Dear Chair Golden, Vice-Chair Girod, and members of the Committee,

On behalf of Great Hells Canyon Council (GHCC) I wish to offer our excitement, gratitude and support for SB 530, which will help maximize carbon sequestration and improve the resilience of Oregon's forests, agricultural lands, wetlands, and natural resource economies.

We are proud to be part of a broad coalition of non-profit organizations, local elected officials, farmers, ranchers, and forest landowners across Oregon who are eager to see the legislature advance Natural Climate Solutions and pass SB 530 this session.

GHCC is based in rural Northeast Oregon. We see first hand and are working daily with a diverse group of stakeholders (ranchers, farmers, tribal partners, other NGOS, and natural resource practitioners) who are all extremely concerned about the effects of a changing climate.
