or intentionally, a first conviction is a*
17 *Class A violation.]*

18 “[8] (7) The court may waive an amount that is at least \$200 but not more than one-third of
19 the fine imposed under subsection (5) of this section, if the violator performs at least 30 hours of
20 community service.

21 “[9] (8) Except as provided in subsection [(8)] (7) of this section, the court may not waive or
22 suspend imposition or execution of the mandatory minimum sentence required by subsection (5) or
23 (6) of this section. In addition to the mandatory sentence, the court may require the violator to make
24 restitution for any damages to property where the alcoholic liquor was illegally consumed or may
25 require participation in volunteer service to a community service agency.

26 “[10)(a)] (9)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, a person who violates
27 subsection (3) of this section commits a Class A violation.

28 “(b) A second or subsequent violation of subsection (3) of this section is a specific fine violation,
29 and the presumptive fine for the violation is \$1,000.

30 “[11] (10) Nothing in this section prohibits any licensee under this chapter from allowing a
31 person who is visibly intoxicated to remain on the licensed premises so long as the person is not
32 sold or served any alcoholic liquor.

33 **“SECTION 19.** ORS 471.430 is amended to read:

34 **“471.430. (1)** A person under 21 years of age may not attempt to purchase, purchase or acquire
35 alcoholic beverages. Except when [*such*] a minor is in a private residence accompanied by the parent
36 or guardian of the minor and with [*such*] the parent’s or guardian’s consent, a person under 21 years
37 of age may not have personal possession of alcoholic beverages.

38 “(2) For the purposes of this section, personal possession of alcoholic beverages includes the
39 acceptance or consumption of a bottle of [*such*] alcoholic beverages, or any portion [*thereof*] or a
40 drink of [*such*] alcoholic beverages. However, this section does not prohibit the acceptance or con-
41 sumption by any person of sacramental wine as part of a religious rite or service.

42 “(3) Except as authorized by rule or as necessitated in an emergency, a person under 21 years
43 of age may not enter or attempt to enter any portion of a licensed premises that is posted or oth-
44 erwise identified as being prohibited to the use of minors.

45 “(4)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, a person who violates subsection

1 (1) or (3) of this section commits a Class B violation.

2 “(b) A person commits a Class A violation if the person violates subsection (1) of this section
3 by reason of personal possession of alcoholic beverages while the person is operating a motor ve-
4 hicle as defined in ORS 801.360.

5 “(c) Notwithstanding ORS 153.018, if a person who violates subsection (1) or (3) of this section
6 was under 18 years of age at the time of the violation, the court may not impose any fine for the
7 violation.

8 “(5) In addition to and not in lieu of any other penalty established by law:

9 “(a) The court may order a person who violates subsection (1) of this section through misrep-
10 resentation of age to perform community service; and

11 “(b) The court shall order, when a person violates subsection (1) of this section, that the
12 person’s driving privileges and right to apply for driving privileges be suspended pursuant to ORS
13 809.260 and 809.280. The court notification made to the Department of Transportation under this
14 paragraph may include a recommendation that the person be granted a hardship permit under ORS
15 807.240 if the person is otherwise eligible for the permit.

16 “(6) If a person cited under this section is at least 13 years of age but less than 21 years of age
17 at the time the person is found in default under ORS 153.102 or 419C.472 for failure to appear, in
18 addition to and not in lieu of any other penalty established by law, the court shall issue notice under
19 ORS 809.220 to the department for the department to suspend the person’s driving privileges under
20 ORS 809.280 (4).

21 “(7) In addition to and not in lieu of any penalty established by law, the court may order a
22 person who violates this section to undergo assessment and treatment as provided in ORS 471.432.
23 The court shall order a person to undergo assessment and treatment as provided in ORS 471.432 if
24 the person has previously been found to have violated this section.

25 “(8) The prohibitions of this section do not apply to a person under 21 years of age who is acting
26 under the direction of the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission or under the direction of state
27 or local law enforcement agencies for the purpose of investigating possible violations of laws pro-
28 hibiting sales of alcoholic beverages to persons who are under 21 years of age.

29 “(9) The prohibitions of this section do not apply to a person under 21 years of age who is acting
30 under the direction of a licensee, **an eligible business, as defined in section 2 of this 2023 Act,**
31 **or a third-party delivery facilitator, as defined in section 2 of this 2023 Act,** for the purpose
32 of investigating possible violations by employees **or agents** of the licensee, **eligible business or**
33 **third-party delivery facilitator** of laws prohibiting sales **or deliveries** of alcoholic beverages to
34 persons who are under 21 years of age.

35 “(10)(a) A person under 21 years of age is not in violation of, and is immune from prosecution
36 under, this section if:

37 “(A) The person contacted emergency medical services or a law enforcement agency in order
38 to obtain medical assistance for another person who was in need of medical assistance due to alco-
39 hol consumption and the evidence of the violation was obtained as a result of the person’s having
40 contacted emergency medical services or a law enforcement agency; or

41 “(B) The person was in need of medical assistance due to alcohol consumption and the evidence
42 of the violation was obtained as a result of the person’s having sought or obtained the medical as-
43 sistance.

44 “(b) Paragraph (a) of this subsection does not exclude the use of evidence obtained as a result
45 of a person’s having sought medical assistance in proceedings for crimes or offenses other than a

1 violation of this section.

2 **“SECTION 20. (1) Sections 2 to 7 of this 2023 Act and the amendments to ORS 471.175,**
3 **471.178, 471.186, 471.190, 471.200, 471.221, 471.223, 471.227, 471.282, 471.346, 471.410 and 471.430**
4 **by sections 8 to 19 of this 2023 Act become operative on January 1, 2024.**

5 **“(2) The Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission may take any action before the oper-**
6 **ative date specified in subsection (1) of this section that is necessary to enable the commis-**
7 **sion to exercise, on and after the operative date specified in subsection (1) of this section,**
8 **all of the duties, functions and powers conferred on the commission by sections 2 to 7 of this**
9 **2023 Act and the amendments to ORS 471.175, 471.178, 471.186, 471.190, 471.200, 471.221,**
10 **471.223, 471.227, 471.282, 471.346, 471.410 and 471.430 by sections 8 to 19 of this 2023 Act.**

11 **“SECTION 21. This 2023 Act takes effect on the 91st day after the date on which the 2023**
12 **regular session of the Eighty-second Legislative Assembly adjourns sine die.”**
