Dear Co-Chairs Sanchez and Steiner and the Joint Committee on Ways and Means,

My name is Maria Silva and I am a student at Oregon State University as well as a graduate of Riverside Jr/Sr High School. I'm writing to urge your support of House Bill 3120, which would establish a \$5 million competitive grant fund to be managed by the Higher Education Coordinating Commission in support of college access and success programs like College Possible. College Possible has been an important part of my journey and how I arrived where I am today.

When I first learned about College Possible, they were recruiting students to join during lunchtime at my school. What caught my attention was that they were not shy at all and would go right up to students during their lunchtime and even have conversations with them. They tried to connect with students through similar interests and showed how passionate they were. Seeing how they were trying to recruit students was different from what other programs would do since the majority just sat at tables waiting for students to approach them. After seeing that, I decided to talk to them and sign up for more information.

Being able to learn early on what the college process would consist of helped prepare me for the challenges I later faced and for the main reason I want to go to college. College Possible has supported me in many ways varying from being a support system to being a guide. Without any financial help I would not be able to go to college, but my coaches have made sure to provide me multiple scholarships I qualify for every month and answer any college questions I may have. They also never hesitate to directly reach out and connect with schools to ask questions students may not be comfortable sharing. A memory I have of College Possible that shows how much they care about preparing students for college is when they took us to visit five universities my junior year.
