As a fly tyer and avid angler, I strongly oppose the proposed bill Job 3390 from Oregon. This bill seeks to restrict the use of certain materials in fly tying, including feathers from game birds such as pheasants and grouse. While the intent of the bill may be to protect wildlife, it is misguided and would have a negative impact on the fly tying community, as well as the broader fishing industry.

First and foremost, fly tying is an important aspect of the sport of fly fishing.
