Subject: HB 4154 – Relating to semiconductors Work Session Recommendations

HB 4154 A-Engrossed:

- Directs the Higher Education Coordinating Commission (HECC) to establish a statewide semiconductor industry consortium and provides a blank one-time General Fund appropriation to HECC to do this work.
- Establishes the Semiconductor Talent Sustaining Fund.
- Establishes three subaccounts within the Semiconductor Talent Sustaining Fund and appropriates a total of \$15 million General Fund to HECC for deposit of \$5 million into each of the subaccount.
- Appropriates \$14.9 million General Fund to distribution to three universities and two community colleges to fund semiconductor related research, training, education, and workforce development.
- Expands the use of the Oregon CHIPS Fund, authorized by SB 4 (2023), to include transferring monies to the Semiconductor Talent Sustaining Fund.
- Adds assistance from the National Semiconductor Technology Center (NSTC) to the types of federal assistance for which the Oregon CHIPS Fund can be used.
- Exempts programs that receive assistance from the NSTC from sections of SB 4 (2023) that require the recipients of state semiconductor grants to generate minimum amounts of state and local revenue or to create permanent, full-time jobs in Oregon with above-average pay.

The measure previously had hearings in the House Committee on Higher Education on 2/6/2024 and 2/15/2024 and was reported out with a do pass recommendation.

The –A2 amendment removes the requirement for HECC to establish a statewide semiconductor industry consortium. The –A2 amendment also removes the establishment of the three subaccounts and all appropriation language. With the –A2 amendment, the measure:

- Establishes the Semiconductor Talent Sustaining Fund and directs HECC to allocate moneys from the Semiconductor Talent Sustaining Fund to provide education, training, and research to assist the semiconductor industry.
- Expands the use of the Oregon CHIPS Fund to include transferring monies to the Semiconductor Talent Sustaining Fund.
- Adds assistance from the National Semiconductor Technology Center to the types of federal assistance for which the Oregon CHIPS Fund can be used.
- Exempts programs that receive assistance from the National Semiconductor Technology Center from sections of SB 4 (2023) that require the recipients of state semiconductor grants to generate minimum amounts of state and local revenue or to create permanent, full-time jobs in Oregon with above-average pay.

The measure sunsets on January 2, 2030.

With the –A2 amendment, the fiscal impact to affected agencies is minimal.

#### **Recommended Changes**

LFO recommends adoption of the -A2 amendment.
