Senate Bill 428

Sponsored by Senator BONHAM (Presession filed.)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Modifies pay equity requirements for employers. Removes certain provisions relating to obligations, rights and remedies under pay equity laws. Makes conforming amendments.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

7 <u>SECTION 1.</u> ORS 652.210, as amended by sections 1 and 2, chapter 23, Oregon Laws 2022, is 8 amended to read:
