Apparently the supporters of HB 3158 on the House Committee on Climate, Energy, and Environment don't think we have done enough. We have paid our taxes while establishing a Ma and Pa business that helps to feed the world. After reading HB3158 and how the bill so conveniently rolls 6 new taxes, all which would negatively effect us, into one tidy not so little package, I have concerns.

What would the net annual decrease in carbon emissions be including retrofit carbon footprint?

Would the decrease be meaningful, or just a symbolic gesture that makes no real environmental difference?

What is the projected tax revenue generated annually by each of the six new taxes? Are the news taxes going to sunset or remain in place until other legislation eliminates them?

Why should so much of the burden be placed on rural food and fiber producers when the supposed fixes mainly address an urban issue.?

Until these questions are accurately answered I think it not prudent for any of you to support HB 3158.

No statements concerning Fiscal or Revenue impacts have been produced.

Proceeding forward with the bill without those statements in itself would be irresponsible.

One thing for sure, if this bill becomes law, it will ultimately prove to be a business and job destroyer, except for the bloated government

agencies it will create. Ladies and gentlemen who are supporting this bill, I think you
