Higher Education Coordinating Commission Apprenticeship Utilization

Analyst: Walt Campbell

Request: Acknowledge receipt of a report from public universities and community colleges on outreach efforts to women and minority individuals and the amount of work performed by apprentices under qualified contracts.

Analysis: Apprenticeship utilization requirements began with SB 5505 (2017) which included a provision that the Phil and Penny Knight Campus for Accelerating Scientific Impact (Knight Campus) project at the University of Oregon require contractors and subcontractors to employ apprentices to perform 15% of the hours by workers in apprenticeable occupations; develop a plan for outreach, recruitment, and retention of women and minority individuals; and report this information annually. Requirements were expanded and modified in the 2019 session (SB 455) to apply to all public university and community college capital projects in excess of \$8 million and supported with state bonds proceeds. Requirements were expanded and modified again for public university projects in the 2020 second special session (SB 5721) by adding veterans to the groups tracked; and requiring contractors with qualified contracts to provide health insurance and retirement benefits to workers. Legislation authorizing state-supported general obligation bonds for public university capital projects in the 2021 and 2023 sessions also included apprenticeship utilization and women, minority individuals, and veterans' outreach and retention requirements.

This year's report includes four public university projects approved in the 2020 second special session and five projects approved in the 2021 session (SB 5505). Additionally, the report includes one community college project approved in the 2019 session (HB 5005). The status of each project in relation to the apprenticeship requirements is detailed below. There are additional public university and community college projects not included in the report because they have not started construction as of the November 30, 2023 reporting date.

Inlow Hall (Eastern Oregon University) is a renovation project which includes improvements to the roofing system, building envelope, HVAC systems, and seismic updates as well as remodeling the interior of the building. Construction began in mid-2023. Of the work performed, 10.2% is by apprentices, 5.4% is by minorities, 0% is by women, and 0.7% is by veterans. Most, but not all, subcontractors with qualifying contracts provide health insurance and retirement benefits.

Boivin Hall (Oregon Institute of Technology) is a project to completely renovate a building on the Klamath Falls campus. Work involves a significant systems overhaul, seismic retrofit, building envelope replacement and foundation repair, in addition to an interior remodel. The project was completed in fall 2023. 25.8% of work was by apprentices, 13.1% by minorities, 1.5% by women and 3.9% by veterans. All subcontractors with qualifying contracts provided health insurance and retirement benefits.

Arts and Education Complex (Oregon State University) involves a new two-story structure along with an improved parking lot and green space. The project is nearing completion. Of the work performed, 19.7% is by apprentices, 39.4% is by minorities, 3.3% is by women and 10.2% is by veterans. Health insurance

and retirement benefits are provided by all subcontractors with qualifying contracts.

Cordley Hall (Oregon State University) is a renovation that includes improvements for accessibility, safety, seismic upgrades, and mechanical and electrical system efficiency. Interior spaces, such as laboratories, classrooms and offices will also be renovated. In addition, the project includes construction of a new cooling plant building. Work is nearing completion. Of the work performed so far, 22.6% is by apprentices, 21.2% is by minorities, 3.3% is by women and 1.5% is by veterans. Health insurance and retirement benefits are provided by all subcontractors with qualifying contracts.

Cascades Student Success Center (Oregon State University) is a new construction on the Cascades Campus in Bend. The building will provide academic and career advising, tutoring, mental health counseling, study spaces and a health wellness center. Construction started in fall 2023 and will run through spring 2025. Of the work performed so far, 1.4% is by apprentices, 0% is by minorities, 0% is by women and 0% is by veterans. Health insurance and retirement benefits are provided by all subcontractors with qualifying contracts who have done work on the project.

Vernier Science Center (Portland State University) entails renovating and expanding the usable space of a six-story, 92,600 square foot building. The project is approximately halfway to completion. Of the work performed, 23.2% is by apprentices, 44.7% is by minorities, 13.2% is by women and 0.4% is by veterans. Health insurance and retirement benefits are provided by all subcontractors with qualifying contracts.

Huestis Hall (University of Oregon) is a renovation including building envelope replacement and systems overhaul, as well as modernizing laboratory and learning spaces. Construction is scheduled to be completed in the next few months. A new general contractor (GC) took over the project in June 2022 and the data for earlier work is limited. Of the work performed with the current GC, 26.3% is by apprentices, 10.9% is by minorities, 3.7% is by women and 3.3% is by veterans. Health insurance and retirement benefits are provided by all subcontractors with qualifying contracts under the new GC.

Heritage Buildings Renovation (University of Oregon) includes updates to classrooms, faculty offices, and the theatrical performance hall. The renovation will update and modernize classrooms and workstations, as well as address deferred maintenance, safety issues, and building and site code violations. It is early in the project and most work so far has been demolition. Of the work performed, 19.2% is by apprentices, 17.3% is by minorities, 0% is by women and 0% is by veterans. Health insurance and retirement benefits are provided by all subcontractors with qualifying contracts.

Student Success Center (Western Oregon University) includes construction of a building that will house student services such as advising, tutoring, student support groups, computer labs, and smart classrooms. The new facility will be located on the site of the existing Old Education Building, which will be demolished. Most work so far has been demolition of the old building. Of the work performed, 0.4% is by apprentices, 12.8% is by minorities, 0% is by women and 7.7% is by veterans. Health insurance and retirement benefits are provided by all subcontractors with qualifying contracts.

In addition to the public university projects listed above, there are three additional projects in progress or complete that meet the qualifications for ORS 350.379 because they are funded in part by capital improvement and renewal bond authorizations. Two of the projects are at Oregon State University (OSU) and one is at University of Oregon (UO). **Newport Ship Operations Dock Renewal** (OSU) at the Hatfield Marine Science Center in Newport, Oregon has been completed with the following percentages: 7.1% by apprentices, 3.4% by minorities, 0.6% by women and 21.5% by veterans. **Withycombe Hall Renovation** (OSU) is in progress and currently has these percentages: 17.3% by apprentices, 18.9% by

minorities, 4.3% by women and 1.1% by veterans. **UO Portland Multi-Building Project** (UO) is in progress and currently has these percentages: 17.5% by apprentices, 0% by minorities, 0% by women and 0% by veterans.

The first community college project subject to reporting requirements is the **Health Care Village/Health Professions Building** at Lane Community College. This is a new facility on the main campus for the dental clinic, dental lab, medical office assistant, faculty offices, and support spaces. Work began in September 2022 and is progressing. To date, the metrics for the project are as follows: 15.4% of work is by apprentices, 16.5% is by minorities, 0.2% is by women. Community colleges are not subject to reporting requirements on veteran hours or contractors providing health or retirement benefits.

Legislative Fiscal Office Recommendation: The Legislative Fiscal Office recommends that the Joint Committee on Ways and Means acknowledge receipt of the report.

Request: Report on the amount of work performed by apprentices, women, and minority individuals under qualified contracts as per Oregon Revised Statute (ORS) 350.379.

Recommendation: Acknowledge receipt of the report.

Discussion: Pursuant to ORS 350.379, public institutions of higher education with ongoing qualified contracts are required to report annually to the Joint Committee, or Interim Joint Committee, of Ways and Means on the amount of work performed by apprentices, women, and minority individuals under such contracts.

Below is a status summary of the community college capital construction projects that have been awarded Article XI-G bonds during the current reporting period to comply with ORS 350.379.

Blue Mountain Community College

Facility Agriculture Resource Management - \$6.5 million in Article XI-G Bonds

• Project construction did not start until December 4, 2023. They will report on single contract over \$8 million in the next reporting period.

Lane Community College

Health Care Village/Health Sciences Building - \$8 million in Article XI-G Bonds

- Fortis Construction began mobilization to the site in September 2022 and has continued working on the project during the reporting period through November 2023.
 - Attachment A: Report from start of 2023 through November 30, 2023.
 - Attachment B: Report from projection inception, September 2022, through November 30, 2023.

Linn-Benton Community College

Agricultural Center - \$8 million in Article XI-G Bonds

• Construction start date has not been determined. When construction begins, they will have a single contract of over \$8 million that they will report on in the next reporting period if construction has begun by then.

Mt. Hood Community College

Accessible Upgrades, Lab - \$8 million in Article XI-G Bonds

• No single contract above the \$8 million threshold.

Southwestern Oregon Community College

Sumner and Coaledo Halls - \$2,749,997 in Article XI-G Bonds

• Total project cost is less than \$8 million so no single contract above the \$8 million threshold.

Tillamook Bay Community College

Classroom Building and Renovation - \$8 million in XI-G Bonds

• Will not break ground on this project until late May or early June. Nothing has been done on the site yet except geotechnical readings to determine stability. If they have a single contract over \$8 million, they will report in the next reporting period.

Treasure Valley Community College

Nursing Professions Center - \$4.95 million in Article XI-G Bonds

• Construction will not begin until the middle of 2024. They will report on single contract over \$8 million in the next reporting period.

Please find below a status summary of public university capital construction projects with qualifying contracts per ORS 350.379, SB 5721 (2020, 2nd Special Session), SB 5505 (2021), SB 5701 (2022), and HB 5005 (2023).

Eastern Oregon University

Inlow Hall Renovation, Phase II

- \$17,700,200 in Article XI-Q Bonds
- \$564,900 in Article XI-G Bonds
- Early work construction activities started in July of 2023. Full construction activities started in October 2023, with anticipated project completion in late 2024.

Oregon Institute of Technology

Boivin Hall Rehabilitation

- \$18,270,000 in Article XI-Q Bonds
- \$1,015,000 in Article XI-G Bonds
- Construction completed in August 2023, welcoming students in fall 2023.

Geothermal System Emergency Renovation

- \$17,956,151 in Article XI-Q Bonds.
- Engineering and design began in fall 2023. Construction is expected to commence in spring 2024.
- No work hours had been completed on this project as of November 30, 2023.

Oregon State University

Arts and Education Complex

(Patricia Valian Reser Center for the Creative Arts)

- \$35,000,000 in Article XI-G Bonds.
- Construction is 90% complete in January 2024 and is expected to complete in spring 2024.

Cordley Hall Renovation, Phase II

- \$61,000,000 in Article XI-Q Bonds.
- \$25,000,000 in Article XI-G Bonds.
- Construction is 90% complete in January 2024 and is expected to complete in spring 2024.

Cascades Student Success Center

- \$8,800,000 in Article XI-Q Bonds.
- \$5,000,000 in Article XI-G Bonds.
- Construction commenced in August 2023 and is expected to complete in spring 2025.

Collaborative Innovation Complex

(Jen-Hsun and Lori Huang Collaborative Innovation Complex)

- \$71,975,000 in Article XI-G Bonds.
- Construction is expected to commence in January 2024 and complete in winter 2026.
- No work hours had been completed on this project as of November 30, 2023.

Newport Ship Operations Dock Renewal

- Includes a qualifying \$8M+ contract under ORS 350.379.
- Project completed in fall 2023.

Withycombe Hall Renovation

- Includes a qualifying \$8M+ contract under ORS 350.379.
- Construction is underway and expected to be completed in winter 2025.

Gilkey Hall Renovation

- Includes a qualifying \$8M+ contract under ORS 350.379.
- Currently in the construction documents design phase. Construction is expected to commence in summer 2024 and complete in summer 2025.
- No work hours had been completed on this project as of November 30, 2023.

Portland State University

Vernier Science Center

(formerly SB1 Renovation and Expansion)

- \$52,500,000 in Article XI-Q Bonds.
- \$7,500,000 in Article XI-G Bonds.
- Project is approximately 55% complete as of November 30, 2023.

Gateway Art+Design Project

(formerly Gateway Center Reuse and Extension)

- \$45,000,000 in Article XI-Q Bonds.
- \$5,000,000 in Article XI-G Bonds.
- Currently in the construction documentation design phase. Construction is expected to commence in fall 2024.

(Note: The Vernier Science Center and Gateway Art+Design projects collectively received \$52,588,750 in Article XI-Q Bonds in 2023 for project completions.)

University of Oregon

Huestis Hall Renovation

- \$50,880,000 in Article XI-Q Bonds.
- \$6,360,000 in Article XI-G Bonds.
- Construction is expected to be completed in spring 2024, with occupancy this spring/summer.

Heritage Buildings Renovation (University and Villard Halls)

- \$52,650,000 in Article XI-Q Bonds.
- \$5,850,000 in Article XI-G Bonds.
- In Design Development. Construction selective demolition commenced in fall 2023, with completion targeted in summer 2025.

Friendly Hall Renovation

- \$7,543,000 in Article XI-G Bonds.
- \$65,175,650 in Article XI-Q Bonds.
- The project is not yet underway. Consultant and Contractor selection is expected in summer 2024. Construction is expected to commence in summer 2025. Project completion is expected in early 2028.
- No work hours had been completed on this project as of November 30, 2023.

UO Portland Multi-Building Project

- Includes a qualifying \$8M+ contract under ORS 350.379.
- Construction commenced in 2023 and is expected to complete in early 2025.

Western Oregon University

Student Success Center

- \$20,680,000 in Article XI-Q Bonds.
- \$660,000 in Article XI-G Bonds.
- Workers have completed demolition of the Old Education building. Structural Steel was installed in January 2024, with the construction portion of the project at 30 percent completion. Projected to open on schedule for winter term 2025.

Senate Bill 5505 (2021) funded Eastern Oregon University's (EOU) Inlow Hall Renovation capital project. In early 2023 EOU, publicly procured McCormack Construction Company, Inc. (MCC) via a formal selection process as the project Construction Manager / General Contract (CM/GC). Section 10 of SB 5505 (2021) was incorporated in the CM/GC contract. Preconstruction activities took place from May to September of 2023. One Early Work Amendment (EWA) was issued in July and a second EWA was issued in September. This resulted in construction activities which required Section 10 tracking and reporting for 2023.

Attached is MCC's 2023 Apprenticeship Report for those construction activities conducted from July through November 30, 2023. The report includes the 5 subcontracts that exceed \$200,000.

While the two EWA's represent \$7.7M or 47% of the total construction cost, the construction is in an early stage with most of the work to be completed in 2024.

Dear Johnmartin,

During the second special session of 2020, the State of Oregon invested in four public university capital construction projects including the Oregon Institute of Technology's (Oregon Tech, the University) Boivin Hall Rehabilitation (the Boivin Project). Boivin Hall was built in 1976 and has not seen any major renovations in that time. It includes the University's only chemistry labs which are critical for STEM and Health programs and is a critical building utilized by all undergraduate students on the Klamath Falls campus. Increasing class/lab space and modernizing the facility will expand the total capacity of Oregon Tech to graduate high demand engineering and healthcare professionals.

Additionally, during its 2023 legislative session, the State of Oregon invested in three additional public university capital construction projects, with the University's Geothermal System Emergency Renovation project being one (the Geothermal Emergency Project).

This report includes the legislatively mandated reporting requirements, details of the Boivin Hall Rehabilitation and Geothermal System Emergency Renovation projects, respective apprenticeship hours to date, and information on the Southern Oregon Joint Apprenticeship Training Council.

This report represents (a) final reporting on the Boivin Project, including work performed through project completion during calendar year 2023, and (b) initial reporting of the Geothermal Emergency Project whereas no work had been performed on project qualifying contracts as of November 30, 2023.

Background – Boivin Hall Rehabilitation

SB 5721 (2020) requires that on or before February 1 of each year, the University report to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means or Joint Interim Committee on Ways and Means on the contract value and total hours of work performed by apprentices, minority individuals, women and Veterans, and the types and costs of health insurance and benefits provided to workers by contractors and subcontractors.

SB 5721 (2020) provided \$19,615,000 in state funded bonds for the Boivin Hall Rehabilitation Project on Oregon Tech's Klamath Falls campus. The bill requires that in all qualified contracts the University require contractors to employ apprentices in "apprenticeable occupations", performing 15 percent of the work under the contract. The provisions of the bill only apply to contracts with an estimated cost of \$200,000 or more. The bill also requires the University to establish and execute a plan for outreach, recruitment, and retention of women and minority individuals to perform work under the contracts.

Background – Geothermal System Emergency Renovation

SB 5005 (2023) requires that on or before February 1 of each year, the University report to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means or Joint Interim Committee on Ways and Means on the contract value and total hours of work performed by apprentices, minority individuals, women and Veterans, and the types and costs of health insurance and benefits provided to workers by contractors and subcontractors.

SB 5005 (2023) provided \$18,160,000 in state funded bonds for the Geothermal System Emergency Renovation, also on Oregon Tech's Klamath Falls campus. Similar to SB 5721 (2020), SB 5005 (2023)

requires that in all qualified contracts, the University require contractors to employ apprentices in "apprenticeable occupations", performing 15 percent of the work under the contract. The provisions of the bill only apply to contracts with an estimated cost of \$200,000 or more. The bill also requires the University to establish and execute a plan for outreach, recruitment, and retention of women and minority individuals to perform work under the contracts.

Summary – Boivin Hall Rehabilitation

This report is for the Boivin Project period of December 1, 2022, through August 31, 2023. For the reporting period, the Boivin Project had one construction manager/general contractor (CM/GC) and eight subcontractors with qualifying contracts of \$200,000 or more with apprenticeable trades, similar to the prior year. For these contracts, the total hours worked on the Boivin Project during the reporting period was approximately 54,922 with 14,176 hours, or 25.8%, being apprenticeship hours. The Boivin Project was completed on schedule during the summer of 2023, and welcomed students starting fall term of the current academic year.

Summary – Geothermal System Emergency Renovation

This report also includes information on the Geothermal Emergency Project, for its initial project period of November 23, 2023, through November 30, 2023. On November 23, 2023, the University and Bogatay Construction, Inc. (Bogatay), in their capacity as General Contractor (GC), signed a public improvement contract (construction contract). The Project Labor Agreement (PLA) will be executed in the subsequent reporting period. Activity on this qualifying contract for the current reporting period was related to construction contract execution only (November 23, 2023) and no actual work had commenced on the Geothermal Emergency Project as of November 30, 2023.

Project – Boivin Hall Rehabilitation

In August 2020, the Oregon Legislature approved \$18,560,000 Article XI-Q bonds to finance \$18,270,000 of project costs and \$290,000 for costs of issuing the bonds and \$1,055,000 Article XI-G bonds to finance \$1,015,000 of project costs and \$40,000 for costs of issuing the bonds to completely renovate Boivin Hall on the Klamath Falls campus of the Oregon Institute of Technology. The Boivin Project budget also includes \$1,015,000 of University funds, the required institutional match to Article XI-G bonds. Total Boivin Project costs are budgeted to be \$20,300,000.

The Boivin Project also includes seismic retrofit; mechanical, electrical, and plumbing replacement; building envelope replacement; foundation repair; and full interior (classroom and lab) remodel and modernization. Improvements to surrounding areas, including ADA accessibility sidewalk, transportation, and landscaping are part of the Boivin Project scope.

Project – Geothermal System Emergency Renovation

During its 2023 legislative session, the State of Oregon approved \$18,160,000 Article XI-Q bonds to finance \$17,956,151 of project costs and \$203,849 for costs of issuing the bonds to completely renovate the geothermal heating system at the Klamath Falls campus which is at imminent risk of catastrophic failure.

The Geothermal Emergency Project also includes a combination of rehabilitation, replacement, and modernization of the following: wells (production and injection wells), geothermal mechanical building and main geothermal storage and pumping system, geothermal distribution system (distribution piping), campus main electrical gear and distribution system (building heat exchange system) and campus

electrical equipment. Lastly, the project includes addressing code compliance, imminent life safety risks, improvements to surrounding areas, landscaping and ADA accessibility.

Project Labor Agreement – Boivin Hall Rehabilitation

On May 24, 2021 the Oregon Institute of Technology and Adroit Construction Company, Inc. (Adroit) in their capacity as CM/GC signed the Project Labor Agreement (PLA).

Report – Boivin Hall Rehabilitation and Geothermal System Emergency Renovation

Section 15 of SB 5721 (2020) and Section 11 of SB 5005 (2023), respectively, requires the Oregon Institute of Technology to:

- Employ apprentices to perform 15 percent of the work hours that workers in apprenticeable occupations perform under the contract, in a manner consistent with the apprentices' respective apprenticeship training programs;
- b) Establish and execute a plan for outreach, recruitment and retention of women, minority individuals and Veterans to perform work under the contract, with the aspirational target of having at least 15 percent of total work hours performed by individuals in one or more of those groups;
- c) Provide health insurance and retirement benefits to workers; and
- d) Require any subcontractor engaged by the contractor to abide by the requirements set forth in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of this subsection, if the work to be performed under the subcontract has an estimated cost of \$200,000 or greater.

On or before February 1 of each year, each public university that is carrying out a qualified project shall report to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means or Joint Interim Committee on Ways and Means, as part of the report required under ORS 350.379, on:

- a) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by apprentices;
- b) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by women, minority individuals and veterans; and
- c) The types and costs of health insurance and retirement benefits provided to workers by contractors and subcontractors.

Apprenticeship Rates in Qualified Contracts – Boivin Hall Rehabilitation

The Boivin Project was completed during the current reporting period. Overall, there were 14,176 total number of hours worked on qualified apprenticeable occupations for the Boivin Hall Rehabilitation Project during the reporting period. Total hours worked by minority individuals, women, and Veterans under this contract for the reporting period were 11,188 or 20.4%; 1,251 or 2.3%; and 3,318 or 6.0%, respectively.

Adroit provides employee health benefits through Regence at a cost to the CM/GC of \$575.10 per month and offers additional benefits for child, spouse, family insurance plus dental, and vision option. Adroit also provides a 401(k) retirement plan with a two-percent match on a four-percent employee contribution.

Belfor Environmental provides employee health and dental benefits of \$603.54 per month and offers additional benefits for child, spouse and family insurances.

Blackline Glass provides medical, dental, vision coverage paid 100% by the employer to Local 740 at a rate of \$7.40 per hour. Blackline Glass also 100% funds the Local 740 pension plan at a rate of \$13.17 per hour.

Bob's Excavation provides employee health benefits at a cost of \$735.52 per month and offers additional benefits for child, spouse, family insurance. Bob's Excavation also provides a retirement plan with a four-percent employer contribution.

Hammerquist Mechanical provides a portion of employee health benefits each month and offers additional benefits for child, spouse and family insurance plus a dental option.

Modoc Contacting provides a portion of employee health benefits including dental and vision, and offers additional benefits for child, spouse, family insurance.

MottLab provides employee health insurance and retirement benefits as confirmed by contractor.

Precision Electric provides employee health benefits at a cost of \$436.75 per month and offers additional benefits for child, spouse, family insurance. Precision Electric also provides insurances and other benefits for dental, vision, life, accident and short-term disability.

S&S Sheet Metal provides employee health insurance and covers 80% of insurance costs of \$406.92 - \$448.35 per month, depending on health plan selected, and offers additional benefits for dental, vision, life, GAP, accident, and disability insurance. S&S Sheet Metal also provides a retirement plan with a three-percent employer contribution.

Apprenticeship Rates in Qualified Contracts – Geothermal System Emergency Renovation

As of November 30, 2023, the Geothermal Emergency Project was in the early stages of construction planning, with the public improvement contract executed on November 23, 2023. For the reporting period ending November 30, 2023, there were zero total number of hours worked on qualified apprenticeable occupations, and zero total hours worked by women, minority individuals, or Veterans, respectively, under this contract for the reporting period.

Bogatay Construction, Inc. provides employee health insurance and retirement benefits.

Establishment of Southern Oregon Joint Apprenticeship Committee

In March 2021, the Southern Oregon Joint Apprenticeship Training Committee (SOJATC) presented their application for registered apprenticeship status to the Bureau of Labor and Industries and the Oregon State Apprenticeship Training Council. SOJATC is a collaborative effort of Bogatay Construction, Inc., Modoc Contracting Co, Adroit, Massey Interior Construction Inc, and Summit Certified Home Inspections Inc. with a goal of improving the local workforce and economy through providing an apprenticeship training program for carpentry, cement masonry, painting, drywall, and exterior interior specialist.

The program is facilitated locally through Klamath Community College and through Rogue Community College in Jackson/Josephine County. The program began classes in Fall 2021. Klamath Community College is in the process of establishing an accredited Associates in Construction Trades with these five occupations, which was approved by the Oregon Bureau of Labor Statistics in March 2021.

Adroit, the CM/GC for the Boivin Hall Rehabilitation project, and Bogatay, the GC for the Geothermal System Emergency Renovation Project, are charter members of SOJATC and will work in coordination with local subcontractors throughout the construction process to require that at least 15 percent of work done in apprenticeable occupations for all qualified contracts above \$200,000 is done by apprentices. Adroit is also actively involved with recruiting apprentices and promoting apprentice outreach in Central and Southern Oregon.

Dear Legislators,

During the 2020 legislative session, PSU was awarded \$52,500,000 in Article XI-Q Bonds and \$7,500,000 in Article XI-G Bonds for the Renovation and Expansion of Science Building 1. This project will transform Science Building 1 into the Vernier Science Center (VSC). The new VSC will meet a critical need for PSU, creating a model teaching facility for a university that leads all other public universities in Oregon in the education of first-generation students, Underrepresented Minorities (URM), veterans and Pell Grant recipients.

The VSC Project will renovate a six-story, 92,600 square foot building, transforming a space that is primarily used for research into a building focused on undergraduate teaching and student success. The VSC Project enhances opportunity and equity for students whose future career goals match two of the state's key occupational areas, health- and STEM-related fields. The VSC Project will support these students by replacing outdated instructional modalities, such as fixed-configuration classrooms, and ill-suited research labs, with flexible active learning classrooms, accessible undergraduate laboratories, and light-filled collaborative learning spaces.

During the 2021 legislative session, PSU was awarded \$45,585,000 in Article XI-Q Bonds and \$5,105,000 in Article XI-G Bonds for the construction of a new building for Art+Design, referred to as the Gateway Center. The construction of this new building will allow the School of Art+Design to consolidate their space in one building from the five buildings where they are currently located. In addition, it will enable PSU to exit a very expensive and unsustainable land lease, thus saving the University millions of dollars over the next 20 years. Finally, we plan to demolish two of the buildings that Art+Design currently resides in, reducing our overall square footage and eliminating a sizable portion of our deferred maintenance.

Additionally in the 2023 legislative session, PSU was awarded \$52,588,750 in Article XI-Q Bonds and \$4,275,000 in Article XI-G Bonds to supplement and provide funds to finish the construction of the aforementioned Vernier Science Center (VSC) and the Art+Design Building as well as to facilitate PSU moving out of the expensive land lease at the University Center Building. These bonds funds are split between the two projects previously awarded funding and the UCB move out work.

Background

SB 5721 (2020) requires that on or before February 1 of each year, Portland State University report to the Joint Committee on Ways and Means or Joint Interim Committee on Ways and Means on the amount of work performed by apprentices, women and minority individuals under qualified contracts. Additionally, the bill necessitates that in all qualified contracts the University requires contractors to employ apprentices (in "apprenticeable occupations") to perform 15 percent of the work hours performed under the contract. The provisions of the bill only applied to contracts paid for with bond proceeds, and that exceeded \$200,000. The bill also required the University to establish and execute a plan for outreach, recruitment, and retention of women and minority individuals to perform work under the contracts.

Summary

Vernier Science Center

This report is for the period 07/26/2021 (date Skanska, the project general contractor, signed their first work agreement) through 11/31/2023.

- There are 27 contracts in that period with apprenticeable trades exceeding \$200,000
- Five of the contracts are complete
- One was for building demolition work that did not use bond funds
- For the five completed contracts that used bond funds, two had apprenticeship numbers that exceeded the target.
- 22 contracts are in progress or yet to begin.

This project is approximately 55% complete as of 11/30/23 and the overall apprentice percentage on qualified contracts is 23.2%

Gateway Project for Art+Design

No construction has occurred on this project. The project is currently in the construction documentation design phase and the contractor, Swinerton, is only providing pre-construction and BIM services at this time. Two trade partners have been contracted under Swinerton at this time but also only for pre-construction and BIM work. No contracts with apprenticeable trades exceeding \$200,000 have been issued at this time. Construction for the project is scheduled to start in Fall 2024

Report - Vernier Science Center

Section 15 of SB 5721 (2020) requires Portland State University to:

• Establish and execute a plan for outreach, recruitment, and retention of women and minority individuals to perform work under contracts funded with bond proceeds, and

• Employ apprentices to perform 15 percent of the work hours that workers in apprenticeable occupations perform under the contracts funded with bond proceeds.

For the purposes of these reporting requirements, "Qualified contracts" means contracts that:

- (A) Are for improvements to real property in connection with the Portland State University's Renovation and Expansion of Science Building 1;
- (B) Have a cost that, at the time the contract was executed, was estimated to be greater than \$200,000; and
- (C) Are to be paid from proceeds of bonds issued under Article XI-G or Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution.

Outreach Efforts

For the early work, Skanska's plans for outreach have been communication prior to bid regarding the diverse contracting and workforce participation on the project. These efforts led to contracting requirements being added to Drywall/Framing/Ceilings, Mechanical/Plumbing and Electrical/Low Voltage scopes, as well as overall subcontractor selection. For this early work, there has been numerous communications with subcontractors regarding both the participation and reporting requirements starting with executed subcontract agreements, preconstruction meetings prior to start of work and more informal communications. Skanska is following up monthly with certified payroll submissions and subcontractor reporting to ensure that reporting is accurate, any questions are resolved, and corrective actions taken to ensure that we meet these objectives.

In preparation for bidding the main body of the work to determine the Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) Skanska continued with the above efforts and have added the following outreach efforts:

- Bid package listed these goals as requirements for potential bidders and pre-bid meetings included discussion and importance of these criteria.
- Specific outreach to MWESB contractors for bidding opportunities of the VSC package utilizing Skanska's database of MWESB firms as well as utilizing the State COBID (Certification Office for Business Inclusion and Diversity) certification listing and sending bid invitations to those firms.
- Subcontractor contracts list the apprentice and minority participation goals explicitly in the contract between Skanska and their subcontractors.
- Some scopes of work (painting, landscape, doors/hardware) were only sent to MWESB certified contractors with multiple bids received on each scope of work

Apprenticeship Rates in Qualified Contracts

The project has completed approximately 55.9% of the expected billings as of November 30, 2023 (99,068 hours billed of an anticipated 240,000). Of that amount there have been 77,607 hours billed to qualified contracts and of those 18,021 hours were completed by apprentices, or 23.2%.

Workforce Diversity

SB5721 (2020) sets an aspirational target of having at least 15 percent of total work hours performed by women, minority individuals and veterans. As of November 30, 2023 there were 82,632 hours billed to qualified contracts and of those 48,197 were billed by one or more of the workforce diversity groups, or 58.3%.

Health Insurance and Retirement Benefits

SB5721 (2020) requires Portland State University to indicate if Health Insurance and Retirement Benefits are being provided by subcontractors to their employees. Health Insurance and Retirement Benefits are being provided by 100% of the subcontractors who are currently under a qualified contract to provide work on the project.

Report - Gateway Project for Art + Design

Section 15 of SB 5721 (2020) requires Portland State University to:

- Establish and execute a plan for outreach, recruitment, and retention of women and minority individuals to perform work under contracts funded with bond proceeds, and
- Employ apprentices to perform 15 percent of the work hours that workers in apprenticeable occupations perform under the contracts funded with bond proceeds.

For the purposes of these reporting requirements, "Qualified contracts" means contracts that:

- (A) Are for improvements to real property in connection with the Portland State University's Gateway Project for Art + Design;
- (B) Have a cost that, at the time the contract was executed, was estimated to be greater than \$200,000; and
- (C) Are to be paid from proceeds of bonds issued under Article XI-G or Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution.

Outreach Efforts

For the selection of early trade partners for the mechanical, plumbing, and electrical scopes of work, contracting requirements were added regarding the apprenticeship and workforce diversity percentages by Swinerton for these early trade partner subcontractors to meet. There have been numerous communications with subcontractors regarding both the participation and reporting requirements starting with executed subcontract agreements, preconstruction meetings prior to start of work and more informal communications.

In preparation of putting the full scope of work out to public bid as part of the Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) contract the following will be done:

- The bid package will include language and stress the importance of these requirements.
- Specific outreach to MWESB contractors for bidding opportunities of the A+D package utilizing Swinerton's database of MWESB firms as well as utilizing the State COBID (Certification Office for Business Inclusion and Diversity) certification listing and sending bid invitations to those firms.

- Swinerton has attended multiple outreach events with MWESB contractors and local contracting groups in an effort to publicize the project as well as identify other qualified subcontractors who will contribute to meeting the project apprentice and diversity minimums.
- The subcontracts between Swinerton and the subcontractor will list the apprentice and minority participation goals explicitly in the contract.
- Some scopes of work (painting, landscape, insulation, cleaning) will initially only be sent to MWESB certified contractors.
- Swinerton will submit monthly certified payroll along with quarterly updates on the apprentice and diversity percentages in order to track and accurately project forward so that the project will meet the minimum percentages.

Apprenticeship Rates in Qualified Contracts

The project has completed approximately 3% of the expected billings as of November 30, 2023. Of that amount there have been no hours for apprenticeable occupations billed to bond funds and thus no work covered by the requirements of SB 5721 (2020).

Dear Legislators,

With this document, the University of Oregon is responding to the requirements of the noted Senate Bills.

SB 0455 (2019) - ORS 350-379 - Projects over \$8M using State Bonds:

The UO initiated a project (UO Portland Multi-Building Project) on the UO Portland campus located in NE Portland which has incorporated CIR funding distributed by the HECC. This project exceeds the \$8M threshold requiring reporting per ORS 350-379, initiated by SB 0455 (2019). The project was initiated without the intent of using CIR funds, however due to the large quantity of deferred maintenance in some of the buildings we have had to apply CIR funding to some of the E&G buildings as we move forward. We were able to backtrack and collect some data, but not all of the data for work that has been completed. There were only two scopes of work initiated in 2023 that met the reporting requirements. Flooring work performed by Rubenstein's Carpet Company was performed in a building that contains no CIR funding within the project and there were no union contractors that provided bids on this portion of the project. They have not met the apprenticeship requirements as they were unable to do so. The second contractor, performing demolition work is a union contractor, which was able to report apprenticeship information. They however were unable to backtrack and capture the diversity reporting information. We will be tracking this moving forward. Attachment A contains the apprenticeship/diversity information required to be reported by this Senate Bill and ORS 350-379.

SB 5721 (2020), containing the UO Huestis Hall Deferred Maintenance Project:

This project saw significant work performed in 2023, which is apparent by the more than 125,000 labor hours by companies that are required to report. Apprenticeship percentages in 2023 exceeded the 15% requirement overall with a 25.87% total. The diversity goal of 15% across the three categories was also exceeded with a total of 18.24%. Attachment B contains a spreadsheet containing apprenticeship/diversity data as well as benefit/insurance information as required by the Senate Bill.

SB 5505 (2021) / SB 5701 (2022), containing the UO Heritage Project (University & Villard): This project was primarily in design during 2023. Demolition was initiated at the very end of the year, resulting in only two subcontractors of reportable status performing work in the required reporting period. Apprenticeship percentages in 2023 exceeded the 15% requirement overall with a 19.20% total. The diversity goal of 15% across the three diversity categories was also exceeded with a total of 17.28%. Attachment C contains a spreadsheet containing apprenticeship/diversity information as well as the benefit/insurance information required by these Senate Bills.

HB 5005 – Friendly Hall Renovation Project:

The UO has not initiated work on this project, so there is no information to report.

The following information is provided on behalf of Western Oregon University (WOU) in response to reporting requirements under House Bill 5721 (2020 2nd Special Session), SB 5505 (2021), and SB 5702 (2022). The reporting requirement applies to qualifying public university projects carried out with contracts costing \$200,000 or greater.

SB 5701, section 6 (2022) also requires the 2024 report to include information on qualifying contracts associated with WOU's Student Success Center capital project. WOU has begun work on this project and any qualifying contracts for this project entered into over the next year will be included in the report due on February 1, 2024. Western Oregon University currently has one project that meets the requirements for SB 5505 reporting of apprentices and certain other workers for capital Projects.

Construction on WOU's Student Success Center, which is funded in part by Article XI-G bond proceeds with a total project cost over \$21 million, began in September 2023. A copy of WOU's report is attached.

The WOU Student Success Center has completed demolition of the Old Education building, poured concrete footings and has structural steel arriving onsite in early January 2024.



Western Oregon University (WOU) understands the importance of House Bill 5721 (2020 2nd Special Session), SB 5505 (2021), and SB 5702 (2022) and is submitting this memo in response to the Student Success Center (SSC) project apprentice numbers being lower than the outlined 15 percent.

The report before this memo accounts for all work hours for the first three months of the SSC project. In this small window WOU had five subcontracts on the project and a small contingency of carpenters that work under Turner Construction, the general contractor.

The work that occurred in the first three months of the project consisted of mostly heavy machinery, trucking and precise concrete cuts to ensure parts of the building outlined to be saved were saved.

Unfortunately, demolition and earthwork historical do not have a large apprenticeship program and are lagging behind such scopes as carpentry, plumbing and electrical. This is evident in our work hours chart that shows only carpenters have apprentice hours and none are present in power equipment operators or truck drivers.

As of the start of 2024 the number of carpenters, iron workers and electricians on-site increased dramatically and in turn will increase our apprentice work hours. These scopes of work combined with the scopes of work that will happen in 2024, such as flooring, plumbing and mechanical will greatly improve our apprentice work hours.

I'm confident that the WOU SSC will be at and possibly over the 15 percent mark for apprentice work hours at the end of the project and feel this low number is only a result of our limited work in 2023 and does not reflect WOU's or Turners commitment to growing Oregon's construction work force.

WOU's CPC team with be conducting monthly reviews with Turner Construction to ensure the 15 percent goal is met.
