Subject: Support & Fund HB 2994A

Dear Co-Chair Steiner, Co-Chair Sanchez and Members of the Joint Committee On Ways and Means,

I am writing today to share my strong support of HB 2994A, a bill that will ensure deaf and hard-of-hearing kids across the state get the critical healthcare services they need to thrive.

In 2018, the legislature passed HB 4104 which required insurers to cover hearing aids, cochlear implants, and certain assistive listening devices for children to reduce barriers in school and life for those with hearing loss. Early interventions and access to hearing aids, cochlear implants, and assistive listening devices are incredibly important for a child's development. HB 4104 passed almost unanimously through the legislature, showing strong bipartisan support. It set a national model of care for how the state, in partnership with insurers, can support Oregonians who are deaf or hard of hearing.

Since the passage of HB 4104, several issues have cropped up in the implementation process, barring children with hearing loss from being able to access these critical services, and forcing families to pay out-of-pocket costs for less medically appropriate alternatives.

HB 2994A will clarify and expand insurance coverage of hearing aids, cochlear implants, and assistive listening devices for deaf and hard-of-hearing children across the state and ensure the promise the state made to our children in 2018 is properly implemented.

I AM THE MOTHER OF A DEAF AND BLIND SON. I personally know the challenges he and his peers faced regarding insurance coverage for needed devices and services. He received his first hearing aids at 5 months, his right ear cochlear implant at 4 years and his left ear cochlear implant at 15 years. He is now 35 year old with an undergraduate degree from Berklee College of Music and a Master's in Legal Studies. He works for a non-profit which assists disabled individuals find employment. Think about it! He is deaf and blind! His cochlear implants gave him incredible spoken language and music skills, allowed him to excel in the academic

world, and have a productive career. He does not need to rely on State and Federal assistance to live. This is the opportunity every child should have. The 2018 was good but we need more. We need HB 2994A!

This bill passed the House Behavioral Health & Health Care Committee with unanimous support and has a bipartisan group of co-chief and regular sponsors.

The state has an opportunity to invest in the future of our children. That is why I am urging you to fund HB 2994A this session and keep the promise the legislature made to our deaf and hard-of-hearing children five years ago.
