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Origin of the OYA 10-Year Plan



In 2013, the Oregon Youth Authority received the following budget note:

"The Oregon Youth Authority (OYA) has two aging youth correctional facilities in the Willamette Valley that are operating well below the intended bed capacity and that have significant deferred maintenance needs. The April 2013 Oregon Youth Authority Demand Forecast projects a reduction in the number of close custody beds necessary to house incarcerated youth and also shows a need for a substantial increase in the number of community residential treatment beds. The Joint Committee on Ways and Means directs OYA to develop a facilities plan that:

- 1. Evaluates facilities in terms of capacity, operating and maintenance cost, and deferred maintenance need;
- 2. Develops 10 year or longer term plans for the facilities;
- 3. Includes recommendations and rationale for facility disposition, if appropriate; and
- 4. Recommends future use of the buildings that OYA would no longer need."

OYA 10 - Year Planning Process

OYA is due to update the Agency's 10-Year Plan. Completed in 2014, the 10-year plan sets guideposts for best practices in populational management, capital improvements, managing deferred maintenance and construction.

The 10-Year plan provides a continuous vision of what projects are next and why.

Critical Aspects of the 10-Year Plan

- Juvenile Justice Consultant Involvement
 - Understand the current population, trends (OYA and national), and best practices in space use.
- Resolve Deferred Maintenance
 - Create a current Facility Condition Assessment (FCA) and FCI (our recent Facility Condition Index is in the poor category) and phased strategy for deferred maintenance and capital renewal projects.
- Escalated Construction Costs
 - 2019 cost estimates for 10 -YR Plan projects must be updated to account for post -pandemic costs. Nationally recognized cost estimating experts show a 34.2% cost escalation over the last few years.
- · Creating Developmental Spaces for Youth
 - Transforming youth spaces to align with and support development and reformation goals. Renovations and construction projects follow the goals of creating a less correctional and developmental environment for youth.
 - Update project phasing for a 10 -year period.
 - Identify new construction and remodel needs.

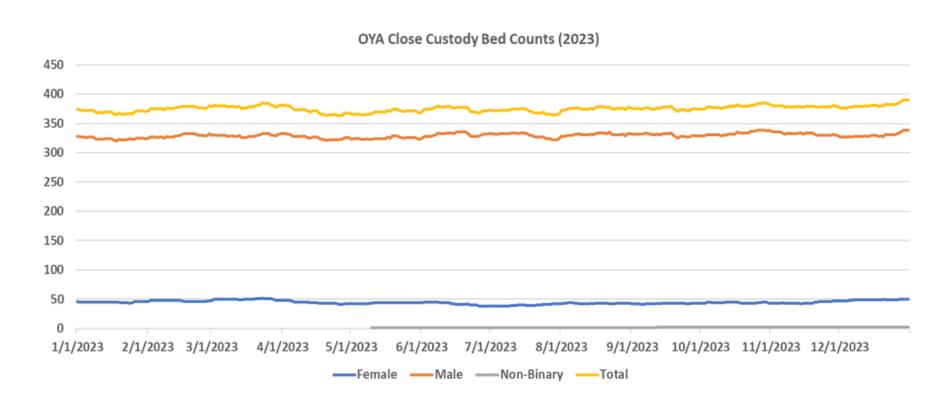

2019-21	610	Hillcrest Closes, YWTP - adjustment, MYCF New Units
2021-23		1 unit closed RVYCF, budget closer to actual pop and smaller unit sizes
2023-25	407	2 units closed at MYCF

*Geer - 2 units are not habitable, 2 (40 beds) are used for emergencies (quarantine, if other facilities not habitable) and temporary housing for sporting events. However, Geer is to be demolished due to deferred maintenance needs. Other vacant units will be used at MYCF to offset demolition. 10-yr plan to inform further on emergency and temporary capacity needs.

Juvenile Justice Information System (JJIS) Modernization (Other Capital Projects)



- Estimated Completion: Oct 2025
- Stage Gate / Contract Award
 - Stage Gate 3 Endorsement by EIS in July 2023.
 - Contract with the solution implementation vendor, DMI, signed August 2023; Implementation Planning Workshops began in October 2023.
- OYA anticipates development beginning Q1 20 24 and the first release to end users rolling out late this year.
- Quality Assurance/Risk Level
 - The project is assessed to be operating at a LOW level of risk.
- Legislatively Approved Funding Breakdown
 - o XI-Q Bonds \$7,746,046
 - o Cost Of Issuance \$103,954
 - o Debt Service \$1,078,123
 - o GF \$3,418,078
 - o FF \$108,987
