

Senate Bill 782

Sponsored by Senator FREDERICK

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Removes statutory provisions relating to death penalty.

Takes effect only if constitutional amendment proposed by Senate Joint Resolution 27 (2023) is approved by people at regular general election held in November 2024. Takes effect on effective date of constitutional amendment proposed by Senate Joint Resolution 27 (2023).

6 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

CHANGES TO MURDER SENTENCING PROCEEDINGS

10 **SECTION 1.** ORS 163.105 is amended to read:

11 163.105. Notwithstanding the provisions of ORS chapter 144 and ORS 421.450 to 421.490:

12 (1)(a) Except as otherwise provided in ORS 137.707, when a defendant is convicted of aggravated
13 murder as defined by ORS 163.095, the defendant shall be sentenced, pursuant to ORS 163.150, to
14 [*death,*] life imprisonment without the possibility of release or parole or life imprisonment.

15 (b) A person sentenced to life imprisonment without the possibility of release or parole under
16 this section shall not have that sentence suspended, deferred or commuted by any judicial officer,
17 and the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision may not parole the prisoner nor reduce
18 the period of confinement in any manner whatsoever. The Department of Corrections or any execu-
19 tive official may not permit the prisoner to participate in any sort of release or furlough program.

20 (c) If sentenced to life imprisonment, the court shall order that the defendant shall be confined
21 for a minimum of 30 years without possibility of parole or release to post-prison supervision except
22 as provided in ORS 144.397, and without the possibility of release on work release or any form of
23 temporary leave or employment at a forest or work camp.

24 (2) At any time after completion of a minimum period of confinement pursuant to subsection
25 (1)(c) of this section, the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision, upon the petition of a
26 prisoner so confined, shall hold a hearing to determine if the prisoner is likely to be rehabilitated
27 within a reasonable period of time. The sole issue is whether or not the prisoner is likely to be re-
28 habilitated within a reasonable period of time. At the hearing, the prisoner has:

29 (a) The burden of proving by a preponderance of the evidence the likelihood of rehabilitation
30 within a reasonable period of time;

NOTE: Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter [*italic and bracketed*] is existing law to be omitted. New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

1 (b) The right, if the prisoner is without sufficient funds to employ an attorney, to be represented
2 by legal counsel, appointed by the board, at board expense; and

3 (c) The right to a subpoena upon a showing of the general relevance and reasonable scope of
4 the evidence sought, provided that any subpoena issued on behalf of the prisoner must be issued by
5 the State Board of Parole and Post-Prison Supervision pursuant to rules adopted by the board.

6 (3) If, upon hearing all of the evidence, the board, upon a unanimous vote of three board mem-
7 bers or, if the chairperson requires all voting members to participate, a unanimous vote of all voting
8 members, finds that the prisoner is capable of rehabilitation and that the terms of the prisoner's
9 confinement should be changed to life imprisonment with the possibility of parole, release to post-
10 prison supervision or work release, it shall enter an order to that effect and the order shall convert
11 the terms of the prisoner's confinement to life imprisonment with the possibility of parole, release
12 to post-prison supervision or work release and may set a release date. Otherwise the board shall
13 deny the relief sought in the petition.

14 (4) If the board denies the relief sought in the petition, the board shall determine the date of the
15 subsequent hearing, and the prisoner may petition for an interim hearing, in accordance with ORS
16 144.285.

17 (5) The board's final order shall be accompanied by findings of fact and conclusions of law. The
18 findings of fact shall consist of a concise statement of the underlying facts supporting the findings
19 as to each contested issue of fact and as to each ultimate fact required to support the board's order.

20 **SECTION 2.** ORS 163.150 is amended to read:

21 163.150. (1)(a) Upon a finding that the defendant is guilty of aggravated murder, the court, ex-
22 cept as otherwise provided in subsection (3) of this section, shall conduct a separate sentencing
23 proceeding to determine whether the defendant shall be sentenced to life imprisonment, as described
24 in ORS 163.105 (1)(c), **or** life imprisonment without the possibility of release or parole, as described
25 in ORS 163.105 (1)(b)[, *or death*]. The proceeding shall be conducted in the trial court before the trial
26 jury as soon as practicable. If a juror for any reason is unable to perform the function of a juror,
27 the juror shall be dismissed from the sentencing proceeding. The court shall cause to be drawn the
28 name of one of the alternate jurors, who shall then become a member of the jury for the sentencing
29 proceeding notwithstanding the fact that the alternate juror did not deliberate on the issue of guilt.
30 If the defendant has pleaded guilty, the sentencing proceeding shall be conducted before a jury
31 impaneled for that purpose. In the proceeding, evidence may be presented as to any matter that the
32 court deems relevant to sentence including, but not limited to, victim impact evidence relating to
33 the personal characteristics of the victim or the impact of the crime on the victim's family and any
34 aggravating or mitigating evidence relevant to [*the issue in paragraph (b)(C) of this subsection*]
35 **sentencing**; however, neither the state nor the defendant shall be allowed to introduce repetitive
36 evidence that has previously been offered and received during the trial on the issue of guilt. The
37 court shall instruct the jury that all evidence previously offered and received may be considered for
38 purposes of the sentencing hearing. This paragraph shall not be construed to authorize the intro-
39 duction of any evidence secured in violation of the Constitution of the United States or of the State
40 of Oregon. The state and the defendant or the counsel of the defendant shall be permitted to present
41 arguments [*for or against a sentence of death and*] for or against a sentence of life imprisonment with
42 or without the possibility of release or parole.

43 [*(b) Upon the conclusion of the presentation of the evidence, the court shall submit the following*
44 *issues to the jury:*]

45 [*(A) Whether the conduct of the defendant that caused the death of the deceased was committed*

1 *deliberately and with the reasonable expectation that death of the deceased or another would result;]*

2 *[(B) If raised by the evidence, whether the conduct of the defendant in killing the deceased was*
3 *unreasonable in response to the provocation, if any, by the deceased; and]*

4 *[(C) Whether the defendant should receive a death sentence.]*

5 *[(c)(A) (b) The court shall instruct the jury to consider[, in determining the issues in paragraph*
6 *(b) of this subsection,] any mitigating circumstances offered in evidence, including but not limited to*
7 *the defendant's age, the extent and severity of the defendant's prior criminal conduct and the extent*
8 *of the mental and emotional pressure under which the defendant was acting at the time the offense*
9 *was committed.*

10 *[(B) The court shall instruct the jury to answer the question in paragraph (b)(C) of this subsection*
11 *"no" if, after considering any aggravating evidence and any mitigating evidence concerning any aspect*
12 *of the defendant's character or background, or any circumstances of the offense and any victim impact*
13 *evidence as described in paragraph (a) of this subsection, one or more of the jurors believe that the*
14 *defendant should not receive a death sentence.]*

15 *[(d) The state must prove each issue submitted under paragraph (b) of this subsection beyond a*
16 *reasonable doubt, and the jury shall return a special verdict of "yes" or "no" on each issue*
17 *considered.]*

18 *[(e) The court shall charge the jury that it may not answer any issue "yes," under paragraph (b)*
19 *of this subsection unless it agrees unanimously.]*

20 *[(f) If the jury returns an affirmative finding on each issue considered under paragraph (b) of this*
21 *subsection, the trial judge shall sentence the defendant to death.]*

22 (2)(a) Upon the conclusion of the presentation of the evidence, the court shall also instruct the
23 jury that *[if it reaches a negative finding on any issue under subsection (1)(b) of this section,]* the trial
24 court shall sentence the defendant to life imprisonment without the possibility of release or parole,
25 as described in ORS 163.105 (1)(b), unless 10 or more members of the jury *[further]* find that there
26 are sufficient mitigating circumstances to warrant life imprisonment, in which case the trial court
27 shall sentence the defendant to life imprisonment as described in ORS 163.105 (1)(c).

28 (b) If the jury *[returns a negative finding on any issue under subsection (1)(b) of this section and*
29 *further]* finds that there are sufficient mitigating circumstances to warrant life imprisonment, the
30 trial court shall sentence the defendant to life imprisonment in the custody of the Department of
31 Corrections as provided in ORS 163.105 (1)(c).

32 (3)(a) When the defendant is found guilty of aggravated murder[,] and ORS 137.707 (2) applies
33 *[or the state advises the court on the record that the state declines to present evidence for purposes of*
34 *sentencing the defendant to death],* the court[:]

35 *[(A) Shall not conduct a sentencing proceeding as described in subsection (1) of this section, and*
36 *a sentence of death shall not be ordered.]*

37 *[(B)]* shall conduct a sentencing proceeding to determine whether the defendant shall be sen-
38 tenced to life imprisonment without the possibility of release or parole as described in ORS 163.105
39 (1)(b) or life imprisonment as described in ORS 163.105 (1)(c). If the defendant waives all rights to
40 a jury sentencing proceeding, the court shall conduct the sentencing proceeding as the trier of fact.
41 The procedure for the sentencing proceeding, whether before a court or a jury, shall follow the
42 procedure of subsection (1)(a) of this section[, *as modified by this subsection*]. In the proceeding, ev-
43 idence may be presented as to any matter that the court deems relevant to sentence, including, but
44 not limited to, victim impact evidence relating to the personal characteristics of the victim or the
45 impact of the crime on the victim's family.

1 (b) Following the presentation of evidence and argument under paragraph (a) of this subsection,
 2 the court shall instruct the jury that the trial court shall sentence the defendant to life
 3 imprisonment without the possibility of release or parole as described in ORS 163.105 (1)(b), unless
 4 after considering all of the evidence submitted, 10 or more members of the jury find there are suf-
 5 ficient mitigating circumstances to warrant life imprisonment with the possibility of parole as de-
 6 scribed in ORS 163.105 (1)(c). If 10 or more members of the jury find there are sufficient mitigating
 7 circumstances to warrant life imprisonment with the possibility of parole, the trial court shall sen-
 8 tence the defendant to life imprisonment as described in ORS 163.105 (1)(c).

9 (c) Nothing in this subsection shall preclude the court from sentencing the defendant to life
 10 imprisonment, as described in ORS 163.105 (1)(c), or life imprisonment without the possibility of re-
 11 lease or parole, as described in ORS 163.105 (1)(b), pursuant to a stipulation of sentence or stipu-
 12 lation of sentencing facts agreed to and offered by both parties if the defendant waives all rights to
 13 a jury sentencing proceeding.

14 (4) If any part of subsection (2) of this section is held invalid and as a result thereof a defendant
 15 who has been sentenced to life imprisonment without possibility of release or parole will instead be
 16 sentenced to life imprisonment in the custody of the Department of Corrections as provided in ORS
 17 163.105 (2), the defendant shall be confined for a minimum of 30 years without possibility of parole,
 18 release on work release or any form of temporary leave or employment at a forest or work camp.
 19 Subsection (2) of this section shall apply only to trials commencing on or after July 19, 1989.

20 (5) Notwithstanding subsection (1)(a) of this section, if the trial court grants a mistrial during
 21 the sentencing proceeding, the trial court, at the election of the state, shall either:

22 (a) Sentence the defendant to imprisonment for life in the custody of the Department of Cor-
 23 rections as provided in ORS 163.105 (1)(c); or

24 (b) Impanel a new sentencing jury for the purpose of conducting a new sentencing proceeding
 25 to determine if the defendant should be sentenced to:

26 [(A) *Death;*]

27 [(B)] (A) Imprisonment for life without the possibility of release or parole as provided in ORS
 28 163.105 (1)(b); or

29 [(C)] (B) Imprisonment for life in the custody of the Department of Corrections as provided in
 30 ORS 163.105 (1)(c).

31 **SECTION 3.** ORS 163.155 is amended to read:

32 163.155. (1) When a defendant, who was at least 15 years of age at the time of committing the
 33 murder, is convicted of murdering a pregnant victim under ORS 163.115 (1)(a) and the defendant
 34 knew that the victim was pregnant, the defendant shall be sentenced to life imprisonment without
 35 the possibility of release or parole if the person was at least 18 years of age at the time of com-
 36 mitting the offense or to life imprisonment. The court shall conduct a sentencing proceeding to de-
 37 termine whether the defendant shall be sentenced to life imprisonment without the possibility of
 38 release or parole as described in subsection (4) of this section or to life imprisonment as described
 39 in subsection (5) of this section. If the defendant waives all rights to a jury sentencing proceeding,
 40 the court shall conduct the sentencing proceeding as the trier of fact. The procedure for the sen-
 41 tencing proceeding, whether before a court or a jury, shall follow the procedure of ORS 163.150
 42 (1)(a)[*as modified by this section*].

43 (2) Following the presentation of evidence and argument under subsection (1) of this section, the
 44 court shall instruct the jury that the trial court shall sentence the defendant to life imprisonment
 45 without the possibility of release or parole as described in subsection (4) of this section, unless after

1 considering all of the evidence submitted, 10 or more members of the jury find there are sufficient
2 mitigating circumstances to warrant life imprisonment with the possibility of release or parole as
3 described in subsection (5) of this section. If 10 or more members of the jury do not find there are
4 sufficient mitigating circumstances to warrant life imprisonment with the possibility of release or
5 parole, the trial court shall sentence the defendant to life imprisonment without the possibility of
6 release or parole as described in subsection (4) of this section. If 10 or more members of the jury
7 find there are sufficient mitigating circumstances to warrant life imprisonment with the possibility
8 of release or parole, the trial court shall sentence the defendant to life imprisonment as described
9 in subsection (5) of this section.

10 (3) Nothing in this section precludes the court from sentencing the defendant to life
11 imprisonment, as described in subsection (5) of this section, or life imprisonment without the possi-
12 bility of release or parole, as described in subsection (4) of this section, pursuant to a stipulation
13 of sentence or stipulation of sentencing facts agreed to and offered by both parties if the defendant
14 waives all rights to a jury sentencing proceeding.

15 (4) A sentence of life imprisonment without the possibility of release or parole under this section
16 may not be suspended, deferred or commuted by any judicial officer, and the State Board of Parole
17 and Post-Prison Supervision may neither parole the prisoner nor reduce the period of confinement
18 in any manner whatsoever. The Department of Corrections or any executive official may not permit
19 the prisoner to participate in any sort of release or furlough program.

20 (5) If the defendant is sentenced to life imprisonment, the court shall order that the defendant
21 be confined for a minimum of 30 years without possibility of parole or release to post-prison super-
22 vision except as provided in ORS 144.397, and without the possibility of release on work release or
23 any form of temporary leave or employment at a forest or work camp.

24 (6) At any time after completion of the minimum period of confinement pursuant to subsection
25 (5) of this section, the board, upon the petition of a prisoner so confined, shall hold a hearing to
26 determine if the prisoner is likely to be rehabilitated within a reasonable period of time. The sole
27 issue shall be whether the prisoner is likely to be rehabilitated within a reasonable period of time.
28 The proceeding shall be conducted in the manner prescribed for a contested case hearing under ORS
29 chapter 183, except that:

30 (a) The prisoner has the burden of proving by a preponderance of the evidence the likelihood
31 of rehabilitation within a reasonable period of time;

32 (b) The prisoner has the right, if the prisoner is without sufficient funds to employ an attorney,
33 to be represented by legal counsel, appointed by the board, at board expense; and

34 (c) The prisoner has the right to a subpoena upon a showing of the general relevance and rea-
35 sonable scope of the evidence sought, provided that any subpoena issued on behalf of the prisoner
36 must be issued by the board pursuant to rules adopted by the board.

37 (7) If, upon hearing all of the evidence, the board, upon a unanimous vote of three board mem-
38 bers or, if the chairperson requires all voting members to participate, a unanimous vote of all voting
39 members, finds that the prisoner is capable of rehabilitation and that the terms of the prisoner's
40 confinement should be changed to life imprisonment with the possibility of parole, release on post-
41 prison supervision or work release, it shall enter an order to that effect and the order shall convert
42 the terms of the prisoner's confinement to life imprisonment with the possibility of parole, release
43 on post-prison supervision or work release and may set a release date. Otherwise the board shall
44 deny the relief sought in the petition.

45 (8) Not less than two years after the denial of the relief sought in a petition under this section,

1 the prisoner may petition again for a change in the terms of confinement. Further petitions for a
 2 change may be filed at intervals of not less than two years thereafter.

29 (E) Misdemeanor crimes.

30 (F) Crimes requiring mandatory minimum sentences.

31 [(f) *The decision whether to present evidence for purposes of seeking the death penalty under ORS*
 32 *163.150.*]

33 [(g)] (f) Plea offers.

34 [(h)] (g) Civil compromise under ORS 135.703 to 135.709.

35 [(i)] (h) Diversion programs.

36 [(j)] (i) Requests for the imposition of fines and fees, including attorney fees for appointed
 37 counsel.

38 [(k)] (j) If an early disposition program exists in the county, eligibility and standard disposition
 39 recommendations.

40 [(L)] (k) If any treatment court exists in the county, eligibility and standard disposition recom-
 41 mendations.

42 [(m)] (L) If any pre-arrest diversion program exists in the county, eligibility.

43 [(n)] (m) The consideration of collateral consequences of conviction, including immigration
 44 consequences.

45 [(o)] (n) Sentencing programs, including alternative incarceration programs, conditional release,

1 work release, earned sentence reductions and short-term transitional leave.

2 [(p)] (o) The filing of an affidavit and motion for change of judge under ORS 14.260.

3 [(q)] (p) Victim engagement and involvement, including but not limited to involvement in
4 charging decisions.

5 [(r)] (q) Pretrial release under ORS 135.230 to 135.290, including the amount of security release
6 requested for charged offenses and objections to release.

7 [(s)] (r) Guilty except for insanity dispositions.

8 (2) The district attorney shall ensure that the policies described in subsection (1) of this section
9 are available to the public on the district attorney's website.

10 (3) No later than five years after the initial adoption of the policies described in subsection (1)
11 of this section, and every five years thereafter, the district attorney shall:

12 (a) Review the policies, make revisions to the policies as necessary and readopt the policies; and

13 (b) Make the revised policies available to the public on the district attorney's website.

31 tive director shall determine and pay, as provided by the policies, procedures, standards and guide-

33 compensation for the services of appointed counsel in the proceedings in the circuit court.

34 [(7)] (6) If the public defense services executive director denies, in whole or in part, expenses
35 and compensation submitted for review and payment, the person who submitted the payment request
36 may appeal the decision to the presiding judge of the circuit court. The presiding judge or the
37 designee of the presiding judge shall review the public defense services executive director's decision
38 for abuse of discretion. The decision of the presiding judge or the designee of the presiding judge
39 is final.

40 [(8)(a)] (7)(a) When a petitioner has been authorized to proceed as a financially eligible person,
41 all court fees in the circuit court, except for the filing fee required by ORS 138.560, are waived.

42 (b) When a petitioner is allowed to file a petition without payment of the fee required by ORS
43 138.560 due to inability to pay, the fee is not waived but may be drawn from, or charged against,
44 the petitioner's trust account if the petitioner is an adult in custody in a correctional facility.

7 (2) “Assistant district medical examiner” means a physician appointed by the district medical
8 examiner to investigate and certify deaths within a county or district.

9 (3) “Cause of death” means the primary or basic disease process or injury ending life.

10 (4) “Death requiring investigation” means the death of a person occurring in any one of the
11 circumstances set forth in ORS 146.090.

12 (5) “District medical examiner” means a physician appointed by the Chief Medical Examiner to

39 (b) Be transmitted directly to a pharmacist in a pharmacy of the patient's choice with no in-
40 tervening person having access to the prescription drug order;

41 (c) Specify the prescribing practitioner's telephone number for verbal confirmation, the time and
42 date of transmission, the identity of the pharmacy intended to receive the transmission and all other
43 information required for a prescription by federal or state law; and

44 (d) Be traceable to the prescribing practitioner by an electronic signature or other secure
45 method of validation.

1 (3) An electronic transmission of a prescription drug order shall be stored by electronic means
2 or reduced promptly to writing, filed by the pharmacy and retained in conformity with the require-

4 (4) The dispensing pharmacist shall exercise professional judgment regarding the accuracy, va-
5 lidity and authenticity of an electronically transmitted prescription drug order.

6 (5) All equipment for transmission, storage or receipt of electronically transmitted prescription
7 drug orders shall be maintained to protect against unauthorized access.

8 (6) A pharmacist, pharmacy or pharmacy department shall not enter into an agreement with a
9 practitioner or health care facility concerning the provision of any electronic transmission equip-
10 ment or apparatus that would adversely affect a patient's freedom to select the pharmacy or phar-
11 macy department of the patient's choice.

12 (7) A pharmacist, pharmacy or pharmacy department shall not provide any electronic equipment
13 or apparatus to a practitioner or health care facility for the purpose of providing an incentive to
14 the practitioner or health care facility to refer patients to a particular pharmacy or pharmacy de-
15 partment.

16 (8) There shall be no additional charge to the patient because the prescription drug order was
17 electronically transmitted.

18 (9) Nothing in this section shall be construed as authorizing the electronic transmission of a
19 prescription drug order when a written prescription is required under ORS 127.815, [137.473,] 169.750
20 or 453.025.
