Measure: HB3382

As a concerned Oregon native, who grew up on the Yaquina River, has lived in North Portland along the Willamette and Columbia Rivers, and now lives adjacent to the Tualatin River, I strongly oppose HB 3382. The Joint Committee on Transportation should not advance HB 3382, which is an extreme, vague, and dangerous bill that would allow powerful Ports to bypass important protections for our environment and our communities. Specifically,

- HB 3382 would exempt five listed Ports from local and state land use regulations including statewide land use planning goals and related administrative rules, local comprehensive plans, and local zoning regulations if a project, on land or in water, is served by a deep-water navigation channel. This would include local and state regulations involving public involvement, protections for in-water, riparian, and upland habitat, floodplains and wetlands, protections for the Willamette River Greenway, protections for Oregon's coastal zone, dredging and dredge disposal regulations, regulations to protect the safety and livability of adjacent communities,
- HB 3382 would give powerful Ports and their powerful industrial allies, some of the most influential and well-connected interests in the state, the ability to run roughshod over local communities.
- HB 3382 provides absolutely no rationale for giving sweeping exemptions for Ports which are some of the largest landowners in that state and which have profound impacts on the environment, the community, and the economy.
- The Port of Portland, one of the five listed Ports in this legislation, says that it was not involved in drafting the legislation and is not supporting it.
- HB 3382 would fundamentally undermine the ability of communities to protect their environment, community safety, climate goals, and livability goals and is an affront to basic public process and accountability.

In summary, I ask you to please NOT advance HB 3382.
