## B-Engrossed House Bill 3395

Ordered by the Senate June 23  
Including House Amendments dated June 13 and Senate Amendments  
dated June 23 to resolve conflicts

Sponsored by Representatives RAYFIELD, DEXTER, GOMBERG, Senator JAMA; Representatives ANDERSEN, NELSON, Senator ANDERSON

### SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Allows affordable housing on lands zoned for commercial uses within urban growth boundaries.

Allows local governments to extend decision-making period for application to develop residential structures within urban growth boundary or to reconsider land use decision for development of residential structures.

Makes permanent requirements that local governments allow siting of certain emergency shelters, conditioned upon latest estimates of percentage of individuals experiencing homelessness. Awards attorney fees for certain appeals of emergency shelter application.

Requires Department of Consumer and Business Services to update Oregon Structural Specialty Code to allow additional single-exit residential occupancies.

Exempts certain affordable housing from Oregon Planned Community Act.

Restricts local governments' ability to regulate condominium form of ownership.

Requires cities or counties to accept funding letters to affordable housing developers as sufficient assurances needed to approve subdivision plat.

Requires local governments to allow certain single room occupancies in residential zones. Amends definition of "needed housing" to include single room occupancies.

Requires more cities to allow duplexes on certain lands zoned to allow single-family dwellings. Updates deadlines for compliance by affected cities and appropriates moneys from General Fund to Department of Land Conservation and Development to provide grants for support.

Provides process and form by which associations may amend declarations and bylaws of planned community or condominium to remove unlawfully discriminatory provisions. Extends until December 31, 2024, deadline by which associations must review declarations and bylaws.

Allows Public Utility Commission to allow public utility to sell or convey real property for affordable housing.

Requires Department of Human Services to provide financial support to nonprofits to provide affordable housing for low-income college students. Sunsets January 2, 2026.

Requires Housing and Community Services Department to provide grants for urban community housing supporting agricultural employees. Sunsets January 2, 2028.

Requires Oregon Department of Administrative Services to provide grants for regional housing coordination and to local governments to support development of needed housing. Sunsets January 2, 2034.

Requires Housing and Community Services Department to make grant to Network for Oregon Affordable Housing to provide low-interest loans to purchasers of homes with limited equity. Sunsets January 2, 2026. Requires department to report on use of loan fund to interim committee of Legislative Assembly by September 15, 2025, and September 15, 2027.

Requires Housing and Community Services Department to provide grants for housing. Sunsets January 2, 2026.

Amends allowable purposes of Emergency Housing Account to include account moneys to be used for grants to assist companion animals of individuals experiencing or at risk of homelessness.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

**Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

**RESIDENTIAL USE OF COMMERCIAL LANDS**

**SECTION 1.** Section 2 of this 2023 Act is added to and made a part of ORS 197.286 to 197.314.

**SECTION 2.** (1) Notwithstanding an acknowledged comprehensive plan or land use regulations, within an urban growth boundary a local government shall allow, on lands zoned to allow only commercial uses and not industrial uses, the siting and development of:

(a) Residential structures subject to an affordable housing covenant as provided in ORS 456.270 to 456.295 making each unit affordable to a household with income less than or equal to 60 percent of the area median income as defined in ORS 456.270; or

(b) Mixed use structures with ground floor commercial units and residential units subject to an affordable housing covenant as provided in ORS 456.270 to 456.295 making the properties affordable to moderate income households, as defined in ORS 456.270.

(2) The local government may only apply those approval standards, conditions and procedures under ORS 197.307, that would be applicable to the residential zone of the local government that is most comparable in density to the allowed commercial uses.

(3) Development under this section does not:

(a) Trigger any requirement that a local government consider or update an analysis as required by a statewide planning goal relating to economic development.

(b) Apply on lands where the local government determines that:

(A) The development on the property cannot be adequately served by water, sewer, storm water drainage or streets, or will not be adequately served at the time that development on the lot is complete;

(B) The property contains a slope of 25 percent or greater;

(C) The property is within a 100-year floodplain; or

(D) The development of the property is constrained by land use regulations based on statewide land use planning goals relating to:

(i) Natural disasters and hazards; or

(ii) Natural resources, including air, water, land or natural areas, but not including open spaces.

(c) Apply on lands that are vacant or that were added to the urban growth boundary within the last 15 years.

**RESIDENTIAL APPROVAL PROCEDURES**

**SECTION 3.** ORS 215.427 is amended to read:

215.427. (1) Except as provided in subsections (3), (5) and (10) of this section, for land within an urban growth boundary and applications for mineral aggregate extraction, the governing body of a county or its designee shall take final action on an application for a permit, limited land use decision or zone change, including resolution of all appeals under ORS 215.422, within 120 days after the application is deemed complete. The governing body of a county or its designee shall take final

1 action on all other applications for a permit, limited land use decision or zone change, including  
2 resolution of all appeals under ORS 215.422, within 150 days after the application is deemed com-  
3 plete, except as provided in subsections (3), (5) and (10) of this section.

4 (2) If an application for a permit, limited land use decision or zone change is incomplete, the  
5 governing body or its designee shall notify the applicant in writing of exactly what information is  
6 missing within 30 days of receipt of the application and allow the applicant to submit the missing  
7 information. The application shall be deemed complete for the purpose of subsection (1) of this sec-  
8 tion and ORS 197.311 upon receipt by the governing body or its designee of:

9 (a) All of the missing information;

10 (b) Some of the missing information and written notice from the applicant that no other infor-  
11 mation will be provided; or

12 (c) Written notice from the applicant that none of the missing information will be provided.

13 (3)(a) If the application was complete when first submitted or the applicant submits additional  
14 information, as described in subsection (2) of this section, within 180 days of the date the application  
15 was first submitted and the county has a comprehensive plan and land use regulations acknowledged  
16 under ORS 197.251, approval or denial of the application shall be based upon the standards and  
17 criteria that were applicable at the time the application was first submitted.

18 (b) If the application is for industrial or traded sector development of a site identified under  
19 section 12, chapter 800, Oregon Laws 2003, and proposes an amendment to the comprehensive plan,  
20 approval or denial of the application must be based upon the standards and criteria that were ap-  
21 plicable at the time the application was first submitted, provided the application complies with  
22 paragraph (a) of this subsection.

23 (4) On the 181st day after first being submitted, the application is void if the applicant has been  
24 notified of the missing information as required under subsection (2) of this section and has not sub-  
25 mitted:

26 (a) All of the missing information;

27 (b) Some of the missing information and written notice that no other information will be pro-  
28 vided; or

29 (c) Written notice that none of the missing information will be provided.

30 (5) The period set in subsection (1) of this section or the 100-day period set in ORS 197.311 may  
31 be extended for a specified period of time at the written request of the applicant. The total of all  
32 extensions, except as provided in subsection (10) of this section for mediation, may not exceed 215  
33 days.

34 (6) The period set in subsection (1) of this section applies:

35 (a) Only to decisions wholly within the authority and control of the governing body of the  
36 county; and

37 (b) Unless the parties have agreed to mediation as described in subsection (10) of this section  
38 or ORS 197.319 (2)(b).

39 (7) Notwithstanding subsection (6) of this section, the period set in subsection (1) of this section  
40 and the 100-day period set in ORS 197.311 do not apply to:

41 (a) A decision of the county making a change to an acknowledged comprehensive plan or a land  
42 use regulation that is submitted to the Director of the Department of Land Conservation and De-  
43 velopment under ORS 197.610[.]; or

44 (b) A decision of a county involving an application for the development of residential  
45 structures within an urban growth boundary, where the county has tentatively approved the

1 **application and extends these periods by no more than seven days in order to assure the**  
2 **sufficiency of its final order.**

3 (8) Except when an applicant requests an extension under subsection (5) of this section, if the  
4 governing body of the county or its designee does not take final action on an application for a  
5 permit, limited land use decision or zone change within 120 days or 150 days, as applicable, after  
6 the application is deemed complete, the county shall refund to the applicant either the unexpended  
7 portion of any application fees or deposits previously paid or 50 percent of the total amount of such  
8 fees or deposits, whichever is greater. The applicant is not liable for additional governmental fees  
9 incurred subsequent to the payment of such fees or deposits. However, the applicant is responsible  
10 for the costs of providing sufficient additional information to address relevant issues identified in  
11 the consideration of the application.

12 (9) A county may not compel an applicant to waive the period set in subsection (1) of this sec-  
13 tion or to waive the provisions of subsection (8) of this section or ORS 197.311 or 215.429 as a  
14 condition for taking any action on an application for a permit, limited land use decision or zone  
15 change except when such applications are filed concurrently and considered jointly with a plan  
16 amendment.

17 (10) The periods set forth in subsections (1) and (5) of this section and ORS 197.311 may be ex-  
18 tended by up to 90 additional days, if the applicant and the county agree that a dispute concerning  
19 the application will be mediated.

20 **SECTION 4.** ORS 227.178 is amended to read:

21 227.178. (1) Except as provided in subsections (3), (5) and (11) of this section, the governing body  
22 of a city or its designee shall take final action on an application for a permit, limited land use de-  
23 cision or zone change, including resolution of all appeals under ORS 227.180, within 120 days after  
24 the application is deemed complete.

25 (2) If an application for a permit, limited land use decision or zone change is incomplete, the  
26 governing body or its designee shall notify the applicant in writing of exactly what information is  
27 missing within 30 days of receipt of the application and allow the applicant to submit the missing  
28 information. The application shall be deemed complete for the purpose of subsection (1) of this sec-  
29 tion or ORS 197.311 upon receipt by the governing body or its designee of:

- 30 (a) All of the missing information;  
31 (b) Some of the missing information and written notice from the applicant that no other infor-  
32 mation will be provided; or  
33 (c) Written notice from the applicant that none of the missing information will be provided.

34 (3)(a) If the application was complete when first submitted or the applicant submits the re-  
35 quested additional information within 180 days of the date the application was first submitted and  
36 the city has a comprehensive plan and land use regulations acknowledged under ORS 197.251, ap-  
37 proval or denial of the application shall be based upon the standards and criteria that were appli-  
38 cable at the time the application was first submitted.

39 (b) If the application is for industrial or traded sector development of a site identified under  
40 section 12, chapter 800, Oregon Laws 2003, and proposes an amendment to the comprehensive plan,  
41 approval or denial of the application must be based upon the standards and criteria that were ap-  
42 plicable at the time the application was first submitted, provided the application complies with  
43 paragraph (a) of this subsection.

44 (4) On the 181st day after first being submitted, the application is void if the applicant has been  
45 notified of the missing information as required under subsection (2) of this section and has not sub-

1 mitted:

2 (a) All of the missing information;

3 (b) Some of the missing information and written notice that no other information will be pro-  
4 vided; or

5 (c) Written notice that none of the missing information will be provided.

6 (5) The 120-day period set in subsection (1) of this section or the 100-day period set in ORS  
7 197.311 may be extended for a specified period of time at the written request of the applicant. The  
8 total of all extensions, except as provided in subsection (11) of this section for mediation, may not  
9 exceed 245 days.

10 (6) The 120-day period set in subsection (1) of this section applies:

11 (a) Only to decisions wholly within the authority and control of the governing body of the city;  
12 and

13 (b) Unless the parties have agreed to mediation as described in subsection (11) of this section  
14 or ORS 197.319 (2)(b).

15 (7) Notwithstanding subsection (6) of this section, the 120-day period set in subsection (1) of this  
16 section and the 100-day period set in ORS 197.311 do not apply to:

17 (a) A decision of the city making a change to an acknowledged comprehensive plan or a land  
18 use regulation that is submitted to the Director of the Department of Land Conservation and De-  
19 velopment under ORS 197.610[.]; or

20 (b) **A decision of a city involving an application for the development of residential struc-**  
21 **tures within an urban growth boundary, where the city has tentatively approved the appli-**  
22 **cation and extends these periods by no more than seven days in order to assure the**  
23 **sufficiency of its final order.**

24 (8) Except when an applicant requests an extension under subsection (5) of this section, if the  
25 governing body of the city or its designee does not take final action on an application for a permit,  
26 limited land use decision or zone change within 120 days after the application is deemed complete,  
27 the city shall refund to the applicant, subject to the provisions of subsection (9) of this section, ei-  
28 ther the unexpended portion of any application fees or deposits previously paid or 50 percent of the  
29 total amount of such fees or deposits, whichever is greater. The applicant is not liable for additional  
30 governmental fees incurred subsequent to the payment of such fees or deposits. However, the ap-  
31 plicant is responsible for the costs of providing sufficient additional information to address relevant  
32 issues identified in the consideration of the application.

33 (9)(a) To obtain a refund under subsection (8) of this section, the applicant may either:

34 (A) Submit a written request for payment, either by mail or in person, to the city or its designee;  
35 or

36 (B) Include the amount claimed in a mandamus petition filed under ORS 227.179. The court shall  
37 award an amount owed under this section in its final order on the petition.

38 (b) Within seven calendar days of receiving a request for a refund, the city or its designee shall  
39 determine the amount of any refund owed. Payment, or notice that no payment is due, shall be made  
40 to the applicant within 30 calendar days of receiving the request. Any amount due and not paid  
41 within 30 calendar days of receipt of the request shall be subject to interest charges at the rate of  
42 one percent per month, or a portion thereof.

43 (c) If payment due under paragraph (b) of this subsection is not paid within 120 days after the  
44 city or its designee receives the refund request, the applicant may file an action for recovery of the  
45 unpaid refund. In an action brought by a person under this paragraph, the court shall award to a

1 prevailing applicant, in addition to the relief provided in this section, reasonable attorney fees and  
2 costs at trial and on appeal. If the city or its designee prevails, the court shall award reasonable  
3 attorney fees and costs at trial and on appeal if the court finds the petition to be frivolous.

4 (10) A city may not compel an applicant to waive the 120-day period set in subsection (1) of this  
5 section or to waive the provisions of subsection (8) of this section or ORS 197.311 or 227.179 as a  
6 condition for taking any action on an application for a permit, limited land use decision or zone  
7 change except when such applications are filed concurrently and considered jointly with a plan  
8 amendment.

9 (11) The periods set forth in subsections (1) and (5) of this section and ORS 197.311 may be ex-  
10 tended by up to 90 additional days, if the applicant and the city agree that a dispute concerning the  
11 application will be mediated.

12 **SECTION 5.** ORS 197.830 is amended to read:

13 197.830. (1) Review of land use decisions or limited land use decisions under ORS 197.830 to  
14 197.845 shall be commenced by filing a notice of intent to appeal with the Land Use Board of Ap-  
15 peals.

16 (2) Except as provided in ORS 197.620, a person may petition the board for review of a land use  
17 decision or limited land use decision if the person:

18 (a) Filed a notice of intent to appeal the decision as provided in subsection (1) of this section;  
19 and

20 (b) Appeared before the local government, special district or state agency orally or in writing.

21 (3) If a local government makes a land use decision without providing a hearing, except as  
22 provided under ORS 215.416 (11) or 227.175 (10), or the local government makes a land use decision  
23 that is different from the proposal described in the notice of hearing to such a degree that the notice  
24 of the proposed action did not reasonably describe the local government's final actions, a person  
25 adversely affected by the decision may appeal the decision to the board under this section:

26 (a) Within 21 days of actual notice where notice is required; or

27 (b) Within 21 days of the date a person knew or should have known of the decision where no  
28 notice is required.

29 (4) If a local government makes a land use decision without a hearing pursuant to ORS 215.416  
30 (11) or 227.175 (10):

31 (a) A person who was not provided notice of the decision as required under ORS 215.416 (11)(c)  
32 or 227.175 (10)(c) may appeal the decision to the board under this section within 21 days of receiving  
33 actual notice of the decision.

34 (b) A person who is not entitled to notice under ORS 215.416 (11)(c) or 227.175 (10)(c) but who  
35 is adversely affected or aggrieved by the decision may appeal the decision to the board under this  
36 section within 21 days after the expiration of the period for filing a local appeal of the decision es-  
37 tablished by the local government under ORS 215.416 (11)(a) or 227.175 (10)(a).

38 (c) A person who receives notice of a decision made without a hearing under ORS 215.416 (11)  
39 or 227.175 (10) may appeal the decision to the board under this section within 21 days of receiving  
40 actual notice of the nature of the decision, if the notice of the decision did not reasonably describe  
41 the nature of the decision.

42 (d) Except as provided in paragraph (c) of this subsection, a person who receives notice of a  
43 decision made without a hearing under ORS 215.416 (11) or 227.175 (10) may not appeal the decision  
44 to the board under this section.

45 (5) If a local government makes a limited land use decision which is different from the proposal

1 described in the notice to such a degree that the notice of the proposed action did not reasonably  
2 describe the local government's final actions, a person adversely affected by the decision may appeal  
3 the decision to the board under this section:

4 (a) Within 21 days of actual notice where notice is required; or

5 (b) Within 21 days of the date a person knew or should have known of the decision where no  
6 notice is required.

7 (6) The appeal periods described in subsections (3), (4) and (5) of this section:

8 (a) May not exceed three years after the date of the decision, except as provided in paragraph  
9 (b) of this subsection.

10 (b) May not exceed 10 years after the date of the decision if notice of a hearing or an adminis-  
11 trative decision made pursuant to ORS 197.195 or 197.797 is required but has not been provided.

12 (7)(a) Within 21 days after a notice of intent to appeal has been filed with the board under  
13 subsection (1) of this section, any person described in paragraph (b) of this subsection may intervene  
14 in and be made a party to the review proceeding by filing a motion to intervene and by paying a  
15 filing fee of \$100.

16 (b) Persons who may intervene in and be made a party to the review proceedings, as set forth  
17 in subsection (1) of this section, are:

18 (A) The applicant who initiated the action before the local government, special district or state  
19 agency; or

20 (B) Persons who appeared before the local government, special district or state agency, orally  
21 or in writing.

22 (c) Failure to comply with the deadline or to pay the filing fee set forth in paragraph (a) of this  
23 subsection shall result in denial of a motion to intervene.

24 (8) If a state agency whose order, rule, ruling, policy or other action is at issue is not a party  
25 to the proceeding, it may file a brief with the board as if it were a party. The brief shall be due on  
26 the same date the respondent's brief is due and shall be accompanied by a filing fee of \$100.

27 (9) A notice of intent to appeal a land use decision or limited land use decision shall be filed  
28 not later than 21 days after the date the decision sought to be reviewed becomes final. A notice of  
29 intent to appeal plan and land use regulation amendments processed pursuant to ORS 197.610 to  
30 197.625 shall be filed not later than 21 days after notice of the decision sought to be reviewed is  
31 mailed or otherwise submitted to parties entitled to notice under ORS 197.615. Failure to include a  
32 statement identifying when, how and to whom notice was provided under ORS 197.615 does not  
33 render the notice defective. Copies of the notice of intent to appeal shall be served upon the local  
34 government, special district or state agency and the applicant of record, if any, in the local gov-  
35 ernment, special district or state agency proceeding. The notice shall be served and filed in the form  
36 and manner prescribed by rule of the board and shall be accompanied by a filing fee of \$300. If a  
37 petition for review is not filed with the board as required in subsections (10) and (11) of this section,  
38 the board shall award the filing fee to the local government, special district or state agency.

39 (10)(a) Within 21 days after service of the notice of intent to appeal, the local government, spe-  
40 cial district or state agency shall transmit to the board the original or a certified copy of the entire  
41 record of the proceeding under review. By stipulation of all parties to the review proceeding the  
42 record may be shortened. The board may require or permit subsequent corrections to the record;  
43 however, the board shall issue an order on a motion objecting to the record within 60 days of re-  
44 ceiving the motion. If the board denies a petitioner's objection to the record, the board may establish  
45 a new deadline for the petition for review to be filed that may not be less than 14 days from the

1 later of the original deadline for the brief or the date of denial of the petitioner's record objection.

2 (b) Within 10 days after service of a notice of intent to appeal, the board shall provide notice  
3 to the petitioner and the respondent of their option to enter into mediation pursuant to ORS 197.860.  
4 Any person moving to intervene shall be provided such notice within seven days after a motion to  
5 intervene is filed. The notice required by this paragraph shall be accompanied by a statement that  
6 mediation information or assistance may be obtained from the Department of Land Conservation and  
7 Development.

8 (11) A petition for review of the land use decision or limited land use decision and supporting  
9 brief shall be filed with the board as required by the board under subsection (13) of this section.

10 (12) The petition shall include a copy of the decision sought to be reviewed and shall state:

11 (a) The facts that establish that the petitioner has standing.

12 (b) The date of the decision.

13 (c) The issues the petitioner seeks to have reviewed.

14 (13)(a) The board shall adopt rules establishing deadlines for filing petitions and briefs and for  
15 oral argument.

16 (b) **The local government or state agency may withdraw its decision for purposes of re-**  
17 **consideration** at any time:

18 (A) Subsequent to the filing of a notice of intent; and

19 (B) Prior to:

20 (i) The date set for filing the record[,]; or[,]

21 (ii) On appeal of a decision under ORS 197.610 to 197.625 **or relating to the development of**  
22 **a residential structure**, [*prior to*] the filing of the respondent's brief[, *the local government or state*  
23 *agency may withdraw its decision for purposes of reconsideration*].

24 (c) If a local government or state agency withdraws an order for purposes of reconsideration,  
25 it shall, within such time as the board may allow, affirm, modify or reverse its decision. If the  
26 petitioner is dissatisfied with the local government or agency action after withdrawal for purposes  
27 of reconsideration, the petitioner may refile the notice of intent and the review shall proceed upon  
28 the revised order. An amended notice of intent is not required if the local government or state  
29 agency, on reconsideration, affirms the order or modifies the order with only minor changes.

30 (14) The board shall issue a final order within 77 days after the date of transmittal of the record.  
31 If the order is not issued within 77 days the applicant may apply in Marion County or the circuit  
32 court of the county where the application was filed for a writ of mandamus to compel the board to  
33 issue a final order.

34 (15) Upon entry of its final order, the board:

35 (a) May, in its discretion, award costs to the prevailing party including the cost of preparation  
36 of the record if the prevailing party is the local government, special district or state agency whose  
37 decision is under review.

38 (b) Shall award reasonable attorney fees and expenses to the prevailing party against any other  
39 party who the board finds presented a position or filed any motion without probable cause to believe  
40 the position or motion was well-founded in law or on factually supported information.

41 (c) Shall award costs and attorney fees to a party as provided in ORS 197.843.

42 (16) Orders issued under this section may be enforced in appropriate judicial proceedings.

43 (17)(a) The board shall provide for the publication of its orders that are of general public in-  
44 terest in the form it deems best adapted for public convenience. The publications shall constitute  
45 the official reports of the board.



1 (b) Any moneys collected or received from sales by the board shall be paid into the Board  
2 Publications Account established by ORS 197.832.

3 (18) Except for any sums collected for publication of board opinions, all fees collected by the  
4 board under this section that are not awarded as costs shall be paid over to the State Treasurer to  
5 be credited to the General Fund.

6 (19) The board shall track and report on its website:

7 (a) The number of reviews commenced, as described in subsection (1) of this section, the number  
8 of reviews commenced for which a petition is filed under subsection (2) of this section and, in re-  
9 lation to each of those numbers, the rate at which the reviews result in a decision of the board to  
10 uphold, reverse or remand the land use decision or limited land use decision. The board shall track  
11 and report reviews under this paragraph in categories established by the board.

12 (b) A list of petitioners, the number of reviews commenced and the rate at which the petitioner's  
13 reviews have resulted in decisions of the board to uphold, reverse or remand the land use decision  
14 or limited land use decision.

15 (c) A list of respondents, the number of reviews involving each respondent and the rate at which  
16 reviews involving the respondent have resulted in decisions of the board to uphold, reverse or re-  
17 mand the land use decision or limited land use decision. Additionally, when a respondent is the local  
18 government that made the land use decision or limited land use decision, the board shall track

27 **47, Oregon Laws 2022, is repealed.**

28 **SECTION 7.** Section 3, chapter 18, Oregon Laws 2021, is amended to read:

29 **Sec. 3.** (1) A local government shall approve an application for the development or use of land  
30 for an emergency shelter, as defined in [*section 2 of this 2021 Act*] **ORS 197.782**, on any property,  
31 notwithstanding **this chapter or** ORS chapter 195, [197,] 197A, 215 or 227 or any statewide [*plan*]  
32 **land use planning goal**, rule of the Land Conservation and Development Commission or local land  
33 use regulation, zoning ordinance, regional framework plan, functional plan or comprehensive plan,  
34 if the emergency shelter:

35 (a) Includes sleeping and restroom facilities for clients;

36 (b) Will comply with applicable building codes;

37 (c) Is located inside an urban growth boundary or in an area zoned for rural residential use as  
38 defined in ORS 215.501;

39 (d) Will not result in the development of a new building that is sited within an area designated  
40 under a statewide planning goal relating to natural disasters and hazards, including flood plains or  
41 mapped environmental health hazards, unless the development complies with regulations directly  
42 related to the hazard;

43 (e) Has adequate transportation access to commercial and medical services; and

44 (f) Will not pose any unreasonable risk to public health or safety.

45 (2) An emergency shelter allowed under this section must be operated by:

- 1 (a) A local government as defined in ORS 174.116;
- 2 (b) An organization with at least two years' experience operating an emergency shelter using  
3 best practices that is:
- 4 (A) A local housing authority as defined in ORS 456.375;
- 5 (B) A religious corporation as defined in ORS 65.001; or
- 6 (C) A public benefit corporation, as defined in ORS 65.001, whose charitable purpose includes  
7 the support of homeless individuals, that has been recognized as exempt from income tax under  
8 section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code *[on or before January 1, 2018]* **for at least three years**  
9 **before the date of the application for a shelter;** or
- 10 (c) A nonprofit corporation partnering with any other entity described in this subsection.
- 11 (3) An emergency shelter approved under this section:
- 12 (a) May provide on-site for its clients and at no cost to the clients:
- 13 (A) Showering or bathing;
- 14 (B) Storage for personal property;
- 15 (C) Laundry facilities;
- 16 (D) Service of food prepared on-site or off-site;
- 17 (E) Recreation areas for children and pets;
- 18 (F) Case management services for housing, financial, vocational, educational or physical or be-  
19 havioral health care services; or
- 20 (G) Any other services incidental to shelter.
- 21 (b) May include youth shelters, winter or warming shelters, day shelters and family violence  
22 shelter homes as defined in ORS 409.290.
- 23 (4) An emergency shelter approved under this section may also provide additional services not  
24 described in subsection (3) of this section to individuals who are transitioning from unsheltered  
25 homeless status. An organization providing services under this subsection may charge a fee of no  
26 more than \$300 per month per client and only to clients who are financially able to pay the fee and  
27 who request the services.
- 28 (5)(a) The approval **or denial** of an emergency shelter under this section **may be made without**  
29 **a hearing. Whether or not a hearing is held, the approval or denial** is not a land use decision  
30 and is subject to review only under ORS 34.010 to 34.100.
- 31 (b) **A reviewing court shall award attorney fees to:**
- 32 (A) **A local government, and any intervening applicant, that prevails on the appeal of a**  
33 **local government's approval; and**
- 34 (B) **An applicant that prevails on an appeal of a local government's denial.**

42 **SINGLE EXIT MULTIFAMILY DWELLINGS**  
43

44 **SECTION 8. On or before October 1, 2025, the Department of Consumer and Business**  
45 **Services shall review and consider updates to the State of Oregon Structural Specialty Code**

1 through the Building Codes Structures Board established under ORS 455.132, to allow a res-  
2 idential occupancy to be served by a single exit, consistent with the following policies of this  
3 state:

4 (1) The reduction, to the extent practicable, of costs and barriers to the construction of

22 (2) "Blanket encumbrance" means a trust deed or mortgage or any other lien or encumbrance,  
23 mechanic's lien or otherwise, securing or evidencing the payment of money and affecting more than  
24 one lot in a planned community, or an agreement affecting more than one lot by which the developer  
25 holds such planned community under an option, contract to sell or trust agreement.

26 (3) "Class I planned community" means a planned community that:

27 (a) Contains at least 13 lots or in which the declarant has reserved the right to increase the  
28 total number of lots beyond 12; and

29 (b) Has an estimated annual assessment, including an amount required for reserves under ORS  
30 94.595, exceeding \$10,000 for all lots or \$100 per lot based on:

31 (A) For a planned community created on or after January 1, 2002, the initial estimated annual  
32 assessment, including a constructive assessment based on a subsidy of the association through a  
33 contribution of funds, goods or services by the declarant; or

34 (B) For a planned community created before January 1, 2002, a reasonable estimate of the cost  
35 of fulfilling existing obligations imposed by the declaration, bylaws or other governing document as  
36 of January 1, 2002.

37 (4) "Class II planned community" means a planned community that:

38 (a) Is not a Class I planned community;

39 (b) Contains at least five lots; and

40 (c) Has an estimated annual assessment exceeding \$1,000 for all lots based on:

41 (A) For a planned community created on or after January 1, 2002, the initial estimated annual  
42 assessment, including a constructive assessment based on a subsidy of the association through a  
43 contribution of funds, goods or services by the declarant; or

44 (B) For a planned community created before January 1, 2002, a reasonable estimate of the cost  
45 of fulfilling existing obligations imposed by the declaration, bylaws or other governing document as

1 of January 1, 2002.

2 (5) "Class III planned community" means a planned community that is not a Class I or II  
3 planned community.

4 (6) "Common expenses" means expenditures made by or financial liabilities incurred by the  
5 homeowners association and includes any allocations to the reserve account under ORS 94.595.

6 (7) "Common property" means any real property or interest in real property within a planned  
7 community which is owned, held or leased by the homeowners association or owned as tenants in  
8 common by the lot owners, or designated in the declaration or the plat for transfer to the associ-  
9 ation.

10 (8) "Condominium" means property submitted to the provisions of ORS chapter 100.

11 (9) "Declarant" means any person who creates a planned community under ORS 94.550 to 94.783.

12 (10) "Declarant control" means any special declarant right relating to administrative control of  
13 a homeowners association, including but not limited to:

14 (a) The right of the declarant or person designated by the declarant to appoint or remove an  
15 officer or a member of the board of directors;

16 (b) Any weighted vote or special voting right granted to a declarant or to units owned by the  
17 declarant so that the declarant will hold a majority of the voting rights in the association by virtue  
18 of such weighted vote or special voting right; and

19 (c) The right of the declarant to exercise powers and responsibilities otherwise assigned by the  
20 declaration or bylaws or by the provisions of ORS 94.550 to 94.783 to the association, officers of the  
21 association or board of directors of the association.

22 (11) "Declaration" means the instrument described in ORS 94.580 which establishes a planned  
23 community, and any amendments to the instrument.

24 (12) "Electric vehicle charging station" or "charging station" means a facility designed to de-  
25 liver electrical current for the purpose of charging one or more electric motor vehicles.

26 (13) "Electronic meeting" means a meeting that is conducted through telephone, teleconference,  
27 video conference, web conference or any other live electronic means where at least one participant  
28 is not physically present.

29 (14) "Governing document" means articles of incorporation, bylaws, a declaration or a rule,  
30 regulation or resolution that was properly adopted by the homeowners association or any other in-  
31 strument or plat relating to common ownership or common maintenance of a portion of a planned  
32 community that is binding upon lots within the planned community.

33 (15) "Governing entity" means an incorporated or unincorporated association, committee, person  
34 or any other entity that has authority under a governing document to maintain commonly main-  
35 tained property, to impose assessments on lots or to act on matters of common concern on behalf  
36 of lot owners within the planned community.

37 (16) "Homeowners association" or "association" means the organization of owners of lots in a  
38 planned community, created under ORS 94.625, required by a governing document or formed under  
39 ORS 94.574.

40 (17) "Majority" or "majority of votes" or "majority of owners" means more than 50 percent of  
41 the votes in the planned community.

42 (18) "Mortgagee" means any person who is:

43 (a) A mortgagee under a mortgage;

44 (b) A beneficiary under a trust deed; or

45 (c) The vendor under a land sale contract.

1 (19) "Owner" means the owner of any lot in a planned community, unless otherwise specified,  
2 but does not include a person holding only a security interest in a lot.

3 (20) "Percent of owners" or "percentage of owners" means the owners representing the specified  
4 voting rights as determined under ORS 94.658.

5 (21)(a) "Planned community" means any subdivision under ORS 92.010 to 92.192 that results in  
6 a pattern of ownership of real property and all the buildings, improvements and rights located on  
7 or belonging to the real property, in which the owners collectively are responsible for the mainte-  
8 nance, operation, insurance or other expenses relating to any property within the planned commu-  
9 nity, including common property, if any, or for the exterior maintenance of any property that is  
10 individually owned.

11 (b) "Planned community" does not mean:

12 (A) A condominium under ORS chapter 100;

13 (B) A subdivision that is exclusively commercial or industrial; *[or]*

14 (C) A timeshare plan under ORS 94.803 to 94.945[.]; **or**

15 **(D) A development established on or after January 1, 2024, in which each residential unit**  
16 **is either:**

17 **(i) Subject to an affordability restriction, including an affordable housing covenant, as**  
18 **defined in ORS 456.270; or**

19 **(ii) Owned by a public benefit or religious nonprofit corporation.**

20 (22) "Purchaser" means any person other than a declarant who, by means of a voluntary trans-  
21 fer, acquires a legal or equitable interest in a lot, other than as security for an obligation.

22 (23) "Purchaser for resale" means any person who purchases from the declarant more than two  
23 lots for the purpose of resale whether or not the purchaser for resale makes improvements to the  
24 lots before reselling them.

25 (24) "Recorded declaration" means an instrument recorded with the recording officer of the  
26 county in which the planned community is located that contains covenants, conditions and re-  
27 strictions that are binding upon lots in the planned community or that impose servitudes on the real  
28 property.

29 (25) "Special declarant rights" means any rights, in addition to the rights of the declarant as a  
30 lot owner, reserved for the benefit of the declarant under the declaration or ORS 94.550 to 94.783,  
31 including but not limited to:

32 (a) Constructing or completing construction of improvements in the planned community which  
33 are described in the declaration;

34 (b) Expanding the planned community or withdrawing property from the planned community  
35 under ORS 94.580 (3) and (4);

36 (c) Converting lots into common property;

37 (d) Making the planned community subject to a master association under ORS 94.695; or

38 (e) Exercising any right of declarant control reserved under ORS 94.600.

39 (26) "Successor declarant" means the transferee of any special declarant right.

40 (27) "Turn over" means the act of turning over administrative responsibility pursuant to ORS  
41 94.609 and 94.616.

42 (28) "Unit" means a building or portion of a building located upon a lot in a planned community  
43 and designated for separate occupancy or ownership, but does not include any building or portion  
44 of a building located on common property.

45 (29) "Votes" means the votes allocated to lots in the declaration under ORS 94.580 (2).

**REGULATION OF CONDOMINIUMS**

**SECTION 10.** ORS 100.015 is amended to read:

100.015. The Real Estate Commissioner **has the exclusive right to regulate the submission of property to the provisions of this chapter and** may adopt such rules as are necessary for the administration of this chapter.

**SECTION 11.** ORS 100.022 is amended to read:

100.022. *[(1)]* **Except as provided under ORS 100.015 or explicitly required or allowed under this chapter,** a zoning, subdivision, building code or other *[real property law,]* **regulation by a public body, agency rule or local ordinance or regulation may not *[prohibit]:***

**(1) Have the effect of prohibiting or restricting** the condominium form of ownership; or

**(2) Impose any restriction or requirement upon a structure, property or development that is submitted or proposed to be submitted to the condominium form of ownership under this chapter that it would not impose upon a structure or development under a different form of ownership[.], including:**

**(a) Any charge, tax or fee;**

**(b) A review or approval process by any person of a declaration, bylaw, plat, articles of incorporation, regulation, resolution or any other document relating to the condominium or the submission of the property or development to the condominium form of ownership;**

**(c) Any additional permitting requirements or conditions of approval of the property or development; or**

**(d) Any other requirements.**

*[(2) Except as set forth in this section, no provision of this chapter invalidates or modifies any provision of any zoning, subdivision, building code or other real property use law, ordinance or regulation.]*

*[(3) Subsection (1) of This section does not prohibit any governmental approval required under this chapter.]*

**SECTION 12.** ORS 100.110 is amended to read:

100.110. (1)(a) Before a declaration, supplemental declaration or an amendment thereto may be recorded, it must be approved as provided in this section by the county assessor of the county in which the property is located and the Real Estate Commissioner.

(b) Before a declaration, supplemental declaration or, if required under subsection (3) of this section, an amendment thereto may be recorded, it must be approved by the tax collector of the county in which the property is located.

(c) A declaration, supplemental declaration or amendment thereto may not be approved unless the requirements of subsections (2) to (7) of this section are met. Approval must be evidenced by execution of the declaration or amendment or by a written approval attached thereto.

(d) If the requirements of subsections (2) to (7) of this section are met, the commissioner, county assessor and tax collector, if applicable,[:]

*[(A)] shall approve the declaration, supplemental declaration or amendment[: and]*

*[(B) May not impose additional requirements not specified in subsections (2) to (7) of this section].*

(2) The county assessor of the county in which the property is located shall approve a declaration, supplemental declaration or amendment thereto if:

(a) The name complies with ORS 100.105 (5) and (6); and

(b) The plat complies with the requirements of ORS 100.115 or the plat amendment complies with

1 ORS 100.116.

2 (3) The tax collector of the county in which the property is located shall approve the declaration  
3 or supplemental declaration, or an amendment that adds property to the condominium, changes the  
4 boundary of a unit or creates an additional unit from all or parts of other units or from all or parts  
5 of other units and common elements for which a plat amendment is required under ORS 100.116, if:

6 (a) All ad valorem taxes, special assessments, fees, or other charges required by law to be placed  
7 upon the tax roll for the affected units that have or will become a lien upon the property during the  
8 tax year have been paid;

9 (b) Advance payment of ad valorem taxes, special assessments, fees or other charges for the af-  
10 fected units that are not on the tax roll and for which payment is required under paragraph (a) of  
11 this subsection has been made to the tax collector utilizing the procedures contained in ORS 92.095  
12 and 311.370; and

13 (c) The additional taxes, penalty, and any interest attributable thereto, required because of dis-  
14 qualification of the affected units from any special assessment have been paid.

15 (4) Subject to subsection (6) of this section, the commissioner shall approve the declaration or  
16 amendment thereto if:

17 (a) The declaration or the amendment thereto complies with the requirements of ORS 100.105  
18 and 100.135 and other provisions of this chapter;

19 (b) The bylaws adopted under ORS 100.410 comply with the requirements of ORS 100.410 and  
20 100.415 and other provisions of this chapter;

21 (c) The plat complies with the requirements of ORS 100.115 or the plat amendment complies with  
22 ORS 100.116 and other provisions of this chapter;

23 (d) The declaration is for a conversion condominium and the declarant has submitted:

24 (A) An affidavit that the notice of conversion was given in accordance with ORS 100.305 and  
25 that the notice period has expired;

26 (B) An affidavit that the notice of conversion was given in accordance with ORS 100.305 and  
27 copies of the written consent of any tenants as provided in ORS 100.305 (6) or a signed statement  
28 that no tenants were entitled to notice under ORS 100.305; or

29 (C) Any applicable combination of the requirements of subparagraphs (A) and (B) of this para-  
30 graph;

31 (e) A copy of the plat executed by the declarant and prepared in conformance with ORS 100.115  
32 or plat amendment prepared in conformance with ORS 100.116 is submitted;

33 (f) A certification of plat execution, on a form prescribed and furnished by the commissioner, is:

34 (A) Executed by the declarant, the professional land surveyor who signed the surveyor's certif-  
35 icate on the plat, the attorney for the declarant, a representative of the title insurance company that  
36 issued the information required under ORS 100.640 (1)(e) or 100.668 (2)(d) or another person au-  
37 thorized by the declarant in writing to execute the certification; and

38 (B) Submitted stating that the copy is a true copy of the plat signed by the declarant; and

39 (g) A copy of a reserve study has been submitted, if a disclosure statement was issued under

41 (5) The commissioner shall approve a supplemental declaration if:

45 (c) The supplemental declaration is for a conversion condominium and the declarant has com-

1 plied with the requirements of subsection (4)(d) of this section; and

2 (d) A copy of the supplemental plat and a certification of plat execution described in subsection  
3 (4)(e) and (f) of this section have been submitted.

4 (6) Approval by the commissioner is not required for an amendment to a declaration transferring  
5 the right of use of a limited common element pursuant to ORS 100.515 (5).

6 (7) Before the commissioner approves the declaration, supplemental declaration or amendment  
7 thereto under this section:

8 (a) The declarant or other person requesting approval shall pay to the commissioner a fee de-  
9 termined by the commissioner under ORS 100.670; and

10 (b) For an amendment or supplemental declaration, the Condominium Information Report and  
11 the Annual Report described in ORS 100.260 must be designated current by the Real Estate Agency  
12 as provided in ORS 100.255 and the fee required under ORS 100.670 must be paid.

13 (8) If the declaration, supplemental declaration or amendment thereto approved by the commis-  
14 sioner under subsection (4) or (5) of this section is not recorded in accordance with ORS 100.115  
15 within one year from the date of approval by the commissioner, the approval automatically expires  
16 and the declaration, supplemental declaration or amendment thereto must be resubmitted for ap-  
17 proval in accordance with this section. The commissioner's approval must set forth the date on  
18 which the approval expires.

20 100.115. (1) A plat of the land described in the declaration or a supplemental plat described in

34 boundaries shall be referenced to a known benchmark elevation or other reference point as ap-  
35 proved by the city or county surveyor;

36 (B) For a space described in ORS 100.020 (3)(b)(B), the horizontal boundaries of each unit and  
37 the common elements to which each unit has access. If the space is located within a structure, the  
38 vertical boundaries also shall be shown and referenced to a known benchmark elevation or other  
39 reference point as approved by the city or county surveyor;

40 (C) For a moorage space described in ORS 100.020 (3)(b)(C), the horizontal boundaries of each  
41 unit and the common elements to which each unit has access; and

42 (D) For a floating structure described in ORS 100.020 (3)(b)(D), the horizontal and vertical  
43 boundaries of each unit and the common elements to which each unit has access. The vertical

6 professional land surveyor or registered professional engineer certifying that the plat fully and ac-  
7 curately depicts the boundaries of the units of the building and that construction of the units and  
8 buildings as depicted on the plat has been completed, except that the professional land surveyor who  
9 prepared the plat need not affix a seal to the statement.

10 (e) Include a surveyor's certificate, complying with ORS 92.070, that includes information in the  
11 declaration in accordance with ORS 100.105 (1)(a) and a metes and bounds description or other de-  
12 scription approved by the city or county surveyor.

13 (f) Include a statement by the declarant that the property and improvements described and de-  
14 picted on the plat are subject to the provisions of ORS 100.005 to 100.627.

15 *[(g) Include such signatures of approval as may be required by local ordinance or regulation.]*

16 *[(h)] (g)* Include any other information or data not inconsistent with the declaration that the  
17 declarant desires to include.

18 *[(i)] (h)* If the condominium is a flexible condominium, show the location and dimensions of all  
19 variable property identified in the declaration and label the variable property as  
20 "WITHDRAWABLE VARIABLE PROPERTY" or "NONWITHDRAWABLE VARIABLE  
21 PROPERTY," with a letter different from those designating a unit, building or other tract of vari-  
22 able property. If there is more than one tract, each tract shall be labeled in the same manner.

23 (2) The supplemental plat required under ORS 100.150 (1) shall be recorded simultaneously with  
24 the supplemental declaration. The supplemental plat shall be titled in accordance with subsection  
25 (3) of this section and shall:

26 (a) Comply with ORS 92.050, 92.060 (1), (2) and (4), 92.080, 92.120 and subsection (3) of this sec-  
27 tion.

28 (b) If any property is withdrawn:

29 (A) Show the resulting perimeter boundaries of the condominium after the withdrawal; and

30 (B) Show the information required under subsection *[(1)(i)] (1)(h)* of this section as it relates to  
31 any remaining variable property.

32 (c) If any property is reclassified, show the information required under subsection (1)(a) to (d)  
33 of this section.

34 (d) Include a "Declarant's Statement" that the property described on the supplemental plat is  
35 reclassified or withdrawn from the condominium and that the condominium exists as described and  
36 depicted on the plat.

37 (e) Include a surveyor's certificate complying with ORS 92.070.

38 (3) The title of each supplemental plat described in ORS 100.120 shall include the complete name  
39 of the condominium, followed by the additional language specified in this subsection and the appro-  
40 priate reference to the stage being annexed or tract of variable property being reclassified. Each  
41 supplemental plat for a condominium recorded on or after January 1, 2002, shall be numbered se-  
42 quentially and shall:

43 (a) If property is annexed under ORS 100.125, include the words "Supplemental Plat No.  
44 \_\_\_\_\_: Annexation of Stage \_\_\_\_\_"; or

45 (b) If property is reclassified under ORS 100.150, include the words "Supplemental Plat No.

1 \_\_\_\_\_: Reclassification of Variable Property, Tract \_\_\_\_\_.”

2 (4) Upon request of the county surveyor or assessor, the person offering a plat or supplemental  
3 plat for recording shall also file an exact copy, certified by the surveyor who made the plat to be  
4 an exact copy of the plat, with the county assessor and the county surveyor. The exact copy shall  
5 be made on suitable drafting material having the characteristics of strength, stability and transpar-  
6 ency required by the county surveyor.

7 (5) Before a plat or a supplemental plat may be recorded, it must be approved by the city or  
8 county surveyor as provided in ORS 92.100. Before approving the plat as required by this section,  
9 the city or county surveyor shall:

10 (a) Check the boundaries of the plat and units and take measurements and make computations  
11 necessary to determine that the plat complies with this section.

12 (b) Determine that the name complies with ORS 100.105 (5) and (6).

13 (c) Determine that the following are consistent:

14 (A) The designation and area in square feet of each unit shown on the plat and the unit desig-  
15 nations and areas contained in the declaration in accordance with ORS 100.105 (1)(d);

16 (B) Limited common elements identified on the plat and the information contained in the decla-  
17 ration in accordance with ORS 100.105 (1)(h);

18 (C) The description of the property in the surveyor’s certificate included on the plat and the  
19 description contained in the declaration in accordance with ORS 100.105 (1)(a); and

20 (D) For a flexible condominium, the variable property depicted on the plat and the identification  
21 of the property contained in the declaration in accordance with ORS 100.105 (7)(c).

22 (6) The person offering the plat or supplemental plat for approval shall:

23 (a) Submit a copy of the proposed declaration and bylaws or applicable supplemental declaration  
24 at the time the plat is submitted; and

25 (b) Submit the original or a copy of the executed declaration and bylaws or the applicable sup-  
26 plemental declaration approved by the commissioner if required by law prior to approval.

27 (7) For performing the services described in subsection (5)(a) to (c) of this section, the city sur-  
28 veyor or county surveyor shall collect from the person offering the plat for approval a fee of \$150  
29 plus \$25 per building. The governing body of a city or county may establish a higher fee by resol-  
30 ution or order.

31 **SECTION 14.** ORS 100.105 is amended to read:

32 100.105. (1) A declaration must contain:

33 (a) A description of the property, including property on which a unit or a limited common ele-  
34 ment is located, whether held in fee simple, leasehold, easement or other interest or combination  
35 thereof, that is being submitted to the condominium form of ownership and that conforms to the  
36 description in the surveyor’s certificate provided under ORS 100.115 (1).

37 (b) Subject to subsection (11) of this section, a statement of the interest in the property being  
38 submitted to the condominium form of ownership, whether fee simple, leasehold, easement or other  
39 interest or combination thereof.

40 (c) Subject to subsections (5) and (6) of this section, the name by which the property is known  
41 and a general description of each unit and the building or buildings, including the number of stories  
42 and basements of each building, the total number of units and the principal materials of which they  
43 are constructed.

44 (d) The unit designation, a statement that the location of each unit is shown on the plat, a de-  
45 scription of the boundaries and area in square feet of each unit and any other data necessary for

1 proper identification. The area of a unit must be the same as shown for that unit on the plat de-  
2 scribed in ORS 100.115 (1).

3 (e) A notice in substantially the following form in at least 12-point type in all capitals or bold-

19 (B) A statement of the unit to which the use of each limited common element is reserved, pro-

22 (i) The method of determining liability for common expenses and right to common profits in ac-  
23 cordance with ORS 100.530.

24 (j) The voting rights allocated to each unit in accordance with ORS 100.525 or, in the case of  
25 condominium units committed as property in a timeshare plan defined in ORS 94.803, the voting  
26 rights allocated in the timeshare instrument.

27 (k) A statement of the general nature of use, residential or otherwise, for which the building or  
28 buildings and each of the units is intended.

29 (L) A statement that the designated agent to receive service of process in cases provided in ORS  
30 100.550 (1) is named in the Condominium Information Report which will be filed with the Real Estate  
31 Agency in accordance with ORS 100.250 (1)(a).

32 (m) The method of amending the declaration and the percentage of voting rights required to  
33 approve an amendment of the declaration in accordance with ORS 100.135.

34 (n) A statement as to whether or not the association of unit owners pursuant to ORS 100.405 (5)  
35 and (8) has authority to grant leases, easements, rights of way, licenses and other similar interests  
36 affecting the general and limited common elements of the condominium and consent to vacation of  
37 roadways within and adjacent to the condominium.

38 (o) If the condominium contains a floating structure described in ORS 100.020 (3), a statement  
39 regarding the authority of the board of directors of the association, subject to ORS 100.410, to  
40 temporarily relocate the floating structure without a majority vote of affected unit owners.

41 (p) Any restrictions on alienation of units. Any such restrictions created by documents other  
42 than the declaration may be incorporated by reference in the declaration to the official records of  
43 the county in which the property is located.

44 (q) Any other details regarding the property that the person executing the declaration considers  
45 desirable. However, if a provision required to be in the bylaws under ORS 100.415 is included in the

1 declaration, the voting requirements for amending the bylaws also govern the amendment of the  
2 provision in the declaration.

3 (2) In the event the declarant proposes to annex additional property to the condominium under  
4 ORS 100.125, the declaration also must contain a general description of the plan of development,  
5 including:

6 (a) The maximum number of units to be included in the condominium.

7 (b) The date after which any right to annex additional property will terminate.

8 (c) A general description of the nature and proposed use of any additional common elements  
9 which declarant proposes to annex to the condominium, if such common elements might substantially  
10 increase the proportionate amount of the common expenses payable by existing unit owners.

11 (d) A statement that the method used to establish the allocation of undivided interest in the  
12 common elements, the method used to determine liability for common expenses and right to common  
13 profits and the method used to allocate voting rights for each unit annexed is as stated in the dec-  
14 laration in accordance with subsection (1)(g), (i) and (j) of this section.

15 (e) Such other information as the Real Estate Commissioner requires in order to carry out the  
16 purposes of this chapter.

17 (3) Unless expressly prohibited by the declaration and subject to the requirements of ORS  
18 100.135 (2) and subsections (9) and (10) of this section:

19 (a) Not later than two years following the termination date specified in subsection (2)(b) of this  
20 section, the termination date may be extended for a period not exceeding five years.

21 (b) Before the termination date specified in the declaration or supplemental declaration under  
22 subsection (7)(d) of this section, the termination date may be extended for a period not exceeding

30 not be changed unless all owners agree to the change and an amendment to the declaration or  
31 supplemental declaration and, if applicable, the plat or supplemental plat are recorded in accordance

33 (5) The name of the property shall include the word "condominium" or "condominiums" or the  
34 words "a condominium."

35 (6) A condominium may not bear a name which is the same as or deceptively similar to the name  
36 of any other, **different** condominium located in the same county.

37 (7) If the condominium is a flexible condominium containing variable property, the declaration  
38 shall also contain a general description of the plan of development, including:

39 (a) A statement that the rights provided for under ORS 100.150 (1) are being reserved.

40 (b) A statement:

41 (A) Of any limitations on rights reserved under ORS 100.150 (1), including whether the consent  
42 of any unit owner is required, and if so, a statement of the method by which the consent is ascer-  
43 tained; or

44 (B) That there are no limitations on rights reserved under ORS 100.150 (1).

45 (c) A statement of the total number of tracts of variable property within the condominium, in-

1 cluding:

2 (A) A designation of each tract as withdrawable variable property or nonwithdrawable variable  
3 property;

4 (B) Identification of each variable tract by a label in accordance with ORS 100.115 [(1)(i)]  
5 (1)(h);

6 (C) A statement of the method of labeling each tract depicted on the plat in accordance with  
7 ORS 100.115 [(1)(i)] (1)(h); and

8 (D) A statement of the total number of tracts of each type of variable property.

9 (d) The termination date, which is the date after which any right reserved under ORS 100.150  
10 (1) will terminate, and a statement of the circumstances, if any, that will terminate any right on or  
11 before the date specified. Subject to ORS 100.120, the termination date from the date of recording  
12 of the conveyance of the first unit in the condominium to a person other than the declarant may  
13 not exceed:

14 (A) Twenty years, only if a condominium consists, or may consist if the condominium is a flexi-  
15 ble condominium, exclusively of units to be used for nonresidential purposes; or

16 (B) Seven years.

17 (e) The maximum number of units that may be created.

18 (f) A statement that the method used to establish the allocations of undivided interest in the  
19 common elements, the method used to determine liability for common expenses and right to common  
20 profits and the method used to allocate voting rights as additional units are created is the same as  
21 stated in the declaration in accordance with subsection (1)(g), (i) and (j) of this section.

22 (g) A general description of all existing improvements and the nature and proposed use of any  
23 improvements that may be made on variable property if the improvements might substantially in-  
24 crease the proportionate amount of the common expenses payable by existing unit owners.

25 (h) A statement of whether or not the declarant reserves the right to create limited common  
26 elements within any variable property, and if so, a general description of the types that may be  
27 created.

28 (i) A statement that the plat shows the location and dimensions of all withdrawable variable  
29 property that is labeled "WITHDRAWABLE VARIABLE PROPERTY."

30 (j) A statement that if by the termination date all or a portion of the withdrawable variable  
31 property has not been withdrawn or reclassified, the withdrawable variable property is automat-  
32 ically withdrawn from the condominium as of the termination date.

33 (k) A statement of the rights of the association under ORS 100.155 (2).

34 (L) A statement of whether or not all or any portion of the variable property may not be with-  
35 drawn from the condominium and, if so, with respect to the nonwithdrawable variable property:

36 (A) A statement that the plat shows the location and dimensions of all nonwithdrawable variable  
37 property that is labeled "NONWITHDRAWABLE VARIABLE PROPERTY."

38 (B) A description of all improvements that may be made and a statement of the intended use of  
39 each improvement.

40 (C) A statement that, if by the termination date all or a portion of the variable property desig-  
41 nated as "nonwithdrawable variable property" has not been reclassified, the property is automat-  
42 ically reclassified as of the termination date as a general common element of the condominium and  
43 any interest in the property held for security purposes is automatically extinguished by the classi-  
44 fication.

45 (D) A statement of the rights of the association under ORS 100.155 (3).

1 (m) A statement by the local governing body or appropriate department thereof that the with-  
2 drawal of any variable property designated as “withdrawable variable property” in the declaration  
3 in accordance with paragraph (L) of this subsection, will not violate any applicable planning or  
4 zoning regulation or ordinance. The statement may be attached as an exhibit to the declaration.

5 (8) The plan of development for any variable property included in the declaration or any sup-  
6 plemental declaration of any stage in accordance with subsection (7) of this section is subject to any  
7 plan of development included in the declaration in accordance with subsection (2) of this section,  
8 except that the time limitation specified in subsection (7)(d) of this section governs any right re-  
9 served under ORS 100.150 (1) with respect to any variable property.

10 (9) The information included in the declaration in accordance with subsection (7)(j), (k) and (m)  
11 of this section may not be deleted by amendment.

12 (10)(a) Approval by the unit owners is not required for a declarant to redesignate withdrawable  
13 variable property as “nonwithdrawable variable property” under ORS 100.150 (1) by supplemental  
14 declaration and supplemental plat, for any reason, including if the redesignation is required by the  
15 local governing body to comply with any planning or zoning regulation or ordinance.

16 (b) If as a result of a redesignation under paragraph (a) of this subsection, the information re-  
17 quired to be included in the supplemental declaration under subsection (7)(L)(B) of this section is  
18 inconsistent with the information included in the declaration or supplemental declaration in ac-  
19 cordance with subsection (7)(g) of this section, an amendment to the declaration or supplemental  
20 declaration and plat or supplemental plat approved by at least 75 percent of owners is required.

21 (11) The statement of an interest in property other than fee simple submitted to the condomin-  
22 ium form of ownership and any easements, rights or appurtenances belonging to property submitted  
23 to the condominium form of ownership, whether leasehold or fee simple, must include:

24 (a) A reference to the recording index numbers and date of recording of the instrument creating  
25 the interest; or

26 (b) A reference to the law, administrative rule, ordinance or regulation that creates the interest  
27 if the interest is created under law, administrative rule, ordinance or regulation and not recorded  
28 in the office of the recording officer of the county in which the property is located.

30 **SUBDIVIDING FOR DEVELOPMENT OF AFFORDABLE HOUSING**

31  
32 **SECTION 15.** ORS 92.090 is amended to read:

33 92.090. (1) Subdivision plat names shall be subject to the approval of the county surveyor or, in  
34 the case where there is no county surveyor, the county assessor. No tentative subdivision plan or  
35 subdivision plat of a subdivision shall be approved which bears a name similar to or pronounced the  
36 same as the name of any other subdivision in the same county, unless the land platted is contiguous  
37 to and platted by the same party that platted the subdivision bearing that name or unless the party  
38 files and records the consent of the party that platted the contiguous subdivision bearing that name.  
39 All subdivision plats must continue the lot numbers and, if used, the block numbers of the subdivi-  
40 sion plat of the same name last filed. On or after January 1, 1992, any subdivision submitted for final  
41 approval shall not use block numbers or letters unless such subdivision is a continued phase of a  
42 previously recorded subdivision, bearing the same name, that has previously used block numbers or  
43 letters.

44 (2) No tentative plan for a proposed subdivision and no tentative plan for a proposed partition  
45 shall be approved unless:

1 (a) The streets and roads are laid out so as to conform to the plats of subdivisions and partitions  
2 already approved for adjoining property as to width, general direction and in all other respects un-  
3 less the city or county determines it is in the public interest to modify the street or road pattern.

4 (b) Streets and roads held for private use are clearly indicated on the tentative plan and all  
5 reservations or restrictions relating to such private roads and streets are set forth thereon.

6 (c) The tentative plan complies with the applicable zoning ordinances and regulations and the  
7 ordinances or regulations adopted under ORS 92.044 that are then in effect for the city or county  
8 within which the land described in the plan is situated.

9 (3) No plat of a proposed subdivision or partition shall be approved unless:

10 (a) Streets and roads for public use are dedicated without any reservation or restriction other  
11 than reversionary rights upon vacation of any such street or road and easements for public or pri-  
12 vate utilities.

13 (b) Streets and roads held for private use and indicated on the tentative plan of such subdivision  
14 or partition have been approved by the city or county.

15 (c) The subdivision or partition plat complies with any applicable zoning ordinances and regu-  
16 lations and any ordinance or regulation adopted under ORS 92.044 that are then in effect for the  
17 city or county within which the land described in the subdivision or partition plat is situated.

18 (d) The subdivision or partition plat is in substantial conformity with the provisions of the ten-  
19 tative plan for the subdivision or partition, as approved.

20 (e) The subdivision or partition plat contains a donation to the public of all common improve-  
21 ments, including but not limited to streets, roads, parks, sewage disposal and water supply systems,  
22 the donation of which was made a condition of the approval of the tentative plan for the subdivision  
23 or partition.

24 (f) Explanations of all common improvements required as conditions of approval of the tentative  
25 plan of the subdivision or partition have been recorded and referenced on the subdivision or parti-  
26 tion plat.

27 (4) Subject to any standards and procedures adopted pursuant to ORS 92.044, no plat of a sub-  
28 division shall be approved by a city or county unless the city or county has received and accepted:

29 (a) A certification by a city-owned domestic water supply system or by the owner of a privately  
30 owned domestic water supply system, subject to regulation by the Public Utility Commission of  
31 Oregon, that water will be available to the lot line of each and every lot depicted in the proposed  
32 subdivision plat;

33 (b) A bond, irrevocable letter of credit, contract or other assurance by the subdivider to the city  
34 or county that a domestic water supply system will be installed by or on behalf of the subdivider  
35 to the lot line of each and every lot depicted in the proposed subdivision plat[; *and the amount of*  
36 *any such bond, irrevocable letter of credit, contract or other assurance by the subdivider shall be*] **in**  
37 **an amount** determined by a registered professional engineer, subject to any change in such amount  
38 as determined necessary by the city or county; or

39 (c) [*In lieu of paragraphs (a) and (b) of this subsection,*] A statement that no domestic water  
40 supply facility will be provided to the purchaser of any lot depicted in the proposed subdivision plat,  
41 even though a domestic water supply source may exist. A copy of any such statement, signed by the  
42 subdivider and indorsed by the city or county, shall be filed by the subdivider with the Real Estate  
43 Commissioner and shall be included by the commissioner in any public report made for the subdivi-  
44 sion under ORS 92.385. If the making of a public report has been waived or the subdivision is oth-  
45 erwise exempt under the Oregon Subdivision Control Law, the subdivider shall deliver a copy of the

1 statement to each prospective purchaser of a lot in the subdivision at or prior to the signing by the  
2 purchaser of the first written agreement for the sale of the lot. The subdivider shall take a signed  
3 receipt from the purchaser upon delivery of such a statement, shall immediately send a copy of the  
4 receipt to the commissioner and shall keep any such receipt on file in this state, subject to in-  
5 spection by the commissioner, for a period of three years after the date the receipt is taken.

6 (5) Subject to any standards and procedures adopted pursuant to ORS 92.044, no plat of a sub-  
7 division shall be approved by a city or county unless the city or county has received and accepted:

8 (a) A certification by a city-owned sewage disposal system or by the owner of a privately owned  
9 sewage disposal system that is subject to regulation by the Public Utility Commission of Oregon that  
10 a sewage disposal system will be available to the lot line of each and every lot depicted in the  
11 proposed subdivision plat;

12 (b) A bond, irrevocable letter of credit, contract or other assurance by the subdivider to the city  
13 or county that a sewage disposal system will be installed by or on behalf of the subdivider to the  
14 lot line of each and every lot depicted on the proposed subdivision plat[; *and the amount of such*  
15 *bond, irrevocable letter of credit, contract or other assurance shall be*] **in an amount** determined by  
16 a registered professional engineer, subject to any change in such amount as the city or county  
17 considers necessary; or

18 (c) [*In lieu of paragraphs (a) and (b) of this subsection,*] A statement that no sewage disposal  
19 facility will be provided to the purchaser of any lot depicted in the proposed subdivision plat, where  
20 the Department of Environmental Quality has approved the proposed method or an alternative  
21 method of sewage disposal for the subdivision in its evaluation report described in ORS 454.755  
22 (1)(b). A copy of any such statement, signed by the subdivider and indorsed by the city or county  
23 shall be filed by the subdivider with the Real Estate Commissioner and shall be included by the  
24 commissioner in the public report made for the subdivision under ORS 92.385. If the making of a  
25 public report has been waived or the subdivision is otherwise exempt under the Oregon Subdivision  
26 Control Law, the subdivider shall deliver a copy of the statement to each prospective purchaser of  
27 a lot in the subdivision at or prior to the signing by the purchaser of the first written agreement  
28 for the sale of the lot. The subdivider shall take a signed receipt from the purchaser upon delivery  
29 of such a statement, shall immediately send a copy of the receipt to the commissioner and shall keep  
30 any such receipt on file in this state, subject to inspection by the commissioner, for a period of three  
31 years after the date the receipt is taken.

32 **(6) A city or county shall accept as other assurance, as used in subsections (4)(b) and**  
33 **(5)(b) of this section, one or more award letters from public funding sources made to a sub-**  
34 **divider who is subdividing the property to develop affordable housing, that is or will be sub-**  
35 **ject to an affordability restriction as defined in ORS 456.250 or an affordable housing**  
36 **covenant as defined in ORS 456.270, if the awards total an amount greater than the project**  
37 **cost.**

38 [(6)] (7) Subject to any standards and procedures adopted pursuant to ORS 92.044, no plat of a  
39 subdivision or partition located within the boundaries of an irrigation district, drainage district,  
40 water control district, water improvement district or district improvement company shall be ap-  
41 proved by a city or county unless the city or county has received and accepted a certification from  
42 the district or company that the subdivision or partition is either entirely excluded from the district  
43 or company or is included within the district or company for purposes of receiving services and  
44 subjecting the subdivision or partition to the fees and other charges of the district or company.

**SINGLE ROOM OCCUPANCIES**

**SECTION 16.** Section 17 of this 2023 Act and ORS 197.758 are added to and made a part of ORS 197.286 to 197.314.

**SECTION 17.** (1) As used in this section “single room occupancy” means a residential development with no fewer than four attached units that are independently rented and lockable and provide living and sleeping space for the exclusive use of an occupant, but require that the occupant share sanitary or food preparation facilities with other units in the occupancy.

(2) Within an urban growth boundary, each local government shall allow the development of a single room occupancy:

(a) With up to six units on each lot or parcel zoned to allow for the development of a detached single-family dwelling; and

(b) With the number of units consistent with the density standards of a lot or parcel zoned to allow for the development of residential dwellings with five or more units.

**SECTION 18.** ORS 197.303, as amended by section 27, chapter 13, Oregon Laws 2023 (Enrolled House Bill 2001), is amended to read:

197.303. (1) As used in ORS 197.296 and this section, “needed housing” means all housing on land zoned for residential use or mixed residential and commercial use that is determined to meet the need shown for housing within an urban growth boundary at price ranges and rent levels that are affordable to households within the county with a variety of incomes, including but not limited to households with low incomes, very low incomes and extremely low incomes, as those terms are defined by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development under 42 U.S.C. 1437a. “Needed housing” includes the following housing types:

(a) Attached and detached single-family housing, middle housing types as described in ORS 197.758 and multiple family housing for both owner and renter occupancy;

(b) Government assisted housing;

(c) Mobile home or manufactured dwelling parks as provided in ORS 197.475 to 197.490;

(d) Manufactured homes on individual lots planned and zoned for single-family residential use that are in addition to lots within designated manufactured dwelling subdivisions;

(e) Agriculture workforce housing;

(f) Housing for individuals with a variety of disabilities related to mobility or communications that require accessibility features;

(g) Housing for older persons, as defined in ORS 659A.421; [and]

(h) Housing for college or university students, if relevant to the region[.]; and

**(i) Single room occupancies as defined in section 17 of this 2023 Act.**

(2) For the purpose of estimating housing needs, as described in ORS 197.296 (3)(b), Metro shall adopt findings and perform an analysis that estimates each of the following factors:

(a) Projected needed housing units over the next 20 years;

(b) Current housing underproduction;

(c) Housing units needed for people experiencing homelessness; and

(d) Housing units projected to be converted into vacation homes or second homes during the next 20 years.

(3) At the time Metro performs the analysis under subsection (2) of this section, Metro shall allocate a housing need for each city within Metro.

1 (4) In making an allocation under subsection (3) of this section, Metro shall consider:

2 (a) The forecasted population growth under ORS 195.033 or 195.036;

3 (b) The forecasted regional job growth;

4 (c) An equitable statewide distribution of housing for income levels described in section 2 (4),  
5 **chapter 13, Oregon Laws 2023 (Enrolled House Bill 2001)** [of this 2023 Act].

6 (d) The estimates made under subsection (2) of this section; and

7 (e) The purpose of the Oregon Housing Needs Analysis under section 1 (1), **chapter 13, Oregon**  
8 **Laws 2023 (Enrolled House Bill 2001)** [of this 2023 Act].

9 (5) Metro shall make the estimate described in subsection (2) of this section using a shorter time  
10 period than since the last review under ORS 197.296 (2)(a)(B) if Metro finds that the shorter time  
11 period will provide more accurate and reliable data related to housing need. The shorter time period  
12 may not be less than three years.

13 (6) Metro shall use data from a wider geographic area or use a time period longer than the time  
14 period described in subsection (2) of this section if the analysis of a wider geographic area or the

24 **SECTION 28.** (1) The amendments to sections 4 and 6, chapter 67, Oregon Laws 2021, by  
25 sections 26 and 27 of this 2023 Act are intended to extend the deadline for compliance with

39 (2)(a) To facilitate the development of affordable housing in this state, the Public Utility  
40 Commission may allow a public utility to sell, or to convey at below market price or as a gift,  
41 the public utility’s interest in real property for the purpose of the real property being used  
42 for the development of affordable housing.

43 (b) The instrument that conveys, or contracts to convey, the public utility’s interest in  
44 the real property must include an affordable housing covenant as provided in ORS 456.270 to  
45 456.295.

1 (3) A public utility may not recover costs from customers for selling, or conveying at  
2 below market price or as a gift, the public utility's interest in real property under this sec-  
3 tion.

5 HOUSING SUPPORT FOR LOW-INCOME COLLEGE STUDENTS

6  
7 SECTION 30. The Department of Human Services shall provide financial support to  
8 nonprofit organizations providing affordable housing support to low-income college students  
9 across this state in accordance with the department's self-sufficiency programs.

10 SECTION 31. Section 30 of this 2023 Act is repealed on January 2, 2026.

11 SECTION 32. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appro-  
12 priated to the Department of Human Services, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, out  
13 of the General Fund, the amount of \$4,000,000 to provide financial support to nonprofit or-  
14 ganizations under section 30 of this 2023 Act.

15 SECTION 32a. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropri-  
16 ation made to the Department of Human Services by section 1 (3), chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws  
17 2023 (Enrolled House Bill 5026), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, for self-sufficiency  
18 programs, is increased by \$244,963 to administer financial support to nonprofit organizations  
19 pursuant to the provisions of section 30 of this 2023 Act.

21 COMMUNITY HOUSING SUPPORTING AGRICULTURAL EMPLOYEES

22  
23 SECTION 33. Section 34 of this 2023 Act is added to and made a part of ORS 456.548 to  
24 456.725.

25 SECTION 34. (1) As used in this section, "community housing supporting agricultural  
26 employees" means a housing development that:

27 (a) Is within an urban growth boundary;

28 (b) Is within 20 miles of significant agricultural employment as identified by the Housing  
29 and Community Services Department;

30 (c) Is promoted for residential use by agricultural employees and developed with amen-  
31 ities suitable for agricultural employees and their families;

32 (d) Consists of a multifamily dwelling or a cluster of buildings, including manufactured,  
33 prefabricated or modular housing, housing produced through a three-dimensional printing  
34 process or other housing developed using innovative construction types; and

35 (e)(A) Is subject to an affordable housing covenant requiring that the units are main-  
36 tained for a period of no less than 60 years as affordable to rent for low income households,  
37 as described in ORS 456.270 to 456.295;

38 (B) Is operated as a consumer housing cooperative; or

39 (C) Is operated under a model approved by the department designed to preserve  
40 affordability or control of the property by its residents.

41 (2) The Housing and Community Services Department shall provide one or more grants  
42 to qualified housing sponsors for the purposes of developing community housing supporting  
43 agricultural employees.

44 (3) In awarding grants under this section, (3) the department shall prioritize applications:

45 (a) From a developer that is a nonprofit housing corporation that serves agricultural

1 workers;

2 (b) From a developer that is a nonprofit that promotes housing for agricultural employ-  
3 ees or other needs of agricultural employees, or from a developer that has entered into a  
4 partnership with a nonprofit housing corporation that serves agricultural workers for the  
5 purposes of developing the community housing;

6 (c) Where other funding for the housing development has been dedicated or can be lev-  
7 eraged by the grant;

8 (d) Where the housing development will be located close to significant agricultural em-  
9 ployment; or

10 (e) Where the housing development will include or will be near specific characteristics  
11 or amenities designed to support or attract agricultural employees and their families.

12 (4) Grants awarded under this section may be used for any project costs for the devel-  
13 opment or predevelopment of the community housing supporting agricultural employees.

14 (5) A qualified housing sponsor receiving grants under this section shall agree to provide  
15 information to the department to report to an appropriate interim committee of the Legis-  
16 lative Assembly, in the manner provided in ORS 192.245, on the use of the grant on or before  
17 September 15, 2027.

18 SECTION 35. Section 34 of this 2023 Act is repealed on January 2, 2028.

19 SECTION 36. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appro-  
20 priated to the Housing and Community Services Department, for the biennium beginning July  
21 1, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$10,000,000, to award and administer grants  
22 under section 34 of this 2023 Act.

23  
24 **LOCAL GOVERNMENT HOUSING SUPPORT**

25  
26 SECTION 37. (1) The Oregon Department of Administrative Services, in consultation with  
27 the Department of Land Conservation and Development and the Housing and Community  
28 Services Department, shall provide grants to councils of governments, as defined in ORS  
29 294.900, and economic development districts to support housing and community development  
30 capacity within cities and counties in this state and within the nine federally recognized In-  
31 dian tribes in this state.

32 (2) Councils of governments and economic development districts receiving grants under  
33 this section shall partner and consult with local governments, developers, financiers, the  
34 Department of Land Conservation and Development, the Housing and Community Services  
35 Department, other relevant state agencies and other interested public and private partners  
36 to enable local governments throughout the region to encourage community development  
37 and the development of infrastructure and needed housing, as defined in section 23, chapter  
38 13, Oregon Laws 2023 (Enrolled House Bill 2001), by:

39 (a) Bridging any information gaps;

40 (b) Identifying and securing needed resources, including infrastructure and community  
41 facilities;

42 (c) Connecting producers of needed housing with consumers of needed housing; and

43 (d) Working with representatives of historically underrepresented groups to overcome  
44 community-specific barriers to obtaining housing.

45 SECTION 38. Section 37 of this 2023 Act is repealed on January 2, 2034.

1       **SECTION 39.** In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appro-  
2 priated to the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, for the biennium beginning  
3 July 1, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$5,000,000, to provide grants under  
4 section 37 of this 2023 Act.

5  
6                                   **AFFORDABLE HOMEOWNERSHIP REVOLVING LOAN FUND**  
7

8       **SECTION 40.** (1) The Housing and Community Services Department shall make a grant  
9 to the Network for Oregon Affordable Housing (NOAH) to establish a revolving loan fund  
10 that will allow a first-time home buyer who is purchasing a home, including a share of a  
11 cooperative or a condominium unit, in which the purchaser's equity will be limited, to es-  
12 tablish equity at a faster rate while making monthly payments similar to those described in  
13 subsection (3)(a)(A) of this subsection. The department may not make a grant under this  
14 section until NOAH has demonstrated that it has dedicated to a loan fund described in this  
15 section no less than \$7,500,000 of additional private moneys.

16       (2) Loans made from the loan fund must be used for the purchase of a dwelling that is  
17 subject to an affordability restriction, such as a restriction as described in ORS 456.270 to  
18 456.295, that:

19       (a) Has the effect of limiting the purchaser's ability to gain equity from the appreciation  
20 of the dwelling's value; and

21       (b) Requires that the purchaser be a low income household as defined in ORS 456.270.

22       (3) Loans made from the loan fund must:

23       (a) Be made only to applicants that have met with an approved or certified housing  
24 counseling agency, as described in 24 C.F.R. 214 subpart B, and have a first-time home buyer  
25 program offered by the agency;

26       (b) Have a term of 20 years or less; and

27       (c) Have a fixed interest rate that is not more than the greater of:

28       (A) The rate that would allow monthly amortized principal and interest payments under  
29 the term of the loan to be the amount that would result from a 30-year fixed-rate amortized  
30 mortgage at the national current average rate as published by a reputable financial source;  
31 or

32       (B) 0.5 percent.

33       **SECTION 41.** Section 40 of this 2023 Act is repealed on January 2, 2026.

34       **SECTION 42.** In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appro-  
35 priated to the Housing and Community Services Department, for the biennium beginning July  
36 1, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$7,500,000, to make a grant under section 40  
37 of this 2023 Act.

38       **SECTION 43.** On or before September 15, 2025, and on or before September 15, 2027, the  
39 Housing and Community Services Department shall provide a report to an appropriate in-  
40 terim committee of the Legislative Assembly, in the manner provided in ORS 192.245, on the  
41 use of the loan funds described in section 40 of this 2023 Act, as reported to the department  
42 by the Network for Oregon Affordable Housing (NOAH).

43  
44                                   **AFFORDABLE HOUSING LOAN GUARANTEE FUND**  
45

1       **SECTION 44.** Section 45 of this 2023 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 458.

2       **SECTION 45.** (1) The Housing and Community Services Department shall provide grants  
3 to one or more nonprofit corporations to develop a fund.

4       (2) The moneys in the fund may be used only to guarantee the repayment of loans to fi-  
5 nance the construction of housing subject to an affordable housing covenant for low or  
6 moderate income households, as described in ORS 456.270 to 456.295 and as further defined  
7 by the Housing and Community Services Department by rule.

8       (3) The term of a loan guaranteed under this section may not exceed five years.

9       (4) The department and the state are not guarantors of any loan guaranteed by a  
10 nonprofit corporation under this section.

11       (5) To be eligible for a grant under this section, a nonprofit corporation must:

12       (a) Be exempt from income taxes under section 501(c)(3) or (4) of the Internal Revenue  
13 Code; and

14       (b) Demonstrate to the satisfaction of the department that the corporation is a commu-  
15 nity development financial institution that operates statewide to support investment in the  
16 construction of affordable housing.

17       **SECTION 46.** Section 45 of this 2023 Act is repealed on January 2, 2026.

18       **SECTION 47.** In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appro-  
19 priated to the Housing and Community Services Department, for the biennium beginning July  
20 1, 2023, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$20,000,000 to provide grants under section  
21 45 of this 2023 Act.

23                   **HOUSING AND COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT ADMINISTRATION**

24  
25       **SECTION 47a.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropri-  
26 ation made to the Housing and Community Services Department by section 1, chapter \_\_\_,  
27 Oregon Laws 2023 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5511), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, is in-  
28 creased by \$529,802, for purposes of administering sections 34, 37, 40, 43 and 45 of this 2023  
29 Act.

31                   **EMERGENCY HOUSING ASSISTANCE FOR COMPANION ANIMALS**

32  
33       **SECTION 48.** ORS 458.650 is amended to read:

34       458.650. (1) The Housing and Community Services Department shall administer the Emergency  
35 Housing Account to assist homeless individuals and individuals who are at risk of becoming  
36 homeless, through means including the emergency housing assistance program and the state  
37 homeless assistance program. Notwithstanding subsection (3)(a) of this section, the state homeless  
38 assistance program shall serve individuals experiencing homelessness, especially unsheltered  
39 homelessness, without respect to income.

40       (2) The Oregon Housing Stability Council shall develop a policy for the use of program funds  
41 with the advice of:

42       (a) Persons who have experienced housing instability;

43       (b) Tribes;

44       (c) The Community Action Partnership of Oregon;

45       (d) Continuums of care, as defined in 24 C.F.R. part 578;

- 1 (e) Local governments;
  - 2 (f) Nonprofit organizations;
  - 3 (g) Homeless services providers;
  - 4 (h) Culturally specific organizations;
  - 5 (i) Housing providers;
  - 6 (j) Veterans' services organizations; and
  - 7 (k) Other entities identified by the department by rule.
- 8 (3) The policy under subsection (2) of this section shall direct that program funds shall be used:
- 9 (a) To provide to low and very low income individuals, including but not limited to individuals
  - 10 more than 65 years of age, persons with disabilities, agricultural workers and Native Americans:
  - 11 (A) Emergency shelters and attendant services;
  - 12 (B) Transitional housing services designed to assist individuals to make the transition from
  - 13 homelessness to permanent housing and economic independence;
  - 14 (C) Supportive housing services to enable individuals to continue living in their own homes or
  - 15 to provide in-home services for such individuals for whom suitable programs do not exist in their
  - 16 geographic area;
  - 17 (D) Programs that provide emergency payment of home payments, rents or utilities; [*or*]
  - 18 **(E) Support for individuals with companion animals, as defined in ORS 401.977, that in-**
  - 19 **cludes:**
  - 20 **(i) Food for both companion animals and their owners;**
  - 21 **(ii) Crates or kennels on-site or off-site that are easily accessible to the companion ani-**
  - 22 **mal owners;**
  - 23 **(iii) Basic veterinary services, including behavioral services; and**
  - 24 **(iv) Rules of conduct and responsibility regarding companion animals and their owners;**
  - 25 **or**
  - 26 [*E*] **(F)** Some or all of the needs described in subparagraphs (A) to [*D*] **(E)** of this paragraph.
  - 27 (b) To align with federal strategies and resources that are available to prevent and end
  - 28 homelessness, including the requirement of providing culturally responsive services and using
  - 29 evidence-based and emerging practices effective in ending homelessness, including practices unique
  - 30 to rural communities.
- 31 (4)(a) The council shall require as a condition of awarding a grant that the organization dem-
- 32 onstrate to the satisfaction of the council that the organization:
- 33 (A) Has the capacity to deliver any service proposed by the organization;
  - 34 (B) Is a culturally responsive organization or is engaged in a process to become a culturally
  - 35 responsive organization;
  - 36 (C) Engages with culturally specific organizations; and
  - 37 (D) Supports local homelessness system planning efforts.
- 38 (b) Any funds granted under this section may not be used to replace existing funds. Funds
- 39 granted under this section may be used to supplement existing funds. An organization may use funds
- 40 to support existing programs or to establish new programs.
- 41 (5) The department may expend funds from the account for:
- 42 (a) The administration of the account as provided for in the legislatively approved budget, as
  - 43 that term is defined in ORS 291.002, for the department in support of directing a statewide policy
  - 44 on homelessness that ensures use of evidence-based and emerging practices, service equity in fund-
  - 45 ing and local planning processes.



1 (b) The development of technical assistance and training resources for organizations developing  
2 and operating emergency shelters as defined in ORS 197.782 and transitional housing accommo-  
3 dations as described in ORS 197.746.

4 (6) The department shall utilize outcome-oriented contracting processes and evidence-based and  
5 emerging practices for account program funds, including evidence-based and emerging practices for  
6 serving rural communities.

7 (7) Twenty-five percent of moneys deposited in the account pursuant to ORS 294.187 are dedi-  
8 cated to the emergency housing assistance program for assistance to veterans who are homeless or  
9 at risk of becoming homeless.
