AN ACT

Relating to state financial administration; and declaring an emergency.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> The amounts authorized, as provided by ORS 286A.035, for issuance of general obligation bonds of the state during the 2023-2025 biennium are as follows:

SECTION 3. The amount authorized, as provided by ORS 286A.035, for issuance of certificates of participation and other financing agreements of the state during the 2023-2025 biennium for the Oregon Department of Administrative Services is \$100,000,000.

SECTION 4. (1) For calendar year 2024, the amount of \$509,538,600 is allocated for private activity bonds, as provided in ORS 286A.615, as follows:

(3) If an increase in this state's population, a sufficient increase in the Consumer Price Index or a change in federal law allows the private activity bond limit as set by the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, to exceed \$509,538,600 during the 2024 calendar year or \$509,538,600 during the 2025 calendar year, the increase is allocated to the Private Activity Bond Committee.

SECTION 5. In addition to and not in lieu of any authorization to issue general obligation bonds under ORS 286A.035, in the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, at the request of the Department of Transportation, the State Treasurer may issue general obligation bonds authorized under Article XI, section 7, of the Oregon Constitution, in an amount that produces \$250,000,000 of net proceeds for the Interstate 5 bridge replacement project, plus an amount estimated by the State Treasurer to pay bond-related costs.

SECTION 6. In addition to and not in lieu of any authorization to issue general obligation bonds under ORS 286A.035, in the biennium beginning July 1, 2027, at the request of the Department of Transportation, the State Treasurer may issue general obligation bonds authorized under Article XI, section 7, of the Oregon Constitution, in an amount that produces \$250,000,000 of net proceeds for the Interstate 5 bridge replacement project, plus an amount estimated by the State Treasurer to pay bond-related costs.

SECTION 7. In addition to and not in lieu of any authorization to issue general obligation bonds under ORS 286A.035, in the biennium beginning July 1, 2029, at the request of the Department of Transportation, the State Treasurer may issue general obligation bonds authorized under Article XI, section 7, of the Oregon Constitution, in an amount that produces \$250,000,000 of net proceeds for the Interstate 5 bridge replacement project, plus an amount estimated by the State Treasurer to pay bond-related costs.

<u>SECTION 8.</u> (1) For purposes of Article XI-F(1), section 1, of the Oregon Constitution, the Legislative Assembly determines that the projects authorized to be financed pursuant to section 1 (9) of this 2023 Act with bonds issued under Article XI-F(1) of the Oregon Constitution will benefit higher education institutions or activities.

(2) For purposes of Article XI-G, section 1, of the Oregon Constitution, the Legislative Assembly determines that the projects authorized to be financed pursuant to section 1 (1) of this 2023 Act with bonds issued under Article XI-G of the Oregon Constitution will benefit higher education institutions or activities or community colleges authorized by law to receive state aid.

<u>SECTION 9.</u> Bonds authorized pursuant to Article XI-G of the Oregon Constitution under section 1 (1) of this 2023 Act for the benefit of a constructing authority may not be issued until the constructing authority certifies that the constructing authority has matching funds available for the same or similar purposes as the bonds, that the matching funds are not proceeds of indebtedness incurred by the state under any other article of the Oregon Constitution, and that the matching funds are available to the constructing authority in an amount at least equal to the amount of indebtedness incurred by the state through the issuance of the bonds.

<u>SECTION 10.</u> (1) Out of the amount specified in section 1 (6)(m)(A) of this 2023 Act, the State Treasurer may issue Article XI-Q bonds in an amount not to exceed \$8,831,894 of net proceeds for the purposes and in the manner specified in section 8, chapter 705, Oregon Laws 2013, plus an amount estimated by the State Treasurer to pay estimated bond-related costs.

(2) Out of the amount specified in section 1 (6)(m)(B) of this 2023 Act, the State Treasurer may issue Article XI-Q bonds in an amount not to exceed \$30,000,000 of net proceeds for the purposes and in the manner specified in section 8, chapter 705, Oregon Laws 2013, plus an amount estimated by the State Treasurer to pay estimated bond-related costs.

(3) Out of the amount specified in section 1 (6)(m)(C) of this 2023 Act, the State Treasurer may issue Article XI-Q bonds in an amount not to exceed \$12,575,000 of net proceeds for the purposes and in the manner specified in section 8, chapter 705, Oregon Laws 2013, plus an amount estimated by the State Treasurer to pay estimated bond-related costs.

(4) Out of the amount specified in section 1 (6)(m)(D) of this 2023 Act, the State Treasurer may issue Article XI-Q bonds in an amount not to exceed \$10,600,000 of net proceeds for the purposes and in the manner specified in section 8, chapter 705, Oregon Laws 2013, plus an amount estimated by the State Treasurer to pay estimated bond-related costs.

(5) For purposes of sections 8 and 9, chapter 705, Oregon Laws 2013, and section 64, chapter 723, Oregon Laws 2013, bonds issued pursuant to this section are considered to be bonds issued pursuant to section 8, chapter 705, Oregon Laws 2013.

(6) Bonds may not be issued pursuant to section 1 (6)(m)(A), (B), (C) or (D) of this 2023 Act except as provided in this section.

<u>SECTION 11.</u> (1) A public university that is carrying out a qualified project shall require each contractor in a contract with an estimated cost of \$200,000 or greater to:

(a) Employ apprentices to perform 15 percent of the work hours that workers in apprenticeable occupations perform under the contract, in a manner consistent with the apprentices' respective apprenticeship training programs;

(b) Establish and execute a plan for outreach, recruitment and retention of women, minority individuals and veterans to perform work under the contract, with the aspirational target of having at least 15 percent of total work hours performed by individuals in one or more of those groups;

(c) Provide health insurance and retirement benefits to workers; and

(d) Require any subcontractor engaged by the contractor to abide by the requirements set forth in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of this subsection, if the work to be performed under the subcontract has an estimated cost of \$200,000 or greater.

(2) On or before February 1 of each year, each public university that is carrying out a qualified project shall report to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means or Joint Interim Committee on Ways and Means, as part of the report required under ORS 350.379, on:

(a) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by apprentices;

(b) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by women, minority individuals and veterans; and

(c) The types and costs of health insurance and retirement benefits provided to workers by contractors and subcontractors.

(3) The requirements of this section are in addition to, and not in lieu of, the requirements imposed under ORS 350.379.

(4) As used in this section:

(a) "Apprentice" has the meaning given that term in ORS 660.010.

(b) "Apprenticeable occupation" has the meaning given that term in ORS 660.010.

(c) "Apprenticeship training program" means the total system of apprenticeship that a particular local joint committee, as defined in ORS 660.010, operates, including the local joint committee's registered standards and all other terms and conditions for qualifying, recruiting, selecting, employing and training apprentices in an apprenticeable occupation.

(d) "Minority individual" has the meaning given that term in ORS 200.005.

(e) "Qualified project" means the following capital construction projects:

(A) The University of Oregon Friendly Hall renovation referenced in section 1 (1)(L) of this 2023 Act;

(B) The Oregon State University Collaborative Innovation Complex referenced in section 1 (1)(m) of this 2023 Act;

(C) The Portland State University Vernier Science Center and Gateway Art and Design project completions referenced in section 1 (1)(n) of this 2023 Act; and

(D) The Oregon Institute of Technology geothermal system emergency renovation referenced in section 1 (6)(i)(E) of this 2023 Act.

(f) "Veteran" has the meaning given that term in ORS 408.225.

(g) "Woman" has the meaning given that term in ORS 200.005.

SECTION 12. This 2023 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2023 Act takes effect July 1, 2023.
