Chair Dexter, Co-Vice Chairs Gamba, Helfrich and Members of the Committee:

When I arrived in Portland, Oregon in 2010, I was just coming off a national music tour. Before that I was a Wilderness Guide near Moab, Utah and before that, a middle and high school band director. Every season I was outdoors hiking, rock climbing, white water rafting, teaching others how to make fire from rubbing sticks together, you name it. Part of why moved to Portland was so I could be learn to surf and still be a snowboarder without having to travel far. I was only gonna to use my car for grocery trips and getting outta town and for everything else, I was gonna ride my bicycle.

I was riding my bicycle six weeks after arriving when my 150 lb body following all the rules of the road was no match for a 5,000 lb station wagon. After initial contact, I yelled for him to stop but instead, he kept driving. He dragged me around and when I finally landed, the concussion was already setting in. I needed shoulder surgery on my left side and hip surgery on the other. My dominant hand was broken but it took three years to get a cast. Now it's been 13 and four wrist surgeries later, I can use my finally use it again. I wish the same were true for the other parts but I got an appointment later today to talk about back surgery.

My instinct after playing sports my whole life was to get up and walk it off. I told everyone I was fine until it dawned on me seven months later, I couldn't push my way through this one. Between rent, bills and medical expenses, I burned through my \$5,000 savings and had to choose between homelessness and moving into an upstair bedroom with someone who didn't get me.

Along the way, I learned the ADA doesn't cover housing, the Fair Housing Act doesn't do enough, and Section 504 doesn't cover private homes. 7 of the 10 of the places I've lived had stairs. But I was one of the lucky ones, I survived, I rose from the ashes a created a life from my wheelchair but most others in my circumstances don't. They end up in institutions, on the street or dead. I urge you to work with Community Vision and other accessibility experts on House Bill 2889 so stories like mine become our collective past.
