VETERAN EDUCATIONAL BRIDGE GRANT – PROGRAM BACKGROUND



Purpose: to support student veterans who are unable to complete an academic or training program on time because required courses or training hours are not available.

Grant Award: Up to \$5,000

Eligibility: Using Post 9/11 GI Bill[®] and unable to complete an academic or training program on time because required classes or training hours are not available.



VETERAN EDUCATIONAL BRIDGE GRANT – PROGRAM FUNDING



Allocated: \$300,000 LF + 1 FTE funding

Total funds awarded: \$220,961 *as of June 30, 2021*

Allocated: \$175,000 LF

2021-23

Total funds awarded: \$49,848 as of September 8,2022

2019 Regular Session: HB 2201 established the Veteran Educational Bridge Grant (VEBG).

2020: The initial grant launch experienced immediate impact from COVID-19 on the higher education system. School closures left some veterans with gaps in their educational funding. Significant need for this program in summer of 2020.



- Early 2020 school closures and employer shutdowns created widespread course and training unavailability. ODVA received 49 applications and awarded 43 Bridge Grants in 2020.
- As schools reopened and training hours in apprenticeship programs resumed, grant applications decreased.
- 2022 trends indicate occasional class cancellations, changes to course scheduling, and reduced apprenticeship training hours cause interruptions in academic or training progress, but on a smaller scale than during COVID.

Partnerships and Professional Networks

- ODVA Campus Veteran Coordinator Summit: Campus Veteran Coordinators at community colleges and public universities (July 2022).
- School Certifying Officials (SCO) via Oregon Association of Veteran School Certifying Officials (ORAVSCO) conference (May 17-18, 2022), website, and email messaging for distribution to their student populations.
- Partners with BOLI to send out to apprentices and apprenticeship coordinators in their registered apprentice networks.

Campus Visits and Outreach Events

- VEBG Coordinator visited 24 Oregon Institutes of Higher Learning (IHL) between May 1 August 31, 2022.

VEBG EXPANDED ELIGIBILITY – HB 2271

HB 2271 would not change the current purpose of VEBG but would expand eligibility by:

- Eliminating the current statutory sunset of the grant (January 1, 2024) and making the VEBG program permanent.
- Eliminating the requirement that a veteran's program of training or education be approved for GI Bill[®] benefits.
- Allowing veterans at any licensed career school, in any registered apprenticeship, or any on-the-job training program with a public employer to be eligible.
- Eliminating the requirement that veterans have entitlement to education benefits based on service (i.e. GI Bill[®] benefits).
- Allowing veterans to apply for a grant of up to \$5,000 to cover a debt on a student account that is preventing them from enrolling in courses for an upcoming term.



- \$400,000 in LF in the GRB
- If HB 2271 and funding are enacted, ODVA will recruit for the existing position to administer the program
- Education is a top priority of the Governor. "Students need more investment in their education"
- The VEBG does just that investing in our Oregon Veterans' education.
