

## SENATE AMENDMENTS TO SENATE BILL 470

By COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY

April 13

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 4 through 27 and delete page 2 and insert:

2 **“SECTION 1. (1) As used in this section:**

3 **“(a) ‘Juvenile detention facility’ means a detention facility, as defined in ORS 419A.004.**

4 **“(b) ‘Youth’ means an adjudicated youth or a youth, as those terms are defined in ORS**  
5 **419A.004.**

6 **“(2) The Youth in Custody Health Services Advisory Committee is established in the**  
7 **Oregon Health Authority to provide guidance to the authority and policy recommendations**  
8 **to ensure continuity of care and access to health care for youths detained in juvenile de-**  
9 **tention facilities.**

10 **“(3) The director of the Oregon Health Authority shall appoint 14 members to the advi-**  
11 **sory committee as follows:**

12 **“(a) One member from the Oregon Health Authority who represents the behavioral**  
13 **health services program.**

14 **“(b) One member from the Oregon Health Authority who represents the Medicaid pro-**  
15 **gram.**

16 **“(c) One member from the Oregon Youth Authority.**

17 **“(d) Two members representing the Oregon Juvenile Department Directors’ Association,**  
18 **of whom at least one is from a county in which a juvenile detention facility is located.**

19 **“(e) One member from the Department of Human Services who represents child welfare.**

20 **“(f) One member from the Department of Human Services who specializes in services**  
21 **provided to persons with intellectual or developmental disabilities.**

22 **“(g) One member who represents a coordinated care organization that serves a region**  
23 **with a juvenile detention facility.**

24 **“(h) One member who represents the Association of Oregon Community Mental Health**  
25 **Programs.**

26 **“(i) One member who is a member of a federally recognized Indian tribe in this state or**  
27 **that individual’s designee.**

28 **“(j) One member who is a family member of a youth involved in the juvenile justice sys-**  
29 **tem.**

30 **“(k) One member who is a youth with experience being placed in a juvenile detention fa-**  
31 **cility.**

32 **“(L) One member who is from the Department of Education.**

33 **“(m) One member who is a member of the Youth Development Council established under**  
34 **ORS 417.847.**

35 **“(4) The advisory committee shall analyze the services and costs related to health care**

1 for youths placed in juvenile detention facilities and advise and make recommendations to  
2 the Oregon Health Authority regarding the continuum of health-related services for youths  
3 receiving services from county-level juvenile justice systems. In conducting the analyses,  
4 providing the advice and making the recommendations under this subsection, the advisory  
5 committee shall take into consideration, at a minimum:

6 “(a) Key drivers of detention and health care related interventions and post-  
7 interventions.

8 “(b) The system infrastructure used to collect data for program implementation and  
9 monitoring.

10 “(c) Gaps in needed services that create barriers to continuity of care.

11 “(d) Data-driven recommendations to mitigate the gaps identified in paragraph (c) of this  
12 subsection.

13 “(e) Requirements and mandates in federal laws regarding coverage for services for  
14 youths transitioning from custody.

15 “(f) Data-driven information on outcomes and expenses, including denials and complaints  
16 of youths and families attempting to receive services through state medical assistance pro-  
17 grams.

18 “(g) The racial and ethnic disparities of youths who are impacted by the lack of conti-  
19 nuity of care resulting from placement in a juvenile detention facility.

20 “(h) Special health care needs of youths with intellectual or developmental disabilities.

21 “(i) The efficiency and effectiveness of the state and county oversight of access to ser-  
22 vices and service delivery to youths transitioning out of custody.

23 “(j) Opportunities to improve alignment with federal mandates.

24 “(5) The advisory committee may:

25 “(a) Assess current laws and mandates for health care throughout a youth’s involvement  
26 with the juvenile justice system, specifically while placed in juvenile detention facilities; and

27 “(b) Make recommendations for legislation, including recommendations for seeking fed-  
28 eral approval of demonstration projects, waivers or state plan amendments to include ser-  
29 vices for youths in juvenile detention facilities.

30 “(6) No later than September 1 of each even-numbered year, the advisory committee shall  
31 submit a report of its analyses and advice developed under subsection (4) of this section and  
32 any recommendations for legislation to the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly  
33 related to health, in the manner provided in ORS 192.245.

34 “(7) All agencies of state government, as defined in ORS 174.111, are directed to assist  
35 the advisory committee in the performance of its duties and, to the extent permitted by laws  
36 relating to confidentiality, to furnish such information and advice as the members of the  
37 advisory committee consider necessary to perform their duties.

38 “**SECTION 2.** The report described in section 1 (6) of this 2023 Act is first due September  
39 1, 2024.”
