16 Laws 2022, is amended to read:

17 “419B.005. As used in ORS 419B.005 to 419B.050, unless the context re-  
18 quires otherwise:

15 to observe or the photographing, filming, tape recording or other exhibition  
16 which, in whole or in part, depicts sexual conduct or contact, as defined in  
17 ORS 167.002 or described in ORS 163.665 and 163.670, sexual abuse involving  
18 a child or rape of a child, but not including any conduct which is part of  
19 any investigation conducted pursuant to ORS 419B.020 or which is designed  
20 to serve educational or other legitimate purposes; and

21 “(ii) Allowing, permitting, encouraging or hiring a child to engage in  
22 prostitution as described in ORS 167.007 or a commercial sex act as defined  
23 in ORS 163.266, to purchase sex with a minor as described in ORS 163.413  
24 or to engage in commercial sexual solicitation as described in ORS 167.008.

25 “(F) Negligent treatment or maltreatment of a child, including but not  
26 limited to the failure to provide adequate food, clothing, shelter or medical  
27 care that is likely to endanger the health or welfare of the child.

28 “(G) Threatened harm to a child, which means subjecting a child to a  
29 substantial risk of harm to the child’s health or welfare.

6 fined in ORS 475C.009, that subjects a child to a substantial risk of harm to  
7 the child’s health or safety.

8 “(b) ‘Abuse’ does not include reasonable discipline unless the discipline  
9 results in one of the conditions described in paragraph (a) of this subsection.

10 “(2) ‘Child’ means an unmarried person who:

11 “(a) Is under 18 years of age; or

12 “(b) *[Is under 21 years of age and residing in or receiving care or services*  
13 *at a child-caring agency as that term is defined in ORS 418.205]* **Is a child**  
14 **in care, as defined in ORS 418.257.**

15 “(3) ‘Higher education institution’ means:

16 “(a) A community college as defined in ORS 341.005;

17 “(b) A public university listed in ORS 352.002;

18 “(c) The Oregon Health and Science University; and

19 “(d) A private institution of higher education located in Oregon.

27 “**SECTION 6.** ORS 419B.020 is amended to read:  
28 “419B.020. (1) If the Department of Human Services or a law enforcement  
29 agency receives a report of child abuse **by a qualified subject**, the depart-  
30 ment or the agency shall immediately:

1       “(a) Cause an investigation to be made to determine the nature and cause  
2 of the abuse of the child; and

3       “(b) Make the following notifications:

4       “(A) To the Office of Child Care if the alleged child abuse occurred in a  
5 child care facility as defined in ORS 329A.250; or

6       “(B) To the Department of Education if the alleged child abuse occurred  
7 in a school or was related to a school-sponsored activity.

8       “(2) The Department of Human Services shall ensure that an investigation  
9 required by subsection (1) of this section is completed if the report is not  
10 investigated by a law enforcement agency.

11       “(3) If the abuse reported in subsection (1) of this section is alleged to  
12 have occurred at a child care facility or in a school or was related to a  
13 school-sponsored activity:

14       “(a) The Department of Human Services and the law enforcement agency  
15 shall jointly determine the roles and responsibilities of the department and  
16 the agency in their respective investigations; and

17       “(b) The department and the agency shall each report the outcomes of  
18 their investigations:

19       “(A) To the Office of Child Care if the alleged child abuse occurred in a  
20 child care facility as defined in ORS 329A.250; or

21       “(B) To the Department of Education if the alleged child abuse occurred  
22 in a school or was related to a school-sponsored activity.

23       “(4) If the law enforcement agency conducting the investigation finds  
24 reasonable cause to believe that abuse has occurred, the law enforcement  
25 agency shall notify by oral report followed by written report the local office  
26 of the department. The Department of Human Services shall provide protec-  
27 tive social services of its own or of other available social agencies if neces-  
28 sary to prevent further abuses to the child or to safeguard the child’s  
29 welfare.

30       “(5) If a child is taken into protective custody by the department, the

1 department shall promptly make reasonable efforts to ascertain the name and  
2 address of the child’s parents or guardian.

3 “(6)(a) If a child is taken into protective custody by the department or a  
4 law enforcement official, the department or law enforcement official shall,  
5 if possible, make reasonable efforts to advise the parents or guardian imme-  
6 diately, regardless of the time of day, that the child has been taken into  
7 custody, the reasons the child has been taken into custody and general in-  
8 formation about the child’s placement, and the telephone number of the local  
9 office of the department and any after-hours telephone numbers.

10 “(b) Notice may be given by any means reasonably certain of notifying  
11 the parents or guardian, including but not limited to written, telephonic or  
12 in-person oral notification. If the initial notification is not in writing, the  
13 information required by paragraph (a) of this subsection also shall be pro-  
14 vided to the parents or guardian in writing as soon as possible.

15 “(c) The department also shall make a reasonable effort to notify the  
16 noncustodial parent of the information required by paragraph (a) of this  
17 subsection in a timely manner.

18 “(d) If a child is taken into custody while under the care and supervision  
19 of a person or organization other than the parent, the department, if possible,  
20 shall immediately notify the person or organization that the child has been  
21 taken into protective custody.

22 “(7) If a law enforcement officer or the department, when taking a child  
23 into protective custody, has reasonable cause to believe that the child has  
24 been affected by sexual abuse and rape of a child as defined in ORS 419B.005  
25 (1)(a)(C) and that physical evidence of the abuse exists and is likely to dis-  
26 appear, the court may authorize a physical examination for the purposes of  
27 preserving evidence if the court finds that it is in the best interest of the  
28 child to have such an examination. Nothing in this section affects the au-  
29 thority of the department to consent to physical examinations of the child  
30 at other times.

1 “(8) A minor child of 12 years of age or older may refuse to consent to  
2 the examination described in subsection (7) of this section. The examination  
3 shall be conducted by or under the supervision of a physician licensed under  
4 ORS chapter 677, a physician assistant licensed under ORS 677.505 to 677.525  
5 or a nurse practitioner licensed under ORS chapter 678 and, whenever prac-  
6 ticable, trained in conducting such examinations.

7 “(9) When the department completes an investigation under this section,  
8 if the person who made the report of child abuse provided contact informa-  
9 tion to the department, the department shall notify the person about whether  
10 contact with the child was made, whether the department determined that  
11 child abuse occurred and whether services will be provided. The department  
12 is not required to disclose information under this subsection if the depart-  
13 ment determines that disclosure is not permitted under ORS 419B.035.

14 “(10) When the Department of Education receives a notification under  
15 subsection (1) of this section or a report on the outcomes of an investigation  
16 under subsection (3) of this section, the department shall act under, and is  
17 subject to, ORS 339.389.

18 **“SECTION 7. (1) Section 1 of this 2023 Act and the amendments to**  
19 **ORS 329A.030 by sections 2 and 3 of this 2023 Act apply to background**  
20 **checks completed on or after the effective date of this 2023 Act.**

21 **“(2) The amendments to ORS 419B.005 and 419B.020 by sections 4 to**  
22 **6 of this 2023 Act apply to abuse investigations arising from acts oc-**  
23 **curring on or after the effective date of this 2023 Act.”.**
