• Increasing housing access by adding 202 new low barrier supportive housing beds across four counties.

• Expanding low-barrier substance use disorder health care services by offering a low-barrier assessment service in each county and increasing capacity for walk-in and on-demand behavioral health care.

As a provider that is committed to serving those in need, we ask for your continued support to provide these vital services. These initiatives take time, but by supporting HB 2513, we can continue to make progress in addressing addiction and providing essential services to those in need throughout Oregon.

Finally, I want to emphasize that we, the providers, are exhausted from doing more with less. The amount of time we spend protecting funding hinders our ability to focus on strategic work and expansion. By supporting HB 2513, you are supporting us, and in turn, supporting those in need.
