Good Afternoon, Chair Reynolds and Vice Chairs Nguyen and Scharf and members of the committee. Thank you for this opportunity to speak.

My name is Barbara Santiago. I live in Creswell, OR and work at Relief Nursery In. as Deputy Director of Early Childhood Programs.

I support House Bill 2504.

I started working at Relief Nursery in February 2011; some of the requirements for teacher/ home visitors were Bachelor's Degree in Early Childhood Education, social work or the educational field. My educational background is exactly that. I graduated from la "Escuela Normal para Educadoras de Guadalajara Jalisco México" and was very fortunate that Relief Nursery gave me a job opportunity.

The workforce registry, ORO, has been one of the biggest challenges in my professional development. I applied to the registry and sent in the required documentation in 2011. By 2013 I was still struggling with a list of additional requirements they had given in order to get my transcripts accepted. I followed the directions I was given by ORO to get my documentation officially translated and spent more than 500 dollars, re-sent all my information along with my application, only to find out two years later I was still unable to get my bachelor's degree accepted.

I felt so discouraged after trying to have my degree accepted for so long that I started to look for other options to become qualified according to ORO. I decided to enroll at Lane Community College. I went back to school to study for the second time, my same degree, taking classes in the evening after working all day. In 2016, I was finally able to increase my qualifications in the registry after completing my studies at Lane Community College. During the time I was studying at Lane, I was not much present for my family – I had three little girls at home. During the day, I was working to support my family, during the nights I went to school, and worked on school projects.

Now that years have passed and I have grown professionally at Relief Nursery, I can see nothing has changed with the registry system, the challenges and struggles have not been reviewed or improved and I see that many other applicants that like me find themselves struggling to be able to meet requirements of the work force. I know and understand how difficult for both employee and employer it is to face this challenging registry system. I am here today to ask for your vote in favor of house bill 2405 to eliminate the barriers and challenges in the early childhood work force registry.
