



Timeline



2022

Oregon Health Equity Task Force developed HB 4052 to support the declaration made in HR 6

HB 4052 passed on March 23rd, 2022

HB 4052 passed and began funding the OHA Mobile Health Unit Pilot Program and OACO Affinity Group Task Forces



House Resolution 6: Declaring Racism a Public Health Crisis

"Whereas white supremacy was institutionalized through the development of policies and systems that ensure power, privilege and resources remain in the hands of white men; and

Whereas racism in Oregon has left a legacy of trauma from one generation to the next, impacting Oregon tribes, Black and Indigenous communities and people of color through a cumulative effect;..."



House Bill 2925 (2023)

HB2925 passed and enacted the following:

Extended the timeline for OACO staff and the task force to continue their work until June 2026 as opposed to June 2023

Revised the language of the bill based on consultation with the Nine Federally Recognized Tribes





Community Healthcare Workers

Problem: There are gaps in the Community Health Worker system that need to be addressed.

Solution:

- Create livable wages for Community Health Workers regardless of citizenship
- Increase the amount of BIPOC, transgender, disabled and queer

- Provide culturally relevant training






Addiction Recovery

Problem: In our community, there is a need for more accessible, culturally competent addiction recovery support

Solution: There must be a push to establish accessible and comprehensive support programs, emphasizing both treatment and prevention, to promote lasting recovery and well-being.

Housing for Low-Income, BIPOC Families

Problem: Many families struggle to pay rent and it results in families living on the streets.

Solution: Funding for families to have the ability to afford housing.






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End the School to Prison Pipeline

Problem: Schools are no longer considered safe places to go to, there are weapons, drugs and discrimination.

Solution: Required school districts across Oregon and all partners receiving state education funds to train all personnel and students to gain social emotional skills. Substitute a punitive culture in schools with a culture of repair and wrap around support for students.

Food for All

Problem: Oregonians whose income would qualify them for SNAP but are excluded from the Federal program because of their immigration status, do not have access to enough food for themselves or their families to thrive in Oregon. Food that is accessible through food boxes often do not include culturally specific foods.

Solution: There must be a legislative action to establish food for all Oregonians to provide SNAP to individuals who qualify however, due to their immigration status or lack of SSN would not be eligible.

2023 State of Disparity Study


The state of Oregon's Department of Administrative Services (DAS) commissioned BBC Research & • Consulting (BBC) to conduct a disparity study to assess whether businesses owned by persons of color (POCs), women, and service-disabled veterans (SDVs) face any barriers as part of the state's contract and procurement processes.



CHAPTER

AN ACT

Relating to equity; and declaring an emergency.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. (1) As used in this section:

(a) "Communities of color" means members of the following racial or ethnic communities:

(A) American Indian:

(B) Alaska Native;

(C) Hispanic or Latino;

(D) Asian;

(E) Native Hawaiian;

(F) Pacific Islander;

(G) Black or African American;

(H) Middle Eastern;

(I) North African:

(J) Mixed race; or

(K) Other racial or ethnic minorities.

(b) "Priority populations" means groups that disproportionately experience avoidable illness, death or other poor health or social outcomes attributable directly or indirectly to racism, including:

(A) Communities of color

(B) Oregon's nine federally recognized tribes and the descendants of the members of the tribes;

(C) Immigrants;

(D) Refugees;

(E) Migrant and seasonal farmworkers:

(F) Low-income individuals and families

(G) Persons with disabilities; and

(H) Individuals who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender or queer or who question their sexual or gender identity.

(2)(a) The Oregon Health Authority shall convene an advisory committee to provide guidance on establishing, funding and operating a pilot program to improve the health out-

Enrolled House Bill 4052 (HB 4052-B)

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OACO and House Bill 4052

- 2021 HR 6 Declares Racism a Public Health Crisis
- 2022 HB 4052 Addressing Racism as a Public Health Crisis Improve health and social outcomes for people in Oregon marginalized by racism and colonialism
- HB 4052 designed by Oregon Public Health Association's Health **Equity Task Force** 25
- OACO and OHA are two agencies tasked with implementing the bill
