

## HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 5204

3 **“DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION**

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5 **“SECTION 1.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation  
6 made to the Department of Education by section 2 (3), chapter 449, Oregon Laws 2023, for  
7 the biennium ending June 30, 2025, to be distributed as grants-in-aid, for program costs and  
8 to purchase services, for youth development programs, is increased by \$2,500,000, for the  
9 East Metro Outreach, Prevention and Intervention program.

10 **“SECTION 2.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation  
11 made to the Department of Education by section 1 (1), chapter 449, Oregon Laws 2023, for  
12 the biennium ending June 30, 2025, for operations, is increased by \$1,988,595, for curriculum  
13 supplements related to the dangers of synthetic opioids.

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15 **“DEPARTMENT OF EARLY LEARNING AND CARE**

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17 **“SECTION 3.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation  
18 made to the Department of Early Learning and Care by section 1 (2), chapter 448, Oregon  
19 Laws 2023, for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, for Early Learning Programs, is increased  
20 by \$2,700,000, for relief nurseries.

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22 **“HIGHER EDUCATION COORDINATING COMMISSION**

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24 **“SECTION 4.** In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appro-  
25 priated to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission, for the biennium ending June 30,  
26 2025, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$4,000,000, for distribution to the following in-  
27 stitutions in the following amounts to be used for education and training to expand the be-  
28 havioral health workforce in Oregon, which may include awarding stipends, fellowships,  
29 scholarships or any other type of tuition assistance to students; providing behavioral and  
30 mental health services to individuals from underserved communities, including individuals  
31 who are veterans, homeless or living in rural environments; partnering with community or-  
32 ganizations and labor management partnerships to develop career pathways; developing ed-  
33 ucation and training programs; and any other method reasonably necessary to expand access  
34 to education and training in this state for the next generation of behavioral and mental  
35 health practitioners:

- 1 “(1) \$666,667 to Eastern Oregon University.
- 2 “(2) \$666,667 to Oregon Institute of Technology.
- 3 “(3) \$1,333,332 to Portland State University.
- 4 “(4) \$666,667 to Southern Oregon University.
- 5 “(5) \$666,667 to Western Oregon University.

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7 “OREGON HEALTH AUTHORITY

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9 “**SECTION 5.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation  
10 made to the Oregon Health Authority by section 1 (2), chapter 591, Oregon Laws 2023, for the  
11 biennium ending June 30, 2025, for Health Systems Division - Programs, is increased by  
12 \$2,055,976, for carrying out the provisions of chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2024 (Enrolled House  
13 Bill 4002).

14 “**SECTION 6.** Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on  
15 expenditures established by section 5 (2), chapter 591, Oregon Laws 2023, for the biennium  
16 ending June 30, 2025, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds,  
17 excluding federal funds described in section 2, chapter 591, Oregon Laws 2023, collected or  
18 received by the Oregon Health Authority, for Health Services Division - Programs, is in-  
19 creased by \$1,064,016, for carrying out the provisions of chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2024 (En-  
20 rolled House Bill 4002).

21 “**SECTION 7.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation  
22 made to the Oregon Health Authority by section 1 (7), chapter 591, Oregon Laws 2023, for the  
23 biennium ending June 30, 2025, for state assessments and enterprise-wide costs, is increased  
24 by \$3,675, for carrying out the provisions of chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2024 (Enrolled House  
25 Bill 4002).

26 “**SECTION 8.** Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on  
27 expenditures established by section 5 (7), chapter 591, Oregon Laws 2023, for the biennium  
28 ending June 30, 2025, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds,  
29 excluding federal funds described in section 2, chapter 591, Oregon Laws 2023, collected or  
30 received by the Oregon Health Authority, for state assessments and enterprise-wide costs,  
31 is increased by \$3,363, for carrying out the provisions of chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2024  
32 (Enrolled House Bill 4002).

33 “**SECTION 9.** Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on  
34 expenditures established by section 2 (10), chapter 591, Oregon Laws 2023, for the biennium  
35 ending June 30, 2025, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or  
36 other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, tobacco tax receipts, marijuana tax re-  
37 cepts, beer and wine tax receipts, provider taxes and Medicare receipts, but excluding lot-  
38 tery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter 591, Oregon Laws 2023,  
39 collected or received by the Oregon Health Authority, for shared administrative services, is  
40 increased by \$81,704, for carrying out the provisions of chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2024 (En-  
41 rolled House Bill 4002).

42 “**SECTION 10.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropri-  
43 ation made to the Oregon Health Authority by section 1 (2), chapter 591, Oregon Laws 2023,  
44 for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, for Health Systems Division - Programs, is increased  
45 by \$7,500,000, for distribution to Community Mental Health Programs for community resto-

1 ration services.

2 “**SECTION 11.** In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appro-  
3 priated to the Oregon Health Authority, for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, out of the  
4 General Fund, the amount of \$9,825,000, for Health Systems Division - Programs, for dis-  
5 tribution to Community Mental Health Programs to provide deflection program coordination  
6 and services as described under section 76, chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2024 (Enrolled House  
7 Bill 4002).

8 “**SECTION 12.** In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appro-  
9 priated to the Oregon Health Authority, for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, out of the  
10 General Fund, the amount of \$3,155,147, which shall be expended to provide the nonfederal  
11 matching share required for costs of targeted case management services in the Nurse-Family  
12 Partnership nurse home visiting services program.

13 “**SECTION 13.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropri-  
14 ation made to the Oregon Health Authority by section 1 (1), chapter 591, Oregon Laws 2023,  
15 for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, for Health Systems Division -Administration, is in-  
16 creased by \$750,000, for the System of Care Advisory Council to partner with a national or-  
17 ganization specializing in resources addressing issues of drug-endangered children.

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19 **“DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS**

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21 “**SECTION 14.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropri-  
22 ation made to the Department of Corrections by section 1 (4), chapter 377, Oregon Laws 2023,  
23 for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, for community corrections, is increased by \$16,000,000.

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25 **“OREGON CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMISSION**

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27 “**SECTION 15.** In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appro-  
28 priated to the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission, for the biennium ending June 30, 2025,  
29 out of the General Fund, the amount of \$20,708,200, for deposit into the Oregon Behavioral  
30 Health Deflection Program Account established by section 78, chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2024  
31 (Enrolled House Bill 4002).

32 “**SECTION 16.** Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of  
33 \$20,708,200 is established for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, as the maximum limit for  
34 payment of expenses by the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission from the Oregon Behav-  
35 ioral Health Deflection Program Account established in section 78, chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws  
36 2024 (Enrolled House Bill 4002), for making grants to fund deflection programs through the  
37 formula established in section 76 (6), chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2024 (Enrolled House Bill 4002),  
38 including grants in the amount of 50 percent of the expected formula amounts due to the  
39 following counties, which must be distributed within 60 days of the effective date of this 2024  
40 Act: Baker County, Benton County, Clackamas County, Clatsop County, Columbia County,  
41 Crook County, Curry County, Deschutes County, Gilliam County, Grant County, Harney  
42 County, Hood River County, Jackson County, Josephine County, Klamath County, Lane  
43 County, Malheur County, Marion County, Morrow County, Multnomah County, Umatilla  
44 County, Wasco County and Washington County.

2 “SECTION 35. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropri-  
3 ation made to the Public Defense Services Commission by section 1 (10), chapter 481, Oregon  
4 Laws 2023, for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, for the Special Programs, Contracts and  
5 Distributions Division, is increased by \$2,056,436, for the unrepresented defendant/persons  
6 crisis and a misdemeanor training collaboration with law schools.

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8 “OREGON DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

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10 “SECTION 36. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there are appro-  
11 priated to the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, for the biennium ending June  
12 30, 2025, out of the General Fund, the following amounts, for provision of grants to the fol-  
13 lowing entities for the following purposes:

14 “(1) \$600,000 to New Directions Northwest, Inc., to build a crisis receiving center addition  
15 to the Recovery Village Crisis Stabilization and Detox Center.

16 “(2) \$5,000,000 to Benton County Health Department Behavioral Health Division to relo-  
17 cate Children and Family Services.

18 “(3) \$4,000,000 to Clackamas County for the construction of a crisis stabilization center.

19 “(4) \$500,000 to Clatsop Behavioral Healthcare to acquire detox and substance use disor-  
20 der treatment residential beds.

21 “(5) \$400,000 to Coos Health and Wellness for the development of a sobering center.

22 “(6) \$525,000 to BestCare Treatment Services, Inc., to expand detox capacity in central  
23 Oregon.

24 “(7) \$1,500,000 to Deschutes County Community Mental Health Program to support the  
25 Deschutes County Stabilization Center.

26 “(8) \$5,000,000 to Adapt Integrated Health Care to support the construction of the Adapt  
27 Recovery Campus.

28 “(9) \$500,000 to Addictions Recovery Center, Inc., for sobering center operations.

29 “(10) \$1,000,000 to Addictions Recovery Center, Inc., to support the Substance Use Dis-  
30 order Withdrawal Management Expansion project.

31 “(11) \$1,500,000 to BestCare Treatment Services, Inc., to develop culturally specific sub-  
32 stance use disorder residential treatment capacity.

33 “(12) \$2,400,000 to Klamath Basin Behavioral Health to support the construction of a  
34 residential treatment facility with a crisis stabilization center.

35 “(13) \$2,500,000 to Transformations Wellness Center for the construction of a residential,  
36 co-occurring, substance use disorder treatment facility with detox beds.

37 “(14) \$4,000,000 to Willamette Family, Inc., to support the construction of the Willamette  
38 Family Medical Detox and Resident Services facility.

39 “(15) \$3,500,000 to Lincoln County Health and Human Services Department to support the  
40 Lighthouse Village Apartments Mental Health Housing project.

41 “(16) \$5,750,000 to Lifeways, Inc., for the Ontario Medical Plaza project to convert vacant  
42 retail space into an integrated healthcare facility with supported housing units.

43 “(17) \$11,500,000 to Bridgeway Recovery Services, Inc., for the development of the  
44 Bridgeway Medical Center and substance use disorder treatment residential facilities.

45 “(18) \$10,000,000 to Multnomah County to support the construction of a behavioral health

1 drop-off center.

2 “(19) \$4,000,000 to the 4th Dimension Recovery Center (4D Recovery) to support the ac-  
3 quisition of a facility to provide adolescent substance use disorder residential and outpatient  
4 services.

5 “(20) \$4,000,000 to Cascade AIDS Project to purchase the Prism Health facility located on  
6 North Morris Street, Portland, Oregon.

7 “(21) \$333,000 to Wallowa Valley Center for Wellness to support phase 2 of the Park  
8 Street Transitional Housing project.

9 “(22) \$8,000,000 to Wasco County to support the development of the Mid-Columbia Center  
10 for Living Campus.

11 “(23) \$8,900,000 to Washington County Behavioral Health Division to support the devel-  
12 opment of the Center for Addictions Triage and Treatment project.

13 “SECTION 37. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appro-  
14 priated to the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, for the biennium ending June  
15 30, 2025, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$1,000,000, for distribution to Portland Op-  
16 portunities Industrialization Center for a peer-to-peer mentoring outreach program.

17 “SECTION 38. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appro-  
18 priated to the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, for the biennium ending June  
19 30, 2025, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$150,000, for distribution to WomenFirst  
20 Transition and Referral Center for the purpose of providing detox services.

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22 “LEGISLATIVE POLICY AND RESEARCH COMMITTEE  
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24 “SECTION 39. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropri-  
25 ation made to the Legislative Policy and Research Committee by section 15, chapter 383,  
26 Oregon Laws 2023, for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, is increased by \$400,340, for the  
27 purpose of supporting the task forces under sections 16 and 18, chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws  
28 2024 (Enrolled House Bill 4002).

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30 “EMERGENCY BOARD  
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32 “SECTION 40. (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is ap-  
33 propriated to the Emergency Board, for the biennium ending June 30, 2025, out of the Gen-  
34 eral Fund, the amount of \$4,700,000, to be allocated to the Oregon Health Authority for  
35 payments to employers of behavioral health care providers, as described in section 20, chap-  
36 ter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2024 (Enrolled House Bill 4002), following the approval by the Centers  
37 for Medicare and Medicaid Services of the use of Federal Medical Assistance matching funds  
38 by the Oregon Health Authority for this purpose.

39 “(2) If any of the moneys appropriated under subsection (1) of this section are not allo-  
40 cated by the Emergency Board prior to December 1, 2024, the moneys remaining on that date  
41 become available for any purpose for which the Emergency Board lawfully may allocate  
42 funds.
