SB 799 will create an environment in which small housing providers will struggle more than they already do to survive in a state that appears to be against them. SB 799 will lead to a rental market even more dominated by corporate housing providers than ever. If this bill is made into law there will be less rental units, rents will continue to increase, there will be less housing inventory developed and added in the state, and housing providers will have to be much more strict with screening requirements.
