## HJR20 Testimony

My name is Brandy Penner, I am a parent and former chair and director of the Newberg School Board.

I am here today to speak to the importance of allowing 16 and 17-year-old Oregonians to participate in our democratic process to help ensure that we are a state with leaders and laws representing and serving all Oregonians.

Including 16 and 17-year-old in the democratic process will engage and empower lifelong voters and help ensure that elected officials are held accountable by their youngest constituents.

I have experienced firsthand the consequences of an elected body that wielded power unchecked to those they were meant to serve.
